 42 MR. BARKER: 9862-16. Proclamation
 43 congratulating the Pittsburgh Penguins upon the occasion
 44 of its 50th anniversary.

1 making the team one of the most successful franchises in
 2 the league. The Pens have won eight division
 3 championships, nine conference finals, five Stanley Cup
 4 finals and four Stanley Cup Championships, 1991, 1992,
 5 2009 and 2016.
 6 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the
 7 Allegheny County Council does hereby congratulate the
 8 Pittsburgh Penguins upon the momentous occasion of their
 9 50th anniversary. We thank the organization for its
 10 generous contributions benefiting our community and we
 11 recognize the team as a shining example of excellence for
 12 all of Allegheny County. This is sponsored by myself and
 13 all of Council. Thank you.
 14 (Applause.)
 15 MR. FINNERTY: Do you want to read?
 16 MR. PALMIERE: If you don't mind.
 17 MR. FINNERTY: Yes, that's great.
 18 MR. PALMIERE: This is the Proclamation,
 19 gentleman, for the Cup this year. Okay? And I want to
 20 tell you, I had the pleasure of --- my credit card has
 21 never been swelled up like that ever. I want to tell you.
 22 MR. FINNERTY: It was a good cause.
 23 MR. PALMIERE: It was a wonderful cause. When I
 24 got that --- my wife said, I'm so glad you were able to go
 25 to all those playoff games until she saw the bill. Wow.
 26 It was a pleasure being there. I loved every minute of
 27 it. And I survived it.
 28 MR. FINNERTY: That was a big contract.
 29 MR. PALMIERE: Oh, my, I'll tell you.
 30 WHEREAS, on June 12th, 2016 after an impressive
 31 48-26 in eight regular season record, the Pittsburgh
 32 Penguins defeated the San Jose Sharks three games to one
 33 to conclude a dramatic six game series to win, for the
 34 fourth time in franchise history, the Stanley Cup and
 35 become National League --- National Hockey League
 36 Champions; and
 37 WHEREAS, the Pittsburgh Penguins have amassed
 38 one of the best winning records in the National Hockey
 39 League, having qualified for five Stanley Cup finals and
 40 winning the Stanley Cup four times, back-to-back seasons
 41 in '91 and '92, in 2009 and again in 2016 and hopefully in
 42 2017.
 43 WHEREAS, on October 6th, 2016, President Barack
 44 Obama welcomed the Pittsburgh Penguins to the White House
 45 to honor the Stanley Cup Champions; and

1 9931-16. Proclamation congratulating the
 2 Pittsburgh Penguins for winning the 2016 Stanley Cup.
 3 9932-16. Proclamation honoring Pittsburgh
 4 Penguins Captain Sidney Crosby for his outstanding
 5 accomplishments on and off the ice. Sponsored by Council
 6 Members Finnerty, Baker, DeFazio, DeMarco, Ellenbogen,
 7 Futules, Kirk, Klein, Kress, Macey, Martoni, Means,
 8 Palmiere, Ranalli-Russell and Walton.
 9 MR. FINNERTY: We got everybody here. We have
 10 with us David Morehouse who's the CEO and President of
 11 Pittsburgh Penguins, so would you come up, David?
 12 Also Travis Williams, who is the COO, General
 13 Counsel. And we have Tom McMillan, who is the Vice
 14 President of Communications for the Pittsburgh Penguins.
 15 We want to really --- we really appreciate what
 16 the Penguins have done for Allegheny County, the City of
 17 Pittsburgh. It's quite amazing with Mario Lemieux and
 18 what he's done, and how you've carried it on. It's just
 19 an amazing, amazing team, how you people seem to come back
 20 from whatever, down 4-2 and six goals, bingo, it's over.
 21 It's amazing. It was amazing. So let me read this
 22 proclamation about your 50th.
 23 WHEREAS, thanks to the original owner, Jack
 24 McGregor, and his local group of supporters on February
 25 9th, 1966, the National Hockey League awarded an expansion
 26 team to Pittsburgh for the 1967-68 season. The Pittsburgh
 27 Penguins played their first game October the 11th, 1967;
 28 and,
 29 WHEREAS, the Pittsburgh Penguins played in the
 30 Civic Arena, also known as the Igloo, from the time of
 31 their inception to the end of the 2009-2010 season. In
 32 September 2010, the Penguins completed the move to the
 33 state of the art CONSOL Energy Center now named PPG Paints
 34 Arena.
 35 WHEREAS, over the past five decades, some of the
 36 greatest players in the history of hockey have wore the
 37 Pittsburgh Penguin crest; Mario Lemieux, Jaromir Jagr,
 38 Paul Coffey, Tom Barrasso, Rich Kehoe, Jean Pronovost,
 39 Kevin Stevens, Ron Francis, Sidney Crosby and Evgeni
 40 Malkin, just to name a few. Throughout the years, the
 41 Penguins have led by --- have been led by 23 head coaches
 42 including Hockey Hall of Famer "Badger" Bob Johnson,
 43 Scottie Bowman and Herb Brooks; and
 44 WHEREAS, Mario Lemieux is credited with saving
 45 the Pittsburgh Penguins from financial misfortune and

1 WHEREAS, the Pittsburgh Penguins franchise
 2 management and players have demonstrated the talent, skill
 3 and determination that has earned the affection and pride
 4 of Allegheny County and its citizens.
 5 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the
 6 Allegheny County Council does hereby congratulate the
 7 Pittsburgh Penguins' organization for bringing the Stanley
 8 Cup back to Pittsburgh. And we commend these talented
 9 players and coaches for capturing the sports ultimate
 10 prize once again continuing evidence that this is the
 11 County of Champions. Sponsored by Mr. Kress and all the
 12 rest of us on County Council.
 13 And I want to say, gentlemen, that the night
 14 that we didn't win, that fifth night, was the most exiting
 15 night I think I've ever experienced in Pittsburgh. That
 16 was just a marvelous night. But we knew when we left
 17 there that night that you guys were going back to San Jose
 18 and bring it home. Thank you very much and it was a
 19 pleasure to meet all of you. Thank you.
 20 (Applause.)
 21 MR. FINNERTY: We have to read Sid's. It's
 22 amazing.
 23 MR. KRESS: This is a story. I wanted to read
 24 the shorter one. Okay.
 25 WHEREAS, having from Cole Harbour, Nova Scotia,
 26 Canada, Sid The Kid, Sidney Crosby was the top overall
 27 pick in the 2005 National Hockey League draft and brought
 28 the Pittsburgh Penguins and their fan base back to life;
 29 and
 30 WHEREAS, in his first NHL season, Sidney Crosby
 31 finished sixth in the league in scoring with 102 points,
 32 39 goals, 63 assists, and was a runner-up for the Calder
 33 Memorial Trophy. By his second season, he led the NHL
 34 with 120 points, 36 goals, 84 assists to capture the Art
 35 Ross Trophy, becoming the youngest player and the only
 36 teenager to win a scoring title in any major North
 37 American sports league. That same season, Crosby won the
 38 Hart Memorial Trophy as the Professional Hockey Writers
 39 Association's choice for most valuable player and the
 40 Lester B. Pearson Award as NHL Players Association's
 41 choice for most outstanding player, becoming the seventh
 42 player in NHL history to earn all three awards in one
 43 year.
 44 WHEREAS, on May 31st, 2007, Sidney Crosby was
 45 named captain of the Pittsburgh Penguins and in 2009

1 became the youngest captain in NHL history to win the
 2 Stanley Cup. And in the 2009-2010 season, Crosby scored a
 3 career high 51 goals, tying him with Steve Stankos for the
 4 Rocket Richard Trophy as a league leader with 58 assists.
 He totaled 109 points, second in the NHL.

5 During the off season, Crosby received a Mark
 6 Messier Leadership, most outstanding player --- Mark
 7 Messier Leadership --- Mark Messier Leadership Award. In
 8 the 2012-2013 season, Crosby received the Ted Lindsay
 9 Award given to the NHL's most outstanding player as voted
 10 on by the members of the NHL, PAA, NHLPA --- excuse me.
 11 The 2013-14 season accumulated an award and hat trick
 12 where Crosby was the recipient of the Art Ross Trophy,
 13 Hart Memorial Trophy and the Ted Lindsay Award. In 2016,
 14 he became a Stanley Cup Champion for the second time and
 15 received the Conn Smythe Trophy; and

16 WHEREAS, internationally, Sidney Crosby has
 17 represented Canada in numerous tournaments for the
 18 country's junior and men's teams. He won gold medals in
 19 2010, in the 2014 Winter Olympics and 2015. He captained
 20 Team Canada to a gold medal at the IIHF Men's World
 21 Championship and became a member of the Triple Gold Club
 22 by winning the IIHF World Championship, Olympic Gold and
 23 the Stanley Cup.

24 To date, Crosby is the only member of the Triple
 25 Gold Club who served as captain of each respective team.
 26 He helped Team Canada win the 2016 World Cup of Hockey
 27 Gold Medal and also was selected as the Most Valuable
 28 Player. He joined Bobby Orr and Wayne Gretzky as the only
 29 players to win the Conn Smythe, Hart Trophy and World Cup
 30 MVP; and

31 WHEREAS, Sidney Crosby established the Sidney
 32 Crosby Foundation in 2009 to financially assist charities
 33 and improve the lives of disadvantaged children. He
 34 founded the Sidney Crosby Hockey School in his hometown of
 35 Cole Harbour in Nova Scotia, and his commitment in giving
 36 back to his community has extended to Pittsburgh, his home
 37 away from home.

38 WHEREAS, Sidney Crosby has made multiple visits
 39 to patients at Children's Hospital Pittsburgh, he
 40 regularly purchases a luxury suite where he hosts Big
 41 Brothers, Big Sisters, Children's Hospital Pittsburgh,
 42 Boys and Girls Club of Western Pennsylvania, Make a Wish
 43 Foundation and the Special Olympics, among the dozens of
 44 local charities. He's a major sponsor of the Little
 45

1 the Steelers, Pirates and Pitt. And also by the fans and
 2 their enthusiasm. And Sidney Crosby said it himself, Game
 3 6, what you referred to from last --- from the Stanley Cup
 4 Finals, we had 18,500 people inside, we had 20,000 people
 5 outside and we had another 15,000 in Market Square. As a
 6 matter of fact, when we went out at five o'clock --- the
 7 game was an eight o'clock start --- the area outside was
 8 completely packed. And I turned to Travis, I said,
 9 where's our overflow? And he said, well, we have another
 10 screen on its way. We have to find a place for it. And
 11 we ended up in Market Square so ---

12 MR. FINNERTY: That was fantastic that you were
 13 doing that.

14 MR. MOREHOUSE: But we didn't win that night.
 15 But we did --- as you said, we brought it home after we
 16 went to San Jose. And the players, you know, they follow
 17 the lead on the ice and off the ice of Mario Lemieux and
 18 Ron Burkle. Not on the ice, but off the ice. And as
 19 everyone knows, Mario has been involved in the community
 20 from the time he was a rookie in 1984. And the Lemieux
 21 Foundation has done a lot for Pittsburgh, for cancer
 22 research, neonatal research and Sid does the same thing.
 23 And most of our --- all of our players, actually, are
 24 committed to helping the community. And we're very
 25 fortunate to have the type of players that we do.

26 So I want to thank you for recognizing that on
 27 their behalf. And we're going to continue to do what we
 28 can to win another championship and to continue to be
 29 engaged in the community. Thank you very much.

30 (Applause.)

31 MR. FINNERTY: Thank you. Well, let's get our
 32 picture taken then.

33 MR. MOREHOUSE: I forgot. I forgot one thing.
 34 Every once in a while, Sidney Crosby gets hooked and we
 35 don't have anyone on the ice to really protect him. But I
 36 know we have Jumping Johnny DeFazio and the Masked Marvel.
 37 So what I want to know is, can you skate?

38 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: No.

39 MR. MOREHOUSE: We can teach you to skate, but
 40 we may need your help.

41 MS. KIRK: I'll skate behind him and push him
 42 along.

43 (Pictures taken.)

44 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: 9933-16 and the rest to be
 45 read into the record.

1 Penguins, Learn to Play Hockey Program in which boys and
 2 girls, age four to eight in the Greater Pittsburgh area
 3 receive head to toe equipment for a marginal fee and ten
 4 hours of on-ice instruction. More than 6,000 children
 5 participated in the Little Penguins program to date; and

6 WHEREAS, Sidney Crosby serves as a role model of
 7 hockey skill, sportsmanship and leadership for young
 8 hockey players throughout western Pennsylvania, Canada and
 9 around the world; and

10 WHEREAS, Sidney Crosby has made a tremendous
 11 impact on the City of Pittsburgh and Allegheny County
 12 through his kind and generous acts, and it is fitting that
 13 this Council recognizes his contributions to our
 14 community.

15 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOVLED, that the
 16 Allegheny County Council does hereby congratulate Sidney
 17 Crosby, captain of the Pittsburgh Penguins, for his
 18 incredible accomplishments on and off the ice. Promoting
 19 the sport of hockey with grace and humility and for your
 20 dedication to serving the people of Pittsburgh and
 21 Allegheny County. Again, sponsored by Councilman Mike
 22 Finnerty and all the members of Allegheny County Council.
 23 Thank you.

24 (Applause.)

25 MR. KRESS: And I just have to say one thing
 26 about out sports teams. We overlook those --- the great
 27 things that they do for our community. I just want to say
 28 with the Penguins' organization, they've raised money for
 29 our fallen officers. Like recently Scott Bashoum was
 30 killed in Washington County, and they were there raising
 31 money, I don't know how many days afterwards. And I have
 32 to say that's what --- to me, is a first class
 33 organization. I mean, again, you guys are about winning,
 34 but the ultimate winning is when you're helping people in
 35 our community. And I really do appreciate all the support
 36 you've done for all the people in our community. So thank
 37 you very much.

38 (Applause.)

39 MR. MOREHOUSE: Thank you. First of all, I want
 40 to thank the Council for their service. I know you work
 41 hard and you do well for the County. On behalf of Ron
 42 Burkle and Mario Lemieux, I want to thank you. And Sidney
 43 Crosby. Allegheny County is one of the --- is the best
 44 sports region in the country as evidenced by all the
 45 championship teams we've had. Not just the Penguins, but

 32 Second Reading. 9925-16.

33 MR. BARKER: A Resolution of the County of
 34 Allegheny, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, adopting an
 35 Operating Budget pursuant to Article IV, Section 2 and
 36 Article VII, Section 4 of the Home Rule Charter, by
 37 setting forth appropriations to pay the expenses of
 38 conducting the public business of Allegheny County and for
 39 meeting debt charges for the fiscal year beginning January
 40 1st, 2017 and ending December 31st, 2017. Sponsored by
 41 Council Members, Finnerty, DeFazio, DeMarco, Kress, Macey,
 42 Martoni and Palmiere.

43 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Finnerty?

44 MR. FINNERTY: Thank you, Mr. President. The
 45 operating budget is \$880,300,000. It's the day-to-day

1 budget. And most of these expenditures are for Health and
 2 Welfare, which is 41 percent and Public Safety, which is
 3 27 percent of that budget. So I move for approval.
 4 MR. MACEY: Second.
 5 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks? Seeing none,
 6 we'll take the roll.
 7 MR. BARKER: Mr. Baker?

 38 MR. BARKER: Resolution of the County of
 39 Allegheny, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, adopting a
 40 Capital Budget pursuant to Article IV, Section 2 and
 41 Article VII, Section 4 of the Home Rule Charter by setting
 42 forth appropriations to pay the expenses for capital
 43 expenditures during the fiscal year beginning January 1st,
 44 2017 and ending on December 31st, 2017. Sponsored by

1 MR. BARKER: Mr. Macey?
 2 MR. MACEY: Yes.

 15 MR. FINNERTY: President, could I make a
 16 comment? Personal privilege.
 17 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yes.
 18 MR. FINNERTY: The budget process is a team
 19 effort, and I'd like to thank the Executive's Budget
 20 Department under the direction of Mary Soroka and William
 21 McKain, the County Manger. Also, I'd like to thank our
 22 Budget Director, Walt Szymanski, and all of County
 23 Council. The process was a cooperative and collaborative
 24 effort this year, and it was without any major problems as
 25 we went along. So I thank everybody for that. Thank you,
 26 Mr. President.
 27 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Ellenbogen?
 28 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Thank you, Mr. President. I
 29 want to echo Mr. Szymanski's hard work that he did on this
 30 budget. He spent many a tireless day and evening.
 31 I just wanted to say that I voted for this
 32 budget, but I was unhappy with the monies that was given
 33 to the Allegheny County Treasurer. With the highest
 34 amount of money that he collects and also being charged
 35 with the enforcement of the Drink Tax and collecting all
 36 that money, that I was disappointed that there weren't a
 37 few more dollars for him to do his job. But other than
 38 that, I have nothing further. Thank you, Mr. President.
 39 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Macey?
 40 MR. MACEY: Thank you, Mr. President. I just
 41 want to say that Chairman Finnerty has done an omen's job.
 42 He has been there day in, day out. He's spent more time,
 43 more hours in the office trying to get this budget
 44 correct. And he's done a great job. And I just want to

 3 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Finnerty.
 4 MR. FINNERTY: Thank you, Mr. President. The
 5 capital budget is \$105,952,541. This is mostly used for
 6 bridges, 40 percent, roads, 17 percent and buildings, 16
 7 percent. The Chief Executive, Rich Fitzgerald, and
 8 Council have increased this budget from \$50 million to its
 9 --- right now it's what it is. And we'll say it's \$106
 10 million in the last three years. This demonstrates our
 11 commitment to upgrade the County's infrastructure, and I
 12 move for approval.
 13 MR. MACEY: Second.
 14 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks? Did you
 15 second it?
 16 MR. MACEY: Yes, I seconded, but I'd like
 17 to ---
 18 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Go ahead.
 19 MR. MACEY: Yeah, Thank you, Mr. President and
 20 Members of Council. I can tell you that the Public Works
 21 Department has done an omen's (phonetic) job in Allegheny
 22 County. They've gone through 50 miles of roads and
 23 infrastructure and done quite a bit of infrastructure with
 24 regards to bridges and retaining walls. So Allegheny
 25 County is getting better and they've done a lot more than
 26 we've seen in the past. And I can say only one thing,
 27 thank you, Public Works.
 28 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks? Any more
 29 remarks? Seeing none, we'll take the roll.
 30 MR. BARKER: Mr. Baker?
 31 MR. BAKER: Yes.
 32 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?
 33 MR. DEMARCO: Yes.
 34 MR. BARKER: Mr. Ellenbogen?

1 thank him. And I think I can speak for the rest of the
 2 Council. Mr. Finnerty has done a great job. Thank you.
 3 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Seeing no more remarks, will
 4 you take the role?
 5 MR. FINNERTY: No. We already voted.
 6 MR. BARKER: Yeah. We're good.
 7 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: I'm sorry. We had a little
 8 extra comments. I'm sorry. Under Liaison Reports?
 9 MR. DEMARCO: Liaison Report, yesterday, I had
 10 the pleasure of joining Councilman Mike Finnerty,
 11 Councilman Tom Baker, Councilwoman Sue Means, at an event
 12 that was held by Senator Guy Reschenthaler in Bridgeville
 13 in which we were honoring Vietnam era veterans. You know,
 14 many of the folks understand and recall the welcome that
 15 they received or the welcome they did not receive when
 16 they returned home. Yesterday between 80 and 90 Vietnam
 17 era veterans showed up there to be honored by the elected
 18 officials, presented with their ceremonial lapel pins.
 19 And each of us had the opportunity to individually thank
 20 each of them. And I think it was a tremendous event.
 21 Very well done. And I want to commend my other Council
 22 members for attending.
 23 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Finnerty and
 24 then I'll come to you.
 25 MR. FINNERTY: I'd just like to echo what you
 26 said. I don't know really have to repeat it. But it was
 27 just a privilege just to be there with those gentlemen,
 28 those heroes that fought for us over there.
 29 But also, the Western Pennsylvania Operating
 30 Engineers joint apprenticeship and training program is
 31 going on. The dates for it are between December 5th and
 32 December the 15th. So if you would like to --- I would
 33 say, want to put an application in --- I'm trying to find
 34 the number on here. I know I'll find it eventually. Oh,
 35 the telephone number is 724-668-2244. That's
 36 724-668-2244. So if you want to avail yourself of that,

 38 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Means?
 39 MS. MEANS: Yes. I also want to thank the ---
 40 all the Vietnam vets that served and reiterate what a
 41 wonderful --- and a privilege and honor it was to be there
 42 and honor the Vietnam vets. And if there's anyone
 43 watching today, please, we really appreciate your service
 44 to our country. And we think very highly of you.

1 I also wanted to congratulate the Friends of
 2 South Park who last Friday had their light-up night. It
 3 was a wonderful event. There was over 100 people, more
 4 like 150 people there. And I --- and the park rangers
 5 came and they brought their pets and the children really
 6 enjoyed that. And Santa came. And there was singing and
 7 punch and cookies, and it was just a really lovely event.
 8 And I want to thank the County Manager and the Parks
 9 Director for how they support the Friends. And thank the
 10 Friends for how they work so diligently to make the park a
 11 better place. So thank you.
 12 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Macey?
 13 MR. MACEY: Thank you, Mr. President. I just
 14 want to remind everybody that there's a celebrity of trees
 15 in the Renziehausen Park in McKeesport and the Mon Valley.
 16 And you could see the different ethnic interpretations of
 17 trees in the Mon Valley. And I think it's a great
 18 opportunity for you to go there and just see something
 19 just a little bit different. Thank you.
 20 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Seeing no more, we'll go to
 21 9938-16.
 22 MR. BARKER: Motion of the Council of Allegheny
 23 County to continue the services of Attorney John F.

 27 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Nick Futules, Representative
 28 Futules?
 29 MR. FUTULES: Sure. For the new members of
 30 Council, each year, the first week of the December month,
 31 we usually retain our attorney. So tonight, we would have
 32 to vote to retain him for the following year, 2017. So I

1 (Chorus of ayes.)
 2 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Opposed? The ayes have it.
 3 Public Comment on Agenda Items. We have, what is it, Bill
 4 Godshall.
 5 MR. GODSHALL: I'm not speaking. Sorry.
 6 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Richard Marino.
 7 MR. MARINO: Hello, my name is Richard Marino,
 8 I'm the owner of Cool Vapes. We have two locations with
 9 12 employees. I'm here today to urge County Council to
 10 reject the proposed ban from the Board of Health on
 11 electronic cigarettes and work in public places.
 12 The Board of Health's proposal, proposed ban is
 13 an absolute infringement on business owners, private
 14 property rights. The County should not be dictating what
 15 a business owner can or cannot do inside their own
 16 business. Currently, the decision to allow or disallow
 17 the use of electronic cigarettes is enforced by the
 18 management of that facility. Examples of this would be
 19 PNC Park and Heinz Field. Management chooses to allow or
 20 disallow with their very specific knowledge of that
 21 facility.
 22 This process works. It is not a one size fits
 23 all approach that the Board is proposing. The Board of
 24 Health refused to acknowledge at their first meeting that
 25 there were over 300 comments opposing the ban versus zero
 26 or none for it. Not a single person was complaining;
 27 however, they chose to proceed.
 28 You will hear from nonprofit organizations such
 29 as the American Heart and Lung Association, American
 30 Cancer Society and others that are funded by big
 31 businesses like Pfizer, GlaxoSmithKline and paid millions
 32 of dollars to publish their misleading and incorrect
 33 information about electronic cigarettes.
 34 Why you say? Because electronic cigarettes
 35 really do work and pose a real threat to their billion
 36 dollar industry. These are some of the most profitable
 37 nonprofit organizations you will find in the country.
 38 There's no credible research or evidence of harm
 39 from secondhand vapor from an electronic cigarette. The
 40 Center for Disease Control reports over 1,000 people die
 41 every day, 1,000 people a day die from smoking cigarettes.
 42 This is a viable alternative that saves lives and really
 43 we should not be banning it. We should be embracing it.
 44 But forcing users of lifesaving electronic cigarettes into
 45 the shameful category as traditional smokers, we are

 25 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: 9939-16.
 26 MR. BARKER: Motion of the Council of Allegheny
 27 County re-establishing the Budget Transfer Committee in
 28 accordance with Section 805.03 of the Administrative Code,
 29 Sponsored by Council Member Finnerty.
 30 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Finnerty?
 31 MR. FINNERTY: Thank you. I'd like to make a
 32 motion to approve.
 33 MR. MACEY: Second.
 34 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks? Seeing none,
 35 all those in favor signify by saying aye.
 36 (Chorus of ayes.)
 37 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Opposed? The ayes have it.
 38 Notification of Contracts, 9940-16.
 39 MR. BARKER: Communication summarizing approved
 40 executive actions from November 1st through November 30th,
 41 2016.
 42 MR. FINNERTY: Receive and file.
 43 MR. MACEY: Second.
 44 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks? Seeing
 45 none, all those in favor signify by saying aye.

1 sending the wrong message that they are all the same. And
 2 we know that is not true. Vaping is not smoking.
 3 The vaping industry is now under new federal FDA
 4 regulations that prohibit the sales to minors. Vaping
 5 products are not marketed to underage children. In fact,
 6 smoking is at an all-time low at all demographic levels.
 7 Over ten million people have now quit smoking over the
 8 last four to five years.
 9 I urge County Council to reject the proposal.
 10 It is imperative that current adult smokers become aware
 11 of the alternatives currently available to them. Thank
 12 you.
 13 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Kate Conn.
 14 MS. CONN: I was going to start with how about
 15 that Pens game last night, but you guys already got it
 16 covered. Thank you for that. So I'll just do business as
 17 usual.
 18 I'm here to comment about the indoor vaping ban
 19 that the Allegheny Board of Health has proposed to County
 20 Council. My name is Kate Conn. I'm an Allegheny County
 21 resident and I own a couple of businesses here in
 22 Allegheny County. And I have a few concerns about the
 23 proposed ban.
 24 First and most importantly, the overreach that
 25 the Board of Health expects the County to implement. I
 26 find it absurd that they expect the County to tell
 27 individual business owners how they can and cannot allow
 28 or disallow vaping in their private establishments. I
 29 know plenty of business owners who feel very strongly
 30 about a county-wide ban and whether or not they would
 31 chose to allow the vaping in their businesses. They
 32 definitely don't want the County to force their hand one
 33 way or another.
 34 The science backing secondhand vapor shows that
 35 there's minimal to no health risk associated with
 36 secondhand vapor. Yet the Board of Health did not present
 37 one rebuttal to that. They actually presented absolutely
 38 nothing in their unanimous vote to ban vapor products in
 39 the workplace.
 40 We got a very nonchalant, we're glad you quit
 41 smoking. We know it wasn't easy, but we cannot determine
 42 that these are harmless. I would have felt less cheated
 43 had they actually given us the respect to explain why
 44 Medically and scientifically, they feel that these are
 45 comparable to combustible tobacco products. It was a lot

1 of work for us in this industry to put in just to get a
 2 sharp no.
 3 This industry was created by consumers, not by
 4 big tobacco. It was created to end the tobacco epidemic
 5 and the deadly consequences users and innocent bystanders
 6 are subjected to. We back vapor products 100 percent
 7 because we've educated ourselves and we have years of
 8 experience using these vapor products.

9 I can tell you that by forcing any vapor outside
 10 to stand with the smokers is irresponsible in many levels.
 11 You're not only placing them alongside their Kryptonite,
 12 but you're subjecting them to the same secondhand poison
 13 they worked very hard to escape. I'm not going to harp on
 14 the health benefits. I'll send more information over via
 15 e-mail in addition to e-mails that I have already sent you
 16 guys in the past couple of weeks.

17 I will end with this. The City of St. Joseph,
 18 Missouri just voted on a smoking and vaping ban and vaping
 19 was excluded from the citywide smoking ban. They had the
 20 option to leave the regulation in place, remove it
 21 completely or create a new regulation solely for vaping.
 22 They chose to leave it alone due to the fact that
 23 businesses have the right to enforce a no vaping policy as
 24 is, but they didn't want them to be required to. This is
 25 what I hope to see here in Allegheny County. I do not see
 26 any businesses beating down your doors demanding
 27 electronic cigarette regulation. I do not think a
 28 Countywide regulation would be well received from business
 29 owners from all walks of life. And I know this industry
 30 is too important for public health to be demonized by any
 31 type of ban. Thank you.

32 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Someone like to
 33 make a motion to adjourn?

34 MR. MACEY: So moved.

35 MS. MEANS: There's three more.

36 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. I'm sorry. There's
 37 more room on the front page. Marc Conn. Marc Conn.

38 MR. CONN: Hello, Council members. And thank
 39 you for giving me the opportunity to speak with you today.

40 My name is Marc Conn and I'm one of the owners
 41 of Steel City Vapors. I'm an Allegheny County resident
 42 and both of my two shops are located in Allegheny County
 43 as well. I'm also a vaper myself and I've been cigarette
 44 free for almost five years thanks to electronic
 45 cigarettes.

1 I've spoken to lots of Congressmen and senators
 2 both in the state and federal level, and I've explained to
 3 them as I will to you today is that we're not against
 4 regulation. We're against unreasonable regulation. It
 5 has been a decade's long battle to cut smoking rates
 6 across all age groups, and it would be criminal to do
 7 anything to put that in jeopardy. But let's be clear,
 8 vaping is not smoking. While proposed regulations have
 9 some merit to them, they go far beyond what could be
 10 considered reasonable regulation. And they completely
 11 ignore some major unattended consequences. The
 12 regulations as written have three main problems.

13 First, it erroneously lumps electronic
 14 cigarettes and their users in with smokers. They do this
 15 by banning their use in public places just like their
 16 combustible counterparts with no consideration of the
 17 difference in both the product and the harm. This alters
 18 public perception into seeing e-cigs as having the same
 19 harm as combustible cigarettes even though they have been
 20 proven to be 95 percent less harmful. This could keep
 21 people smoking by demonizing the safer alternative. They
 22 also force vapers back outside with the smokers into the
 23 cloud of toxic chemicals that they have chosen to leave
 24 behind.

25 Second, these regulations impose unfair and
 26 meritless restrictions on business owners. There are
 27 owners that can see the advantage of vaping and allow
 28 their use while still banning the use of actual
 29 cigarettes. Not only does this regulation impose on the
 30 rights of business owners, but it can actually decrease
 31 workplace productivity.

32 A study published in the Journal of Tobacco
 33 Control in 2013 shows that even at its lowest cost, each
 34 smoker costs more than \$1,600 per year in unproductive
 35 time. That doesn't include any additional days off or
 36 health costs associated with smokers. All of these costs
 37 can be saved by allowing the use of electronic cigarettes
 38 while inside at work.

39 Finally, this ban is completely unnecessary.
 40 Proponents of this ban will give you two reasons why they
 41 support the regulations. You will hear claims that
 42 secondhand vape has toxins and heavy metals. And while it
 43 is true that some studies have shown this, flawed testing
 44 procedures and providing results in a vacuum has
 45 decontextualized all of those findings.

1 I sent most of you, if not all of you, a very
 2 detailed e-mail explaining all of these and giving you
 3 additional documentation from medical journals showing
 4 that secondhand vape has no negative side effects. You
 5 will also hear that you need to protect the children from
 6 vaping, that vaping will renormalize smoking. This
 7 statement is empirically disproven. Even with the surge
 8 in the use of electronic cigarettes in the past five
 9 years, the CDC has shown that cigarette use continues to
 10 decline year over year and is at its lowest point ever.

11 Furthermore, the children are already protected.
 12 The FDA released regulations on August the 8th and made it
 13 illegal to sell vaping products to minors nationwide.
 14 This alone should mitigate those fears. The status quo
 15 should also allow establishment to make their own
 16 decisions. Middle and high schools, all major sporting
 17 arenas all in Allegheny County and several other
 18 businesses have created their own policy banning the use
 19 of vapor products. Those establishments that have a large
 20 population of minors have already acted to limit the use
 21 of electronic cigarettes in those environments.

22 These regulations don't add any value and
 23 instead handcuff business owners, demonize vaping products
 24 and force those who have made the choice to live a
 25 healthier lifestyle to go and live that life outside
 26 shrouded in the smoke cloud that they fought so hard to
 27 leave. And for these reasons, the proposed regulations
 28 should be defeated. Thank you.

29 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay Brittany Huffman.

30 MS. HUFFMAN: Good evening. My name is Brittany
 31 Huffman and I am the program coordinator with Tobacco Free
 32 Allegheny, an organization dedicated to reducing the
 33 effects of smoking and secondhand smoke in Allegheny
 34 County.

35 Tobacco Free Allegheny is the regional, primary
 36 contractor for Allegheny County with the Pennsylvania
 37 Department of Health's Division of Tobacco Prevention and
 38 Control. I'm also a resident and live in Ross Township.

39 We are here today to speak in support of
 40 electronic cigarette regulations. Electronic cigarettes
 41 are a potential public health risk as the aerosol from
 42 E-cigarettes is not harmless water vapor and is not as
 43 safe as clean air. These cigarette aerosol contains heavy
 44 metals, ultrafine particulate and cancer causing agents
 45 like acrolein. These cigarettes also contain propylene

1 glycol or glycerin. These chemicals may meet the FDA
 2 definition for generally recognized as safe as food
 3 additives, but that distinction does not extend to the
 4 inhalation of these chemicals.

5 Many adults don't know that the indoor use of
 6 electronic cigarettes exposes children to nicotine and
 7 leaves nicotine deposits on surfaces. Various reporting
 8 sources across the United States have reported an increase
 9 in serious second and third-degree burns from exploding
 10 e-cigarettes. The United Kingdom saw a 44-percent
 11 increase in fire calls related to e-cigarettes between
 12 2013 and 2014. Local hospitals have banned e-cigarettes
 13 from their facilities because of the concerns safety
 14 officers have for explosion risks. These exploding
 15 devices now present a huge safety hazard to others.

16 An additional public health risk is exposure to
 17 e-cigarette liquid. The Centers for Disease Control and
 18 Prevention report that e-cigarette nicotine liquid
 19 exposure has resulted in a dramatic increase in calls to
 20 poison centers, increasing from one per month in September
 21 2010 to 215 per month in February 2014. The poisonings
 22 have been among users and non-users due to the ingestion
 23 of nicotine liquid, absorption through the skin and
 24 inhalation. More than half of the calls to poison centers
 25 due to e-cigarettes involved young children under age five
 26 and about 42 percent of the poison calls involved people
 27 aged 20 and older.

28 The health of youth is a major public health
 29 concern and the use of e-cigarettes in public places
 30 promotes the normalization of the behavior of smoking with
 31 youth. From 2011 to 2015, past 30 day use of e-cigarettes
 32 increased nearly tenfold for high school students from
 33 1.55 to 16 percent and nearly nine fold for middle school
 34 students from 6 percent to 5.3 percent. In 2013, more
 35 than a quarter of a million middle and high school
 36 students who had never smoked cigarettes had used
 37 e-cigarettes.

38 Even the Royal College of Physicians from the
 39 United Kingdom who are examining the harm of reduction
 40 potential of electronic cigarettes states that there's a
 41 need for regulation to reduce direct and indirect adverse
 42 effects of e-cigarette use. Prohibition of electronic
 43 cigarettes in areas where smoking is not allowed could
 44 support tobacco free norms, support enforcement of tobacco
 45 free laws, preserve clean indoor air standards and protect

1 bystanders from exposure to secondhand electronic
 2 cigarettes aerosol. Thank you.
 3 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay, Cassandra Wood,
 4 MS. WOOD: Good evening. My name is Cassandra
 5 Wood and I am a program specialist with the American Lung
 6 Association in Pennsylvania based here in Pittsburgh.
 7 The American Lung Association in Pennsylvania
 8 thanks you for the opportunity to comment on the
 9 e-cigarette regulation before the committee today.
 10 The American Lung Association in Pennsylvania
 11 supports the inclusion of e-cigarettes and Clean Indoor
 12 Air Laws and a comprehensive regulation. The Association
 13 wants to ensure that e-cigarettes are considered tobacco
 14 products as the FDA has ruled. Following the 2016
 15 announcement of FDA oversight of tobacco products,
 16 e-cigarette manufacturers will have two additional years
 17 to submit an application to remain in the marketplace.
 18 Until that time, the nearly 500 brands and 7,000 flavors
 19 of e-cigarettes will remain on the market before FDA is
 20 fully able to evaluate them. Until FDA's evaluation is
 21 done, there are very few ways for anyone other than
 22 manufacturers to know exactly what types of chemicals
 23 there are contained in e-liquids or how e-cigarettes might
 24 affect health whether short-term or long-term.
 25 We don't presently know all the chemicals that
 26 could be found in e-cigarettes. However, in initial lab
 27 tests conducted in 2009 the FDA found detectible levels of
 28 toxic, cancer-causing chemicals including an ingredient
 29 used in antifreeze in two leading brands of e-cigarettes
 30 in 18 various cartridges. Our review of studies found
 31 that levels of toxins in e-cigarettes aerosol varied
 32 considerably within and between brands.
 33 Data released from the CDC shows that calls to
 34 the nation's poison control center for e-cigarette
 35 exposure poisonings are rapidly increasing. One study
 36 found that while most calls involving e-cigarettes liquid
 37 poisoning came from accidental ingestion of the
 38 e-cigarette or its liquid, about one sixth of the calls
 39 involved to someone inhaling these items.
 40 Large doses of nicotine have the potential for
 41 poisoning with symptoms beginning from nausea and vomiting
 42 to the progression to seizures and respiratory depression
 43 in cases of severe nicotine poisoning. Tragically, one
 44 child died from acute e-cigarette poisoning in 2014
 45 attributed to the ingestion of liquid nicotine in

1 businesses, but it would also affect people where they
 2 currently live. So just something to think about as we
 3 evaluate this potentially coming up before us. Thank you,
 4 Mr. President.
 5 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. Is Godshall here? Go
 6 ahead. We'll put you on. We missed you, so go ahead.
 7 MR. GODSHALL: Good evening. I'm here to urge
 8 Council members to reject the Board of Health's workplace
 9 vaping banning again because it would deceive the public
 10 to believe vaping is as harmful as smoking, would
 11 discourage smokers from switching to vaping, would prompt
 12 some vapers to switch back to smoking. And it would
 13 expose youth to far more vapers and vaping outside of
 14 buildings.
 15 Since 1990 when I created Smoke Free
 16 Pennsylvania, we've campaigned to reduce cigarette smoking
 17 which is still the leading cause of disease, disability
 18 and death in the United States. Although our efforts have
 19 helped reduce teen smoking from --- excuse me. I just
 20 walked up four flights of steps. While we've helped
 21 reduce teen smoking right from 30 percent down below 10
 22 percent and we've helped reduce adults, reduce adult
 23 smoking rate from 27 percent down to 15 percent, there's
 24 still 36 million cigarette smokers in the United States
 25 and half of them will quit or half of them will die early
 26 if they don't quit smoking.
 27 The largest declines in adult and teen smoking
 28 have occurred since 2010 when vaping began to skyrocket
 29 nationwide among smokers. The largest declines in adult
 30 smoking have occurred among the youngest age groups.
 31 Survey data indicate there are not about 200,000 cigarette
 32 smokers in Allegheny County and about 50,000 vapers
 33 including about 10,000 to 15,000 vapers who have
 34 completely quit smoking and another 10,000 to 15,000
 35 vapers who have sharply reduced their cigarette
 36 consumption. Studies have found that smokers who have
 37 switched to vaping significantly improve their lung
 38 function. And a newly published study last week found
 39 that vaping significantly reduced blood pressure among
 40 hypertensive smokers who switched.
 41 A recent published --- a recently published
 42 study of a 100 vape shop customers found that 98 percent
 43 were previously smokers, 62 percent were biochemically
 44 verified to be smoking abstinent, and that the mean daily
 45 cigarette consumption by vapers who continued smoking had

1 e-cigarettes. As public places increasingly become smoke
 2 free, reports show some people are attempting to use
 3 e-cigarettes indoors and in public spaces which are smoke
 4 free like bars, restaurants and even public transit.
 5 While e-cigarettes do not contain smoke, they do
 6 expose others to secondhand emissions. Studies have found
 7 formaldehyde, benzene and tobacco specific carcinogens
 8 coming from the secondhand emissions. There is no
 9 evidence that these emissions are safe for nonusers to
 10 inhale. But there is much more testing that still needs
 11 to be done to determine the potential dangers that have
 12 yet to be found. The American Lung Association in
 13 Pennsylvania supports prohibiting the use of e-cigarettes
 14 at worksites and in public places and including
 15 e-cigarettes under smoke free laws with other tobacco
 16 products.
 17 Currently nine states and hundreds of
 18 communities have prohibited e-cigarette use in the same
 19 place where smoking is already prohibited. Join them.
 20 E-cigarettes are tobacco products. The American Lung
 21 Association in Pennsylvania remains concerned about their
 22 impact on public health as they are now the most commonly
 23 used tobacco product by youth. As the FDA begins its
 24 oversight of these products, we will learn more about
 25 them. And more safeguards will be put into place to
 26 protect the public's health. Thank you.
 27 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Would someone
 28 like to ---? Yes.
 29 MR. DEMARCO: I have a comment.
 30 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yes.
 31 MR. DEMARCO: For the Council's information, I
 32 just wanted --- because we're talking about this
 33 particular issue. The proposed legislation that the
 34 Health Department is talking about would ban vaping
 35 anywhere that smoke--- where smoking is prohibited. Last
 36 Wednesday, the Obama Administration, Housing, Department
 37 of Housing, or Urban Development, took and passed a ban on
 38 smoking any --- it prohibits smoking any lit tobacco
 39 products like cigarettes, pipes and cigars in indoor areas
 40 of public housing complexes. It also bans smoking in
 41 public housing administrative offices and in outdoor areas
 42 within 25 feet of the buildings.
 43 MR. MACEY: Great.
 44 MR. DEMARCO: So I just wanted to make everyone
 45 aware that this proposed ban here not only would affect

1 declined from 19 cigarettes a day down to 4.8. Scientific
 2 evidence indicates that vaping is 95 percent less
 3 hazardous than cigarettes and poses no harm to nonusers.
 4 Last week the United States Housing and Urban
 5 Development Agency issued a final rule banning smoking
 6 inside all public housing units and even outdoors within
 7 25 feet of doorways, but HUD reversed its originally
 8 proposed vaping ban in housing units pointing out that
 9 there's no evidence a vaping ban would provide any
 10 benefit. And just today, the American Legacy Foundation
 11 which has lobbied the Food and Drug Administration since
 12 2009 to ban the sale of all vapor products to adult
 13 smokers published a comprehensive review of 687 scientific
 14 articles on vapor products and concluded that electronic
 15 cigarettes are particularly helpful --- are particularly
 16 used by current smokers, pose substantially less harm to
 17 smokers than cigarettes and are being used to reduce and
 18 quit smoking. Thank you.
 19 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Someone want to
 20 make a motion to adjourn?
 21 MR. FINNERTY: I'll make that motion.
 22 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Second.
 23 MR. MACEY: Second.
 24 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: All those in favor signify
 25 by saying aye?
 26 (Chorus of ayes.)
 27 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Opposed? The ayes have it.
 28 Meeting adjourned. Thank you.
