1 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: The meeting will come to  
 2 order. Will you all rise for the Pledge of Allegiance to  
 3 the flag and remain standing for silent prayer or  
 4 reflection?  
 5 (Pledge of Allegiance.)  
 6 (Silent Prayer or Reflection.)  
 7 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: We'll have the roll call.  
 8 MR. BARKER: Mr. Baker?  
 9 Here.  
 10 MR. BARKER: Mr. Catena?  
 11 Here.  
 12 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?  
 13 Here.  
 14 MR. BARKER: Mr. Futules?  
 15 Here.  
 16 MR. BARKER: Ms. Kirk?  
 17 (No response.)  
 18 MR. BARKER: Mr. Klein?  
 19 Here.  
 20 MR. BARKER: Mr. Macey?  
 21 Here.  
 22 MR. BARKER: Ms. Means?  
 23 Here.  
 24 MR. BARKER: Mr. Palmiere?  
 25 Here.  
 26 MR. BARKER: Mr. Palmosina?  
 27 Here.  
 28 MR. BARKER: Ms. Prizio?  
 29 (No response.)  
 30 MR. BARKER: Ms. Ranalli-Russell?  
 31 Here.  
 32 MR. BARKER: Mr. Walton?  
 33 Here.  
 34 MR. BARKER: Mr. Zavarella?  
 35 Here.  
 36 MR. BARKER: President DeFazio?  
 37 Here.  
 38 MR. BARKER: We have 13 members present.  
 39 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: We have the Chief Executive  
 40 quarterly address.  
 41 (Applause.)  
 42 CHIEF EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Thank you, Mr.  
 43 President and Members of Council. I'm going to keep my  
 44 normal quarterly address brief, because I know we have  
 45 special discussions we're going to have for some members

1 distribution and the things that we need to continue  
 2 manufacturing and growth out in the airport corridor.  
 3 I also want to thank Councilman Baker and  
 4 Councilman Walton for working on the Children's Fund  
 5 Working Group, something we're going to continue to be  
 6 working on next year. We really have to move forward with  
 7 --- with Pre-K and how we do that. I know we've got two  
 8 tremendous U.S. --- U.S. Senators --- almost made you  
 9 U.S., wow, moving you up --- State Senators, Leader Costa  
 10 and Senator Fontana, who worked on that, but we definitely  
 11 want to make sure that our kids are ready for school, and  
 12 Pre-K is a big part of that. And we're going to be  
 13 working on that a lot next year.  
 14 CCAC, Senator Costa also sits on that board.  
 15 They announced a \$65 million campaign to do a regional  
 16 workforce development over on the north shore, over on the  
 17 north side. And \$40 million has already been raised. The  
 18 Parks Foundation, we opened a brand new trail for the  
 19 waterfall. Councilman Catena was with me that day when we  
 20 did that a few weeks ago out in Settlers Cabin Park. It's  
 21 really, really spectacular to be able to go and see that  
 22 beautiful waterfall that's out there.  
 23 And then the Port Authority is continuing to  
 24 enhance its service, adding some service to CCAC in the  
 25 North Hills. And also, they're continuing to work with  
 26 communities to try to reduce the redundancy of stops that  
 27 seem to occur on every other corner --- every corner  
 28 moving forward, so they're working with community groups  
 29 to do that.  
 30 That's the end of my remarks tonight, but I  
 31 really want to talk about some of our folks who have  
 32 served this county in moving on. I want to, first of all,  
 33 congratulate and thank Councilwoman Sue Means. This is  
 34 going to be her last meeting. For the work you've  
 35 continued to do, I know you --- you really represented the  
 36 Bethel Park, Upper Saint Clair, the areas that you  
 37 represented, making sure that South Park and some of the  
 38 communities out there were given the resources they need  
 39 to make that park everything it could be. So I just want  
 40 to thank you. I know we're going to be doing a special  
 41 presentation in a little bit, but I wanted to be --- to  
 42 say those --- to say those words here in front of  
 43 everybody.  
 44 I also want to thank Councilman Ranalli-Russell  
 45 for her work and her continued work out in the --- over in

1 tonight who are going to be leaving --- for us. But first  
 2 of all, I want to thank you for passing the budget at the  
 3 last meeting. For the 18th time in the last 19 years, the  
 4 citizens of Allegheny County will not see their property  
 5 taxes raised, and that's something ---- the work you did,  
 6 Chairman Klein, thank you, and the work the rest of the  
 7 team did. We really appreciate that.  
 8 We also have a special resignation --- not  
 9 resignation, but retirement. The Lucchino Award winner,  
 10 Joe Gavlik, who led DCS for so many years. Joe is going  
 11 to be retiring, has already retired. He was the Lucchino  
 12 Award winner. County Manager McKain gave it to him. And  
 13 the announcement of Jason Ditzenberger as the new Director  
 14 of Information and Technology, a new department that you  
 15 created, and Al Caponi as the new Director of Facilities  
 16 Management.  
 17 Within the region, I wanted to talk real  
 18 quickly, the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce opened a brand  
 19 new Latino business opening, Incubator, up in Beechview.  
 20 I see Senator Fontana is here tonight, along with  
 21 Councilman Palmosina, in their district. It was very  
 22 exciting to see what's happening up on Broadway Avenue.  
 23 We also had --- BNY Mellon celebrated their  
 24 150th Anniversary this year, a very special company that's  
 25 done a lot of good work here. And the Carnegie Science  
 26 Center celebrated the 100th year anniversary of the  
 27 railroad. I'm sure just about most of us as little kids  
 28 --- and take our --- our kids to that railroad village at  
 29 Carnegie Science Center that used to be at Buhl.  
 30 We also, up in the county parks, in North Park,  
 31 reddid the Fallen Police Memorial last month. Our Building  
 32 Trades did a tremendous job in renovating that special  
 33 facility that was built over a half century ago and had  
 34 kind of fallen into disrepair. Glad to see that that's  
 35 brought back to the grandeur and the respect that we owe  
 36 those --- those fallen members of the law enforcement.  
 37 The Airport Authority made a big announcement on  
 38 Neighborhood 91, and then received an \$18, almost a \$19  
 39 million build grant, that I want to thank our  
 40 congressional delegation working in a bipartisan manner.  
 41 Congressman Lamb and Congressman Reschenthaler are working  
 42 with Congressman Doyle and Congressman Kelly, coming  
 43 together with Senator Casey and Senator Toomey to get that  
 44 bill grant that's going to help us with cargo,

1 the North Side and in Lawrenceville and the Strip District  
 2 and the neighborhoods that she represented. There's been  
 3 an awful lot of changes and growth in that neighborhood  
 4 that has happened over the last four years under your  
 5 leadership and the work you've done over there, and I want  
 6 to thank you very much for that.  
 7 I also --- we talked about this a couple of  
 8 weeks ago, but we're going to be bringing up --- I see Dr.  
 9 Martoni's sister, brother are here. I want thank them,  
 10 really to thank them for the work that Chuck Martoni did  
 11 as one of the charter members of this council. The work  
 12 he's done at the community college, but also the work he  
 13 did in helping us. And I see Senator Fontana --- I'm  
 14 going to have Senator Fontana come up in a little bit to  
 15 talk as one of the charter members. We have a couple  
 16 other charter members here. Former President Rick  
 17 Schwartz is here, along with Councilwoman Jan Rea, served  
 18 on this initial council 20 years ago when we sat in those  
 19 seats, and you know, we weren't really red, we weren't  
 20 really blue, but I will tell you we were green. And I  
 21 don't mean from an environmental standpoint either. I  
 22 mean, we --- we were green in trying to figure out how ---  
 23 how to run a new government. And Dr. Martoni was one of  
 24 those folks who had some experience as a former mayor in  
 25 Swissvale, a former Borough Council President in  
 26 Swissvale, worked at the League of Municipalities, the  
 27 Local Government Academy and really was a mentor to --- to  
 28 all of us, and in a little bit we're going to be bringing  
 29 up Phyllis, Chuck's brother.  
 30 But I also want to talk about a very special  
 31 individual tonight. It's going to be his last meeting.  
 32 And that's John DeFazio. John is the President right now,  
 33 and 20 years ago John was the President. John started out  
 34 teaching all of us on how to do things like introduce  
 35 legislation, Robert's Rules of Order, the rules of  
 36 council. You know, a lot of things of --- this council  
 37 that's here now has the structure in place, committees in  
 38 place, things that are there. None of that existed when  
 39 we got sworn in 20 years ago. And John was our leader.  
 40 John was the person who --- who took someone like me and  
 41 someone like Senator Fontana under our wing to kind of  
 42 teach us about how government --- government could be  
 43 done. So a lot of things that have happened over the last  
 44 20 years, you know, the Administrative Code, the Ethics  
 45 Code, row office reform, assessments.

1 One of the other things --- and this is a little  
 2 more informal, but when you guys march in parades, you  
 3 march together. That's something that John DeFazio  
 4 started. Other governments, they might march  
 5 individually. Council always marched together. Although  
 6 I'll tell you when we first used to march together,  
 7 everyone used to ask me and Fontana what are you guys  
 8 doing with Jumping John DeFazio, because he's the only one  
 9 everybody knew. Nobody knew any of the rest of us, but  
 10 they all knew --- they all knew Johnny from his --- from  
 11 his fame and the work he had done before that. But more  
 12 importantly, the things I talked about, you know, getting  
 13 a government up and running, getting a structure into this  
 14 place.  
 15 The fact that I mentioned tonight 18 times out  
 16 of the last 19 years we have not raised the millage of the  
 17 people on their county taxes, and John has been a big part  
 18 of that, leading the government as the president and in  
 19 different committees that he has worked on. We've battled  
 20 through property assessments. Senator Fontana can  
 21 certainly remember his days of doing that. The bond  
 22 rating being the highest it has been in almost 40 years in  
 23 county government. Again, when we go out to borrow money  
 24 for our capital projects, one of the things John --- John  
 25 has been --- been a big part of it.  
 26 He's also been somebody who has worked in a  
 27 very, very bipartisan way. So no matter what party you  
 28 were from, no matter what part of the county you were  
 29 from, city, suburbs, North Hills, South Hills, John always  
 30 gave a voice to allow people to bring things forward, to  
 31 introduce things that would be good for the community and  
 32 good for --- for their reason.  
 33 And, again, we think about where we were 20  
 34 years ago. We're in a much, much different place. We're  
 35 a place where young people are coming, where there's a lot  
 36 of optimism, there's a lot of hope in the future. 1999,  
 37 we weren't in that place at all mentally as a --- as a  
 38 community. And I think John's leadership deserves a lot.  
 39 I'm going to ask Senator Fontana to come up and join me,  
 40 because Senator Fontana also, as a state senator, you  
 41 know, served on that initial council until he went off to  
 42 do bigger and better things in Harrisburg for us. And I  
 43 know he served --- you know, serving with John, I wanted  
 44 to ask the senator to say a few words about John DeFazio.

1 certainly didn't have the name recognition, and I don't  
 2 know, Rich maybe had a little bit more, but you talk about  
 3 rejection, when everybody just yelled, hey, Jumping John,  
 4 hey, Jumping John. And I'm thinking, oh, man, am I ever  
 5 --- anyone ever going to recognize me? But --- but I'm  
 6 telling you, I was proud to work for him, because in my  
 7 --- and I'm obviously older. So I remember Jumping John.  
 8 And in my mind, for me, Jumping John was a legend. He was  
 9 a legend in wrestling. There's no question about it.  
 10 And how many times I went to the --- going for  
 11 the labor endorsements at the council, the labor council,  
 12 and over on that room --- especially in the beginning, and  
 13 to see John sitting there, see that --- because he was  
 14 always, always supportive. He always reached out. He had  
 15 something to say. He'd find something nice to say about  
 16 me around that council. So he was always supportive. So  
 17 to me, John, you're a legend there, too. You're a legend  
 18 as a labor organizer and a representative. And after  
 19 this, after 20 years here, you're a legend here on county  
 20 council, and you always will be. Thank you.  
 21 (Applause.)  
 22 CHIEF EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Yeah. And let me  
 23 echo that. Yeah. We would march in those parades and  
 24 you're right, they would just be cheering for John,  
 25 cheering for John, and the rest of us were supporting  
 26 cast. But you know, his leadership, his mentorship, for  
 27 me, I would not be the County Executive, and we would not  
 28 have the success that this region has had without the work  
 29 that John was ---. And Wayne said it, the fairness,  
 30 everybody was treated fairly, whether John agreed with you  
 31 on your --- on your policies that you were introducing or  
 32 not, through all the --- through three county executives,  
 33 he worked with all three of them to make sure that this  
 34 county was moved forward.  
 35 I really can't think of a better sendoff and a  
 36 better legacy, John, than the things that you have done  
 37 for this region for the last 20 years. Your work as a  
 38 labor leader. You covered the whole state. You were the  
 39 whole --- the representative of the steelworkers all  
 40 across the State of Pennsylvania while you were doing it  
 41 on county council. And I don't know, I know those big  
 42 salaries that you guys get, you know, that \$9,000 a year,  
 43 John actually only got \$3,000 a year, because he had to  
 44 donate back \$6,000 for many years. So he actually did  
 45 this job for the little that we got in those years and you

1 SENATOR FONTANA: Thank you, Rich. It's like  
 2 old times. Feel like you're coming back, it's --- it's  
 3 certainly good. This is where I started, and I never  
 4 forgot that. You know, this is where my political career  
 5 started in the old days, and I'm older now, but it  
 6 certainly was a --- a good send off. I just want to,  
 7 first of all, also recognize Sue Means and Denise  
 8 Ranalli-Russell for their time on council. I know how  
 9 difficult it can be, but I also know this about both of  
 10 you. You worked very hard at your jobs and you did a lot  
 11 for your district, so you should be proud of that moving  
 12 off.  
 13 Rich mentioned Chuck and John obviously, but  
 14 going back to the original members, I just have to say I  
 15 was very, very proud to serve with John DeFazio and Chuck  
 16 Martoni as one of the original members of county council  
 17 starting in 2000. We all ran in 1999. I served for five  
 18 and a half years before I moved on to the state senate.  
 19 But I've got to tell you, I don't think I ever  
 20 served with two finer gentlemen than Chuck Martoni and  
 21 John DeFazio in the years I've been in politics. And even  
 22 in --- even in my other life, real estate and other things  
 23 I've done, these are two fine people that always were  
 24 fair. John as President was always fair. Chuck was  
 25 always fair. You could talk to him all the time. I don't  
 26 care if you were a D or a R. I know Jan Rea is here. She  
 27 probably will attest to that. These two gentlemen were  
 28 --- were great to work with and great to be around and we  
 29 learned a lot from them. They always were fair and they  
 30 always would listen to everyone, whether you were a D or  
 31 an R. That's --- that's how --- that's how they rolled.  
 32 Chuck was a good man. I had some dealings with  
 33 Chuck outside county council over the years and he was ---  
 34 I miss --- I miss him. I really do, and I want to tell  
 35 his family that. He was a good man.  
 36 So John, as the last serving original member of  
 37 county council, it certainly, to me, as I look at your  
 38 years here and years before here actually --- but I think  
 39 it's another milestone in your life for you and your  
 40 family, to be an original member here for 20 years. I  
 41 just really think that's a --- that's a big deal. And I  
 42 think it's something certainly you could be --- you can be  
 43 proud of. You know, John, as I said, was always fair, but  
 44 to me --- Rich mentioned when we first got on council and  
 45 we would walk in the parades, and we were both new and I

1 still get today, he got even less than that. But it was  
 2 truly a labor of love, a labor of service, and for your  
 3 grandchildren and your children and your family, they  
 4 should be so proud of the work and the things that you  
 5 have done to improve things in Allegheny County, and I  
 6 just want to say that. So congratulations, John, with  
 7 everything you've done.  
 8 (Applause.)  
 9 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Hey, Rich, I --- I'm now  
 10 putting in now for all back money.  
 11 CHIEF EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: All your back pay,  
 12 okay. I'll ask the budget director and the county manager  
 13 if we can get that straightened out, get an appropriation.  
 14 No, Thank you. I don't know if we have any questions  
 15 tonight, or we can move on to the --- I'd like to ---  
 16 that's up to you guys. Whatever you guys --- the will of  
 17 the Council. To move on to the proclamations, I think  
 18 it'd appropriate to do that at this point.  
 19 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Let me say this, rather than  
 20 come down and say it. I might as well just say it right  
 21 from here. I want to really thank --- well, so far you  
 22 and Wayne, that spoke. I really appreciate your kind  
 23 words. It was a pleasure working with you guys, and also  
 24 a pleasure working with everybody up here in your office,  
 25 in our staff, we have --- it's --- I'm going to miss all  
 26 you people. Twenty (20) years is a long time, so I don't  
 27 know what I'm going to do. You know, I'm a legend. Now,  
 28 I got to see what that means.  
 29 CHIEF EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: You're still  
 30 welcome at the parades to march with all of us, John, so  
 31 we still stand behind you at the parades.  
 32 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yeah. The only problem is  
 33 with this bad hip I got to get replaced, I can't march. I  
 34 got to --- but anyway, really and truthfully, I do want to  
 35 thank you guys, and I do want to say I really appreciate  
 36 working with all the people on council. It's been a  
 37 pleasure. I mean, I know you people are hardworking  
 38 people. The salaries are not what they should be for the  
 39 work you guys do. And like I said, I can't thank you guys  
 40 enough, and you don't know how --- how much you're going  
 41 to miss somebody until the day comes when you are going to  
 42 be leaving, and you will miss them. I mean, I already  
 43 start thinking about how I'm going to miss everyone, and  
 44 like I said, I guess I'll have to check in one in a while  
 45 with everybody.

1 So with that, I'd like to thank you, Rich. And  
 2 Wayne, you spoke, I'd like to thank you and everybody  
 3 else. Thank you.  
 4 SENATOR FONTANA: Thank you  
 5 (Applause.)  
 6 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Do you want to read off---  
 7 read off the --- 11331-19?  
 8 MR. BARKER: A proclamation recognizing and  
 9 commending Allegheny County Councilmember John DeFazio for  
 10 his dedication and service to the residents of Allegheny  
 11 County. Sponsored by all members of council.  
 12 MR. FUTULES: And Mr. President, a point of  
 13 privilege, I'd like to ask Councilwoman Rea and Councilman  
 14 Schwartz and Councilman Fontana if they could come up here  
 15 and be part of this as well, as the original members of  
 16 council. Do they get a vote tonight as emeritus members?  
 17 Wayne was asking for that.  
 18 MR. MACEY: Well, what a momentous occasion.  
 19 And I just want to thank Nick Futules, who is the Vice  
 20 President of Council, in allowing me to do these  
 21 presentations.  
 22 At the retirement of Johnny DeFazio, guess what?  
 23 I'm going to be the most senior person on council. And at  
 24 71, I guess that means senior.  
 25 Without any further ado, I would just like to  
 26 say that;  
 27 WHEREAS, chosen by the residents of Allegheny  
 28 County, John DeFazio was elected to office in 1999 as one  
 29 of the founding members of the first Allegheny County  
 30 Council, a landmark in government history after 212 years  
 31 of the three commissioner form of government, and;  
 32 WHEREAS, Mr. John DeFazio was elected to one of  
 33 the at large seats on Allegheny County Council, and  
 34 shortly after being sworn in, he was named the first  
 35 President of the new legislative body, and;  
 36 WHEREAS, prior to his election to County  
 37 Council, Mr. DeFazio followed his further footsteps by  
 38 working at Pittsburgh Steel --- a Pittsburgh steel mill  
 39 and becoming a union activist. He began his --- he began  
 40 his union career as a member of the United Steelworkers  
 41 Local 1845 --- 43, at the former J&L Steel, and was only  
 42 29 years old when he was elected president of the 5,000  
 43 member local in 1970, the youngest local union president  
 44 in the history of basic steel at that time, and;

1 the County's Human Relations Commission, co-sponsored the  
 2 county's gender and race equality audit ordinance, aided  
 3 in establishing provisions in the Administration Code that  
 4 ensured appropriate county funding for CCAC. Great  
 5 school. Co-sponsored the ordinance requiring the  
 6 prevailing wages to be paid by contractors working in the  
 7 county projects. Co-sponsored the county's false claims  
 8 ordinance. Co-sponsored the ordinance that enacted the  
 9 County's unconventional gas well fee, and joined with the  
 10 County treasurer in sponsoring legislation that aids in  
 11 the equality collection of appropriate hotel, motel room  
 12 taxes and short-term rental properties. Wow.  
 13 WHEREAS, during his tenure, Mr. DeFazio served  
 14 --- served as President of the County Council from 2000 to  
 15 2001 and 2014 through 2019, and;  
 16 WHEREAS, committed to providing high quality  
 17 service and good stewardship, Mr. DeFazio served on  
 18 numerous boards, including the International Maglev Board,  
 19 the Civil Rights Committee in Western Pennsylvania, Shaler  
 20 Democratic Committee, and Public Trustee of the Carnegie  
 21 Library, Pittsburgh.  
 22 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the  
 23 Allegheny County Council, on behalf of the citizens of  
 24 Allegheny County Council hereby recognizes the Honorable  
 25 Mr. John DeFazio for his contributions to the Allegheny  
 26 County Council, and to enhance the wellbeing of his county  
 27 residents. Mr. DeFazio acted always in the best interest  
 28 of the constituents of Allegheny County, and his  
 29 unwavering commitment to the council serves as an  
 30 exemplary model of leadership. This council thanks him  
 31 for his 19 years of dedicated public service and wishes  
 32 him well in the --- as he moves on in the future.  
 33 IN WITNESS THEREOF, hey, Allegheny County  
 34 Council. Johnny?  
 35 (Applause.)  
 36 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: There you are. Now I'll say  
 37 a few words --- are you going to say something now?  
 38 MR. FUTULES: Yeah.  
 39 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Go ahead. He just did War  
 40 and Peace. Go ahead. What are you going to do?  
 41 MR. FUTULES: Well, if anybody is going to take  
 42 any bets on me getting emotional, you might as well ---  
 43 you're going to win that bet. That's for sure. I  
 44 actually got emotional just coming into this meeting,  
 45 knowing it will be his last. John has been a great friend

1 WHEREAS, in 1977, Mr. DeFazio was appointed to  
 2 the United Steelworkers of America international staff and  
 3 subsequently promoted to the subdistrict director. He  
 4 served as District 10 Civil Rights Coordinator and has  
 5 extensive experience helping workers and financially  
 6 troubled companies, and;  
 7 WHEREAS, Mr. DeFazio wrestled, yeah, maybe,  
 8 professionally for most of the 1960s and '70s. In --- in  
 9 the ring he was known as Jumping Johnny DeFazio. And he  
 10 had the reputation of always playing a baby face, the  
 11 wrestling term for a good guy, and;  
 12 WHEREAS, every Saturday night, Mr. DeFazio  
 13 performed on the well-known Pittsburgh television shown  
 14 --- show, Studio Wrestling. During several of his  
 15 matches, Mr. DeFazio and his --- had the opportunity to  
 16 wrestle alongside former County Council Member and friend  
 17 Charles --- Charles Martoni. What a great guy.  
 18 WHEREAS, Mr. DeFazio, the once most prolific  
 19 World Junior Heavyweight Champion, he retired from  
 20 wrestling in 1977 in order to further pursue his career  
 21 with the United Steelworkers of America.  
 22 WHEREAS, across the span of his 19 years at  
 23 Allegheny County Council, Mr. DeFazio strived to build a  
 24 better county for his constituents. During his tenure, he  
 25 was a sponsor of the ordinance that established the  
 26 county's Ethics Code, broadcast the ability of senior  
 27 citizens to participate in a longtime senior citizens  
 28 owner/occupant tax relief program, supported  
 29 intergovernmental cooperation with city --- with the City  
 30 of Pittsburgh, cosponsored the ordinance establishing  
 31 revenue neutrality in Allegheny County property  
 32 assessments, sponsored county workers by requiring the  
 33 county not to contract with sweatshops, consistently  
 34 fought for the right of Allegheny County workers to  
 35 unionize if they wished to do so. Reformed the County's  
 36 property tax assessment system by sponsoring one bill  
 37 requiring periodic review of properties owned by tax  
 38 exempted entities, and another which ensures that  
 39 homestead exemptions are not improperly applied to  
 40 properties that are ineligible for the exemption.  
 41 Co-sponsored the ordinance that established the  
 42 county's residential visibility, designed tax credit,  
 43 cosponsored legislation that aided the county in  
 44 monitoring the activities of the various county  
 45 authorities, co-sponsored the ordinance that established

1 over the years, but my journey with you started actually -  
 2 -- I think I was ten, ten years old. Saturday night. I  
 3 would watch Studio Wrestling in front of my TV. I sat  
 4 with my feet up on the screen. And I used to put my toes  
 5 on the figures like I was touching you. I never dreamed  
 6 --- I never dreamed I'd know you back then. I never  
 7 dreamed ---  
 8 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: I was watching you, Nick.  
 9 MR. FUTULES: --- you'd be my friend. I'm  
 10 sorry. But you've been my best friend here on council.  
 11 And you know, we always went to dinner together. We  
 12 always went to meetings together. And through the county,  
 13 everybody wanted your autograph. And the only time they  
 14 wanted mine was to pay the bill. Even Jennifer Liptak has  
 15 your autograph in her office. Such a famous person. And  
 16 I'm just proud to be your friend. And you know, 12 years  
 17 ago, I stood at this podium thanking the people for  
 18 getting me elected. You know, I still haven't forgiven  
 19 him for that, by the way. John DeFazio, he said --- I  
 20 asked everybody in this room to stand up and be recognized  
 21 that were here on my behalf that day. And --- and after  
 22 that, Johnny said --- and here I thought they were all for  
 23 me. And --- and guess what, John? Tonight they are. So  
 24 everybody here that is on behalf of John DeFazio, please  
 25 rise. Stand up and be recognized, John.  
 26 (Applause.)  
 27 MR. FUTULES: Tonight they're here for you.  
 28 Thank you. Thank you.  
 29 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Hey, Nick.  
 30 MR. FUTULES: Yeah.  
 31 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: I wish you wouldn't do that,  
 32 because if they don't stand up, I'm going to look like ---  
 33 .  
 34 MR. FUTULES: Oh, I'm sorry. Do you want to  
 35 speak? I'm sorry. My apologies.  
 36 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Let me say one quick story.  
 37 MR. FUTULES: We got to take your picture down  
 38 here. Come on down.  
 39 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. Going down.  
 40 (Pictures taken.)  
 41 MR. FUTULES: This is your plaque here, John.  
 42 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Oh, it is?  
 43 MR. FUTULES: Yeah. You get a picture and a  
 44 plaque here.

1 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: You know, while Rich is  
 2 doing that, I'm going to tell you a real quick story. I  
 3 was talking about that before I came up here today. I  
 4 used to wrestle. I'd wear a sweater, you know, and a lot  
 5 of the kids would ask for your autograph. While I was  
 6 kneeling down signing an autographs --- and you ever heard  
 7 of George the Animal Steele? Some of you, yeah. Okay.  
 8 He would --- what he went and did is kicked the book and  
 9 the pen up in the air and grabbed the pen. Well, I'm  
 10 rolling on the mat and he's going after me with this pen.  
 11 I didn't think anything of it until I took my sweater off.  
 12 I had 50 holes. I said you got to be out of your mind. I  
 13 had 50 holes bleeding from him with that pen stabbing me.  
 14 There was a lot of --- a lot of nut cases that got  
 15 involved, believe me. He was one of them. Okay.  
 16 Thanks a lot, Nick. Again, I want to thank you.  
 17 I appreciate it.  
 18 MR. FUTULES: By the way, the reason I am the  
 19 Vice President is because of John DeFazio, by the way.  
 20 Thank you.  
 21 (Pictures taken.)  
 22 MR. MACEY: This particular proclamation is  
 23 going to be a little difficult because we lost a --- an  
 24 original member of council, a person who has been a leader  
 25 in the Mon Valley. And I can tell you this. My first  
 26 introduction to Chuck Martoni was back during the '80s. I  
 27 was a steelworker. I was a union officer. And in  
 28 Allegheny County, the steel mills started to close. And  
 29 one of the steel mills that closed was Duquesne Works  
 30 where I worked. And I worked there until the very last  
 31 day. Shortly after that, there was a lot of work trying  
 32 to salvage the steel industry, save Dorothy Six and other  
 33 methods of trying to save jobs in the Mon Valley and  
 34 Allegheny County.  
 35 Chuck Martoni and I served as the original  
 36 members of the Allegheny --- excuse me, of the Steel  
 37 Valley Authority. And from that time on, Chuck and I were  
 38 absolutely tight, and we were really good friends, not to  
 39 mention that I managed to graduate from CCAC, which was a  
 40 milestone in itself, because I was married with kids, had  
 41 to work part-time jobs, and we did what we had to do to  
 42 survive.  
 43 And on behalf of this Allegheny County Council;  
 44 WHEREAS, chosen by residents of Allegheny County  
 45 Council District 8, District Charles --- excuse me, Dr

1 Supporting legislation intended to ensure adequate funding  
 2 for the college. Supported the creation of the County's  
 3 Human Relations Commission. Helped enact a bill requiring  
 4 that all county contracts pay prevailing wages to their  
 5 employees. Supported the county's false claims ordinance,  
 6 aimed to reducing government waste and helped enact a  
 7 standard for procurement contract participation by veteran  
 8 owned businesses.  
 9 WHEREAS, during his tenure, Dr. Martoni served  
 10 as President of County Council from 2012 through 2013,  
 11 WHEREAS, committed to providing high quality  
 12 service and good relationships, Dr. Martoni was president  
 13 of the Mon Valley Initiative and Director of the Board or  
 14 Port Authority of Allegheny County. He was --- he also  
 15 served the Tri-State Conference on Steel Valley Authority  
 16 and Job Creation, West to West Coalition and the Swissvale  
 17 Economic Corporation, and;  
 18 WHEREAS, after almost 20 years of dedicated  
 19 service to the constituents of Allegheny County, Dr.  
 20 Martoni --- excuse me, passed away while in office on May  
 21 19th, 2019 at the age of 82. He left behind his dedicated  
 22 and beloved wife of over 50 years, Marianne.  
 23 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the  
 24 Allegheny County Council, on behalf of the citizens of  
 25 Allegheny County, hereby recognize the Honorable Dr.  
 26 Charles Martoni for his contributions to Allegheny County  
 27 Council and to the enhancement of the wellbeing of the  
 28 county citizens. Dr. Martoni dedicated his life to  
 29 serving the constituents of Allegheny County and he will  
 30 be remembered as an exceptional community leader always  
 31 acting in the best interest of the citizens and his legacy  
 32 will well serve as an inspiration to all. Thank you.  
 33 (Applause.)  
 34 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: I go way back with Chuck  
 35 Martoni. I first got involved with Chuck Martoni --- I  
 36 was still in high school, and I come in, what, second  
 37 place in Mr. Pittsburgh, and that's where Chuck, he used  
 38 to compete in muscle contests, too. That's where I first  
 39 met Chuck. Then I got involved with Chuck when he started  
 40 wrestling a little bit before me, not much, but I got  
 41 involved with Chuck with the wrestling and that.  
 42 And let me say one thing. I don't know of  
 43 anyone that had a bad word to say about Chuck Martoni.  
 44 And everyone that I talk to always has something nice to  
 45 say about Chuck. Chuck was a fair person and --- and

1 Charles "Chuck" Martoni was elected --- elected to office  
 2 in 1999 as one of the founding members of this first  
 3 Allegheny County Council, a landmark in government  
 4 history, after 212 years of the three commissioner form of  
 5 government, and;  
 6 WHEREAS, prior to this --- his election to  
 7 Allegheny County Council, Dr. Martoni spent his life as  
 8 serving his community. He served as a school board member  
 9 for Swissvale School District, President of Swissvale  
 10 Borough Council, and Mayor of Swissvale Borough.  
 11 WHEREAS, Dr. Martoni attended Community College  
 12 of Allegheny County Council's, Allegheny County Council  
 13 Boyce Campus when he was first opened --- when it was  
 14 first opened in 1966 and graduated as a member of CCAC's  
 15 first class in 1968. He went on to earn six additional  
 16 degrees, including a Bachelor's degree from California  
 17 State, a Master's degree in history from California State  
 18 College, Educational Administration and School Counseling  
 19 from Duquesne University, and a Doctorate in higher  
 20 education from the University of Pittsburgh. After  
 21 completing his Doctorate, he finished his education by  
 22 obtaining a second Associate's degree from CCAC in 1989.  
 23 WHEREAS, passionate about CCAC and the services  
 24 they provide to the Allegheny County, Dr. Martoni  
 25 dedicated his professional career to CCAC's Boyce Campus  
 26 from the adjunct professor and Director of Finance and  
 27 councilman to Dean of Student Development, Interim Vice  
 28 President and ultimately President, and;  
 29 WHEREAS, during the 1960s and '70s, Dr. Martoni  
 30 wrestled professionally as Cannonball and Masked Marvel.  
 31 Every Saturday, he would perform on a well-known  
 32 Pittsburgh television show, Studio Wrestling. In 2014,  
 33 Dr. Martoni was inducted in the Pittsburgh Keystone State  
 34 Wrestling Alumnae Hall of Fame, and along with his fellow  
 35 county councilmember and wrestling partner, Johnny  
 36 DeFazio, and;  
 37 WHEREAS, across the span of his 19 years at  
 38 Allegheny County Council, Dr. Martoni strived to build a  
 39 better county for his constituents. During his tenure,  
 40 Dr. Martoni consistently supported the senior citizens tax  
 41 relief program and the Homestead Farmstead Exemption  
 42 Program, supporting governmental efficiency through  
 43 consolidating county and city purchasing functions,  
 44 Championed the work safety by supporting sweatshop  
 45 regulations. Was a staunch advocate for the 2000 CCAC.

1 believe me, I --- like I said, everyone had good words to  
 2 say about Chuck Martoni, including myself. So with that,  
 3 thank you very much.  
 4 (Applause.)  
 5 MR. FUTULES: Okay. Well, I go back pretty far  
 6 with Chuck Martoni myself, actually. I was 18 years old  
 7 going to community college. That's when I met him.  
 8 Didn't know who he was at the time, other than he was an  
 9 administrator. I think this microphone is falling down.  
 10 It is. I'll do my best. Okay.  
 11 Reuniting with him here on council for the last  
 12 12 years, he was known as a very soft-spoken man. And he  
 13 didn't say a whole lot down here. You know, he really  
 14 didn't until we --- until we would debate sometimes, some  
 15 nights for over half an hour. Every so often he would ---  
 16 then he would say something like goddamn it, can't we just  
 17 move forward? You know, he didn't swear too much, but  
 18 take that back --- you know, he had nothing on me. You  
 19 know, I hold the record for that, so ---. But he's second  
 20 place.  
 21 But that's the type of man he was. He would ---  
 22 he would certainly show us wisdom at times when --- when  
 23 we needed it, because that's just the way he was. And  
 24 there's a story about him --- nobody actually knows it.  
 25 Not even you. No. Here I go again.  
 26 There's this girl that works for me. Her name  
 27 is Mary Ann. And she told me this story about him. He  
 28 --- she was his neighbor growing up in Swissvale. And her  
 29 father, his name was Joe Kramer, and he was the Democratic  
 30 Chairman in Swissvale at the time. And he's the one that  
 31 helped Dr. Martoni become Mayor of Swissvale. Well, years  
 32 had gone by, and his kids grew up and --- and one of the  
 33 granddaughters was going to community college. And Mary  
 34 Ann told me they were a poor family, and the parents had  
 35 made arrangements to go to the school and to make payments  
 36 for their daughters' college educations. When they got  
 37 there, they were told that her college education was paid  
 38 in full, including her books and anything she needed for  
 39 the next two years. And they never told them who did it.  
 40 Never told them.  
 41 And they asked Dr. Martoni if he was the one  
 42 that did it. He never admitted it, but they said we know  
 43 he did it. And that's the kind of man that he was. A man  
 44 who cared about people. Never had kids, but he sure took  
 45 care of a lot of kids in --- in college, including me. I

1 was one of them. So I thank him for that and --- and I  
 2 thank you. That's his sister, Phyllis. Phyllis, I think  
 3 it's time maybe you come up and say a few words about your  
 4 brother.  
 5 MRS. FRIEND: Sure. I hadn't planned to do  
 6 this, but --- but I never have a shortage of words. My  
 7 brother was an awesome brother; husband, cousin and uncle.  
 8 Everybody that knew him had kind words, just like were  
 9 said here. I never, ever in my whole life heard my  
 10 brother say a bad word about anyone. The meanest thing he  
 11 ever did was shove my face in a dish of ice cream once,  
 12 because, you know, I was --- I was much younger, and I was  
 13 very annoying. And I wanted the last bit of ice cream.  
 14 This is truly the meanest thing he ever did, other than  
 15 throw me on the couch with his wrestling moves. But I  
 16 wanted that last bit of ice cream and he --- he called me  
 17 fatso, because I was skinny, and my other brother called  
 18 me little girl, because I was a little girl. So he come  
 19 up behind me and said so fatso, you want that ice cream?  
 20 I said, yeah. So he said here, you can have it, and he  
 21 pushes my face right in it. True story. That's the  
 22 meanest thing he ever did to me.  
 23 He was a wonderful uncle. We all went to  
 24 college because of him, community college. That was our  
 25 avenue for education. Without community college, none of  
 26 us would have gone further. I didn't plan to get  
 27 emotional. I didn't plan to talk, but thank you very  
 28 much.  
 29 (Applause.)  
 30 MR. FUTULES: By the way, I --- I'd really like  
 31 to mention that Chuck's wife, Marianne, you know, there  
 32 --- there wasn't one day on this council that I --- that  
 33 she wasn't here. She was here every single meeting of  
 34 every day beside him. And she couldn't be with us tonight  
 35 because she's been sick, and --- and I want to wish her  
 36 well. And thank you.  
 37 (Applause.)  
 38 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Mr. Barker, 11333-19.  
 39 MR. BARKER: A Proclamation recognizing and  
 40 commending Allegheny County Council Member Sue Means for  
 41 her dedication and service to the residents of Allegheny  
 42 County. Sponsored by all members of council.  
 43 MR. MACEY: There again, I've had the pleasure  
 44 of serving with Sue, and although we didn't agree on a lot  
 45 of issues, when we come to County Council, it got

1 there when we had a committee meeting, to help vet, review  
 2 and approve the candidates for appointment that came  
 3 before us.  
 4 Sue reads every single line of every single  
 5 piece of legislation that has ever come before this  
 6 council while she has served. She looks at it, and she  
 7 tries to understand how it's going to affect not just her  
 8 constituents, but all the residents of Allegheny County,  
 9 and particularly the people that that legislation affects.  
 10 If she doesn't know, she reaches out to the people that  
 11 would be affected. Sue has led the way in reaching out  
 12 when we were working on stormwater, reaching out to the  
 13 water and sewer authorities, reaching out to  
 14 municipalities on other pieces of legislation. Reaching  
 15 out to the folks like in the Y and the different spas when  
 16 we were looking at swimming pool regulations and lifeguard  
 17 regulations and things like that. She's been an  
 18 incredible role model for myself and the other Republicans  
 19 to follow. And I can't tell you how much I appreciate and  
 20 have been honored to serve with Sue these past four years  
 21 here on County Council. Sue, would you like to say a few  
 22 words?  
 23 MS. MEANS: Sure.  
 24 MR. MACEY: I would like Sam DeMarco to please  
 25 read the proclamation.  
 26 MR. DEMARCO: Sorry. I'm nervous, man. I've  
 27 never spoke in front --- I never speak in front of people.  
 28 Right?  
 29 You know what, folks, one of the things here at  
 30 this time of year --- it's December, the holiday ---  
 31 holidays are just a few weeks away and a new year is going  
 32 to begin. So we look at with --- in celebration. We look  
 33 at it with a sense of optimism. But every couple years  
 34 it's also a sad time for us, because of the change that  
 35 takes place on County Council. Colleagues that we've  
 36 served with for a number of years, that we've worked with,  
 37 you know, and we work arm and arm in trying to serve the  
 38 citizens of Allegheny County, you know, sometimes move on.  
 39 And in Chuck's case, you know, move on to Heaven here. So  
 40 it's sad to see Johnny and Sue and Denise --- it's sad to  
 41 see them leaving, so you know, from the bottom of my  
 42 heart, I'm going to miss all of you.  
 43 WHEREAS, throughout the history of Allegheny  
 44 County and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, talented  
 45 officials who possess great knowledge and determination

1 contentious at times. But I can tell you one thing about  
 2 Sue Means. She did her homework. She did her due  
 3 diligence. She had the facts. She had the remedies.  
 4 Sometimes it worked. Sometimes it didn't. But I commend  
 5 her for her hard work for the citizens, not only of Bethel  
 6 Park in her district, but of all of Allegheny County  
 7 Council. I am going to step aside and allow the Chairman  
 8 of the Allegheny County Republican Party to present this  
 9 proclamation, but I support it as well.  
 10 MR. DEMARCO: Thank you, Bob. Folks --- many of  
 11 you folks on council, you've had the opportunity to serve  
 12 with Sue, so you know her well. Some of you out here may  
 13 not know her as well. If you can see, Sue Means standing  
 14 beside me is short, but don't let that fool you. Okay?  
 15 While she barely measures more than five feet, this mother  
 16 of five and grandmother of three is no pushover. She's a  
 17 third degree black belt. She earned that black belt by  
 18 breaking wood with her head. Now, some on Council might  
 19 question whether there are some lasting repercussions, but  
 20 I don't because she's a dear, dear friend. Okay?  
 21 Sue is known for persistence in seeking answers  
 22 on behalf of the taxpayers. She represents the  
 23 constituents of Bethel Park, Mount Lebanon, Upper Saint  
 24 Clair and Bridgeville. Sue was born and raised in Bethel  
 25 Park, where she was born to Pete and Ruth Edwards. She  
 26 graduated from Bethel Park High School in 1970, where she  
 27 then went on to earn a Bachelor of Science in Nursing at  
 28 West Virginia University in 1974. Sue worked in the  
 29 neurological unit at Children's Hospital, and she lives in  
 30 Bethel Park with her husband, Jim, whom she married in  
 31 1975.  
 32 Sue was elected to County Council back in  
 33 December of 2013, so this is her sixth year in serving on  
 34 council. And I can say she's done a wonderful job for the  
 35 constituents in her district. Sue spent 19 months of her  
 36 tenure here on County Council as the Chairman of  
 37 Republican Caucus plus County Council. And in that  
 38 time, she instilled a work ethic and demonstrated a  
 39 leadership which we have tried to emulate and follow. One  
 40 of the things that you can always say, we have committee  
 41 meetings --- and Allegheny County Council is a part-time  
 42 position. So everybody on this position has full-time  
 43 jobs or other things that they --- that dictate or take  
 44 away their time. But I could always count, as the Chair  
 45 of the Appointment Review Committee, on Sue Means being

1 and who exhibit exemplary leadership in elected positions  
 2 and contribute invaluable to our community, to our country  
 3 and our world, and;  
 4 WHEREAS, a lifelong resident of Allegheny  
 5 County, Mrs. Sue Means has been passionate about  
 6 preserving community values and creating functional and  
 7 effective legislation for her community, even before being  
 8 elected to County Council. In 2011, she was appointed to  
 9 the Council of the Friends of South Park, where she  
 10 chaired three committees and guided a project to evaluate  
 11 the feasibility of restoring a historic residence within  
 12 the park, and;  
 13 WHEREAS, before being sworn in for her first  
 14 full term, Mrs. Means was elected during a special  
 15 election in 2012 to represent District 5 of Allegheny  
 16 County Council and was officially sworn in on December  
 17 3rd, 2013 for a full four-year term, and;  
 18 WHEREAS, Mrs. Means has been an instrumental  
 19 factor in promoting government policies and fiscal  
 20 responsibilities during her time as the District 5  
 21 representative, and;  
 22 WHEREAS, during her tenure on County Council,  
 23 she served as a member of the Budget and Finance, Health  
 24 and Human Services, Parks, Government Reform, Education,  
 25 and Marketing Committees, and;  
 26 WHEREAS, Sue, a tireless advocate for honest and  
 27 transparent government, Mrs. Means founded and coordinated  
 28 educational workshops throughout her communities and  
 29 helped organize public forums on current issues, including  
 30 religious freedom and healthcare reform.  
 31 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Allegheny  
 32 County Council, on behalf of the citizens of Allegheny  
 33 County, hereby recognizes the Honorable Sue Means for her  
 34 contributions to Allegheny County Council and to the  
 35 enhancements of the wellbeing of the county's citizens.  
 36 Mrs. Means acted always in the best interest of the  
 37 constituents of Allegheny County, and her unwavering  
 38 commitment to council serves as an exemplary model of  
 39 leadership. This council thanks her for her years of  
 40 service and wishes her well as she moves into the future.  
 41 IN WITNESS THEREOF, we have hereto unfor(e) (sic)  
 42 caused the seal of the County of Allegheny to be affixed

 44 (Applause.)

1 MR FUTULES: All right. I'll be brief. Sue,  
 2 you certainly were a great councilwoman here, and over the  
 3 --- over the years you were here, I think you --- you're  
 4 another recordholder as far as showing up at committee  
 5 meetings. You were always there. We could always count  
 6 on you to be there, every one of them. And --- and that's  
 7 dedication when you're a councilwoman and --- and it was  
 8 always I need more information --- and I understood that,  
 9 and that's what makes you great as a councilperson, to be  
 10 diligent with your job.  
 11 And I'll thank you for the years that you put in  
 12 here with us and talk about, you know, the elections, how  
 13 --- how they turned out. I was one that never campaigned  
 14 against anybody that was a seated member of this council,  
 15 and I never have. Maybe except for John DeFazio, I'm  
 16 afraid. Yeah, I take that back. You're the only one,  
 17 John. I did campaign for you. And I felt that it's like  
 18 a fraternity. Once you're here, you're here. How the  
 19 elections turn out has no recoil for me. I consider us  
 20 all family. And thank you.  
 21 (Applause.)  
 22 MS MEANS: With a grateful heart, I finish my  
 23 six years of service on Allegheny County Council. I am  
 24 grateful to my friends and my family for their support,  
 25 especially to my husband for always being my sounding  
 26 board and always encouraging me to stay the course. I am  
 27 grateful for my parents who always supported and believed  
 28 in me in all of my endeavors. Sorry. I am grateful to  
 29 serve among my honored colleagues and other county elected  
 30 officials, County Executive Richard Fitzgerald, Controller  
 31 Chelsa Wagner, Treasurer John Weinstein and Sheriff  
 32 Mullen. Thank you all. It was an honor to serve with you  
 33 all.  
 34 I am grateful to have had a skillful County  
 35 Council staff who did volumes of research and writing for  
 36 me, grateful to the many talented and amazing County  
 37 Council employees, county employees, who worked so hard to  
 38 balance the budget and give the citizens of Allegheny  
 39 County the best services delivered efficiently and  
 40 effectively.  
 41 I'm grateful for the opportunity to represent  
 42 the communities of Bethel Park, Upper Saint Clair,  
 43 Bridgeville and Mount Lebanon. I loved helping people,  
 44 encouraging people and recognizing their accomplishments.  
 45 I took my role as a legislator very seriously. And last,

 45 recognize and thank Noelle and David Conover for their

 14 MR. BARKER: I assume it's --- she's coming up.  
 15 MS. CUMMINGS: I'm here. I'm just slow.  
 16 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Just slow on the draw.  
 17 Okay.  
 18 MS. CUMMINGS: Hi. My name is Elaine Cummings.  
 19 And I'm here pretty much regarding --- nine months ago,  
 20 Councilman Klein proposed a bill that would end the  
 21 conversion therapy in Allegheny County. And for nine  
 22 months, it sat there, and I'm not sure why. But there's a  
 23 whole host of professional medical people, psychological  
 24 people, parents and family and friends that can help you  
 25 if you need help information.  
 26 There --- conversion therapy is still going on  
 27 in Allegheny County --- that's my point --- as we wait to  
 28 pass it again. It is an extremely painful and harmful,  
 29 not just physically, but mentally and spiritually harmful  
 30 to children, to be told that if they were more faithful  
 31 they could be cured or have something that there is no  
 32 cure for. It's how you're made. And it's not a disorder  
 33 or disease. And there are a wealth of people at  
 34 Children's Hospital, Youth and Adolescent Medical Clinic,  
 35 and Persad Centers and outreaches, P-5, a parents and  
 36 friends and family organization for support. But it is  
 37 not a diagnosis. You can't cure it. And it's harmful to  
 38 have it keep going on. So I really urge all of you in the  
 39 upcoming year to repropose --- get that back into a --- up  
 40 for a vote. And before you do, again, ask the people that  
 41 are willing to come educate you. I have a transgender  
 42 niece. I knew not what I did not know about this. And  
 43 the more you know, the more you want to help.  
 44 And --- and there's a lot of pain and suffering  
 45 involved already in being outcast and made fun of, and

1 ban so-called reparative or conversion therapy for sexual  
 2 orientation or gender identity. The support for  
 3 legislation bans strengthens AMA's longstanding opposition  
 4 to this unscientific practice  
 5 The AMA heard testimony, including firsthand  
 6 accounts, regarding the significant harms triggered by  
 7 conversion therapy, including depression, posttraumatic  
 8 stress disorder, and suicidal thoughts and attempts. It  
 9 is clear to the AMA that the conversion therapy needs to  
 10 end in the United States, given the risk of deliberate  
 11 harm to LGBTQ people, said AMA Board Member William E.  
 12 Kobler, M.D. Conversion therapy has no foundation as  
 13 scientifically valid medical care and lacks credible  
 14 evidence to support its efficacy or safety. Only 18 U.S.  
 15 states and the District of Columbia have banned conversion  
 16 therapy for people younger than 18, and no states have  
 17 banned conversion therapy for adults. The AMA agrees with  
 18 medical experts that the lack of regulation on conversion  
 19 therapy opens the door to fraud, harm and trauma for many  
 20 adults and children in the U.S. let's make Pennsylvania  
 21 one of those states, expand it to Allegheny County. It  
 22 starts there. Is my time up?  
 23 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: In a couple --- the red  
 24 light ---  
 25 MR. FUTULES: Keep going.  
 26 MS. MOTEN: Okay. These are some talking points  
 27 that --- that people in the medical field did give me.  
 28 There is no clinical indication for conversion or  
 29 reparative therapy as it does not treat a disorder or a  
 30 diagnosis. There are no protocols or guidelines for  
 31 conversion therapy, resulting in abusive practices.  
 32 Therapies have protocols that are followed that lead to  
 33 the effective and desired results. Conversion therapy  
 34 does not have a protocol. There are no studied or  
 35 published protocols that have been tested. This results  
 36 in conversion therapy being practiced in harmful ways  
 37 including forced genital touching, for example, criminal  
 38 sexual conduct and childhood sexual abuse. Thank you for  
 39 your time.  
 40 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Next?  
 41 MR. BARKER: Next is Gerald Montano.  
 42 MR. MONTANO: Good afternoon. I'm Dr. Gerald  
 43 Montano. I'm a Board Certified Pediatrician licensed in  
 44 the State of Pennsylvania. I have been practicing  
 45 medicine for the last decade. During my practice, I have

1 there's nothing Christian about that. And reparative  
 2 therapies and conversion therapies are usually a faith  
 3 based thing. But, you know, Christmas is here, the light  
 4 of the world, the ultimate love and sacrifice. The word  
 5 of God made flesh never mentions one word about being gay  
 6 or straight, and it wasn't because they didn't exist in  
 7 Roman cultures and great cultures and all over  
 8 Mesopotamia. It's that it did not --- it was not germane  
 9 to get us back to God, you know. It was love one another  
 10 as I have loved you unconditionally, as you are, not  
 11 making --- do not judge. I mean, so many Christian  
 12 things, words, from that man to help us live good lives,  
 13 to help one another be brothers and sisters, no others.  
 14 All brothers and sisters. And when we see others, that's  
 15 how we get all the division that we see in the world right  
 16 now. But we are all brothers and sisters. And I guess my  
 17 time is ending, but please don't let it sit for another  
 18 nine months while that still goes on. That is in ---  
 19 medical people will tell you how harmful it really, truly  
 20 is, mentally and spiritually to children to do that, and  
 21 we should not allow that. Thank you for your time and  
 22 consideration, but please do something next year.  
 23 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. I wanted to bring an  
 24 announcement we didn't mention. Former Councilman Mike  
 25 Finnerty is here. I just wanted to --- there, hey, Mike.  
 26 Hey.  
 27 (Applause.)  
 28 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. Who else do we have  
 29 speaking?  
 30 MR. BARKER: Next up is Kelley Moten.  
 31 MS. MOTEN: Hi. My name is Kelley Moten. I  
 32 live in Etna, PA. I have a transgender daughter who would  
 33 not be here today if I didn't support her. And the idea  
 34 of a parent not supporting their child and telling that  
 35 child that they're wrong for being who they are breaks my  
 36 heart, and without being a doctor, I know it's wrong, but  
 37 you don't have to believe me.  
 38 November 19th of this year, the American Medical  
 39 Association gathered physician and medical student leaders  
 40 from all corners of medicine at its interim meeting to  
 41 shape guiding policies on emerging healthcare topics. The  
 42 AMA --- one of the policies adopted by the House of  
 43 Delegates that day, the AMA supports state and federal  
 44 bans on conversion therapy. The AMA will develop model  
 45 state legislation and advocate for federal legislation to

1 seen many lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender  
 2 children, and their identities are not pathologic, nor do  
 3 they need it to be treatment. So I ask that the City  
 4 Council consider to ban all types of reparative or  
 5 conversion therapy.  
 6 And the last 20 years have demonstrated the  
 7 dangers of reparative or conversion therapy, whether  
 8 physical therapy such as electric shocks, or mental such  
 9 as talk therapy, on the health and wellbeing of any child.  
 10 And studies have shown that these practices have increased  
 11 depression in children and PTSD and suicidality. There is  
 12 no evidence, based on my review of the literature and on  
 13 my own medical opinion, that reparative therapy or  
 14 conversion therapy of any kind can be helpful to any  
 15 child.  
 16 I hear this view with many organizations that  
 17 are opposed to such practices, including national and  
 18 international organizations, including but not limited to  
 19 the World Professional Association of Transgender Health,  
 20 the American Psychological Association, the American  
 21 Psychiatric Association, the American Academy of Pediatric  
 22 and the American Medical Association.  
 23 I respect parents' rights to make decisions  
 24 about the medical care for their children. And at the  
 25 same time, I also believe that it is my ethical  
 26 responsibility to recommend only the best care for  
 27 children and to disapprove any treatment that could harm a  
 28 child. So I really implore for the County Council in the  
 29 new term to consider banning all types of reparative  
 30 therapy or conversion therapy. And I appreciate your time  
 31 tonight. Thank you.  
 32 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Next?  
 33 MR. BARKER: Next is Jeffrey Miller.  
 34 MR. MILLER: Hi. I'm Jeff Miller. And now  
 35 you'll hear from an older perspective. I'm a retired  
 36 clergy and also a retired mental health therapist and an  
 37 active part of our local SAGE group, which stands for  
 38 Service and Advocacy for Gay Elders  
 39 Our group meets weekly, and just recently 16 of  
 40 us all over age 60, talked about whether if we had been  
 41 pushed as teenagers to a therapy that promised to make us  
 42 normal, would we have opted to do that? And every one of  
 43 us said, sure, who wouldn't want to be normal? Looking  
 44 back now, we all emphatically agreed that would have been  
 45 a big mistake. It wouldn't have been healthy or helpful.

1 I've been --- if I had been told that as a teenager that  
 2 it was okay to be gay instead of thinking that I needed to  
 3 be somehow different than I knew I was, it would have  
 4 saved me years of pain and heart palpitations and stomach  
 5 ulcers, anxiety and depression. The very name conversion  
 6 therapy implies that a person is broken or needs to be  
 7 fixed.  
 8 No one, especially teenagers, and I've worked  
 9 with them all my life, want to think their loved ones see  
 10 them as broken. So if a trusted adult holds out a false  
 11 hope of making life happier by denying their true self,  
 12 thus changing one's innate identity instead of assuring  
 13 them that it's okay to be who you are, they most likely  
 14 would choose to move into that abusive therapy situation.  
 15 Teenagers are not always best equipped to make wise and  
 16 informed decisions, and they're especially vulnerable if  
 17 they believe their loved ones think there's something  
 18 wrong and they need to be converted. Youth need advice  
 19 and direction based on evidence-based science and  
 20 research, rather than cultural opinions. Sexual identity  
 21 is not a matter of choice, and if praying away the gay had  
 22 worked, I wouldn't be here right now. So please protect  
 23 our Allegheny County LGBTQ youth by banning this harmful  
 24 and potentially fatal conversion therapy process. Thank  
 25 you.  
 26 MR. BARKER: Last up is Kristie King. Or  
 27 perhaps not.  
 28 MR. FUTULES: She's not here.  
 29 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Someone want to make ---  
 30 MR. WALTON: Motion to adjourn.  
 31 MR. CATENA: Second.  
 32 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: All those in favor, signify  
 33 by saying aye.  
 34 (Chorus of ayes)  
 35 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Opposed? The ayes have it.  
 36 Meeting adjourned.
