I also want to thank Councilman Baker and Councilman Walton for working on the Children's Fund Working Group, something we're going to continue to be working on next year. We really have to move forward with -- with Pre-K and how we do that. I know we've got two tremendous U.S. --- U.S. Senators --- almost made you U.S., wow, moving you up --- State Senators, Leader Costa and Senator Fontana, who worked on that, but we definitely want to make sure that our kids are ready for school, and Pre-K is a big part of that. And we're going to be working on that a lot next year. working on that a lot next year. CCAC, Senator Costa also sits on that board.
They announced a \$65 million campaign to do a regional workforce development over on the north shore, over on the north side. And \$40 million has already been raised. The Parks Foundation, we opened a brand new trail for the waterfall. Councilman Catena was with me that day when we did that a few weeks ago out in Settlers Cabin Park. It's really, really spectacular to be able to go and see that beautiful waterfall that's out there.

And then the Port Authority is continuing to enhance its service, adding some service to CCAC in the North Hills. And also, they're continuing to work with communities to try to reduce the redundancy of stops that seem to occur on every other corner --- every corner moving forward, so they're working with community groups to do that.
That's the end of my remarks tonight, but I really want to talk about some of our folks who have served this county in moving on. I want to, first of all, congratulate and thank Councilwoman Sue Means. This is going to be her last meeting. For the work you've continued to do, I know you --- you really represented the Bethel Park, Upper Saint Clair, the areas that you represented, making sure that South Park and some of the communities out there were given the resources they need to make that park everything it could be.                 Within the region, I wanted to talk real quickly, the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce opened a brand new Latino business opening, Incubator, up in Beechview. I see Senator Fontana is here tonight, along with Councilman Palmosina, in their district. It was very exciting to see what's happening up on Broadway Avenue. We also had —— BNY Mellon celebrated their 150th Anniversary this year, a very special company that's done a lot of good work here. And the Carnegie Science Center celebrated the 100th year anniversary of the railroad. I'm sure just about most of us as little kids —— and take our —— our kids to that railroad village at Carnegie Science Center that used to be at Buhl. We also, up in the county parks, in North Park,
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                 We also, up in the county parks, in North Park, redid the Fallen Police Memorial last month. Our Building
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                  Trades did a tremendous job in renovating that special facility that was built over a half century ago and had kind of fallen into disrepair. Glad to see that that's
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                 brought back to the grandeur and the respect that we owe those --- those fallen members of the law enforcement.
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                   The Airport Authority made a big announcement on
                 Neighborhood 91, and then received an $18, almost a $19 million build grant, that I want to thank our
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                congressional delegation working in a bipartisan manner. Congressman Lamb and Congressman Reschenthaler are working with Congressman Doyle and Congressman Kelly, coming together with Senator Casey and Senator Toomey to get that bill grant that's going to help us with cargo,
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the North Side and in Lawrenceville and the Strip District and the neighborhoods that she represented. There's been an awful lot of changes and growth in that neighborhood that has happened over the last four years under your leadership and the work you've done over there, and I want to thank you very much for that.

Reformed the County's property tax assessment system by sponsoring one bill requiring periodic review of properties owned by tax exempted entities, and another which ensures that homestead exemptions are not improperly applied to properties that are ineligible for the exemption.
