 44 MR. BARKER: A Proclamation recognizing the
 45 Sutek family for raising the profile of in Case of

1 meet everyone's needs, the government, and this is people
 2 helping people go through a rough time. Maybe they got
 3 divorced, maybe the father lost his job, it's just they're
 4 going through a rough time and this is neighbors helping
 5 neighbors, and also with the immigrant population, making
 6 them feel very welcome to the South Hills. And I read
 7 also in an article that a lot of the people that go to the
 8 Prospect Park satellite program buy homes in Whitehall.
 9 So they --- they --- you know, they need that
 10 and they get that little bit of help and --- but let me go
 11 ahead and read this Proclamation, so ---.
 12 WHEREAS, South Hills Interfaith Movement,
 13 originally named South Hills Interfaith Ministries was
 14 founded as a non-profit human services organization in
 15 1968 by the Reverend John Galbreath of Westminster
 16 Presbyterian Church in Upper St. Clair and Rabbi William
 17 Sajowitz of the Temple Emanuel in Mount Lebanon and
 18 Monsignor Francis Rooney of St. Thomas More Catholic
 19 Church in Bethel Park;
 20 WHEREAS, as the organization SHIM is rooted in
 21 mobilizing communities resources and implementing
 22 sustainable programs to compassionately help individuals
 23 meet basic needs, achieve self-sufficiency and build
 24 community awareness or involvement and;
 25 WHEREAS, over the past 50 years, SHIM has been
 26 able to expand the neighbors helping neighbors in need
 27 program due to their dedicated volunteers, donors and
 28 partners;
 29 WHEREAS, SHIM is devoted to reducing the efforts
 30 of suburban poverty among the working poor, unemployed
 31 families, single parents, senior citizens, women and the
 32 high concentration of the refugee families in the South
 33 Hills and;
 34 WHEREAS, SHIM currently serves about 4,000
 35 residents of the South Hills by providing essentials such
 36 as food, clothing and housing along with programs to move
 37 individuals toward self-sufficiency including help with
 38 job applications and interviewing training --- interview
 39 training;
 40 WHEREAS, SHIM hosts three food pantries and 13
 41 community gardens. In 2017, those gardens yielded 12,000
 42 pounds of fresh produce helping to feed 1,500 individuals
 43 from --- and between 700 and 800 families;
 44 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that I, Allegheny
 45 Councilwoman Sue Means do hereby celebrate the 50th

1 Emergency Awareness Program. Sponsored by Council Member
 2 Kirk.
 3 MS. KIRK: Is the Sutek family here yet? I
 4 don't think they're here yet. Is the Sutek family in
 5 here? I don't think they're here yet.
 6 MR. FUTULES: Just put them on hold.
 7 MS. KIRK: Yeah, just put them on hold.
 8 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. 10666-18.
 9 MR. BARKER: A Proclamation celebrating the 50th
 10 anniversary of the South Hills Interfaith Movement.
 11 Sponsored by Council Member Means.
 12 MS. MEANS: Well, we're --- I'm really excited
 13 today to --- I'm very honored to have the executive
 14 director of SHIM with us, James Guffey. And, SHIM is a
 15 wonderful organization and it was started because of an
 16 idea that three men at a clock had. A Presbyterian
 17 minister, a Catholic priest and a Rabbi had the idea to
 18 please meet, to come together and meet the needs of the
 19 South Hills community and it has just grown and grown and
 20 it's doing a wonderful job. That's why I'm so excited
 21 today to talk about SHIM and what it has accomplished.
 22 And actually, I'm glad that Mr. Guffey is here
 23 today because he took the budget, see --- correct me if
 24 I'm wrong. In 2007, he took the budget from \$220,000 of
 25 an annual budget with four full time staff to now they
 26 have 17 full time employees and they serve 1.8 million ---
 27 was that --- I'm sorry, a budget of \$1.8 million. And
 28 they actually have the originals --- well, they started
 29 out in South Hills Village and I actually think I went to
 30 one of the meetings. Really.
 31 In 1968, South Hills Village was new and these
 32 pastors decided they needed to have an afterschool program
 33 and an outreach to the teens, and I really do think I went
 34 to one of those. I remember going to the community room.
 35 And then after three years, they moved on and now there
 36 presently on South Park Road near our community center in
 37 Bethel Park and they also have a wonderful satellite
 38 program in Prospect Park where they help a lot of
 39 immigrants from 30 different countries. And then --- so
 40 they have a food pantry there, one in --- and one there in
 41 South Park, on South Park Road and one at the Baldwin
 42 United --- is it Methodist Church and there in Baldwin.
 43 So they help hundreds and hundreds and thousands
 44 of people, and really what it is are people helping
 45 people. So non-profits are wonderful, we can't possibly

 2 commend this non-profit organization for taking the action
 3 needed to help develop an inclusive community where all
 4 individuals can thrive.

 9 Congratulations. Would you like to say a few
 10 words?
 11 MR. GUFFEY: Okay.
 12 Just real quick, thank you to Council for taking
 13 your time out of what will be a busy schedule. I just
 14 wanted to say to all of you on Council, we're a partner
 15 here with Allegheny County. We're very pleased to partner
 16 with the Department of Human Services under Mark Turner's
 17 leadership.
 18 We, in our Prospect Park location have one of
 19 the 26, 27 family support centers that certainly this
 20 Council has been supportive of over the years. So we
 21 thank you for remembering the South Hills. When you think
 22 of Councilwoman Sue Mean's district as well as Council
 23 Member John Palmiere's district, you're thinking of
 24 communities that aren't normally associated with poverty.
 25 Upper St. Clair, Mount Lebanon, Bethel Park, Castle
 26 Shannon, Baldwin, White Hall and yet families struggle.
 27 So we're proud to partner with the county, we're
 28 proud to partner with you here on Council and we'll be
 29 there for another 50 years if we have anything to say
 30 about that to continue to meet the needs and neighbors
 31 helping neighbors, so thank you for this honor.
 32 (Applause.)
 33 (Pictures taken.)
 34 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: We're waiting for one more

 37 MS. KIRK: These people are here.

1 MS. KIRK: Hi. Tonight, a tragic event led to
 2 some positive changes due to these two fine people.
 3 Unfortunately and I don't --- they lost their son last
 4 year and they --- in an effort not to have other parents
 5 go through some of the struggles they had, they're
 6 promoting and encouraging people to use an app, an ICE app
 7 like In Case of Emergency so people can identify people,
 8 people can get contact information when you can't speak
 9 for yourself.
 10 So we'd like to honor the Suteks here for
 11 turning something, our worst nightmare of any parent or
 12 any family member, into a positive to honor their son,
 13 Gregory, so that's why we're here today. And so we really
 14 appreciate you taking the strength. This is a very
 15 difficult week and we just appreciate them being here and
 16 allowing us to honor them for making Allegheny County a
 17 better place. Thank you.
 18 MRS. SUTEK: Thank you.
 19 MR. SUTEK: Thank you.
 20 MS. KIRK: That said, the Proclamation
 21 WHEREAS, in the mid-2000s Bob Brochie, a
 22 British paramedic conducted research that found that fewer
 23 than 25 percent of people carried the details on them of
 24 who they wanted to be contacted in an event of a serious
 25 emergency. This study led to Mr. Brochie in a campaign
 26 which ultimately resulted in the In Case of Emergency or
 27 ICE and;
 28 WHEREAS, the ICE program encourages all
 29 individuals with a cell phone to add important medical
 30 information and emergency contacts identified by the
 31 initials ICE, that first responders and hospital personnel
 32 should contact in a situation when an individual is unable
 33 to communicate. This information can be used to identify
 34 victims and contact their next of kin in the case if an
 35 individual is seriously injured, unconscious or unable to
 36 respond. It is critical to have this information within
 37 the golden hour which increases the chance of survival and
 38 family comfort;
 39 WHEREAS, after the tragic loss of her son,
 40 Gregory, in 2017, Heather Sutek became an advocate for ICE
 41 through presentations at local schools, hospitals, police
 42 stations. Mrs. Sutek passionately educates others on the
 43 importance of having ICE information on your cell phone or
 44 on your person. Through her presentations, Mrs. Sutek
 45 used her unfortunate experience to help individuals

1 MR. BARKER: Before proceeding, please let the
 2 record reflect that Mr. DeMarco is now participating via
 3 telephone, although it's not the usual system so he may be
 4 a little bit difficult to hear from time to time.
 5 10667-18 A Proclamation congratulating Michael
 6 Ulery for successfully reading more than seven million
 7 words and breaking Shaler Area Elementary School's record.
 8 Sponsored by Council Member Prizio
 9 MS. PRIZIO: It is common to find sixth grader
 10 Michael Ulery reading before wrestling meets, waiting for
 11 the bus or whenever he has a spare moment. In fact,
 12 Michael reads five 400 to 600 page books in one or two
 13 days. Therefore, it's not surprising he has broken Shaler
 14 Township --- Shaler Elementary School's record for the
 15 most words read.
 16 In light of Michael's tremendous achievement, I
 17 would like to offer the following Proclamation from
 18 Allegheny County Office of County Council. A Proclamation
 19 recognizing a seven million word reader.
 20 WHEREAS, every year, students at the Shaler
 21 Elementary School participate in the Titan Trail Reading
 22 Adventure. A sixth grader at Shaler Area, Michael Ulery
 23 participated in the school wide reading incentive program
 24 and broke the school record as he read more than seven
 25 million words this past school year which is equivalent to
 26 about 80 books.
 27 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that I, Allegheny
 28 County Council Member do hereby congratulate Michael for
 29 successfully reading --- participating in the Titan Trail
 30 Adventure and on behalf of all of us on County Council we
 31 wish you continued success in all of your future endeavors
 32 so please keep reading.
 33 (Applause.)
 34 MR. ULERY: Hi. I just want to reinforce how
 35 much of an opportunity books are to learn and gain
 36 knowledge. I also want to reinforce how good the public
 37 library is for getting free books and helping out the
 38 public library.

1 integrate ICE into their daily routine. She also reaches
 2 out to hundreds in the public and private sector to
 3 encourage them to use ICE in their daily life and;
 4 WHEREAS, the --- the United States Center for
 5 Disease Control and Prevention reported in 2006 that
 6 1,600,000 emergency room patients could not provide
 7 contact information because they were incapacitated. In
 8 the United States, there are almost 300,000,000 cellphone
 9 users and many smartphones have that feature which will
 10 allow ICE information to be added through the Health app
 11 or another downloadable app;
 12 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that I, Allegheny
 13 County Councilman Cindy Kirk and the other members of
 14 Council do hereby recognize the Sutek family for raising
 15 the profile of In Case of Emergency or ICE awareness
 16 program. We encourage all residents of Allegheny County
 17 to adopt ICE and add their emergency contact information
 18 into their cellphones.
 19 IN WITNESS THEREOF, I have hereunto cause the

 21 day of June 2018, affixed by John Defazio, President of
 22 Council, and myself.
 23 (Applause.)
 24 MS. KIRK: Would you like to say anything? If
 25 you do, it's up to you?
 26 MRS. SUTEK: Okay. Thank you so much for taking
 27 the time to recognize the In Case of Emergency awareness
 28 initiative. I'm hoping you all have it set up in your
 29 phones. If you don't, if you have an iPhone, take a
 30 second and look at your app. It's one of the built-in
 31 apps in the iPhones. It's called the My Health app it's a
 32 white square with a red heart. If you go in there and
 33 fill out the information in there, it'll be able to be
 34 accessed from the lock screen of your phone.
 35 So if first responders come, they don't need to
 36 know that code that you have on your phone to unlock it.
 37 And if you have an Android, you just search Medical ID in
 38 the app store and one will come up so that you'll be able
 39 to download the app and implement it so that again, first
 40 responders can access your information from the lock
 41 screen. Thank you.

 44 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: 10667-18.

1 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: 10668-18 and the rest of the
 2 proclamations will be read into the record.
 3 MR. BARKER: 10668-18. A Certificate of
 4 Recognition honoring the life and achievements of MR. Carl
 5 Edward Parker. Sponsored by Council Members Futules and
 6 Controller Wagner.
 7 10669-18. A Certificate of Recognition
 8 recognizing Munhall Borough as being named one of
 9 America's top 10 Most Affordable Places to Live in 2018.
 10 Sponsored by Council Member Klein.
 11 And 10670-18. A Certificate of Recognition
 12 recognizing Tom Grealish for being named the 2018 Man of
 13 the Year by the Circus Saints and Sinner Club. Sponsored
 14 by Council Member DeMarco.
 15 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: At this time, the Chief
 16 Executive, quarterly meeting, he'll address us for his
 17 quarterly meeting.
 18 (Applause.)
 19 CHIEF EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Thank you, Mr.
 20 President and Members of Council. I was just with a
 21 number of you as we took the tour on top of the County
 22 office building to show the --- the green roof that this
 23 county invested in a number of years ago and continues to
 24 pay dividends in taking storm water out of the system and
 25 also, you know, the beautification of it but also saving
 26 energy as it's become an insulator to keep the heat in in
 27 the winter and the cool in in the summer. So it was good
 28 --- good to be with you and get to see some of the things
 29 up front and personal that you appropriate and your
 30 appropriation and during the budget process we go through.
 31 I wanted to talk a little bit about, start off
 32 with public works. We know we've come through a --- a
 33 tough winter, even though it doesn't feel like it right
 34 now. It was like a landslide season. We had more
 35 landslides this winter and in this spring that we've ever
 36 had, and I think it's something that we need to try to get
 37 a little bit of a handle on. I know we have a very
 38 difficult typography, and again, the rain that we had
 39 during the month of February caused a lot of problems.
 40 So we've put a taskforce together trying to
 41 reach out to experts across the county and across the
 42 region, working with PennDOT, working with our
 43 universities, working with the Corps of Engineers,
 44 geotechnical experts, et cetera. And I've asked directors
 45 Matt Brown from emergency service and Steve Shanley to

1 co-share it. And we've already begun to get into some
 2 really good information about how we can be a little more
 3 predictive in --- in how this can occur and really trying
 4 to educate some of the folks of the 130 municipal ties
 5 around public works, gathering data that we can share with
 6 each other to try to help prevent these problems from
 7 happening into the future. So that's one of the things
 8 that --- that we're working on.

9 Also, along emergency services, as you know,
 10 we're moving forward with the 911 facility out in Moon
 11 Township. It seems to be going very well and we're hoping
 12 by the end of the year to move into that facility. And I
 13 know many of you have taken the tour out there to see
 14 what's going on there. We're also very fortunate in ---
 15 the Pittsburgh Indian community that just donated \$15,000
 16 to us. They hold a fundraiser every year at North Park, a
 17 \$K for our firefighters and first responders in Allegheny
 18 County. So it was very --- very grateful that they were
 19 willing to do that and raise that money and give it to our
 20 first responders and firefighters who are doing that.

21 Again, you went on top of the roof, a number of
 22 you, and I wanted to highlight the fact that with the
 23 Green Building Alliance, the county who was one of the
 24 first signatories to that seven years ago when we first
 25 joined onto that, seven of our buildings are a part of
 26 that, and that's a 2030 plan in which we want to reduce
 27 our fossil fuel usage by 50 percent over that --- that
 28 period by 2030. Seven of our buildings participate in
 29 that. We've been given a number of awards for doing that.

30 We've also been leading in some of the other
 31 privately held buildings. We have more buildings under
 32 contract, more square footage under contract than any
 33 similar city of our size, any region of our size. So it's
 34 something we can all be proud of, and in the aggregate,
 35 we've already reduced by 14 percent all of the buildings
 36 that were in there, all seven, including this courthouse
 37 which is 17 percent below its original threshold.

38 So we're moving in the right direction and I
 39 want to thank the manager and director Rheridan for ---
 40 and Kathy Hrabovsky, director Hrabovsky for the work that
 41 they're doing in trying to become more sustainable, more
 42 energy efficient and use less water and energy than we do.

43 For those of you that didn't get up on top of
 44 the courthouse, we've talked about that and what we're
 45 doing as far as the roof goes. You probably see on the

1 In DHS, I want to just announce that last week
 2 they began their summer food service program and that
 3 gives for free breakfast and lunches to people that are
 4 eligible with income. That'll be at 80 different sites
 5 around the county that that will be eligible to make sure
 6 that we make sure that people, particularly our young
 7 children, have the food necessary to lead healthy lives.

8 We also began a sporting goods donation. One of
 9 the biggest requests we get from people is they want to
 10 have sporting goods. Baseball gloves, running shoes, or
 11 you know, whatever it might be. And we're collecting
 12 donations through the end of August, and that's been going
 13 very, very well. As people, their kids grow up and they
 14 still have some of those old baseball and football and
 15 hockey and basketball equipment laying around, soccer
 16 equipment, it can be donated to folks who have a real need
 17 and don't necessarily have the means to be able to buy
 18 that.

19 Also want to talk about --- our summer concert
 20 series began a couple of weeks ago and that's been
 21 extremely successful over the years and continues to be
 22 this year with the food trucks that are there every week
 23 at South Park and at Hartwood Acres. And again, the craft
 24 beer from a local Lawrenceville brewery, craft beer place,
 25 is also there this summer.

26 I also, with the parks --- and I want to give
 27 Councilman Palmosina a little shout out here. I went out
 28 to the forestry department that we started a little over a
 29 year ago. He's really been doing some terrific work, and
 30 I think they're going to put together some sort of a video
 31 that they'll be able to show at the parks committee
 32 meeting in which we're taking down diseased and dead trees
 33 that are --- you know, have been infested in our county.
 34 And this forestry division is really a tremendous job,
 35 that --- we've invested in training, we've invested in
 36 equipment, we've invested in the personnel and they are
 37 really --- when you see what they do and we went out, like
 38 I said a couple of weeks ago with the county manager to
 39 observe how they take down some, you know, massive,
 40 massive trees that are causing problems in our parks. It
 41 was impressive to see.

42 So again, we're just trying to make sure that
 43 our parks are as positive as they can be. We're planting
 44 new trees as well, it's not just taking down the old
 45 diseased tress but we're making sure that we plant trees

1 Ross Street side, the roof is orange and that's what it
 2 was in 1888, it was orange. I think most of us grew up
 3 thinking that roof was black because that's what happened
 4 during the industrial age, it turned black, but now you
 5 see going back to the original tiles that were put on that
 6 roof. It will be orange when it's all done, so I think
 7 people will be a little bit surprised and hopefully, it'll
 8 stay orange for a lot longer as Dr. Hacker and her team
 9 have, you know, continued to make improvements on our ---
 10 on our air quality. 450,000 tiles will be replaced. They
 11 have never been replaced since 1888, 130 years ago.
 12 That's the original roof that is up there.

13 We have some legislation we're presenting
 14 tonight to take some of those older tiles that will be
 15 coming down off of that roof and repurposing them with a
 16 company, a local company up in the northern part of
 17 Pennsylvania, Wendell August Forge, to create some tiles
 18 that can be used for people that have worked in this
 19 courthouse or have fond memories and want to have a
 20 remembrance of that. And we'll use --- those proceeds
 21 will go to our parks foundation to put back into the
 22 county parks. So you'll be taking a look at that and I'm
 23 sure it'll go to committee and you'll be able to go
 24 through a lot of things that are --- that are there.

25 I mentioned, you know, the air and the Clean Air
 26 Act. We're proud, and --- Dr. Hacker and her team, but
 27 for the second year in a row under the standards of the
 28 Clean Air Act, Allegheny County met the ozone standards.
 29 So we're moving in the right direction. We're going to
 30 continue as she aggressively talks about making sure that
 31 our air is as clean as it can be and continues to improve.

32 I also want to let you know that on the Health
 33 Department, we've been talking a lot about lead. That's
 34 been in the news for a number of months. We now have
 35 investigators who will go out, and we've actually lowered
 36 the threshold. It used to be we would go out for children
 37 who tested higher than 10 micrograms per deciliter, now it
 38 is over five. So if somebody tests over five, and as you
 39 know, you passed the mandatory lead testing a number of
 40 months ago. So we're trying to make sure that we're being
 41 proactive and the health department does have a program in
 42 which they will go out, investigate to see what's in the
 43 home that could be causing the lead levels in some of our
 44 children to be higher than it needs to be.

1 as well and that's a big part of what we'll continue to
 2 do.

3 We started last year again, some of the
 4 municipal tours. I know some of you have been on a number
 5 of them. We just did a couple in the last month with
 6 Councilman Baker out in Cornopolis. He's got the picture
 7 right there and we often do that, is take a picture with
 8 the borough council members. And then Councilman Futules
 9 joined us in Verona a couple of weeks ago. And it really
 10 gives us a good --- a good firsthand on the ground ability
 11 to see what's going on in these municipalities. I know we
 12 did Carnegie, I believe it was last year that we've done
 13 them. We've done them with a number of you throughout ---
 14 throughout the years and the last couple of years. We'll
 15 continue to do those and we appreciate the fact that you
 16 make the time and come with us to see what their needs
 17 might be, whether it be public safety, public works,
 18 economic development, et cetera, that we continue to ---
 19 to work on.

20 A number of you also participated, I guess a
 21 month or so ago, in the human relation commission awards.
 22 I think it's a great program. We started the human
 23 relation commission about 10 years ago and they --- and
 24 they initiate award ceremonies to different high school
 25 students around the county in some of the things that
 26 they're doing in promoting diversity and promoting
 27 acceptance, et cetera.

28 So I know Councilman --- Councilwomen Prizio and
 29 Kirk and Walton were there that day and I appreciate you
 30 being willing to be there with --- with those kids and
 31 show the support for some of the work that they're doing
 32 out in the community. Were you there, too? I thought you
 33 were. I didn't see --- they didn't put your name on
 34 there, okay. I thought that Councilwoman Russell was
 35 there as well.

36 So I wanted to also bring up to date some of the
 37 things that are happening at the airport. We continue to
 38 see good --- good work that Director Cassotis and her team
 39 are doing out there. We announced that we got --- we're
 40 going to have a San Diego flight. Frontier Airlines is
 41 going to begin that in August as we continue our
 42 connections to the West Coast which is such an important
 43 market for us because of our economy and what we're
 44 dealing with around tech. It's important that we have
 45 that.

1 We're also going to bring the charter flight
 2 program to China that is going to start in August, and
 3 that's a very important part, again for a lot of our
 4 business community to be able to access that market. But
 5 in early August, China Eastern Airlines is going to begin
 6 a flight to Shanghai. It'll be a charter flight initially
 7 and hopefully if things, you know, continue to progress
 8 that we will --- we'll have regular service at some point
 9 in the future. Air Canada also began Montreal service in
 10 May, so that continues the international service that
 11 we're trying to do.

12 And on a, I guess, more lighter and local note
 13 the Voodoo Brewery out of Homestead, Councilman Klein has
 14 began a pop-up pub in our airport. So we're trying to
 15 show more Pittsburgh operations and then I think when the
 16 new airport is done, they want to --- they highlight a lot
 17 of the Pittsburgh foods, the restaurants, the craft beer,
 18 some of the things that we can do. So it's an exciting
 19 time and what they're doing at the airport is really good,
 20 The other thing that I think is exciting is we
 21 signed an MOU, a memorandum of understanding, with
 22 Carnegie Mellon University and Carnegie Mellon University
 23 is going to start an aviation innovation lab in our
 24 airport, literally housed in our airport, to use next gen
 25 technology to make the customer enhanced --- customer
 26 experience at the airport around public security, around
 27 luggage, around food, around parking, ticketing, ground
 28 transportation, all of the things that --- to try to make
 29 it better.

30 We know how difficult when you --- when you fly
 31 and --- and the barriers that you go through, and what
 32 Carnegie Mellon University working with the airport
 33 authority is going to work on making that better and
 34 making it quicker and easier for all of us to use.

35 We also got good news, a couple of weeks ago
 36 when PennDOT threw some innovative, you know, contracting
 37 and some of the things that they're doing around
 38 engineering, freed up \$182 million to do more enhanced
 39 paving and puddles. Again, I discussed the difficult
 40 winter and we're still seeing some of it on our roads but
 41 we actually had Governor Wolf and the PennDOT secretary
 42 were here over on West Carson Street, a PennDOT road
 43 enhancing more money to put into repairing some of the
 44 roads that we had. So that's going to be good news for
 45 all of us here in Allegheny County as --- as PennDOT

1 CHIEF EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Your hockey ---
 2 hockey mask.
 3 MS. KIRK: I don't really have a question but I
 4 just want to make one point of clarification. You said
 5 people who work in the courthouse would probably like to
 6 buy those things from August Wendell Forge. I think a lot
 7 more people than that would be interested. Anyone with
 8 history, anyone who comes in town, this building is an
 9 icon, and I think we have a big --- I think it's a great
 10 idea and I think there's a big group out there and August
 11 Wendell Forge is an amazing company, very well known in
 12 the North Hills.

13 And they did the Civic Arena, they did --- they
 14 made those ornaments from the --- from the roof which sold
 15 everywhere. So I'm really excited about the project and I
 16 just wanted to clarify. I think a lot of people ---.

17 CHIEF EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: I think you're
 18 right. I think you're right to be more than just our
 19 employees.

20 MS. KIRK: Yeah, thank you, thank you. Can we
 21 write this down?

22 CHIEF EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: No, you're right.
 23 It's a bigger market than we think, exactly.

24 MS. KIRK: Yeah, I think so.

25 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Seeing no other questions,
 26 we'll move on. Thank you very much.

27 Mr. FITZGERALD: All right. Thank you, Mr.
 28 President.
 29 (Applause.)

30 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Public comment on ---.

31 MR. BARKER: We have one public comment, Theresa
 32 Chalich.

33 MS. CHALICH: Good evening. Thank you for
 34 letting me speak on behalf of, it's under New Business and
 35 it's number 1065 --- 10 --- 10675-18 and it has to do with
 36 national single healthcare. My name is Theresa Chalich
 37 and I live in Squirrel Hill and I have been, for decades a
 38 supporter of making sure that healthcare is affordable,
 39 accessible, quality of care and making sure that we all
 40 have it.

41 And my history with --- my history with this as
 42 a registered nurse, went back to and I --- I know Bob
 43 Macey remembers. I went back to the early 1980s when we
 44 lost our steel industry, and I was called in to help with
 45 the unemployed steel workers because for the first time

1 continues to --- to improve and fix up the roads, again
 2 after the tough winter that we had.

3 We also got good news, last week, a couple weeks
 4 ago with --- the Port Authority was granted a \$3.6 million
 5 grant, a very competitive grant and they were awarded that
 6 to buy 14 new buses. And as we move forward with the BRT,
 7 we've been testing out the electric buses which will
 8 really improve our environment through that Forbes and
 9 Fifth corridor as well as the speed and reliability and
 10 all of the other benefits that we're going to see for our
 11 --- for our community.

12 And lastly, we got again good news on energy and
 13 clean jobs. While Pennsylvania ranks 11th in the nation
 14 in clean jobs, I'm proud to say that Allegheny County
 15 ranks number one in the state in clean jobs. So we have
 16 11 --- almost 11,000 --- almost 12,000 clean jobs, and
 17 number two is Philadelphia County, Philadelphia with 9,200
 18 jobs. So it's an important aspect of our economy. I know
 19 people often focus, obviously on shale and some of the
 20 other things going on, but I think we're doing everything
 21 in the energy sector to deal with the needs of the market
 22 place and that's a lot of jobs that we're --- we're
 23 providing.

24 So that's just a sketch of what I had over the
 25 last couple of months and certainly any questions, I'll be
 26 glad to take Mr. President of you or your members.

27 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: I'm looking for --- does
 28 anyone have a question? Okay Representative Futules?

29 MR. FUTULES: Yeah, I just have one. You
 30 mentioned the donation of the sporting good stuff, I
 31 didn't hear where? Where do they turn that stuff in, do
 32 you?

33 CHIEF EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Do we know the
 34 details, Mr. Churna?

35 MR. FUTULES: Where do people bring the goods?

36 CHIEF EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Oh, to the --- to
 37 the courthouse. They can bring them to our office.

38 MR. FUTULES: Okay.

39 CHIEF EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: But I didn't know
 40 if there were other --- we'll have to find out more
 41 details of where maybe there's other places they can do it
 42 but we accept them in our --- in our office. You got an
 43 old baseball glove you're going to bring in.

44 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Kirk?

45 MR. FUTULES: Plenty.

1 they didn't have any health insurance coverage, and this
 2 was kind of a shock to all of us when we realized that
 3 healthcare coverage insurance was connected with a job.
 4 And so obviously things have to change.

5 And so in the course of my working with people
 6 and this also included my family members. And so in the
 7 course of doing this I became an advocate and I ran around
 8 Lemoyne Valley and tried to find healthcare for people, a
 9 dentist here, a chiropractor here. I founded a emergency
 10 prescription Council and I actually created a free
 11 healthcare clinic on 8th Avenue in Homestead and --- which
 12 was a part of the Rainbow Kitchen Community Center. And I
 13 even ran for public office in 1990 for the general
 14 assembly as a nurse --- as a nurse.

15 And so here we are 2018 and in this country we
 16 still have 28 million people who are uninsured and this is
 17 despite having the Affordable Care Act. And so this is
 18 why I am in support of a national single-payer healthcare
 19 program. I am with healthcare for all PA, and so right
 20 now I currently am promoting the state program of
 21 single-payer. And so I guess for a lot of us who are ---
 22 a lot of us who are working on single payer, we want to
 23 get it passed either statewide or federal-wide.

24 And I really wish I had more time because I
 25 really wanted to tell you about all of the benefits of the
 26 program, and just one more thing before I'm cut off. I
 27 know that when we talk about single-payer people talk
 28 about Canada and they always --- that there are lines.
 29 Well, I think that we here in Pittsburgh need to be very
 30 somber because June 29th and 30th, we are going to see
 31 lines of people outside of Pitt's PPG Paint Arena waiting
 32 to get dental care and for me that is just absolutely
 33 heartbreaking.

34 It's not like people are in line getting a
 35 Penguins ticket, this is people who do not have access to
 36 dental care, are not going to see a dentist again probably
 37 until this program comes around. I'm very supportive of
 38 this program and I will volunteer as a nurse but I just
 39 wanted --- just want people to know that if we had a --- a
 40 single streamlined system like we have with Medicare for
 41 all then that would make sure that people did have access
 42 to healthcare. So thank you very much and thank you so
 43 much for sponsoring it.

44 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you.
 45 (Applause.)

1 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Approval --- approval of
 2 minutes?
 3 MR. BARKER: We have none.
 4 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: We have none, Okay.
 5 106 --- what is it, 10671-18.
 6 MR. BARKER: Approving the appointment of
 7 Richard C. Snipe to serve as a member of the Board of
 8 Property Assessment Appeals and Review for a term to
 9 expire on July 1st, 2021. Sponsored by Council Member
 10 Walton.
 11 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yeah, we'll refer that to
 12 the Appointment Review Committee.
 13 MS. MEANS: Mr. President?
 14 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yeah?
 15 MS. MEANS: I'd like to make a point of personal
 16 privilege to add a motion to the agenda concerning an
 17 appointment to the Friends of South Park.
 18 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. Go ahead.
 19 MR. BAKER: Second.
 20 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Second.
 21 MS. MEANS: To add it to the agenda we have to
 22 take a vote, Mr. President?
 23 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Oh yeah, you got to ---.
 24 MS. MEANS: And then afterwards I can explain
 25 who the individual is? Is that the proper way to go about
 26 it or do you want me, too?
 27 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: You could do it under
 28 comment, you know, like before we vote, the final vote
 29 here.
 30 MS. MEANS: Okay.
 31 Well, I would like to recommend that Thomas
 32 Kirsch be appointed to the Friends of South Park. He's a
 33 very knowledgeable hardworking businessman who recently
 34 retired and he's just a very kind and caring person and I
 35 think he's going to be a great asset to the friends of
 36 South Park. And therefore, I want to move forth his
 37 appointment and ask a motion to be added to the agenda.
 38 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay.
 39 Is there any other comments? Seeing none, we'll
 40 take a vote. All those in favor signify by saying aye.
 41 (Chorus of ayes.)
 42 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Opposed? The ayes have it.
 43 MS. MEANS: Now that --- that was just a vote to
 44 add it to the agenda, Mr. President. Don't we have to
 45 take another vote to approve it?

1 Community and Economic Development, the guaranty,
 2 authorizing delivery of the guaranty to the trustee under
 3 a trust indenture; specifying the amount of the guaranty
 4 obligations of the County pursuant to the guaranty;

 17 hearing on this issue. After thorough discussion, it
 18 gives the --- this operation an opportunity to go back and
 19 refinance a significant number of bonds at a lower --- at
 20 a lower rate and reduces their obligation. And after new
 21 consideration, the full committee voted affirmatively to
 22 refer this to Council for --- with a recommendation for
 23 approval and I so move.
 24 MR. MACEY: Second.
 25 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks? Seeing none,
 26 take the roll.
 27 MR. BARKER: Mr. Baker?
 28 MR. BAKER: Yes.
 29 MR. BARKER: Mr. Catena?
 30 MR. CATENA: Yes.
 31 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?
 32 MR. DEMARCO: Yes.
 33 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco votes in
 34 the affirmative. Mr. Futules?
 35 MR. FUTULES: Yes.
 36 MR. BARKER: Ms. Kirk?
 37 MS. KIRK: Yes.
 38 MR. BARKER: Mr. Klein?
 39 MR. KLEIN: Yes.
 40 MR. BARKER: Mr. Macey?
 41 MR. MACEY: Yes.
 42 MR. BARKER: Mr. Martoni?
 43 DR. MARTONI: Yes.
 44 MR. BARKER: Ms. Means?
 45 MS. MEANS: Yes.

1 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. Yeah, if you had just
 2 --- if you would have just said just add it to the agenda?
 3 MS. MEANS: Yeah, that was to be added to the
 4 agenda then.
 5 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay.
 6 MS. MEANS: And this is, I would like to
 7 recommend that Thomas Kirsch be appointed to the Friends
 8 of South Park.
 9 MR. MACEY: Second.
 10 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. Under remarks?
 11 MS. MEANS: You know, Tom Kirsch is a really
 12 hard-working retired businessman and he's going to be a
 13 great asset to the Friends of South Park. Thank you for
 14 recognizing me and allowing this to be added to the motion
 15 --- to the meeting.
 16 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. Well, we got to take
 17 the vote first?

 20 by saying aye.
 21 (Chorus of ayes.)
 22 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Opposed? The ayes have it.

 15 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: 10672-18.
 16 MR. BARKER: An Ordinance of the County of
 17 Allegheny, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, authorizing the
 18 continued use of the house on Chipmunk Drive in the
 19 County's Harrison Hills Park as an Environmental Learning
 20 Center by the Friends of Harrison Hills Park. Sponsored
 21 by the Chief Executive.
 22 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yeah, we'll refer that to
 23 the Committee on Parks. 10673-18.
 24 MR. BARKER: An Ordinance of the County of
 25 Allegheny, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania authorizing the
 26 use of grounds near the historic mansion in the County's
 27 Hartwood Acres Park for refurbishment and construction of
 28 sculpture garden, in collaboration with the Allegheny
 29 County Parks Foundation. Sponsored by the Chief
 30 Executive.
 31 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: We'll refer that to the
 32 Committee on Parks. 10674-18.
 33 MR. BARKER: A Resolution of the County of
 34 Allegheny amending the Grants and Special Accounts Budget
 35 for 2018 submission number 06-18. Sponsored by the Chief
 36 Executive.
 37 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: We'll refer that to the
 38 Committee on Budget and Finance. 1 ---.
 39 MS. MEANS: Mr. President, you skipped over the
 40 liaison report, sir?
 41 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: I did?
 42 MS. MEANS: Yeah. Maybe no one has a comment
 43 but ---.
 44 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: No, you know what? It's not
 45 on my agenda. It's a mix-up.

1 MS. MEANS: You know, it's little at the top of
 2 the page, so it was easy to pass.
 3 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: All right. Well, do you
 4 have a liaison report?
 5 MS. MEANS: Yes. I just want to congratulate
 6 the --- the Borough of Bridgeville on a wonderful
 7 community day they held this Saturday, past Saturday and
 8 that's all I have to report. Thank you very much.
 9 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Baker?
 10 MR. BAKER: Thanks, Mr. President, just a couple
 11 quick updates. Councilwoman Prizio, Councilwoman Kirk and
 12 I did a Tour of Hearth, it's actually in Councilwoman
 13 Prizio's district specifically, but it --- all three of us
 14 certainly cover the North Hills and it was about a, what,
 15 an hour and a half, two hour tour and we got to learn a
 16 lot more about Hearth.
 17 I think they've already reached out to
 18 Councilwoman Prizio about sponsoring a Proclamation, just
 19 all three of us getting more active there with Hearth
 20 which is an organization that helps woman that --- that
 21 are homeless, that have been battered and provides them
 22 guidance and support and skills and resources. It was
 23 really an inspired night to take a tour together.
 24 Cabinet in your Community, it was a bipartisan
 25 event. They had secretaries that were secretaries in
 26 within our state, there were Democrats and Republicans. I
 27 know Sue --- Councilwoman Means and I spent a little time
 28 talking to Secretary Wetzel and so did Councilman DeMarco.
 29 Councilman Klein was there as well and our Chief of Staff
 30 who is not here at the moment but Ken Varhola was there as
 31 well. Good --- good learning opportunity certainly to
 32 find out what's going on at the state level and figure out
 33 ways that we can collaborate and work together in a
 34 nonpartisan, bipartisan, all person way.
 35 The State of the Airport event that the County
 36 Executive mentioned, I think it was in all of our
 37 mailboxes but I just wanted to encourage everyone to go
 38 June 26th at six o'clock. It's at the Andy Warhol Museum.
 39 I represent the airport. I know Councilman Catena has
 40 some of the airport as well but we'd love to have you
 41 there as well that's the Air Canada --- or the yeah, the
 42 Air Canada announcement of flights going to Montreal so
 43 that should be good. And I'm leaving towards the end of
 44 the meeting tonight, but for a good reason. I'm speaking

 15 MR. FUTULES: Turn on your microphone.
 16 MS. PRIZIO: (Adjusts microphone.)
 17 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Go ahead.
 18 MS. PRIZIO: I thank my esteemed colleagues for
 19 the co-sponsorship of this important motion. Our
 20 healthcare system is in crisis and in my humble opinion, a
 21 publicly funded, privately delivered single-payer system
 22 also known as Improve Medicare for All is the only fair
 23 and equitable solution.
 24 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Representative
 25 Klein?
 26 MR. KLEIN: Thank you. I, along with
 27 Councilwoman Prizio and other members of Council, join in
 28 supporting this motion urging our representatives in
 29 Harrisburg and/or Washington to begin in earnest the
 30 process of fully vetting a healthcare option that will
 31 reflect our commitment to a society in which people need
 32 not despair when their health fails them in ways large and
 33 small at any point in their lives.
 34 Despite the fact that we, as a municipal
 35 legislative body, cannot legislatively make this happen
 36 this motion today is assuredly something more than an
 37 academic exercise. It's long been said that states are
 38 the laboratories of democracy, a place for
 39 experimentation, social and economic, without imposing its
 40 vision on the nation as a whole. In order to fulfill that
 41 role responsibly, the states must be mindful of the
 42 sentiments and aspirations of the municipalities and those
 43 would be the counties, cities, boroughs and townships that
 44 make up that state.

1 to all the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards students out at

 3 So I just --- you know, I always share with them
 4 about local government and hopefully make them aspired to
 5 be up here on the dais someday with all of us. And I will
 6 point out that Monica Snyder won the Human Relations

 10 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay.

 15 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Any --- any other comments?
 16 MR. WALTON: One brief one, Mr. Chairman.
 17 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Go ahead, Representative
 18 Dewitt Walton.
 19 MR. WALTON: Mr. President, today is June 19th.
 20 Most of us won't be aware of the significant ---
 21 significance of this date, but ---
 22 MR. PALMIERE: Juneteenth.
 23 MR. WALTON: Juneteenth, absolutely. June 19th,
 24 1865, General Granger marched into Galveston, Texas and
 25 declared an end to slavery in Texas, and that effectively
 26 established the end of slavery in the United States.
 27 Slavery, for all intents and purposes, was ended with the
 28 Emancipation Proclamation January 1, 1863.
 29 But it just goes to point out those disparities
 30 that occurred and those differences that really separated
 31 America. And so we as African-Americans truly celebrate
 32 and take note of that date. And in this community there's
 33 going to be a Juneteenth celebration this weekend. It's
 34 going to be in Point State Park. There's going to be a
 35 march from the hill down to downtown.
 36 And so we encourage folks to participate in that
 37 effort and learn more about American history. There's a
 38 whole bunch that we just don't know. Thank you.
 39 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Seeing ---
 40 seeing no more, we'll move onto 10675-18.
 41 MR. BARKER: A Motion of the Council of
 42 Allegheny County supporting any and all lawmakers at the
 43 various levels of government throughout the country to
 44 take swift and expedient action to support legislation of
 45 other efforts that will lead to the establishment of a

1 Today, we members of the Allegheny County
 2 Council are fulfilling our responsibility to our
 3 constituents, to the people we represent and urging that
 4 the state and federal government listen to the rising
 5 voices of our citizens urging us to advance the cause for
 6 universal healthcare in this county. As Americans, we are
 7 guaranteed the fundamental rights of life, liberty and the
 8 pursuit of happiness, none of which are, practically
 9 speaking, realizable without the security of knowing that
 10 our health that's so fundamental to a good quality of life
 11 is assured, is safeguarded regardless of our economic
 12 status.
 13 If we value life, if we are committed to what
 14 we've come to refer to as the culture of life. If all
 15 life does matter, then as a society we must commit
 16 ourselves to making the necessary sacrifices to ensure
 17 that Americans are entitled to healthcare.
 18 To be sure, there will be costs, costs to
 19 provide healthcare, but also costs for not providing
 20 healthcare. For my part, I would rather pay the cost of
 21 providing healthcare than for not doing so. So I
 22 enthusiastically join Councilwoman Prizio and my other
 23 colleagues here this evening in support of this motion.
 24 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Do you want to make a motion
 25 on this?
 26 MS. PRIZIO: I want to make a motion to accept
 27 the --- the motion that's on the table.
 28 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yeah, okay.
 29 MR. PALMOSINA: I second.
 30 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks? Sue Means,
 31 Representative Means?
 32 MS. MEANS: Thank you so much for recognizing
 33 me, Mr. President. As my colleagues are very aware that I
 34 have a nursing background but I do want to share that I've
 35 sat next to patients and loved ones as they breathe their
 36 last breath of life and pass from this life into the next.
 37 And I --- I really don't think --- I think you need to ---
 38 my colleagues need to contemplate very seriously that we
 39 do not want the government or bureaucracy to politicize
 40 the health --- what healthcare is provided.
 41 I mean, we don't want to see government made
 42 sensitive, ethical decisions about your loved ones as far
 43 as when life --- I mean, think about it when does life
 44 begin? Who gets the cancer treatment, who doesn't get the
 45 cancer treatment? Are we going to keep granny on life

1 support or not keep granny on life support? Can you see
 2 it, like vote for me and I'll make sure that this
 3 procedure is covered or that procedure is covered. We
 4 have no idea what it's going to cost but I can guarantee
 5 when it's free and people don't have a co-pay, more people
 6 are going to use it.
 7 And so maybe it looks like at --- theoretically
 8 that it would be cheaper but I think it'll cost the tax
 9 payers more and --- and by viewing what's happened in
 10 other countries let's take a minute and I would like
 11 someone from the staff to pass out this article about
 12 little Alfie Evans in Great Britain. Think about him.
 13 He's a 23-month old toddler. He was very sick
 14 and they --- and the healthcare system didn't even come up
 15 with a diagnosis for him. He's dying and they don't know
 16 why, and he's not allowed to be moved to another hospital
 17 or another country. Italy even gave him citizenship but
 18 again, the supreme court of the United Kingdom said the
 19 hospital must be free to do what's been determined to be
 20 in Alfie's best interest. That is the law of the country,
 21 excuse me. Parents should decide and loved ones should
 22 decide what is best for the country.
 23 So you know the hospital removed little Alfie
 24 from life support and they thought he would die but he
 25 didn't die quickly. The point I'm trying to make is, the
 26 little sordid Alfie Evans saga holds larger lessons for us
 27 all. You all have a copy of the article and I want the
 28 article also entered into the record, is there one to
 29 enter into the record? I'd like it also to be entered
 30 into the record because this article states so clearly why
 31 this --- why we don't want this.
 32 We, the people want to control our healthcare.
 33 This again, if you give government officials control over
 34 your healthcare you give them control over your life. If
 35 you reduce medical judgements to political and
 36 bureaucratic decisions, you can expect an arrogant, cruel,
 37 often heartless and incompetent decisions.
 38 Finally, if you assume that the laws of the
 39 state are superior to the laws of God and then for all
 40 practical purposes your God becomes the state. There's no
 41 higher law over the power of the state, natural law, as
 42 Locke and Jefferson would describe it then logically state
 43 power is absolute. So if you move forward with this,
 44 welcome to tyranny. Thank you for recognizing me.
 45 MR. KLEIN: Wow, sounds like North Korea

1 works within the hospital right now. You'd be surprised
 2 at all the local hospitals, the main ones, how many
 3 international patients coming here at their own expense
 4 from single-payer countries.
 5 They're paying --- they're fortunate enough to
 6 have enough money they don't have to wait, they don't have
 7 to deal with those standards. They pay and they come and
 8 pay cash to our hospital to come. We have so many every
 9 day we have to list so we'd make sure we can provide them
 10 with language support or whatever and we always have a
 11 large list of patients, international patients at our
 12 hospital.
 13 So my question to the rest of you, why are they
 14 coming here and expending their own funds when they could
 15 get it free? I had a lady just tell me the other day, she
 16 was a dual-citizen of England and of Saudi Arabia. She
 17 could have had it free. She chose to come here and pay
 18 cash to get our healthcare that you want to throw away.
 19 So think hard because it's not always the same
 20 and if you look at the VA that tells us a lot, and I'm
 21 very concerned that this could be a problem. So I --- I
 22 will be voting no on this at this time.
 23 MR. WALTON: On the motion, Mr. President.
 24 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Let's still take a vote.
 25 All those in favor signify by saying aye.
 26 MS. KIRK: Wait, wait.
 27 MR. BARKER: I believe Mr. DeMarco would like to
 28 make a comment as well. Okay. Mr. DeMarco, you're on.
 29 MR. DEMARCO: Mr. President, I apologize for not
 30 being there in person but work has called me away and I'm
 31 out of town but I would like to make a comment on it. One
 32 of the reasons why we have been able to work effectively
 33 as a Council since I have been on here for the last two
 34 and a half years is we have tried to stay away from
 35 ideologically arguments over which we have no control or
 36 oversight or prevue.
 37 It seems that recently, the left has found a new
 38 affinity for single-payer healthcare and this thing has
 39 garnered broad support from the left. But yet, this is
 40 despite decades of documented failures in other countries
 41 to provide timely, quality medical care and to face the
 42 similar problems in our own single-payer veterans affair
 43 systems. Now clearly this moment just cries out for truth
 44 about single-payer healthcare and conclusions from
 45 historical evidence and data.

1 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Kirk?
 2 MS. KIRK: Hi, I wanted to bring up a couple
 3 issues that I have a problem with the single-payer plan.
 4 One, is a mother of an active duty military, I'd like to
 5 look at the VA and say, how do we think the government is
 6 treating our vets who as Councilman Klein mentioned, give
 7 us the life, liberty and pursuit of happiness option. And
 8 as you've heard in the last few years how terrible it's
 9 been with the waits. People waiting two years to get a
 10 physical or seek for medical attention and die while
 11 waiting.
 12 Luckily, now they're able to --- with recent
 13 laws, they're able to go to a private practitioner so they
 14 don't suffer terrible consequences. And second, I
 15 recently started seeing a physician who had an accident
 16 and I said --- I asked her where she was from and she's
 17 from the Netherlands. So I had just hung up from
 18 Councilwoman Prizio and so we --- I continued the
 19 discussion with her and asked her about the healthcare
 20 there.
 21 And she said, well, it's --- it's interesting
 22 it's different. She said --- I said, well what's the
 23 cost? She said, usually anything you have is only about
 24 \$100. You know, you're not going to go as expensive as
 25 here. She said, however, you know that MRI I wanted or I
 26 was having done. She said, well, you wanted it done in a
 27 week or two, I would imagine. She goes, in the
 28 Netherlands, you'll be very happy to hear you have it in
 29 two months. And if you need surgery, here in the United
 30 States you get to pick. Do you want it tomorrow, do you
 31 want it next week, two weeks maybe if you --- to arrange
 32 it in your schedule.
 33 In the Netherlands, you'll be thanking your
 34 physician if you have your little knee surgery in six
 35 months. And I asked her, I said, well, it seems like
 36 people aren't upset by this. They're not concerned.
 37 We're not hearing the negatives of all these single-payer
 38 plans. And she said, because they've never known any
 39 different.
 40 We here want now. When we're hurting, we hurt
 41 our knee, we don't want to wait until we get more
 42 arthritic conditions in that knee. We want to get it
 43 repaired now. We have problems and we're concerned that
 44 we have a malignancy growing, we want to get treated now.
 45 And to prove that point, also as a nurse who actively

1 I mean, single-payer healthcare in all of these
 2 other countries has proven to be consistently played by
 3 these characteristics. Massive waiting lists and
 4 dangerous delays for medical appointments, and my
 5 colleague Councilwoman Kirk talked about some of that.
 6 It's the life-threatening delays for treatment, even for
 7 patients requiring urgent cancer treatment or critical
 8 brain surgery, delayed availability of life-saving drugs.
 9 Americans enjoy the world's quickest access to
 10 the newest prescription drugs. Worst availability to
 11 screening tests, significantly worse outcomes form serious
 12 diseases. I mean, all of these things that I'm talking
 13 about here were provided to me in the article that I sent
 14 around to members of Council when this was being debated
 15 and e-mails were being passed along.
 16 Now, one of the concerns that I have, is that
 17 how you look at the VA system. I mean, we have members of
 18 Council who are supposed to be responsible that are
 19 supporting something and they have no idea what it's going
 20 to cost. The current VA system costs \$180 billion a year.
 21 It serves approximately seven million veterans. Well,
 22 seven million into 320 million American's, that goes 45
 23 times.
 24 So 45 times \$180 billion is going to be over
 25 \$8.2 trillion that's more than twice the entire federal
 26 budget. Now, I heard people say, well, I'm willing to pay
 27 some more. Well, you may be, I'm not. I like the free
 28 market health system. I just watched what's happened with
 29 the Affordable Care Act and what's taken place under
 30 Obamacare. My gosh, they spent a billion dollars and they
 31 couldn't get a website to run right, and now we want to
 32 turn the entire healthcare system over to the government?
 33 Absolutely not. And I find it curious today after a
 34 Tribune review article came out the other day, talking
 35 about how little time County Council spends on county
 36 business.
 37 We've probably spent as much time debating this
 38 today, something that we have nothing to do with, no
 39 oversight or oversee of that we have in processing the
 40 county-related business other than proclamations and the
 41 Chief Executive's address. So I am affirmed no on this
 42 and I can't believe that we're wasting our time on things
 43 like this. Thank you, Mr. President.
 44 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Any other comments? Seeing
 45 none, there's a motion to approve. Let's take the roll.

1 MR. BARKER: On Ms. Prizio's motion to approve.
 2 MR. BARKER: Mr. Baker?
 3 (No response.)
 4 MR. BARKER: Mr. Catena?
 5 MR. CATENA: Yes.
 6 MS. KIRK: Wait, Jared.
 7 MR. BARKER: I apologize, did Mr. Baker have an
 8 answer? Mr. Baker's a no?
 9 MR. BARKER: Mr. Catena?
 10 MR. CATENA: Yes.
 11 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?
 12 MR. DEMARCO: No.
 13 MR. BARKER: Mr. Demarco votes no.
 14 MR. BARKER: Mr. Futules?
 15 MR. FUTULES: Yes.
 16 MR. BARKER: Ms. Kirk?
 17 MS. KIRK: No.
 18 MR. BARKER: Mr. Klein?
 19 MR. KLEIN: Yes.
 20 MR. BARKER: Mr. Macey?
 21 MR. MACEY: Yes.
 22 MR. BARKER: Ms. Means?
 23 MS. MEANS: No.
 24 MR. BARKER: Mr. Palmiere?
 25 MR. PALMIERE: Yes.
 26 MR. BARKER: Mr. Palmosina?
 27 MR. PALMOSINA: Yes.
 28 MR. BARKER: Ms. Prizio?
 29 MS. PRIZIO: Yes.
 30 MR. BARKER: Ms. Ranalli-Russell?
 31 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: Yes.
 32 MR. BARKER: Mr. Walton?
 33 MR. WALTON: Yes.
 34 MR. BARKER: President Defazio?
 35 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yes.
 36 MR. BARKER: Ayes 10, nos 4. With one member
 37 absent, the bill passes.
 38 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. 10676-18.
 39 MR. BARKER: Communication summarizing approved
 40 executive actions from May 1st through May 31st, 2018.
 41 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Would someone make a motion?
 42 MR. MACEY: Receive and file.
 43 MR. CATENA: Second.
 44 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks? Seeing none,
 45 all those in favor signify by saying aye.
