ACES EMA 2020 Training Schedule

Registration Policy/Procedures

All students must **pre-register** for classes coordinated by the Division of Emergency Management (ACES-EMA). In order to plan for facilities and equipment ACES-EMA needs to know how many students are attending each program. Therefore, the ACES-EMA reserves the right not to accept walk-in students for any program.

ACES-EMA uses web-based systems for course enrollments. Each class will have a registration link. Some classes require authorization and you may not receive a confirmation up to one week prior to the class start date. If you are declined, you will receive notice via the online registration system.

Approval to ACES-EMA Courses will be based on the following priority:

1. County/local emergency management personnel, first responders (law enforcement, fire, EMS and others), and VOAD/NGO's from within Allegheny County.
2. Other emergency management, allied emergency services, and VOAD/NGO personnel with related responsibilities from the Region 13 Task Force area.
3. Private sector preparedness professionals.
4. Any other emergency management and allied emergency services personnel with related responsibilities on a case-by-case basis.

For courses with a prerequisite requirement(s), students must have documentation of the prerequisites being met with them on the first day of class. A copy of the certificate issued for the prerequisite course will satisfy this requirement. Any student without documentation will not be permitted to participate in the program.

No Show Policy

As program space is limited, the ACES-EMA reserves the right to suspend any student from attending future ACES-EMA classes who registers for a program and then does not show up for the class. If such "No-Shows" occur as a group from a single organization, ACES-EMA reserves the right to suspend the entire organization from attending courses sponsored by ACES-EMA.

G-402: Overview of the Incident Command System for Senior Officials and Executives

3 hours Prerequisites: None

The purpose of this course is to familiarize Senior Officials (executives, elected and appointed officials, city/county managers, agency administrators, etc.) with their role in supporting incident management within the National Incident Management System (NIMS). This course has been customized to be Pennsylvania and Allegheny specific. The course will provide an overview of the municipal requirements, as per PA Title 35, in regard to emergency management and the role and responsibilities of the municipal emergency management coordinator.

This training will equip participants with the basic skills needed to function as Public Information Officers (PIOs), such as oral and written communications, understanding and working with the media, and basic tools and techniques needed to perform effectively.

G-364: Multi-Hazard Emergency Planning for Schools

16 hours Prerequisites: None Recommended: IS-100, IS-700

This field course provides schools with the knowledge, skills, and tools needed to refine or develop an all-hazards school emergency plan (EOP) and to identify who to train and exercise to the school EOP. This course follows the guidance set forth in the FEMA Comprehensive Preparedness Guide, CPG-101, for developing an emergency operations plan and explains how to utilize the National Incident Management System (NIMS) as the foundation for planning and building partnerships with outside agencies such as Law Enforcement, Fire, and Emergency Management.

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G-386: Mass Fatalities Incident Response

16 hours Prerequisites: None

This course prepares state and local response personnel and other responsible agencies and professionals to handle mass fatalities effectively and to work with the survivors in an emergency or disaster. This course covers incident management; mass fatalities; planning before and operations during an incident; establishing the morgue; family assistance support operations; and assistance from the Federal government. Participants will learn to identify the characteristics of a mass fatality incident and identify the roles and responsibilities of key personnel in the incident. In addition, the instructor will describe the steps required to respond to a mass fatalities incident, including catastrophic numbers of fatalities and contaminated remains, and help participants determine their jurisdiction's preparedness for a mass fatalities event.

G-557: Rapid Needs Assessment

8 hours Prerequisites:

Recommended: IS-100, IS-120, IS-200, IS-130. IS-700, & IS-800

This course provides information and resources that will enable participants to plan an effective Damage Assessment Program and conduct rapid and effective damage assessments in order to save lives, protect property and the environment, and begin the process of recovery and mitigation. Selection Criteria: Local officials who are responsible for assessing, collecting, and reporting damages during and after any event that causes damage of private, public, and critical infrastructure.

8 hours Prerequisites: None

This course presents the Incident Command System (ICS) and provides the foundation for higher level ICS training. This course describes the history, features and principles, and organizational structure of the Incident Command System. It also explains the relationship between ICS and the National Incident Management System (NIMS). This course also prepares personnel to coordinate with response partners from all levels of government and the private sector.

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ICS-200: ICS for Single Resources and Initial Action Incidents

12 hours Prerequisites: IS-100 or ICS-100

This course is designed to enable personnel to operate efficiently during an incident or event within the ICS, focusing on the management of single resources. ICS-200 provides training on and resources for personnel who are likely to assume a supervisory position within the ICS. Rather than tactical skills, ICS-200 provides overall incident management skills, covering the topics of Leadership and Management, Delegation of Authority and Management by Objectives, Functional Areas and Positions, Briefings, Organizational Flexibility, and Transfer of Command.

6 hours Prerequisites: None

The Parent-Student Reunification Course is designed to provide participants the ability to identify appropriate sites for the purpose of reuniting school students with their families in the event of a school closing or evacuation. Activities are provided to gain an understanding on how the characteristics of the hazard and its magnitude, intensity, speed of onset, and anticipated duration are all significant factors. These factors will determine the number of people to be reunited, the need for reunification facilities, internal/external communications and the extent of traffic control and security requirements.

AWR-136: Essentials of Community Cyber-Security

4 hours Prerequisites: None

The Essentials of Community Cybersecurity (ECCS) course provides individuals, community leaders, and first responders with information on how cyber-attacks can impact, prevent, and/or stop operations and emergency responses in a community. The course also provides a cursory introduction to cybersecurity vulnerabilities, risks, threats, and countermeasures. It explains vulnerabilities of computer systems and networks and how these vulnerabilities can affect communities, organizations, and daily workplace operations. The course introduces actions communities can take in establishing a cybersecurity program. The course provides participants with an awareness of issues. Participants discuss some of the fundamental activities needed to develop a cybersecurity program, without addressing the technical details of how to secure critical infrastructures.

AWR-147: Rail Car Incident Response

8 hours Prerequisites: None

This eight-hour awareness-level course is designed to increase the knowledge of first responders in recognizing and characterizing the different types of rail cars, potential leaks, and courses of action to be taken based on initial site assessment. The course will increase participants' knowledge of safety and hazardous conditions that may exist at the scene, and will allow them to become familiar with safe practices adopted by the railroad industry.

8 hours Prerequisites: None

This eight-hour awareness-level course for school administrators and emergency responders will educate rural law enforcement personnel as well as school administrators and staff to effectively respond to an emergency involving a school building or an entire school system. The training will provide representatives of rural law enforcement departments with a foundation of knowledge and skills that will enable them to progressively establish a school-based emergency response plan and crisis management team through information sharing and training.

AWR-228: Community Resilience

8 hours Prerequisites: None

This course demonstrates how to integrate risk and community-based collaborative strategies into plans and programs and introduces tools that help communities assess individual risks and vulnerabilities as well as introduces strategies to become more resilient and better prepared for natural disasters. This course will provide state and local government agency staff and other stakeholder groups with background on natural hazards. In addition, the course will guide an approach to (1) assess community resilience and (2) develop next steps for improved resilience. Through increased awareness of natural hazards and best practices, the course will enhance community resilience for state and local government agency staff that routinely interface with the community, private sector, and other stakeholder groups.

MGT-315: Critical Asset Risk Management

16 hours Prerequisites: None

The Critical Asset Risk Management course helps participants answer those questions by teaching critical components of risk management. Through a combination of lecture, facilitated discussion, and group activities, participants will learn how threats, vulnerabilities, and consequences determine risk, and are given an opportunity to practice the fundamentals of conducting vulnerability assessments by conducting on-site assessments of select local facilities. Additionally, they will identify potential mitigation measures associated with their findings and work together to develop and present a risk assessment report.

MGT-341: Disaster Preparedness for Hospitals and Healthcare Organizations within the Community Infrastructure

16 hours Prerequisites: None

The Disaster Preparedness for Hospitals and Healthcare Organizations Within the Community Infrastructure course provides information specific to hospitals and organizations vulnerability to a disaster. During this FEMA sponsored course, participants will be introduced to the various natural, technological, and civil hazards to which hospitals and healthcare organizations may be

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vulnerable and the potential impacts of those hazards. Federal guidelines and legislation that serve to aid in the preparedness for, and response to, incidents involving these hazards are discussed, as are current emergency management standards for the hospital community. Participants review response and recovery issues that should be addressed by medical facilities and organizations in preparation for a large-scale incident, including identification of critical resources necessary for response and recovery.

MGT-346: Emergency Operations Center Operations and Planning for All-Hazards Events

24 hours Prerequisites: None

This course focuses on the core functions, processes and best practices necessary to ensure effective and repeatable performance of an emergency operations center at any level. The core functions and processes are reviewed and demonstrated via facilitated discussion and classroom activities. The participants gain practical experience via a series of interrelated activities and exercises supported by a state-of-the-art computer simulation system and are coached by instructors who have extensive emergency operations and management.

AWR-356: Community Planning for Disaster Recovery

8 hours Prerequisites: None

Disaster Recovery is a complex, costly, and potentially lengthy process. Depending on the scope of a disaster, recovery efforts can last years and cost millions of dollars. Planning has a direct positive impact on a community's ability to recover from disasters. Planning for disaster recovery before disasters occur can significantly speed up and facilitate the post-disaster recovery process. Community Planning for Disaster Recovery is an eight-hour awareness-level course that provides facilitated discussions on key concepts for disaster recovery planning, including the benefits of pre-disaster planning, key elements, and the plan development process. This course will prepare participants to initiate disaster recovery plans and participate in the long-term recovery planning process in their own communities through the review of case studies and existing disaster recovery plans.

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MGT-385: Community Cybersecurity Exercise Planning

12 hours Prerequisites: AWR-136

This course is designed to introduce cyber to exercise planners to help them recognize the nature and reach of cyber, so they can better help their communities prevent, detect, respond to, and recover from cyber incidents. Participants will recognize how cyber can be incorporated into exercises in a meaningful way. Participants will be introduced to cyber topics and how cyber can impact the business operations of an organization and community. Lecture and activities will explore objectives, players, cyber injects and challenges to incorporating cyber into exercises. Participants will be exposed to many possible injects and scenarios that can be used in an exercise. Participants will begin development of a community cybersecurity tabletop exercise. The Community Cybersecurity Maturity Model will be used to examine the contribution of exercises to a community's overall cybersecurity posture. This course teaches planning personnel how to include cyber components in their regular planning process. Participants will be given the opportunity to plan cyber components for future community cybersecurity exercises.

MGT-403: Access and Functional Needs Preparedness Planning

8 hours Prerequisites: IS-100, IS-200, & IS-368

This eight-hour planning and management-level course will assist in preparing communities to meet the assistance and safety needs of older adults, and people with access and functional needs during a crisis event in rural communities using an approach with the Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) Whole Community initiative. Due to the expected diverse student population, general information regarding crisis planning and response (incident command system (ICS), National Incident Management System (NIMS), etc.) will be discussed, flowing into a narrower discussion regarding the needs and care issues of older adults. Included in the discussion are short- and long-term care, pet care, medication, and the need for durable medical equipment and healthcare. The issue of individuals from assisted-living and nursing homes will be emphasized in lessons learned from various disasters.

MGT-414: Advanced Critical Infrastructure Protection

8 hours Prerequisites: None

In this course participants will enhance their skills to formulate considerations for the resiliency of jurisdictional assets leveraging cross-sector partnerships. These considerations will enhance the whole community's ability to manage the risk associated with critical infrastructure protection

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efforts. The course will implement the National Preparedness Goal by facilitating the development of Resiliency Action Plans, involving all jurisdictional critical infrastructure partners.
