1 MR. KLEIN: I'll call to order the Tuesday,  
 2 December the 5th, 2017 County Council meeting. I would  
 3 like to stand for the Pledge of Allegiance and silent  
 4 prayer and reflection.  
 5 Read --- repeat after me.  
 6 (Pledge of Allegiance.)  
 7 (Silent prayer or reflection.)  
 8 MR. KLEIN: Thank you. Roll call.  
 9 MR. BARKER: Mr. Baker?  
 10 MR. BAKER: Here.  
 11 MR. BARKER: Mr. Catena?  
 12 MR. CATENA: Here.  
 13 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?  
 14 MR. DEMARCO: Here.  
 15 MR. BARKER: Mr. Ellenbogen?  
 16 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Here.  
 17 MR. BARKER: Mr. Futules?  
 18 MR. FUTULES: Here.  
 19 MR. BARKER: Ms. Kirk?  
 20 MS. KIRK: Here.  
 21 MR. BARKER: Mr. Klein?  
 22 MR. KLEIN: Here.  
 23 MR. BARKER: Mr. Kress?  
 24 (No response.)  
 25 MR. BARKER: Mr. Macey?  
 26 MR. MACEY: Present.  
 27 MR. BARKER: Mr. Martoni?  
 28 DR. MARTONI: Here.  
 29 MR. BARKER: Ms. Means?  
 30 MS. MEANS: Here.  
 31 MR. BARKER: Mr. Palmiere?  
 32 MR. PALMIERE: Here.  
 33 MR. BARKER: Ms. Ranalli-Russell?  
 34 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: Here.  
 35 MR. BARKER: Mr. Walton?  
 36 MR. WALTON: Here.  
 37 MR. BARKER: President DeFazio?  
 38 (No response.)  
 39 MR. KLEIN: Proclamation certificates, 10417-17.  
 40 MR. BARKER: Proclamation recognizing and  
 41 commending departing Allegheny County Council Member James  
 42 R. Ellenbogen for his dedication and service to the  
 43 residents of Allegheny County. Sponsored by Council  
 44 President DeFazio and Council Members Baker, Catena,

1 for his contributions to Allegheny County Council and to  
 2 the enhancement of the wellbeing of the county's citizens.  
 3 Mr. Ellenbogen acted always in the best interest of his  
 4 constituents of Allegheny County and unwavering commitment  
 5 to council, serving as an exemplary model of leadership.  
 6 This council thanks him for his more than ten years of  
 7 dedicated public service and wish him well as he moves  
 8 into his future.  
 9 Sponsored by myself, John DeFazio and I imagine  
 10 other members of county council.  
 11 Jim?  
 12 (Applause.)  
 13 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Thank you, Nicky and members of  
 14 council.  
 15 Nick, as Spencer Tracy told Edward Brophy in the  
 16 movie The Last Hurrah, how do you thank a guy for a  
 17 million laughs?  
 18 With that, I would like to thank the people of  
 19 Allegheny County for allowing me the opportunity to have  
 20 served the people of this county. I've always said when  
 21 you make an elected official out of a guy who wore a badge  
 22 for all those years, it --- sometimes it goes right from  
 23 here to here (indicating). So if I offended anybody with  
 24 my mouth, I apologize.  
 25 To the members of council, thank you for all  
 26 your help. And working with you, you're a bunch of great  
 27 people. And if the public had any idea of the diligence  
 28 and the time that you folks put into this, they would find  
 29 out that you deserve a lot more money than you get paid,  
 30 for sure.  
 31 To our county solicitor, Council Solicitor Jack  
 32 Cambest, thank you for keeping me out of trouble all these  
 33 years by allowing me to talk to you before I open my big  
 34 mouth.  
 35 To my friend Walt Szymanski, who was the budget  
 36 director and the guy --- he was my go-to guy. I mean, he  
 37 was my Antonio Brown. Without him, I could've --- he got  
 38 so many things done that I never thought I could get done,  
 39 but Walt ---.  
 40 Jared, you were the author behind a lot of the  
 41 stuff that I wrote. I appreciate that.  
 42 The rest of council staff --- Sonya Dietz who  
 43 now was so good that Rich Fitzgerald took her, she was  
 44 also a help. And all the staff and people in the

1 DeMarco, Futules, Kirk, Klein, Kress, Macey, Martoni,  
 2 Means, Palmiere, Ranalli-Russell and Walton.  
 3 MR. FUTULES: Uh-huh (yes). That's pretty nice.  
 4 Well --- well, ladies and gentlemen, I'm here to  
 5 honor Mr. Jim Ellenbogen this evening. We've been friends  
 6 ever since I met him here on county council for --- for I  
 7 guess about 11 years now. And I hate to say it, but I  
 8 hate to see you go. You've been a great council person  
 9 and we've --- we've had a great relationship over the  
 10 years. Every so often, we get yelled at once in a while  
 11 by him. But other than that, you're a pretty nice guy  
 12 there, Jim.  
 13 So without further ado, I'm going to read this  
 14 proclamation on your behalf.  
 15 WHEREAS, throughout the history of Allegheny  
 16 County and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, talented  
 17 officials who proposed great knowledge and determination,  
 18 exhibit exemplary leadership in elected position and  
 19 contribute invaluable to our communities; and  
 20 WHEREAS, Jim R. Ellenbogen was elected on  
 21 November the 6th, 2007 and was duly sworn into the office  
 22 on November 30th, 2007. Because of his leadership,  
 23 confidence and community presence, he was reelected on  
 24 December --- I'm sorry --- November the 10th, 2009 and  
 25 November 12th, 2013 by the residents of the District 12 to  
 26 serve as their representative; and  
 27 WHEREAS, a lifelong resident of the City of  
 28 Pittsburgh and graduate from the University of Pittsburgh,  
 29 Mr. Ellenbogen is fervent about preserving community  
 30 values and being active in a ---  
 31 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Plethora.  
 32 MR. FUTULES: --- thank you --- plethora, can't  
 33 say that word --- plethora of local, charitable and  
 34 professional organizations; and  
 35 WHEREAS, during his tenure on county council,  
 36 Mr. Ellenbogen was appointed chairman of the Public Works  
 37 --- Public Safety Committee. He also served as a member  
 38 of the Appointment Review, Government Reform, Health and  
 39 Human Services, Parks, Public Works and Special Committees  
 40 on Marketing during his time on county council. Mr.  
 41 Ellenbogen demonstrated a strong interest in the county's  
 42 public safety; and  
 43 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Allegheny  
 44 County Council on behalf of the citizens of Allegheny  
 45 County hereby recognize the Honorable James R. Ellenbogen

1 different departments that helped me through the years, I  
 2 --- I thank also.  
 3 When I first came in here, I was pretty much a  
 4 renegade. I mean, the news media dubbed me the seventh  
 5 Republican as I recall it, because I railed against the  
 6 drink tax --- maybe for personal reasons at that time.  
 7 But --- but Rich and I, the Chief Executive,  
 8 when he was the president of council, him and I went at it  
 9 quite a bit. And him and I --- when he became the Chief  
 10 Executive, we --- he showed me a vision of what this  
 11 county could be, and he sold me on it. And I want to  
 12 thank him and his guy, Willy McKain, who --- Willy has  
 13 helped me tremendously in my life through the work that  
 14 he's helped me and things he's helped me achieve.  
 15 But some of the things that have been achieved  
 16 in this county under Chief Fitzgerald that I was very  
 17 proud to be a part of, Google coming here. I mean, look  
 18 at the Amazon thing. Pittsburgh is becoming a place of  
 19 destination.  
 20 Don't anybody think across the street is what  
 21 did it, you know. If it wasn't for Chief Fitzgerald, His  
 22 Honor wouldn't even be over there. So you know, I'm going  
 23 to give credit where credit is due. You know, all these  
 24 new things, all these young people --- I mean, even in my  
 25 own district, I'm meeting kids from Kansas and Alabama  
 26 and different places that people want to come here and work  
 27 here. And I'm very proud to have been a part of that.  
 28 And I wish you folks all the best going forward.  
 29 I know I leave the county in good hands. You got Kenny  
 30 Varhola, who --- I mean, when I go to eat lunch, he's  
 31 right there with a napkin. I mean, this kid is good. So  
 32 --- you guys know what I'm talking about ---?  
 33 But I feel very proud. I'd like to wish my  
 34 successor all the best. He's got a lot of energy and I  
 35 think that he's going to serve the constituents of this  
 36 county well.  
 37 It's really weird, you know, I came in here a  
 38 young guy. What happened?  
 39 MR. MACEY: You used to have hair.  
 40 MR. ELLENBOGEN: You know --- yeah, but at least  
 41 I still have some, you know.  
 42 But --- you know, it's funny because I --- you  
 43 know, when I reflect today, my --- my kids who are grown  
 44 women and professionals and --- and you all know my  
 45 granddaughter Gracie, the two and a half year old boss of

1 my whole family, who is demanding that I spend more time  
 2 with her So this is a good a good thing, particularly  
 3 around the holidays.  
 4 So with that, again, I'd like to thank everyone  
 5 for their diligence and for their help, and I wish you all  
 6 the best in the future. And I thank you all so much for  
 7 the opportunity to have served everyone and thank you all  
 8 so much for the people who have helped me to make me look  
 9 good. Thank you again, ladies and gentlemen.  
 10 (Applause)  
 11 MR FUTULES: So with that, Jim, I present you  
 12 with this proclamation.  
 13 MR ELLENBOGEN: Who paid for this, Nicky? I  
 14 know you didn't.  
 15 MR FUTULES: No.  
 16 MR ELLENBOGEN: Thank you very much. I  
 17 appreciate it.  
 18 MR FUTULES: The guy with the napkin did,  
 19 probably.  
 20 MR ELLENBOGEN: He probably did. You do nice  
 21 work.  
 22 MR FUTULES: Think we're going to go up there  
 23 and get a picture (indicating).  
 24 MR ELLENBOGEN: All right.  
 25 MR FUTULES: Like --- like the good old days.  
 26 MR ELLENBOGEN: Like the good old days, huh?  
 27 MR FUTULES: Yeah. Let's go that way. We want  
 28 the rest (indicating) ---  
 29 MR MACEY: We all have ---  
 30 MR FUTULES: Everybody on council, of course.  
 31 MR MACEY: We'd like to have something to say  
 32 here.  
 33 MR FUTULES: Well, sorry.  
 34 MR MACEY: Go around.  
 35 MR FUTULES: Oh, well, okay.  
 36 MR MACEY: I'm being --- I'm being Nick Futules  
 37 tonight.  
 38 MR FUTULES: You can do that, but whoever would  
 39 like to speak, just start this way and work your way  
 40 around.  
 41 MR BAKER: No, I'd --- I've --- I've loved  
 42 working with Jim Ellenbogen. He's just a really  
 43 enthusiastic, really supportive, kind human being. We  
 44 thank him for all the service here and all the work that  
 45 he's done in our region.

1 MR. DEMARCO: Because it's --- he calls it Tank,  
 2 and it's absolutely huge. So --- well, maybe Tank needs  
 3 to go on a diet. But hey, again ---  
 4 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Yeah, well, I'm going to need a  
 5 couple people to help me with a shovel. I can tell you  
 6 that.  
 7 MR. DEMARCO: Again, I wish you nothing but the  
 8 best and I hope you and your family have wonderful  
 9 holidays. It's been a pleasure serving with you.  
 10 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Thank you.  
 11 MR. DEMARCO: Thank you, Jim.  
 12 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I appreciate that. Thank you.  
 13 MS. KIRK: Hi, Jimmy. I just wanted to thank  
 14 you again, with everyone else, how welcoming you were.  
 15 You probably are like a welcoming committee for all of us,  
 16 and you were always someone who was very approachable from  
 17 the beginning. And you didn't tell us what --- like, you  
 18 didn't tell me what I wanted to hear. You told me what I  
 19 should hear, and I appreciate that. That's very valuable  
 20 because that's how you learn.  
 21 And so I wanted to thank you for just all your  
 22 kindness and --- and God, we're sitting next to each other  
 23 tonight.  
 24 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I could never say no to Captain  
 25 Kirk's mom.  
 26 MS. KIRK: You got that right. Thanks again and  
 27 --- and have a great Christmas if I don't see you until  
 28 then. Thanks.  
 29 MR. KLEIN: Jim, thanks for --- thanks for all  
 30 you do and thanks for --- I have to say that you are not a  
 31 cookie cutter councilman. You are one of a kind. You are  
 32 an original. And I will miss all that you know and have  
 33 shared with all of us, about the history that we should  
 34 come to understand about this institution and about this  
 35 county.  
 36 And I know that you know where all the bodies  
 37 are buried, but we'll talk about that some other time.  
 38 MR. ELLENBOGEN: That's why I'm still here.  
 39 MR. KLEIN: But thank you for all that you do,  
 40 and it --- it really has been a pleasure being with you  
 41 and spending time on this body with you over the past  
 42 couple of years. Thank you.  
 43 MR. KRESS: You know, you couldn't leave alone.  
 44 I had to come with you.  
 45 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I appreciate that.

1 And I look forward to still seeing what Gracie  
 2 is --- Gracie is doing all the time on Facebook. And I  
 3 --- the one thing I can tell about you is just how proud  
 4 of a grandfather you are and how much you love your  
 5 granddaughter.  
 6 So I just thank you for all of your mentorship  
 7 and friendship over these last four years.  
 8 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I just want to say that, you  
 9 know, when I look around, two thirds of the folks that I  
 10 started out with are gone. Nicky, Chuck, Johnny and  
 11 Bobby, you guys are the only ones left. So you guys are  
 12 all newbies. Thanks.  
 13 MR. CATENA: Mr. President, just --- Jimmy, I  
 14 mean, from the day that I first interviewed with council  
 15 back in January, you made me always feel welcome, and I  
 16 will never forget that feeling. You took me under your  
 17 arm, and I truly appreciate that.  
 18 MR. ELLENBOGEN: You're going to ---  
 19 MR. CATENA: Thank you for all your guidance.  
 20 MR. ELLENBOGEN: You're going to be a good  
 21 councilman, Pat.  
 22 MR. CATENA: Thank you, sir. I appreciate it.  
 23 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Sammy, the Beechview kid.  
 24 MR. DEMARCO: So Jim, you're telling folks what  
 25 we already have in common?  
 26 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Yes.  
 27 MR. DEMARCO: I want to thank you for the time  
 28 that you spent on council and that you've dedicated to the  
 29 services for the people not just in your district, but the  
 30 people of Allegheny County.  
 31 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Thank you.  
 32 MR. DEMARCO: I want to thank you for your  
 33 friendship and your mentorship in the two years that I've  
 34 been on council here, and your willingness, even though a  
 35 member of the other party, to be able to look at things on  
 36 what's right for the citizens of Allegheny County and not  
 37 look at things from a partisan perspective. I have a  
 38 great deal of respect for you.  
 39 As Tom said, I look forward to continuing to  
 40 follow your and Gracie and Tank's --- Tank's exploits.  
 41 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Tank, yeah.  
 42 MR. DEMARCO: And Jimmy has a cat that should  
 43 probably be in the Guinness Book of World Records.  
 44 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Yeah, he's a big boy.

1 MR. KRESS: I hate to have people leave by  
 2 themselves. I hate to have them alone.  
 3 No, but you have to say you've been an  
 4 exceptional council person. Also, we also have a  
 5 Lawrenceville connection which I never talk about. My  
 6 family's actually from the 9th Ward over in Lawrenceville.  
 7 So my aunt still lives on 42nd Street.  
 8 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Wow.  
 9 MR. KRESS: So --- and I have to say, your time  
 10 being here --- I mean, you're an independent person, tried  
 11 to do what you thought was right and it was good having  
 12 you here, so --- and good luck with your future endeavors.  
 13 So thank you.  
 14 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Thank you, and I appreciate  
 15 that greatly.  
 16 MR. MACEY: Jimmy, it's certainly a pleasure to  
 17 be your friend and also to be a councilman with you.  
 18 I don't think there's any job --- and you've  
 19 reminded us over and over again --- any job that you  
 20 haven't had in Allegheny County. But I think that ---  
 21 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I was always the boss, though.  
 22 MR. MACEY: Yeah.  
 23 And I --- but more importantly, I think what it  
 24 brought to us was a vision. It brought to us your  
 25 experience, and it helped educate us as to what actually  
 26 was going on in Allegheny County. And I think that's very  
 27 important because many of us who haven't been in that  
 28 situation, we're still learning. I've been here over 11  
 29 years and I'm still learning.  
 30 Allegheny County is a --- the vast area of  
 31 situations and business, if you will.  
 32 But Jim, you've always been an asset to me and  
 33 an asset to this county council, and I'll certainly never  
 34 forget that. And I'll always be your friend, and I'm  
 35 certainly --- certainly, there will be times when I'll  
 36 call on you for some help because it's not easy.  
 37 Everybody thinks this is just an easy situation.  
 38 You sit here at a council meeting and you just vote on  
 39 this and vote on that. But you just don't vote. It comes  
 40 with a lot of experience, comes with a lot of education.  
 41 And I really want to thank you for all your help and what  
 42 you've done for us over the years. Thank you.  
 43 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Thank you, Bob. I appreciate  
 44 that greatly. I do.  
 45 DR. MARTONI: I feel the same way, Jim.

1 You and I have been together longer than this  
 2 council has existed. In fact, ---  
 3 MR. ELLENBOGEN: That's right, Doc.  
 4 DR. MARTONI: --- I was thinking about it when  
 5 you interrupted --- it's about a half a century we been  
 6 working together on these projects. So I'll miss you, but  
 7 I won't miss you because we got to be constantly in touch  
 8 and --- as we always have been.  
 9 MR. ELLENBOGEN: You know, Dr. Martoni, I wanted  
 10 to share something with you that you probably don't even  
 11 remember. But 40 years ago, you said to me one day ---  
 12 you said, son, you know, you're somebody that knows the  
 13 difference between politics and government. And I never  
 14 forgot that. And I always tried in my mind, to aspire to  
 15 that and I thank you for that. But I've carried that with  
 16 me all these years and like I said, you probably don't  
 17 even remember saying it. But of all ---  
 18 DR. MARTONI: I do remember saying that. And I  
 19 think that would be a good saying for all of us to think  
 20 about once in a while. Okay?  
 21 MR. ELLENBOGEN: But thank you, Dr. Martoni, for  
 22 all ---  
 23 DR. MARTONI: Thank you.  
 24 MR. ELLENBOGEN: --- your help over the years,  
 25 really.  
 26 DR. MARTONI: Thank you.  
 27 MS. MEANS: Well, Jimmy, I've known you for four  
 28 years and you made me laugh. I'm going to miss that. I'm  
 29 going to miss that. I love your raw honesty. And I mean,  
 30 you would just tell it like it is. And that alone is so  
 31 refreshing.  
 32 So I thank you for your hard work. I thank you  
 33 for your friendship and I wish you all the best. And I do  
 34 have your phone number, so ---  
 35 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Thank you. You ---  
 36 MS. MEANS: You haven't gotten rid of me.  
 37 MR. ELLENBOGEN: You keep doing what you're  
 38 doing. You're going to be fine.  
 39 MS. MEANS: Thank you.  
 40 MR. PALMIERE: Jimmy, we have a mutual friend  
 41 that's about as politically astute as you are and you two  
 42 are the sharpest guys I know when it comes to really  
 43 breaking things down and letting me know what was --- what  
 44 the score was, and I appreciate that.

1 MR. BARKER: Proclamation recognizing and  
 2 commending departing Allegheny County Council Member  
 3 Edward J. Kress for his dedication and service to the  
 4 residents of Allegheny County. Sponsored by Council  
 5 President DeFazio and Council Members Baker, Catena,  
 6 DeMarco, Ellenbogen, Futules, Kirk, Klein, Macey, Martoni,  
 7 Means, Palmiere, Ranalli-Russell and Walton.  
 8 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: Let me begin by saying  
 9 that I'm honored that Ed asked me to read this  
 10 proclamation, and it might be the first time a Democrat  
 11 read for a Republican. But it's not ---  
 12 MR. KRESS: We have a shared connection.  
 13 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: Yes, we do. Yes, we do.  
 14 And I haven't known Ed that long, but I feel like I've  
 15 known him forever. I know myself, I'm going to miss him.  
 16 He's great at everything he does. He's every --- he's  
 17 like dirt, he's everywhere. You're not ---  
 18 MR. KRESS: Can we have somebody else come up  
 19 and read the proclamation, please?  
 20 (Applause.)  
 21 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: But that's a good thing  
 22 because he's everywhere, and he makes his presence known.  
 23 And when he was campaigning, he didn't even know  
 24 that it was my mom's residence and --- up in her complex.  
 25 And she invited him in, and they were talking. And  
 26 afterwards, she called me. She said I met one of your  
 27 colleagues. And I said, oh, yeah? I said who's that?  
 28 And she said Ed Kress. She said what a nice man, and  
 29 she's also a Democrat, too. She said I really enjoyed my  
 30 conversation with him. And I said, he is --- I said he's  
 31 a great guy.  
 32 So I am honored to be standing here next to you.  
 33 MR. KRESS: Thank you.  
 34 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: I'm going to read your

1 And I'm going to miss --- every time you took  
 2 the microphone, I'm going to miss --- I would think to  
 3 myself, jeez, I wonder what --- what organization he ran  
 4 this time. You know, it was --- and you never failed me.  
 5 You always came through and said I was chief of this and I  
 6 did this and that.  
 7 And the one thing I remember, Jim, finally, is  
 8 the story about North Park Lake. You know, I don't know  
 9 how many people recall, but you really nailed it. You hit  
 10 the nail on the head with that whole situation, and I want  
 11 you to know I thought that was really great insight as to  
 12 what was wrong at the time with the situation. So I  
 13 appreciate you --- you being here all these years and I'm  
 14 going to miss you.  
 15 Thank you very much.  
 16 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Thank you, John. I appreciate  
 17 that.  
 18 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: Hi, Jim.  
 19 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Hi, Denise.  
 20 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: I haven't known you quite  
 21 as long, but that doesn't make a difference. You were one  
 22 of the first people that made me feel at home here, and  
 23 --- because this is a second home. And to see the passion  
 24 that you have with everything that you do, public safety,  
 25 to name the one.  
 26 But I just --- I'm going to miss you, but I know  
 27 this isn't the end of friendship because I know that it'll  
 28 continue long after this. So thank you for everything  
 29 you've done, and I think we're all going to miss you.  
 30 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Thank you, Denise.  
 31 MR. WALTON: Well, Jim, from my perspective, I  
 32 say good luck to you as you move forward with the rest of  
 33 your life. I won't belabor this, but it's been refreshing  
 34 for me to be here and to have the opportunity to be around  
 35 you and to listen to you. We haven't always agreed on  
 36 issues --- issue by issue, but I've always respected the  
 37 courage of your convictions. And for that, I think we're

 32 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: --- President John DeFazio  
 33 and all members of county council, presented this 5th day  
 34 of December, 2017.  
 35 (Applause.)  
 36 MR. KRESS: I don't know. It feels like déjà  
 37 vu. So who knows, I might be doing this again at some  
 38 point. I was here in 2005, 2011. And it's just one of  
 39 those things. I almost feel like it's a Rocky movie or  
 40 maybe a Michael Myers movie --- you just keep coming back.  
 41 And it depends on how you view me, you know? Maybe Rocky,  
 42 Michael Myers, I don't know.  
 43 And that's the thing. I mean, when you look at  
 44 it --- like, why did I do this? You know, why get on  
 45 county council?

1 One of the things is --- and I don't really say  
2 too much about my background, but my father grew up on E  
3 Street over in North Side. And they had a tough time. He  
4 --- my father, his dad lost his job at the Iron Works.  
5 And you know, it was one of those things where --- can we  
6 make a difference, you know, in this area?  
7 And my mom grew up in Lawrenceville, too, like  
8 Jimmy, you know, the Lawrenceville connection there. He  
9 talks a lot about --- more than I do. But I remember  
10 going to Saint Mary's church. And here's the thing, you  
11 know, I'm a Pittsburgh guy. I mean even though I don't  
12 live in the City of Pittsburgh, my father was from there.  
13 We moved out to the suburbs back --- I guess back in '62.  
14 But back in '62, they tore down E Street. There was no E  
15 Street in the early '60s, so they were kind of almost  
16 forced to move.  
17 See, and the thing is too, my --- my father,  
18 growing up, he always used to talk about some of these  
19 great people he knew. One of them was Baldy Regan.  
20 And I don't know how many people know who Baldy  
21 Regan is, but Baldy Regan is a legend. And if you don't  
22 know who Baldy Regan is, he was this great North Side  
23 politician. I --- even going to use the word politician.  
24 I actually don't like the term politician. He was a  
25 public servant, but he helped people out. And when I  
26 thought of myself as being a county councilman, that's the  
27 type of person I wanted to be.  
28 Baldy was there for the people. He sponsored a  
29 lot of different youth leagues. He was here helping  
30 people getting jobs. He was there for the people and he  
31 was a great guy. And his son currently is a Court of  
32 Common Pleas Judge --- and great people.  
33 You know, my dad was also --- he went to North  
34 Catholic, he knew Tom Foerster. He knew some of the other  
35 people in the North Side.  
36 And I have to say like, that North Side kind of  
37 --- it's kind of like --- along with the Lawrenceville,  
38 because it's about trying to help people out, and that's  
39 the reason why I did this. Because it's not about like,  
40 hey --- or you know, about being famous or trying to ---  
41 about an ego. It's about what can I do to help people  
42 out? And that's really what I've done.  
43 When I --- ever since I got here in 2005, I've  
44 always been trying to introduce legislation and make  
45 things work. 2005, I remember I introduced a lot of

1 at steel mills, Edgar J. Thomson. So you know, it's about  
2 bringing back, you know, Old Pittsburgh, the steel mills,  
3 the blue collar jobs.  
4 And also we have this huge opioid epidemic, too,  
5 which we need to address, and we are going to be  
6 addressing now. We currently are. So I mean there's  
7 things what I wanted to do.  
8 Now I want to let you know, I'm just taking a  
9 break. Okay?  
10 The voters in my area said Eddie, you're working  
11 too hard. You got to take a break. Okay? Relax. All  
12 right? And I agree with them, but I'll still be helping  
13 out in Allegheny County. It's my home and I'm not  
14 leaving.  
15 And the thing is, you know, people say --- you  
16 know, this and that --- about elections. You have to keep  
17 things in perspective, you really do. Okay?  
18 I wake up November 8th. Okay? I guess maybe  
19 I'm not feeling the best. My dad is like --- today I was  
20 drafted. I go, what? Yeah. Today is the day I was  
21 drafted. Well, you might've heard about this war. It had  
22 to do with the Korean Peninsula 38th Parallel. North  
23 Koreans had come down and invaded South Korea.  
24 My dad, on November 8th, 1950 was drafted in the  
25 military to go serve. And people have to keep things in  
26 perspective. Like I wasn't drafted that day. I had maybe  
27 lost an election, but my father, who knows where he's  
28 going to go? You know, he could've been --- he could've  
29 been killed in the war, we don't know.  
30 And again, that's a war we don't talk about, the  
31 Korean War. And we've lost what, almost like 40,000  
32 people in that war. And if you read about the war itself,  
33 our troops got surrounded up there in Northern Korea and  
34 a lot of our men were killed, and people don't realize that.  
35 And my father, fortunately, didn't end up in Korea. He  
36 ended up in Alaska.  
37 But we've got to keep our life in perspective  
38 that, hey, it's an election. It's a title. Hey, it  
39 doesn't mean I can't come back and do good for the people  
40 in this area and I'll continue to do that.  
41 And again, I mean, it's one of those things  
42 where I'm going to continue doing good whether it's on  
43 council, whether it's as an attorney. And again too, I  
44 mean, I have my own personal issues. My mom's been sick  
45 with Alzheimer's for how many years now. You know?

1 legislation. And a lot of stuff, if you look at it, some  
2 of the stuff was adopted --- trying to get more revenue  
3 into the county without going to taxpayers. We need to do  
4 things like that. We need to think more entrepreneurial.  
5 We have a restaurant now in North Park. We  
6 didn't have the restaurant and the boat house. So we are  
7 doing a lot of things in the county that I was hoping we  
8 could do in 2005.  
9 And then I came back in 2011, and you know, we  
10 introduced legislation. We did E-Verify on county  
11 projects to protect local workers from losing their jobs.  
12 We did the False Claims Act, which helps us as taxpayers  
13 recoup money from people who've defrauded us.  
14 And then I also did something to help protect  
15 people who lost their homes in sheriff's sales. Because  
16 people were losing their homes in sheriff's sales, but  
17 they were still being sent tax bills when, in fact, the  
18 tax bill needed to go to the actual purchaser of the  
19 property. I worked with the sheriff on that.  
20 And then this --- my current time coming here,  
21 you know, I was elected, you know, in 2013. I served in  
22 2014. I tried to help with the assessment system. We did  
23 things with the parks. I know that Deer Lakes was kind of  
24 controversial, but the people up in my district love it.  
25 And when I got on county council, you know, you  
26 went up to West Deer, people are like --- you know, we're  
27 forgotten. But we're not --- they're not forgotten  
28 anymore. I mean, Middle Road has been repaired. The park  
29 is fabulous. I mean, there's a lot of great things going  
30 on. And that's the reason why I said, hey, this is great  
31 being on county council.  
32 Plus, I had a great relationship with the  
33 building and trades. The building and trades, I have to  
34 say is one of the greatest organizations here in Allegheny  
35 County because we need them. We need good paying jobs.  
36 We need to train people.  
37 Okay? College costs are out of control. Okay?  
38 Since 1978, they've gone up 1,200 percent. Okay? So  
39 thank God for CCAC because I don't know how people would  
40 be able to get educated.  
41 I had a --- I had somebody just recently, they  
42 were looking at going to a college that was \$45,000 a  
43 year. He didn't even know what he wanted to do. He ended  
44 up taking a job with the Laborers Union. He's making \$23  
45 an hour. Some of these people have actually been working

1 And that's those things like, yeah, could I  
2 maybe go on and win the election or done this or that?  
3 That's great, but there's other things in life that make  
4 things special and important, and just keep things in  
5 perspective. And again, I mean, I think this is probably  
6 Rocky III right now. You'll probably see me in Rocky IV  
7 in another couple years. Who knows what? I'll be back.  
8 But again, it's been a pleasure. And also I  
9 want to say too, thanks for everything. I mean, John  
10 DeFazio happened --- he's not able to be here tonight, but  
11 I think he's been a great public servant. Chuck Martoni,  
12 he's been here for a long time. Both of them, I think  
13 were --- you're original members.  
14 Right?  
15 DR. MARTONI: Uh-huh (yes).  
16 MR. KRESS: Yes. So I mean, we have the  
17 originals. And then there was Jay Jabbour. I know he had  
18 --- he was here before Bob Macey, and Bob Macey replaced  
19 him. We had Ron Francis here, Doug Price, Vince Gastgeb,  
20 Jan Rea. These are great people, and I enjoyed serving  
21 with them. So I mean, I have a perspective from 2005,  
22 2011 until now.  
23 And also, I wanted to say something about John  
24 Mascio too, great guy. He passed away a number of years  
25 ago, but he was always a pleasure to work with. I mean,  
26 very funny person, lots --- great personality. And I also  
27 see Walt Szymanski out there, too. Thank you for all  
28 you've done. And there's the county manager out there  
29 too, who is probably happy to get rid of me.  
30 But no, we --- we work great --- he's laughing.  
31 He knows I was on the phone with him a lot.  
32 But I have to say it's been a pleasure being  
33 here. And also the current staff, thank you for  
34 everything you're doing. I know you're going to do a  
35 great job helping the people of this county do well, and  
36 all the current council members and future council  
37 members. So thank you very much for everything and ---  
38 keep the --- let's get the meeting going on, so thanks.  
39 (Applause.)  
40 MR. FUTULES: Stay up there, Ed --- Ed ---  
41 MS. MEANS: We get to say something.  
42 MR. FUTULES: Ed ---  
43 MS. MEANS: Wait, wait.

1 MR. FUTULES: Stay up there. We got to let the  
 2 council members comment. Yeah, start down there with Mr  
 3 Baker.  
 4 MR. BAKER: I was just --- I waited 11 years for  
 5 --- so ---  
 6 Literally, as Ed was talking to all of us, I had  
 7 so many good stories come to mind over the years. Ed and  
 8 I have known each other for about 11 years and there's  
 9 something really special about Ed Kress. I think there's  
 10 --- that's something that we can all say is that if he's  
 11 been a part of your life at some point, you will never  
 12 forget him.  
 13 And he's a passionate person. I think back to a  
 14 --- or a meeting up at Seven Springs that we drove to  
 15 together. He was my ride. We carpooled. And literally,  
 16 like the event that I was on the committee for later that  
 17 night was at 7:00.  
 18 So at like 5:30, I'm like, Ed, are you ready to  
 19 head back to the city? And then it was like 6:30 and my  
 20 wife's texting me like, where are you? And I was like, I  
 21 got Ed Kress. And like --- by like 8:00, she's like are  
 22 you not making it down back to ---? I was like, Ed is  
 23 still talking to people.  
 24 He loves people. Like --- and I think Ed, never  
 25 change. Like you're so --- like, you love talking to  
 26 people. You love chatting with people. The only time I  
 27 ever caught where Ed didn't know what to say --- sometimes  
 28 at these public events, the county executive and the mayor  
 29 will be up. They'll be speaking on behalf of the Pirates  
 30 or Steelers or Penguins.  
 31 One time, Mayor Peduto, when he got done and the  
 32 county executive got done, he handed the microphone to me  
 33 and Ed was just kind of the background. And we looked at  
 34 each other like, what do we do? We had no idea what to  
 35 say. It was maybe the first time either of us were  
 36 speechless.  
 37 So Ed, you're a good friend. I think you'll be  
 38 back for Rocky IV at some point for sure. If it's here or  
 39 somewhere, you'll always keep doing good. So thanks for  
 40 being a friend and congratulations on all your good  
 41 service.  
 42 (Applause)  
 43 MR. CATENA: Ed, you have an innate ability to  
 44 make people think about things. During the many times  
 45 that we've sat up here and you've questioned people about

1 better. And that's truly a blessing and a gift that you  
 2 have, my friend. And please, never lose that.  
 3 It's been my pleasure to serve with you, and I  
 4 appreciate your friendship. Thank you, Ed.  
 5 MR. KRESS: Thank you.  
 6 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Eddie, there's always two  
 7 things I can count on in my life. One is my arthritis in  
 8 my knees is going to come back, and you're going to come  
 9 back.  
 10 Eddie, I just ---  
 11 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: That's a good analogy.  
 12 Dirt, now arthritis.  
 13 MR. ELLENBOGEN: And I --- yeah, I'm not sure  
 14 which one hurts more, but --- no. All kidding aside, it's  
 15 been a pleasure serving with you.  
 16 And I've always appreciated the fact that, you  
 17 know, you really care about people. The one thing I could  
 18 never figure out about you, whether you're really a  
 19 Democrat or a Republican or they just need a separate  
 20 party for you. Because on the one hand, you'll be  
 21 fighting for these business issues that most people would  
 22 view as --- as Republican issues. And the next minute,  
 23 you're the champion of the building trades.  
 24 So you know, with that, it only goes to show  
 25 that you care about people, that, you know, you've worked  
 26 hard to mar the lines between Ds and Rs, and it's the

 33 same. But really, it's been a pleasure working with you  
 34 and I've always appreciated your friendship. Thank you.

 36 you in so many different ways over the last so many years.  
 37 But the one thing that I think really captures you is you  
 38 have a happiness about you. And if you were a little  
 39 girl, you'd understand that really well, because all the  
 40 little stories are about a happiness. Like you just ---  
 41 you can't be sad around Ed Kress. You just have that  
 42 happiness. You (indicating) --- see, Denise understands  
 43 and Sue would understand. But you have that.  
 44 And I think I've shared stories with you when  
 45 I'd see these old ladies, and I'd say something about Ed.

1 different things during hearings and stuff, I learn so  
 2 much from you. Just listening to you and listening to  
 3 your line of thinking as an attorney and where you were  
 4 going with things, I'm like --- I said to myself, boy, you  
 5 really need to think about that. You really need to  
 6 pursue that --- what Ed just said, or think about what Ed  
 7 just said. So I've learned so much from you during my  
 8 short time here.  
 9 So thank you for everything, and I wish you well  
 10 moving forwards.  
 11 MR. KRESS: Thank you. Thank you very much.

 35 display that from what you do, holding job fairs out there  
 36 in your district to try to get people jobs. I mean, you  
 37 --- you honestly care.  
 38 So many of us, sometimes when we sit up here,  
 39 we'll be voting tonight on a budget in excess of \$2  
 40 billion. So many of us fly at the 30,000 foot level  
 41 because we're looking at things from the higher  
 42 perspective. But you have no problem getting down there,  
 43 you know, working with someone even if you have to take  
 44 them by the hand to try to take and help make their lives

 18 much.  
 19 MR. KRESS: Thank you.  
 20 MS. KIRK: Thanks.  
 21 MR. KLEIN: Well, Ed, I'd have to say that you  
 22 and Jim Ellenbogen really have a lot in common. And in  
 23 particular ---  
 24 MR. KRESS: Look at Jimmy's face over there.  
 25 MR. KLEIN: That's actually --- that's actually  
 26 --- that's a compliment.  
 27 But I think that both of you --- I think that  
 28 both of you march to the beat of your own drummer, and  
 29 that is something that is unusual and refreshing in this  
 30 world. And I really admire your independence. I mean,

 32 council, you always asked the tough questions and I have a

 40 take this in the proper way. I think that you have the  
 41 politician's gift of knowing how to make a short meeting  
 42 long. And I say that with ---  
 43 MR. KRESS: I guess you do really want to get of

1 MR. KLEIN: So it's been a pleasure serving with  
 2 you. I'm sure we'll see you around these quarters again.  
 3 MR. KRESS: No, no. Thanks a lot, Paul. It's

 31 councilperson three times. But it's equally as important  
 32 as what you do for people in your community.  
 33 And you're a good man. You're a good person.  
 34 And don't stop doing what you're doing because it's  
 35 important. Thank you.  
 36 MR. KRESS: Thank you very much.  
 37 DR. MARTONI: I will miss you. You have been a  
 38 good example for me to live up to. Okay?  
 39 I know we talk occasionally. When I have  
 40 something bothering me, I call you and you always offer  
 41 good solutions to things. And I wish you great luck in  
 42 the future and I have a strong feeling we'll be seeing you  
 43 again here. Okay?  
 44 MR. KRESS: All right. Thank you very much.

1 --- but --- and Jack notwithstanding. But I want --- I  
 2 want to tell you, you --- you are really a real asset to

 32 your presence, and thank you, sir.  
 33 MR. KRESS: No. Thank you very much for the  
 34 kind words.  
 35 MR. FUTULES: Okay. I get to go last. There  
 36 was times when everybody would refer to Ed Kress and  
 37 they'd say to me, how do you like Ed Kress? I said he's  
 38 the best Democrat we've got on county council, but he's a  
 39 registered Republican. So --- and that's the truth.  
 40 And as other members have said, you always  
 41 looked out for the people and you had a sense of what was  
 42 right and what's wrong and how you felt. And that was a  
 43 good thing.  
 44 And on a personal note, I've known Ed outside

 2 you, pal.  
 3 MS. MEANS: Hey, Ed. I've known you a long  
 4 time. I think the first time I met you, you were running  
 5 for sheriff. Is that right?  
 6 MR. KRESS: I believe.  
 7 MS. MEANS: Yeah --- yeah, you were running for  
 8 sheriff.  
 9 So --- and nobody works harder for their  
 10 constituents. Nobody works harder to get their --- the  
 11 students in their district jobs. And you work so  
 12 tirelessly for the elderly. You're always thinking about  
 13 how you can help the elderly, how you can help people that  
 14 don't have jobs.  
 15 And you have a great passion and a great legal  
 16 mind, and I'm going to miss you. But I know I will see  
 17 you around. I know I will. I know we've --- our paths  
 18 have crossed many times and our paths are going to keep  
 19 crossing, so I wish you all the best.  
 20 MR. KRESS: All right. Thank you very much.  
 21 MR. PALMIERE: Not only, Eddie, could you get  
 22 the meetings to go longer, those telephone calls can last  
 23 a while, too. Let me tell you, there's sometimes I would  
 24 get off the phone with Ed and I'd have cauliflower ear  
 25 starting in.  
 26 I want to --- I want to say this, Ed. This is  
 27 an opportunity, too. It's really nice in this kind of a  
 28 situation, to be able to praise people while they're still  
 29 alive. Because we have a tendency in this country --- we  
 30 only remember people after they're long dead. But this is  
 31 a nice forum here for us to really honor you and to tell  
 32 you how much we appreciate your talents and what you've  
 33 meant to all of us.  
 34 The other thing I wanted to say also is the  
 35 Fourth of July Parade, we've had a lot of fun. Do you  
 36 know --- I've told you before, that's the first Halloween  
 37 for the kids in Brentwood. And Ed had a ball up there. I  
 38 had a heck of a time trying to keep with him, I want to  
 39 tell you.  
 40 And it's --- and also, you've changed my mind

 28 So I'm standing there for a good half an hour  
 29 and there's no Ed. So now I'm looking for him. So I go  
 30 back to where he came from, and he's surrounded by black  
 31 suits and ties and he's waving to me like this  
 32 (indicating). And I'm going like this (indicating), I'm  
 33 waving back. And I says, let's go.  
 34 Well, it turns out they were homeland security  
 35 and he told them about being on the golf course in the  
 36 middle of the night --- talk about terrorists, and they  
 37 were detaining him --- talking about there could be  
 38 terrorists on the golf course. So that was a pretty great  
 39 moment, Ed. I wanted to tell you that I'm never going to  
 40 forget that and --- you know it's true. Don't even rebut  
 41 that.  
 42 Anyhow, thank you. You've been a good friend  
 43 and this all reminds me, believe it or not, of the movie  
 44 the Wizard of Oz when Dorothy was saying goodbye to the  
 45 tin man and the scarecrow and the cowardly lion. She

1 really wasn't saying goodbye. She was --- those people  
 2 were part of her life after she came out of the dream.  
 3 And people like you and Ellenbogen will always be a part  
 4 of our lives even though you're not on council.  
 5 And there's only one good thing about Jimmy  
 6 leaving, that I get to sit --- I get to sit next to Sam  
 7 and I'm going to look little.  
 8 MR ELLENBOGEN: There's nobody left to pick on  
 9 you, but I already talked to DeWitt.

 33 Why is Allegheny County Council voting on a  
 34 stricter policy than the DEP has in place? We need clean  
 35 water, I don't debate that. But the buffer goes beyond.  
 36 Yes, we need a storm management plan. But keep in mind  
 37 the riparian buffer is a separate issue. This buffer  
 38 could be an option for local communities. Every community  
 39 has different circumstances and different needs.  
 40 Residential communities are different from rural areas.  
 41 Shouldn't each community decide what works best for them?  
 42 If DEP thought this was so important, wouldn't  
 43 they have made this buffer mandatory? They are taking  
 44 away peoples' freedom for the greater good. Business  
 45 owners along streams may not be able to renovate their

 29 November 14th, 2019 from the Pennsylvania Commission on  
 30 Crime and Delinquency for use by the Allegheny County  
 31 Health Department. Sponsored by the Chief Executive.  
 32 MR. FUTULES: Mr. Palmiere?

 34 We met and made --- and set this up as an affirmative  
 35 recommendation and I move for approval.

 5 going to prioritize who get --- the first responders, the  
 6 police, the fire department, even sometimes libraries are  
 7 looking for these lifesaving kits. So I think it's a  
 8 wonderful thing, and we will receive four separate  
 9 installments of the medication.  
 10 It has a shelf life of two years and the pharmacies  
 11 are going to track it very closely. And what they can do  
 12 is if they see that it's getting close to the end of its  
 13 shelf life, they can put it somewhere where it will be  
 14 used quickly. Some places turn the medication around  
 15 quicker than others and depending on how much we use,  
 16 we'll get --- like if we're not using it, we don't get as  
 17 much the next time.  
 18 But it's a lifesaving medication. It's free to  
 19 use and it's a wonderful thing. I'm --- be voting in a  
 20 positive for it, but I just wanted to inform the citizens  
 21 of this great opportunity for us. Thank you.

 7 MR. FUTULES: I'm sorry?  
 8 MS. MEANS: I have an amendment. I have an  
 9 amendment.  
 10 MR. FUTULES: Okay.

 27 very simply makes the riparian buffer optional and returns  
 28 it to the model ordinance language. We received --- and  
 29 the handout that support that --- we received the storm  
 30 water ordinance from the DEP and the riparian buffer was  
 31 optional.  
 32 In the first handout you get, you'll see the  
 33 model ordinance that we received, and you'll see page one  
 34 where it says everything in yellow is optional. So then  
 35 you can turn to page 11 and 12 and see the riparian  
 36 buffer, § 305, is highlighted as optional. Now the  
 37 riparian buffer has to do with water quality, and that's  
 38 different than flooding. And if the DEP thought that it  
 39 was crucial to prevent flooding, they would've mandated  
 40 it. Instead, they have made it optional.  
 41 I have concerns because I feel very strongly for  
 42 peoples' properties rights. I feel that if we put the  
 43 riparian buffer as a one size fits all ordinance --- and  
 44 the county is very diverse. We have very densely  
 45 populated areas that are very well developed, and we have

 30 MR. MACEY: Go ahead.  
 31 MR. BARKER: A Resolution of the County Council  
 32 of Allegheny County approving the attached document as  
 33 2017 Allegheny County Storm Water Management Plan pursuant  
 34 to the Storm Water Management Act. Sponsored by the Chief  
 35 Executive.  
 36 MR. FUTULES: Mr. Macey?  
 37 MR. MACEY: Yes. Thank you. I just want to  
 38 make an apology again for getting ordinances out of order.  
 39 This particular ordinance was vetted over  
 40 several months since April of this year, and as I said  
 41 before, many of the councilpersons had special meetings  
 42 and there were public meetings with regards to this.  
 43 We've had engineering firms. We've also had the  
 44 Department of Public Works make various opportunities to  
 45 vet this in a variety of different situations. And

1 farmland. And to put a setback where in Castle Shannon or  
 2 along Streets Run Road or Becks Run Road or --- or Sav  
 3 Mill Run Boulevard, will interfere in peoples' ability to  
 4 develop their property.  
 5 Now, the riparian buffer kicks in when a man ---  
 6 a property owner either develops or redevelops. The other  
 7 thing that can happen when the riparian buffer easement  
 8 kicks in is when you divide subdivisions. So if I had two  
 9 acres and I divided my property in half, then when I would  
 10 file the new deeds with the --- the deed --- wherever you  
 11 file deeds, I'm sorry. I can't think of it right now.  
 12 But if --- it's all stated here in the section, so I've  
 13 --- I've handed you out the --- the --- what we have for  
 14 the riparian buffer section, and so you file in the  
 15 recorder of deeds your new deed which promises not to  
 16 place anything in the riparian buffer.  
 17 So if a person had a --- a creek or a stream  
 18 running across their property, it has a 35-foot setback  
 19 from one bank. The --- the expanse of the creek is  
 20 measured also. Let's say it's five or ten feet, and then  
 21 another 35 feet on the other side. So you cannot put ---  
 22 develop that property. And I think it --- and so you  
 23 could have something --- a strip of land going through  
 24 your property that is 75, 80 feet wide and you can't  
 25 develop there.  
 26 And I wonder if we're setting ourselves up for  
 27 lawsuits because if you redevelop your property and you  
 28 live --- let's say I redevelop my property. I --- I ---  
 29 or I --- I subdivide it. I'm going to give half to my son  
 30 and then I subdivide it. I file my deeds. Now, I can't  
 31 --- I can't have a driveway run through the riparian  
 32 buffer. I can't put non-native vegetation there.  
 33 And then my neighbor, which is John Palmiere, he  
 34 is allowed to have --- build in --- in that area because  
 35 it's not a riparian buffer for him. So he doesn't have  
 36 the easement. Right next door, he has the freedom to use  
 37 his property, but I do not. So maybe I --- maybe I didn't  
 38 say that properly. But --- so I just think that ---  
 39 sorry, I'm a little nervous. He can --- he has things on  
 40 his property I can't have on mine. If he does redevelop  
 41 it, if he does build on it, he will have to again comply  
 42 with the riparian buffer.  
 43 The riparian buffer has to do --- and I'm all  
 44 for water quality, and I do want to say to the council  
 45 members now. It's amazing thing that happened in this

1 council. We had issues with the storm water management  
 2 and it was returned. There were parts of it that --- made  
 3 it prohibitive for the parks --- the recreational trails  
 4 and sewer lines to run for the riparian buffer. Those  
 5 things were fixed and I greatly appreciate it.  
 6 But for me, a --- a man's ability to build on  
 7 his property and develop his property are paramount. If a  
 8 man has land and he thinks he built that land, and his  
 9 business is on that land and he wants to expand his  
 10 business --- expand his parking lot, it will be  
 11 prohibitive.  
 12 And again, a one size fits all ordinance for a  
 13 diverse geographical county is not, I don't think, in the  
 14 best interest of the citizens. And so I hope that you  
 15 will support my amendment to return the riparian buffer  
 16 back to the original optional language of the DEP. Thank  
 17 you very much.  
 18 DR. MARTONI: Because of the complexity of this,  
 19 I think we ought to just send the whole thing back.  
 20 MS. MEANS: If --- I --- I agree --- it's very  
 21 complex and it's very hard and difficult to understand, it  
 22 is. It's very complex and I don't think we've considered  
 23 all the things that can happen. Thank you.  
 24 MR. FUTULES: Mr. Macey?  
 25 MR. MACEY: As with any ordinance with any  
 26 rules, guidelines, there's always exceptions, and those  
 27 exceptions can be done through reaching out to the  
 28 municipality and the government in a variance. You can  
 29 ask for a variance. So this has been --- we've talked  
 30 about this since April. It's been vetted over and over  
 31 again and each councilperson had the opportunity to reach  
 32 out and talk to Mr. Hurlley of the Economic Development and  
 33 Public Works. So this is something that I think needs to  
 34 be moved forward, and we need --- we don't need to delay  
 35 this any longer, in my opinion. Thank you.  
 36 MR. CATENA: Mr. President, I'm calling for the  
 37 vote --- vote on the amendment.  
 38 MR. FUTULES: I believe we have to have a  
 39 majority to do that. Did you ask me to end debate? Is  
 40 that what you just said?  
 41 MR. CATENA: Yes, end the debate.  
 42 MR. FUTULES: I believe we need to vote on that  
 43 Mr. Baker? To end debate, this is a vote to end ---  
 44 MS. MEANS: Wait. Do you have to have a second  
 45 ---

1 MR. WALTON: That's not the issue. The issue is  
 2 whether or not we want to --- we want to pass the  
 3 amendment or not.  
 4 MR. MACEY: No, cease debate.  
 5 MR. WALTON: Cease --- no, the issue about  
 6 ceasing debate ---  
 7 MR. KRESS: Well, that vote's over.  
 8 MR. WALTON: --- has been determined. So if ---  
 9 if we want to go on in an interminable fashion and  
 10 continue to debate, we have the ability to do so. But we  
 11 need to --- we need to make a decision whether or not  
 12 we're going to pass the amendment. It's a simple yes or  
 13 no whether or not we want to pass the amendment.  
 14 MR. FUTULES: Are there any further questions?  
 15 MR. WALTON: We can --- we can have --- I'm  
 16 sorry, Mr. --- I'm sorry, Mr. Vice Chairman.  
 17 But we can have this decision --- this  
 18 discussion all night long. At some point in time, we're  
 19 going to have to make a decision whether or not we want to  
 20 pass the amendment. And the --- and then we move forward.  
 21 We can sit here and talk all night long if we want to.  
 22 MR. FUTULES: Okay. Ms. Means, you seem to have  
 23 your hand ---  
 24 MS. MEANS: Oh, I do. But I noticed that  
 25 Councilman Kirk had her hand up.  
 26 MS. KIRK: I just think that --- Councilman  
 27 Walton, I think if people have things to say, they should  
 28 have an opportunity to be heard.  
 29 MR. WALTON: Oh, I'm not --- I'm not  
 30 disagreeing.  
 31 With all due respect, Member Means --- I mean,  
 32 Member Kirk, I apologize, I'm not saying that no one that  
 33 wants to --- that wants to --- to discuss the issue should  
 34 not be able to. But at the end of the day --- at the end  
 35 of the day, we have to decide whether or not we want to  
 36 pass the amendment. Folks have spoken to --- and if  
 37 somebody wants to advocate for passage of the amendment,  
 38 so be it. But at the end of the day, we have to decide  
 39 whether or not we want to pass the amendment or not.  
 40 MR. FUTULES: Any other questions on the  
 41 amendment? Sue, what?  
 42 MS. MEANS: Thank you for recognizing me.  
 43 MR. FUTULES: Okay.  
 44 MS. MEANS: I just want to make the comment that  
 45 of course, people can apply for a waiver. But that

1 MR. FUTULES: This is a vote to end ---  
 2 MS. MEANS: --- to end the debate?  
 3 MR. FUTULES: This is a vote to end the  
 4 debate ---  
 5 MR. BAKER: Okay.  
 6 MR. FUTULES: --- on the amendment.  
 7 MR. MACEY: Sorry we have to do this.  
 8 MR. BAKER: No.  
 9 MR. MACEY: To end debate on the amendment ---  
 10 MR. BAKER: Right. Yeah. No, if people have  
 11 more say --- no ---  
 12 MR. CATENA: Yes.  
 13 MR. BARKER: Slow down for just a second. Mr.  
 14 Futules?  
 15 MR. FUTULES: Yes.  
 16 MR. BARKER: Ms. Kirk?  
 17 MS. KIRK: No.  
 18 MR. BARKER: Mr. Klein?  
 19 MR. KLEIN: Yes.  
 20 MR. BARKER: Mr. Kress?  
 21 MR. KRESS: No.  
 22 MR. BARKER: Mr. Macey?  
 23 MR. MACEY: Yes.  
 24 MR. BARKER: Mr. Martoni?  
 25 DR. MARTONI: Yes.  
 26 MR. BARKER: Ms. Means?  
 27 MS. MEANS: No.  
 28 MR. BARKER: Mr. Palmiere?  
 29 MR. PALMIERE: Yes.  
 30 MR. BARKER: Ms. Ranalli-Russell?  
 31 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: Yes.  
 32 MR. BARKER: Mr. Walton?  
 33 MR. WALTON: Yes.  
 34 MR. BARKER: Ayes nine, nos five. And I will  
 35 have to do the math --- this requires a two thirds  
 36 majority in order to pass, so nine, five is a failure.  
 37 Correct. That's a failure.  
 38 MR. FUTULES: It fails. Debate has not ended.  
 39 MR. KRESS: I just have a ---  
 40 MR. FUTULES: Any other questions? Yes, Mr.  
 41 Kress?  
 42 MR. KRESS: Yeah, I mean can the --- the  
 43 solicitor come up and just address any of these concerns  
 44 in the amendment? Do you have ---?

1 doesn't necessarily mean your waiver will be accepted. So  
 2 waivers take time, waivers take money. You can apply for  
 3 a waiver and it --- you know, it might delay your project  
 4 a long time and cost you a lot of money. And at the end  
 5 of the day, you might not be granted permission to do what  
 6 you want to do. Thank you.  
 7 MR. FUTULES: Mr. DeMarco?  
 8 MR. DEMARCO: Mr. Chairman, thank you for  
 9 recognizing me. I think, you know, one, I voted to --- no  
 10 to end debate because like Councilwoman Kirk, I believe if  
 11 somebody wants to say something, they should have the  
 12 ability to say it. But I believe we've all had the  
 13 opportunity to say something about this for a considerable  
 14 amount of time.  
 15 Now, this is --- for the folks who are watching  
 16 this on television or for the folks who are in the  
 17 audience who are just hearing this for the first time,  
 18 this isn't something where it's just come before us  
 19 tonight and we're taking and making a decision. This is  
 20 something that there were multiple meetings held over the  
 21 course of the last two years, which we were invited to go  
 22 to, in which over 240 other members of the WPAC community,  
 23 Bayette Tech, in which we were able to take and submit  
 24 comment. We were able to submit questions. This bill  
 25 passed out of the Public Works Committee a number of  
 26 months ago.  
 27 But because we had some concerns and objections,  
 28 how the folks on the trails were going to be treated, how  
 29 the sewer authorities and things were going to be treated,  
 30 as well as some other concerns ---. The administration  
 31 worked.  
 32 Well, let me --- let me first commend Chairman  
 33 Macey for taking and reaching out for --- to the  
 34 Department of Economic Development and for the Department  
 35 of Economic Development taking this to the Chief Executive  
 36 and saying, hey, wait a minute. There are some concerns  
 37 here. Let's talk to the stakeholders and see if we can  
 38 come up with a solution that meets their needs or meets  
 39 their requirements. This was all done. We had meetings,  
 40 language was changed in here to address concerns around  
 41 permeable and non-permeable surfaces on trails. Things  
 42 were changed in here to protect the sanitary --- or the  
 43 utility companies --- the sanitary sewer authorities for  
 44 what they wanted to do.

1 And from a property rights perspective, I agree  
 2 that you should have the ability to do what you want on  
 3 your property, but this is a little bit different because  
 4 it's not just your property You're doing something  
 5 that's going to go into a water or a waterway that's going  
 6 to affect other peoples' properties. So you should ---  
 7 you have the ability to do that  
 8 And to Councilwoman Means' point where she says  
 9 well, hey There's no guarantee that you're going to be  
 10 granted a waiver, there's no --- there's no reason you  
 11 should be guaranteed that It should be based upon the  
 12 project and what you're looking to do and the impact  
 13 that's going to have on --- on the real estate.  
 14 So you know, I think that we need to take and  
 15 move on with this, whatever the other council members  
 16 decisions are. But I think we need to move forward and  
 17 vote on these things.  
 18 MR. FUTULES: Mr. Ellenbogen?  
 19 MR. ELLENBOGEN: You --- you know what, Mr. Vice  
 20 President? I'll save my comments for the actual bill  
 21 MR. WALTON: So ---  
 22 MR. FUTULES: Okay. Mr. Walton, this is on the  
 23 amendment now ---  
 24 MR. WALTON: Once again ---  
 25 MR. FUTULES: We're on the amendment here, not  
 26 --- not ---  
 27 MR. WALTON: Once again, I will --- I will echo  
 28 Member Catena's effort and move to cease debate and to  
 29 vote on the amendment  
 30 MR. FULUTS: That's already failed. When people  
 31 are done talking ---  
 32 MR. WALTON: It --- it can be raised again, sir.  
 33 MR. FUTULES: Are you making that official  
 34 motion?  
 35 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: Second.  
 36 MR. FUTULES: There a second? Here we go again.  
 37 MR. BARKER: On Mr. Walton's motion to end  
 38 debate, Mr. Baker?  
 39 MR. BAKER: No.  
 40 MR. BARKER: Mr. Catena?  
 41 MR. CATENA: Yes.  
 42 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?  
 43 MR. DEMARCO: Yes.  
 44 MR. BARKER: Mr. Ellenbogen?  
 45 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Yes.

1 MR. BARKER: Ms. Means?  
 2 MS. MEANS: Yes.  
 3 MR. BARKER: Mr. Palmiere?  
 4 MR. PALMIERE: No.  
 5 MR. BARKER: Ms. Ranalli-Russell?  
 6 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: No.  
 7 MR. BARKER: Mr. Walton?  
 8 MR. WALTON: No.  
 9 MR. BARKER: Ayes 1, nos 13 The motion fails  
 10 MR. FUTULES: Which now brings us back to the  
 11 original ordinance, and are there any questions or  
 12 comments at this time on the original ordinance? Who was  
 13 first?  
 14 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I'll cede to Ms. Means.  
 15 MR. FUTULES: Okay.  
 16 MS. MEANS: Thank you.  
 17 Well, I --- you know, I think it was interesting  
 18 that Mr. DeMarco brought up how many people have  
 19 participated in the WPAC meetings because just tonight, I  
 20 sat down and I looked at the attendance of the --- of the  
 21 September 20th, 2016 WPAC meeting. And at that meeting,  
 22 there was --- oh, my, did I move it? Oh, there were 18  
 23 municipalities represented and then there were 16 other  
 24 people that at least signed into the meeting. And there  
 25 were two people from the Westmoreland Conservation  
 26 District. I'm counting that in the 16.  
 27 So --- most municipalities, half have a storm  
 28 water maintenance plan and half do not in Allegheny  
 29 County. And yes, everyone was invited to participate in  
 30 these meetings, but there was in my opinion, poor  
 31 attendance. And to say that most citizens have no idea  
 32 this is coming. Most citizens are unaware. There hasn't  
 33 been one newspaper article, one TV --- any news articles  
 34 at all on the whole issue. So I just wanted to point out  
 35 that --- to say that there was good representation at the  
 36 WPAC meetings is --- is --- is not true.  
 37 The other comment I wanted to bring up is I have  
 38 concerns about the wording in the amendment that we passed  
 39 on the --- the 30th of November. If you look at our ---  
 40 it's on the last page of the packet that we --- we got  
 41 today, or a couple days ago. If you look at the summary  
 42 of the legislation, but actually the body. Let's see ---  
 43 two of the ordinance --- page two of the ordinance --- or  
 44 the --- it's called --- actually, I'm sorry. It's  
 45 resolution 10104-17.

1 MR. BARKER: Mr. Futules?  
 2 MR. FUTULES: Yes.  
 3 MR. BARKER: Ms. Kirk?  
 4 MS. KIRK: No.  
 5 MR. BARKER: Mr. Klein?  
 6 MR. KLEIN: Yes.  
 7 MR. BARKER: Mr. Kress?  
 8 MR. KRESS: Yes.  
 9 MR. BARKER: Mr. Macey?  
 10 MR. MACEY: Yes.  
 11 MR. BARKER: Mr. Martoni?  
 12 DR. MARTONI: Yes.  
 13 MR. BARKER: Ms. Means?  
 14 MS. MEANS: No.  
 15 MR. BARKER: Mr. Palmiere?  
 16 MR. PALMIERE: Yes.  
 17 MR. BARKER: Ms. Ranalli-Russell?  
 18 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: Yes.  
 19 MR. BARKER: Mr. Walton?  
 20 MR. WALTON: Yes.  
 21 MR. BARKER: Yes 11, nos 3 The motion passes.  
 22 MR. FUTULES: Okay. So the debate had ended.  
 23 We will now vote on the amendment. Roll call.  
 24 MR. BARKER: On Ms. Means' motion to amend, Mr.  
 25 Baker?  
 26 MR. BARKER: Mr. Baker?  
 27 MR. BAKER: No.  
 28 MR. BARKER: Mr. Catena?  
 29 MR. CATENA: No.  
 30 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?  
 31 MR. DEMARCO: No.  
 32 MR. BARKER: Mr. Ellenbogen?  
 33 MR. ELLENBOGEN: No.  
 34 MR. BARKER: Mr. Futules?  
 35 MR. FUTULES: No.  
 36 MR. BARKER: Ms. Kirk?  
 37 MS. KIRK: No.  
 38 MR. BARKER: Mr. Klein?  
 39 MR. KLEIN: No.  
 40 MR. BARKER: Mr. Kress?  
 41 MR. KRESS: No.  
 42 MR. BARKER: Mr. Macey?  
 43 MR. MACEY: No.  
 44 MR. BARKER: Mr. Martoni?  
 45 DR. MARTONI: No.

1 So it lists things here, Allegheny County Act  
 2 167 phase two countywide storm water management plan model  
 3 storm water management ordinance March 20th, 2017. So  
 4 that's number one, and then it lists at four --- number  
 5 four, it says March 20, 2017. And number five, it says  
 6 March 20, 2017 and March --- and number six says March 20,  
 7 2017.  
 8 Now that ordinance was changed. We --- I mean,  
 9 when we got the March 20, 2017 ordinance countywide storm  
 10 water management plan ordinance, it had in there that you  
 11 couldn't put sewer lines in the riparian buffer and it  
 12 also had language that was really prohibitive to the trail  
 13 that the --- the people that build our recreational  
 14 trails. Now the language was changed over time. Thanks  
 15 to Mr. Macey, he sent the bill back and there was --- and  
 16 thank you again to the Department of Economic Development  
 17 But they had meetings and they changed the language.  
 18 But I think referencing a management plan, I  
 19 don't know if the --- the solicitor or someone can  
 20 address, is that an issue that the language was changed  
 21 since March 20, 2017 and does the language revert back to  
 22 the March 20, 2017 even though it was changed by economic  
 23 development to allow sewer lines to go in the riparian  
 24 buffer and allow the trails to continue building?  
 25 Thank you. If someone could address that for  
 26 me. I don't know if it should be Mr. Hurley or --- or ---  
 27 or I think the solicitor should address that.  
 28 MR. CAMBEST: Well, I can address, I think, one  
 29 part of that question. I wasn't at the committee meeting,  
 30 so I'm not sure what was changed or wasn't changed.  
 31 But my understanding is the final drafts of the  
 32 language that we see here on the desk and which will be  
 33 attached to the original document contained those changes.  
 34 That's my understanding was that (indicating) --- anyone  
 35 has any different understanding?  
 36 MS. MEANS: So just to clarify, so you're saying  
 37 that even though the name of it is something that was  
 38 adopted long ago, as long as the right wording is in those  
 39 750 pages, then we're good to go.  
 40 MR. CAMBEST: It would be referenced --- it  
 41 would be referenced in that ordinances as these  
 42 attachments. And as long as that language has changed  
 43 through these committee meetings are a part of those  
 44 documents, that would be proper. Yes.  
 45 MS. MEANS: Okay.

1 I --- I would like to, for the record, say that  
 2 this went in a regular path in that it wasn't changed  
 3 inside of, you know, Public Works Committee. The changes  
 4 didn't come there and they couldn't come there because the  
 5 750 pages were a link to a website, not --- not --- you  
 6 know, language inside of an ordinance that we could amend.  
 7 And we could only amend the language since last Thursday  
 8 because it was just only then incorporated.  
 9 So there's not even a paper trail to document  
 10 that the words were not --- you know, that the words have  
 11 been changed.  
 12 MR. WALTON: Mr. ---  
 13 MS. MEANS: Thank you.  
 14 MR. WALTON: --- Mr. Vice Chairman? Mr. ---  
 15 MR. FUTULES: Yeah?  
 16 MR. WALTON: --- Vice President?  
 17 MR. FUTULES: Yeah?  
 18 MR. WALTON: Absent --- absent further debate on  
 19 the motion, I think we should go ahead and vote on the  
 20 motion.  
 21 MR. MACEY: Second.  
 22 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I have to speak.  
 23 MR. FUTULES: We have Mr. Ellenbogen with his  
 24 hand up, and he wants to comment. Mr. Ellenbogen?  
 25 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I was hoping I could get out of  
 26 here without --- but you know, I want to try to make it  
 27 real for people in laymen's terms. I mean, Bobby might  
 28 not know that I was a former chief of special emergency  
 29 services for this county, ---  
 30 MR. MACEY: I don't believe that  
 31 MR. ELLENBOGEN: --- but you know ---  
 32 MS. KIRK: We love you --- we love you, Jimmy.  
 33 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I had no choice there. Anyway,  
 34 you know, nature has its own way of doing things and for  
 35 150 years in this county, there is what they call a  
 36 natural 100 year flood plain. Floods and things that  
 37 happen within 100 years are very rare, that's why it's a  
 38 100 year flood plain.  
 39 Now I can tell you from experience that the ---  
 40 the flood plain of this county has been compromised more  
 41 than once. Those that have been around a while, I spent  
 42 five days in Piteairn because Monroeville ignored a lot of  
 43 the things that compromised the flood plain. Hey, you  
 44 know, we can sublet this and let's build something over  
 45 here and not keep all that in mind.

1 MR. ELLENBOGEN: --- think of these things.  
 2 Thank you, Mr. Vice President and Mr. Public Works  
 3 Chairman.  
 4 MR. DEMARCO: Thank you, Mr. Vice President.  
 5 I would just like to say that it was interesting  
 6 that Ms. Means looked at the attendance of one meeting  
 7 when there were actually six WPAC meetings held.  
 8 MS. MEANS: Uh-huh (yes)  
 9 MR. DEMARCO: And I know that I attended  
 10 numerous ones, as a matter of fact, with her. So if we're  
 11 going to comment on the attendance, I think you should  
 12 look at the attendance of all the meetings.  
 13 Also, public comment period was open with this  
 14 thing for months. For months there was a public comment  
 15 period.  
 16 Okay?  
 17 Then the other thing here, you start talking  
 18 about the state --- Act --- there are 67 counties in the  
 19 State of Pennsylvania. The topography of these different  
 20 counties is different, so they allow them and they make  
 21 this optional for counties in which it's an issue to be  
 22 able to incorporate it.  
 23 Here in Allegheny County where we have four  
 24 major --- major rivers running through --- the three here  
 25 (indicating) and then at the other end there, the Yough.  
 26 We have to be able to put something in place.  
 27 She was talking about saying, well, half the  
 28 municipalities have storm water management plans. No they  
 29 don't. There are 25 watersheds in Allegheny County, and  
 30 that 25 covers about a third of the county. Four of them  
 31 --- there are four that were put in place from '86 to '94  
 32 and only four others which were updated in 2008 through  
 33 the North Hills council government. So you're looking at  
 34 a total of eight, and there's 130 municipalities here in  
 35 Allegheny County.  
 36 Am I happy that we're doing all this? No, I  
 37 believe that we should have as little government as  
 38 possible, but there are certain things that need to be  
 39 done. We heard from a public speaker today, a businessman  
 40 who's concerned about how these things are going to affect  
 41 him and his business --- excuse me, his expense.  
 42 But the thing that we have to look at here is  
 43 many of these waterways flow through multiple  
 44 municipalities. It is not feasible to say, well, we'll  
 45 let a municipality handle it at a municipal level because

1 And what happened? Piteairn was under water.  
 2 Do you remember that, Dr. Martoni?  
 3 DR. MARTONI: Yeah.  
 4 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I spent another week in West  
 5 Elizabeth because Forward Township and all them also  
 6 decided to ignore the kinds of things that we're talking  
 7 about tonight, and West Elizabeth went under water. I'm  
 8 sure former president of Carnegie Council could tell you  
 9 what happened in Carnegie when the flood plain has been  
 10 compromised.  
 11 And in those --- Mr. Kress in Millvale. What's  
 12 happened is because of all the development --- because of  
 13 all the new development, the flood plain in this county  
 14 has been compromised and you're seeing floods and things  
 15 that have never been seen in this county before. And it's  
 16 because of the kinds of things --- for instance, you know,  
 17 you do business with a company that says, well, we're  
 18 going to do this. So they subcontract it to somebody else  
 19 who says, well, we can cut corners and do this. And they  
 20 further subcontract it. So you don't even end up with  
 21 what's on paper.  
 22 And so in other words, if the county doesn't do  
 23 the kinds of things to safeguard these kind of things,  
 24 you're going to see these kind of horrific kinds of floods  
 25 in the future.  
 26 Now the North Hills in particular is a very  
 27 development area thing. And as they develop more and  
 28 more, it's the same thing --- we never had the kind of  
 29 tornadoes here. And when they tore out the natural  
 30 terrain in 79, now you're getting tornadoes that make  
 31 their way down 79 and end up in Mount Washington.  
 32 So I'm not going to belabor the point, but I  
 33 have to commend the administration for trying to think out  
 34 of the box to try to protect the public in terms of what  
 35 could happen. Because you know, my experience is if you  
 36 don't watch it, nobody watches it, nobody really cares  
 37 about what's going to happen right now and then they  
 38 change the game and you end up with these horrific kinds  
 39 of tragedies.  
 40 So with that, you know --- unless anybody wants  
 41 to ask me a question, but ---  
 42 It's important to ---  
 43 MR. FUTULES: Sam?

1 you might have a waterway that runs through three, four,  
 2 five or six of them. Someone upstream may not want to  
 3 take and do something when the one downstream is the one  
 4 that's being flooded. So we have to look at these things  
 5 in totality.  
 6 I believe that private property rights are being  
 7 protected here. We have a waiver process. Anything under  
 8 less than an acre will go to the municipality, anything  
 9 above the acre will go to the DEP, or if they fail to  
 10 deliver permits on time, the Allegheny Conservation  
 11 District.  
 12 So Mr. Chairman, I have looked at this. I have  
 13 met with folks. I hear their concerns. But I --- but I  
 14 think that we've done as much as we possibly can to make  
 15 this ordinance as good as it can possibly be for the  
 16 municipalities in Allegheny County.  
 17 Thank you, Mr. Chairman.  
 18 MR. FUTULES: Well said, Councilman DeMarco.  
 19 Ms. Means, we're --- we're all sure that we  
 20 understand your concerns, so please be brief if you may.  
 21 MS. MEANS: Okay. I just wanted to ask that the  
 22 minutes from the public hearing that county council held  
 23 on May 9th be entered into the record.  
 24 I also want to comment that I am happy with the  
 25 part of the storm water management. I --- I am totally  
 26 okay with that. The riparian buffer is a total and  
 27 complete --- it's a separate issue. And to correct Mr.  
 28 --- Councilman DeMarco, the Allegheny County Conservation  
 29 District will not be approving the waivers. It goes to  
 30 the DEP. And movement of dirt has to do with the storm  
 31 water ordinance, not the riparian buffer.  
 32 So I'm --- I just wanted to correct those things  
 33 and ask again that this be entered into the record. Thank  
 34 you very much.  
 35 MR. FUTULES: Thank you. Roll call.  
 36 MR. BARKER: On Mr. Macey's motion to approve,  
 37 Mr. Baker?  
 38 MR. BAKER: Yes.  
 39 MR. BARKER: Mr. Catena?  
 40 MR. CATENA: Yes.  
 41 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?  
 42 MR. DEMARCO: Yes.  
 43 MR. BARKER: Mr. Ellenbogen?  
 44 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Aye.  
 45 MR. BARKER: Mr. Futules?

1 MR FUTULES: Yes,  
 2 MR BARKER: Ms Kirk?  
 3 MS KIRK: Yes.  
 4 MR BARKER: Mr Klein?  
 5 MR KLEIN: Yes.  
 6 MR BARKER: Mr Kress?  
 7 MR KRESS: Yes.  
 8 MR BARKER: Mr Macey?  
 9 MR MACEY: Yes.  
 10 MR BARKER: Mr Martoni?  
 11 DR MARTONI: Yes.  
 12 MR BARKER: Ms. Means?  
 13 MS MEANS: No.  
 14 MR BARKER: Mr. Palmiere?  
 15 MR PALMIERE: Yes.  
 16 MR BARKER: Ms. Ranalli-Russell?  
 17 MS RANALLI-RUSSELL: Yes.  
 18 MR BARKER: Mr. Walton?  
 19 MR WALTON: Yes.  
 20 MR BARKER: Ayes 13, nos 1. The bill passes.  
 21 MR FUTULES: Okay. Next, liaison reports. But  
 22 before we get to liaison, I notice a group of youngster  
 23 --- young folks in the back room. Could you identify this  
 24 and let us know who you are?  
 25 MR. DEMARCO: (indicating).  
 26 MR. FUTULES: Oh, never mind. Sam wants to  
 27 identify them. Go ahead.  
 28 MR. DEMARCO: Yes. I'd like to take the  
 29 opportunity here to welcome our guests here. This is the  
 30 student council from Urban Pathways Charter School here in  
 31 downtown Pittsburgh on Penn Avenue under the tutelage and  
 32 mentorship of Mr. Michael Corbett.  
 33 And I had the privilege of attending a session  
 34 at their facility back in November, last month. And at  
 35 that time, Savannah was so nice to me while we had lunch,  
 36 I wanted to invite them up here to see what an Allegheny  
 37 County Council meeting was like. I do apologize to them  
 38 for the length, but this is a big meeting as today is the  
 39 night that we approve our budgets and two of our  
 40 colleagues are going to be moving on.  
 41 But I do want to welcome them and I want to  
 42 commend them all for their interest in learning more about  
 43 government and that sort of thing. I hope --- I hope  
 44 we're able to finish quickly because I would like to take

1 them downstairs if we get the opportunity. So thank you,  
 2 Mr. Chairman.  
 3 MR. FUTULES: Well, it's too late for quickly,  
 4 but ---  
 5 MR. CORBETT: On our behalf again, we do want to  
 6 thank you for this opportunity to come here to be able to  
 7 take some of this and transfer it to student council. So  
 8 I do want to thank you for this opportunity.  
 9 MR. DEMARCO: Mr. Chairman, could we get a  
 10 picture?  
 11 MR. FUTULES: Thank you.  
 12 MR. DEMARCO: Could we get --- could we get them  
 13 to get a picture?  
 14 MR. FUTULES: Come on up, folks. They want to  
 15 get your picture? You want to get yourself on TV? Come  
 16 on up, kids. We got a --- we got a television camera  
 17 there. He wants to take pictures. Come on. We can do it  
 18 through our staff, Michelle.  
 19 Come on, now. Come on, kids. Come on up.  
 20 (Pictures taken.)  
 21 MR. FUTULES: Okay. Seeing how there's no  
 22 liaison reports ---  
 23 MS. MEANS: Mr. ---  
 24 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Yeah, I have one.  
 25 MR. FUTULES: I knew you were going to say that.  
 26 MS. MEANS: I do, too.  
 27 MR. FUTULES: Okay. Go ahead. Mr. Ellenbogen,  
 28 you have a liaison report?  
 29 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I do.  
 30 MR. FUTULES: Okay.  
 31 MR. ELLENBOGEN: One of the things, Mr. Vice  
 32 President, that I never got an opportunity to finish when  
 33 I was the Public Safety Chair is when we talk about the  
 34 officers, you know, carrying Narcan on everyone, I would  
 35 urge this council to think about particularly with all the  
 36 allergies that children have today of also pushing forward  
 37 that these officers and sheriff's deputies carry EpiPens.  
 38 There's so many emergencies that happen that  
 39 could be resolved, kids dying or worse, waiting --- you  
 40 know. So if --- if they're going to carry Narcan, I'm  
 41 thinking they should also carry EpiPens too. And I would  
 42 urge this council to think about that hard and --- as we  
 43 go into the future, particularly with the types of  
 44 allergies that these kids are getting today from

1 everything from nuts to whatever. Thank you, Mr. Vice  
 2 President.  
 3 MR. FUTULES: I agree. Sue?  
 4 MS. MEANS: I just wanted to say ---  
 5 congratulate Representative Dan Miller for a wonderful  
 6 substance abuse forum that was held on November 29th and I  
 7 want to thank Michelle McAndrew from our staff who  
 8 attended the meeting and took excellent notes. And I'm  
 9 going to have her share the notes with everyone rather  
 10 than take the time and read them.  
 11 So again, it was a wonderful, very informative  
 12 and helpful event and we all need to work together to  
 13 fight the opioid crisis. Thank you.  
 14 MR. FUTULES: Any other liaison reports? Seeing  
 15 none, new business ordinance and resolutions, 10419-17.  
 16 MR. BARKER: An Ordinance approving the sale of  
 17 a parcel of property identified as 3441 Forbes Avenue, 4th  
 18 Ward, Pittsburgh Block and Lot 28-F-172, known as the  
 19 Allegheny County Health Department Forbes Medical  
 20 Building, for the sale price of \$1,900,000 to 3441 F  
 21 Street, LLC. Sponsored by the Chief Executive.  
 22 MR. FUTULE: That will be referred to the  
 23 Committee on Economic Development and Housing. 10420-17.  
 24 MR. BARKER: A Resolution approving a project  
 25 for the benefit of Presbyterian SeniorCare to be financed  
 26 by the Authority for Improvements in Municipalities by the  
 27 issuance of the Authority's tax-exempt revenue notes, in  
 28 one or more series, to be designated Authority for  
 29 Improvements in Municipalities, Revenue Notes, Series 2017  
 30 Presbyterian SeniorCare Project or such other designation  
 31 as may be determined by the Authority and the Borrower, in  
 32 a maximum aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$12.5  
 33 million, provided that the taxing power of the County of  
 34 Allegheny, Pennsylvania shall not be obligated in any way  
 35 with respect to the Notes, and declaring the financing of  
 36 such project as desirable for the health, safety and  
 37 welfare of the people in the County and in the area served  
 38 by the project. Sponsored by the Chief Executive.  
 39 MR. FUTULES: That'll be referred to Committee  
 40 on Economic Development and Housing. New business  
 41 motions, 10421-17.  
 42 MR. BARKER: Motion of the Council of Allegheny  
 43 County re-establishing the Budget Transfer Committee in  
 44 accordance with Section 805.03 of the Administrative Code.  
 45 Sponsored by Council Member Klein.

1 MR. FUTULES: Mr. Klein? I believe it ---  
 2 MR. KLEIN: I'm making a motion at this time for  
 3 approval of the Budget Transfer Committee in accordance  
 4 with Section 805.03 of the Administrative Code.  
 5 MR. MACEY: Second.  
 6 MR. FUTULES: Question? It's a voice vote. All  
 7 in favor signify by saying aye.  
 8 (Chorus of ayes.)  
 9 MR. FUTULES: Opposed? Ayes have it. Motion  
 10 passes. 10422-17.  
 11 MR. BARKER: Motion of the Council of Allegheny  
 12 County to continue the services of Attorney John F.  
 13 Cambest to provide legal advice, representation and  
 14 consultation to County Council. Sponsored by Council  
 15 Member Walton.  
 16 MR. FUTULES: Sorry, Mr. Walton.  
 17 MS. MEANS: Second.  
 18 MR. FUTULES: What?  
 19 MR. PALMIERE: Third.  
 20 MR. FUTULES: What? Wait a minute.  
 21 MR. WALTON: I'm --- move --- so moved.  
 22 MR. FUTULES: You want to ---?  
 23 MR. PALMIERE: Second.  
 24 MR. FUTULES: Okay. You seconded it before he  
 25 moved it.  
 26 MR. WALTON: Yeah ---  
 27 MR. FUTULES: Any questions --- any questions?  
 28 Seeing none, that would be a voice vote. This is --- Mr.  
 29 Cambest, if I'm not mistaken. Right?  
 30 MR. CAMBEST: Yes.  
 31 MR. FUTULES: Yeah. Comment?  
 32 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I just wanted to say you know,  
 33 when I first came here, we all said aye when we voted.  
 34 I'm the last of the aye voters on this council. So with  
 35 this vote for Mr. Cambest, everything will be yes from now  
 36 on. I'm the end of the ayes ---.  
 37 MR. WALTON: Well, I'm going to go back to aye.  
 38 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Well, I appreciate that. But I  
 39 just noticed that when I --- because I'm the last one left  
 40 that says I. You guys all say yes, the modern councilmen  
 41 you know.  
 42 All right. Thank you, Mr. President.  
 43 MR. FUTULES: Mr. Catena, did you have a  
 44 question?  
 45 MR. CATENA: I think Mr. Kress had his hand up.



1 MR. FUTULES: Well, Mr. Kress, you seem to have  
 2 a ---  
 3 MR. KRESS: No, I already talked to you about  
 4 it.  
 5 MR. FUTULES: Okay.  
 6 MR. KRESS: I'm okay.  
 7 MR. FUTULES: Okay.  
 8 Any other questions?  
 9 So it's a voice vote --- excuse me. Everyone in  
 10 favor signify by saying aye.  
 11 (Chorus of ayes.)  
 12 MR. FUTULES: Opposed? Hearing none,  
 13 congratulations, Mr. Cambest. Let's see. Notification of  
 14 contracts.  
 15 MR. BARKER: We have none.  
 16 MR. FUTULES: Public comment on general items?  
 17 MR. BARKER: Also none.  
 18 MR. WALTON: Motion to adjourn.  
 19 MR. PALMIERE: Second.  
 20 MR. FUTULES: Meeting adjourned.
