1 MR. MACEY: I'm going to call this meeting to
 2 order. Our President, Pat Catena, is ill and is resting
 3 at home. Would you follow after me, the Pledge of
 4 Allegiance to the Flag?
 5 (Pledge of Allegiance.)
 6 MR. MACEY: I'd also like to take a couple
 7 minutes for us to remember those people who have lost
 8 their lives due to COVID-19, and pray for those who are
 9 now sick and recovering.
 10 (Silent prayer or reflection.)
 11 MR. MACEY: Thank you. Roll call, please?
 12 MR. BARKER: Mr. Baker?
 13 MR. BARKER: Here.
 14 MR. BARKER: Ms. Bennett?
 15 MS. BENNETT: Here.
 16 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?
 17 MR. DEMARCO: Here.
 18 MR. BARKER: Mr. Duerr?
 19 MR. DUERR: Here.
 20 MR. BARKER: Mr. Futules?
 21 MR. FUTULES: Here.
 22 MR. BARKER: Ms. Hallam?
 23 MS. HALLAM: Here.

 44 MR. MACEY: Thank you. Proclamations and
 45 Certificates, 11538-20.

1 MR. BARKER: We have three individuals who
 2 signed up. All of their comments are very brief so they
 3 will easily fit within the time limit.
 4 First up is Nicole Hall of 1707 Rhine Street in
 5 the City of Pittsburgh. She wished to speak about an
 6 ordinance in the County of Allegheny, Commonwealth of
 7 Pennsylvania requiring the County test all residents of
 8 the Kane hospitals, all inmates at the Allegheny County
 9 Jail and all the County employees and contractors
 10 performing work at either location for current COVID-19
 11 infection. That was the entire content of the comment.
 12 Next up is Fred Frances at 1605 Broadway Avenue,
 13 also in the City of Pittsburgh. He signed up exactly the
 14 same way. He signed up to speak about an ordinance of the
 15 County of Allegheny, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
 16 requiring that the County test all residents of the Kane
 17 hospitals, all inmates of the Allegheny County Jail and
 18 all County employees and contractors performing work at
 19 either location for current COVID-19 infection. That was
 20 the sum total of his comment.
 21 And the third is Sadie Powers of 1707 Rhine
 22 Street in the City of the Pittsburgh. I support the
 23 ordinance to test inmates at the ACJ for COVID-19, but the
 24 easiest way to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in the ACJ
 25 is to end cash bail and release the 81 percent of inmates
 26 who are currently housed there and have not been convicted
 27 of a crime, as well as decrease the number of people
 28 exposed to the illness by reducing the number of people
 29 processed daily at the ACJ. Current number is roughly 100
 30 people processed there each day. Most of the arrests
 31 being made are for nonviolent acts, which surely can be
 32 handled with a citation instead of an arrest, if any
 33 conviction --- if any action is even needed at all. The
 34 Abolitionist Law Center has been calling for decarceration
 35 to prevent the spread of COVID-19 since March 15th.
 36 As for the ordinance to establish penalties for
 37 the improper search warrant executions, accountability in
 38 any capacity is a good start, but there should be
 39 processes put in place to decrease improper search warrant
 40 execution from even occurring. Additionally, imposing
 41 penalties doesn't necessarily decrease these behaviors if
 42 there is not systematic change to ensure that the
 43 penalties will actually occur. And it should be proposed
 44 that monetary penalties come out of the police pension

1 MR. BARKER: A Proclamation posthumously
 2 recognizing and commending the Honorable William "Bill"
 3 Russell Robinson for his dedication and service to the
 4 residents of Allegheny County. Sponsored by Council
 5 Members Walton and Bennett and all members of Council.
 6 MR. MACEY: Okay. Mr. Walton?
 7 MR. WALTON: Uh-huh (yes)?
 8 MR. MACEY: Would you like to say something? I
 9 know it says read into the record, but I spent over ten
 10 years with Bill and he was quite the orator and he was a
 11 good man. And I also would like to be added to the
 12 record.
 13 MR. BARKER: For Bill?
 14 MR. MACEY: Yeah.
 15 MR. WALTON: I would suggest that all members of
 16 Council, their --- their individual names be added to that
 17 Proclamation ---
 18 MR. PALMIERE: Here, here.
 19 MR. WALTON: --- as a kind of courtesy and
 20 respect. I believe that Bill had an incredible career. I
 21 replaced him in 2015, and I am working every day to live
 22 up to the legacy that he created over his long and
 23 successful career. He had an incredible impact. He was a
 24 consummate gentleman and orator, very dashing and
 25 committed to the things that he believed in and so it is
 26 quite fitting that we honor Bill today, and as a credit to
 27 his legacy rename the independent police review
 28 legislation after Bill Robinson, the Bill Robinson
 29 Independent Police Review Board. I think it is
 30 appropriate that with that thought in mind that we move
 31 forward and, as I believe Bill would say, act very
 32 progressively and certainly pass that legislation. So a
 33 tribute to Bill and let's move on.
 34 MR. MACEY: Thank you very much. Does any other
 35 person who has --- Council person who has worked with Bill
 36 would like to say --- would like to say something?
 37 Okay. Having heard nothing, a Proclamation,
 38 11539-20, and it'll be read into the record.
 39 MR. BARKER: A Proclamation congratulating
 40 LeMont for 60 years of dedication to providing delicious
 41 meals to the residents of Allegheny County sponsored by
 42 Council Member Palmosina.
 43 MR. MACEY: All right. Public comment on agenda
 44 items?

 3 I also support the legislation proposed by
 4 Councilwoman --- women Bennett and Hallam to ban the use

 9 MR. BARKER: A Motion to approve the minutes of
 10 the May 19th, 2020 regular meeting of Council.

 13 MR. MACEY: Motion by Councilman Duerr.
 14 MR. BAKER: Second. Baker.
 15 MR. MACEY: Second by Councilman Baker. All
 16 those in favor, it's a voice vote, say aye.
 17 (Chorus of ayes.)
 18 MR. MACEY: Presentations of appointments, and I
 19 would like to entertain a motion to approve all friends of
 20 the park appointments on tonight's agenda together.
 21 MR. WALTON: I so move, Mr. President, with the
 22 caveat that if a member has an objection that we --- that
 23 we address their specific objection and after that we
 24 approve them in en masse.
 25 MR. MACEY: Do we have a second?
 26 MR. FUTULES: I second.
 27 MR. MACEY: All those in favor signify by saying
 28 aye.
 29 (Chorus of ayes.)
 30 MR. MACEY: Okay. Mr. Barker, will you read the
 31 appointments?
 32 MR. BARKER: Indeed.
 33 MR. MACEY: I got a little ahead of myself.
 34 MR. BARKER: First up, we have the re-
 35 appointment of Robert Potter to the Friends of North Park
 36 for a term to expire July 14th, 2022; the re-appointment

 38 expiring July 14th, 2022; re-appointing Mary Warmbrodt to

 41 Council of Friends for North Park for a term to expire
 42 also on July 14th, 2022.

 23 MR. MACEY: Those opposed? Okay. Thank you.
 24 Unfinished business, Committee on Economic
 25 Development and Housing, Second Reading.
 26 MR. BARKER: Bill Number 11517-20, a Resolution
 27 approving a project for the benefit of Duquesne University
 28 of the Holy Spirit to be financed by the Allegheny County
 29 Higher Education Building Authority by the issuance of the
 30 Authority's taxable or tax-exempt revenue bonds, in one or
 31 more series, to be designated Allegheny County Higher
 32 Education Building Authority, University Revenue Bonds,
 33 Series A of 2020, in an aggregate principal amount not to
 34 exceed \$80 million, provided that the taxing power of ---
 35 the County of Allegheny, Pennsylvania shall not be
 36 obligated in any way with respect to the Bonds, and
 37 declaring the financing of such project as desirable for
 38 the health, safety and welfare of the people in the County
 39 sponsored by the Chief Executive.
 40 MR. MACEY: Economic development. Mr. DeMarco?
 41 MR. DEMARCO: Thank you very much, Mr.
 42 President. The Committee on Economic Development and
 43 Housing met on June 16th, 2020. And this was --- we
 44 talked to the folks from Duquesne University as well as
 45 the administration, and this was affirmatively recommended

 5 MR. BARKER: An ordinance of the County of

 12 MR. MACEY: Councilwoman Kirk, would you like to
 13 address this?
 14 MS. KIRK: Councilwoman ---
 15 MR. MACEY: Oh. I'm sorry, Liv.
 16 MS. KIRK: Yeah. This would be Councilwoman
 17 Bennett.
 18 MR. MACEY: Councilwoman Bennett, please.
 19 MS. BENNETT: Thank you, Chairman. We ---
 20 Public Safety met Wednesday, June 17th, and this was
 21 negatively recommended to the full Council. So may I have
 22 a motion to approve?
 23 MS. HALLAM: Point of personal privilege,
 24 Chairman Macey?
 25 MR. MACEY: What is your privilege?
 26 MS. HALLAM: Well, I could go on for a while
 27 about that, but specifically here, what I --- there are
 28 some amendments that we would like to introduce so as
 29 a primary sponsor on this, I would like to request that this
 30 bill get sent back to Committee for discussion including
 31 the amendment as opposed to voting on the amended
 32 legislation tonight without discussion in committee.
 33 MR. MACEY: Is that as far as you want to go
 34 with this? This is your legislation. How about you, Liv?
 35 MS. BENNETT: As Councilwoman Hallam stated,
 36 there is an amendment on the floor. We talked about it
 37 earlier so I don't oppose it coming back so that amendment
 38 can be discussed because it's my understanding that
 39 changes the dynamic of the support of this bill.
 40 MR. MACEY: I'm wondering if we would like to
 41 move on the amendment. Is there a motion to approve the
 42 amendment?
 43 MS. HALLAM: I'm sorry, Councilman Macey. We
 44 are --- we are not looking to move on the amendment. We
 45 are looking to send the full bill with the amendment back

1 and brought to the full Council for a vote with a positive
 2 recommendation.
 3 MR. MACEY: May I have a motion to approve
 4 please?
 5 MR. BAKER: So moved.
 6 MR. DUERR: Seconded.
 7 MR. MACEY: Okay. Moved by Mr. Baker and
 8 seconded by Mr. Duerr. All those in favor signify by
 9 saying aye.
 10 (Chorus of ayes.)
 11 MR. MACEY: No. Wait a second. Maybe we'll do
 12 it a little differently. We'll follow the rules. We're
 13 going to do a roll call vote.
 14 MR. BARKER: On the Motion to approve
 15 Mr. Baker?
 16 MR. BAKER: Yes.
 17 MR. BARKER: Ms. Bennett?
 18 MS. BENNETT: Yes.
 19 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?
 20 MR. DEMARCO: Yes.
 21 MR. BARKER: Mr. Duerr?
 22 MR. DUERR: Yes.
 23 MR. BARKER: Mr. Futules?

1 to Committee as opposed to voting on the legislation
 2 tonight.
 3 MR. MACEY: So you're withdrawing your motion
 4 and amendment --- I mean, your amendment?
 5 MS. HALLAM: What --- I'm sorry. What --- to
 6 clarify, what I am asking is that the legislation be sent
 7 back to Committee as opposed to there being a vote on it
 8 with the amended --- with the amended piece tonight so
 9 that we can discuss the full legislation with the
 10 amendment. The amendment is a significant part. It's
 11 only a few words that add --- makes all employees and ---
 12 but I think it's very important so we should send it back
 13 to Committee to discuss.
 14 MR. MACEY: Okay. Hold on, please.
 15 MS. KIRK: Chairman Macey?
 16 MR. MACEY: Yes, ma'am?
 17 MS. KIRK: Chairman Macey, this is Councilwoman
 18 Kirk. Could I have a say?
 19 MR. MACEY: Yes.
 20 MS. KIRK: This is Councilwoman Kirk. I was at
 21 that meeting, and those couple meetings we spent close to
 22 two and a half hours discussing and I believe why it came
 23 more as a negative recommendation is because this goes
 24 above and beyond what our Health Department says --- what
 25 the Pennsylvania Health Department says, what the CDC says
 26 and the medical experts at AJN, who are the medical
 27 experts for the jail. So this --- this --- this seems
 28 like a do-over because all you're doing is adding more
 29 testing when we rejected the amount of testing that's
 30 already being done. It sounds like let's try it again,
 31 maybe I can get a different result so I would like this to
 32 go forth to a vote tonight.
 33 MS. HALLAM: With all due respect ---
 34 MR. MACEY: Thank --- hold it. One at --- do
 35 not crossover. You'll --- you will be given the
 36 opportunity to speak when you're recognized. We have
 37 other people here that would like to speak.
 38 MS. HALLAM: Okay.
 39 MR. WALTON: Mr. Chairman?
 40 MR. MACEY: Yeah, Councilman Walton?
 41 MR. WALTON: It is not inappropriate for the
 42 sponsor of the amendment to ask to have it referred, the
 43 amendment to be referred, to be added and referred back to
 44 Committee. What the challenge is, is that the amendment
 45 needs to be properly introduced and agreed on or not

1 agreed on to be added to the legislation. And then the
 2 appropriate step would be whether or not to refer it back
 3 to Committee for consideration. We have to ---
 4 MR. MACEY: Correct.
 5 MR. WALTON: We have to find out what the
 6 amendment is first.
 7 MR. MACEY: Councilman Walton, there is no
 8 amendment at this time.
 9 MS. HALLAM: That's incorrect, Councilman Macey
 10 I --- the amendment was ---
 11 MR. MACEY: Beth. Beth, there's other people
 12 who would like to talk. Thank you. Hold on.
 13 MS. HALLAM: There's been no discussion to be
 14 had here. I just want it back to Committee to discuss.
 15 MR. MACEY: Did you want to say something?
 16 MR. FUTULES: Well, I think we have the minority
 17 if you want to --- we have ---
 18 MR. MACEY: No. No. No.
 19 MR. DUERR: On the agenda ---
 20 MR. FUTULES: There's a motion to move an
 21 amendment.
 22 MR. MACEY: There's nothing.
 23 MR. DUERR: You're right.
 24 MR. MACEY: There's nothing. You're right.
 25 MR. CAMBEST: If they want to send the amendment
 26 and the bill ---
 27 MR. MACEY: Okay.
 28 MR. CAMBEST: --- they can send the amended Bill
 29 back to Committee, then you have to vote on the amendment
 30 to approve the amendment, which will then be incorporated
 31 in the bill and go back.
 32 MS. HALLAM: I ---
 33 MR. MACEY: There is no amendment. Is that
 34 correct, Ms. Hallam?
 35 MR. CAMBEST: She's saying there is. She wants
 36 it to go back.
 37 MS. HALLAM: Point of personal privilege,
 38 Councilman Macey, I need to move to introduce the
 39 amendment prior to sending it back to Committee. I am
 40 comfortable doing that.
 41 MR. MACEY: I'm sorry. I didn't hear what you
 42 said. Hey. Please go ahead.
 43 MS. HALLAM: Councilman Macey, are you referring

 7 --- to take the Citizens Police Review Board out of
 8 Committee. Roll call.
 9 MR. BARKER: On the motion to pull the Bill from
 10 Committee.
 11 Mr. Baker?
 12 MR. BAKER: No.
 13 MR. BARKER: Ms. Bennett?
 14 MS. BENNETT: No.
 15 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?
 16 MR. DEMARCO: No.

 42 to pull fails.
 43 MR. MACEY: Okay. Next order of business.
 44 MR. PALMOSINA: Did he say something?
 45 MR. FUTULES: He didn't answer.

1 MS. HALLAM: Okay. I would like some advice
 2 from the staff. If --- Councilman Walton, if I'm
 3 understanding what he's saying, I actually need to move to
 4 amend the legislation first and then separately address
 5 sending it back to Committee. Is that correct?
 6 MR. MACEY: Ms. Hallam, do you have an amendment
 7 tonight?
 8 MS. HALLAM: The amendment was sent out to
 9 everyone and Jared has it in writing for anyone who's
 10 there in person.
 11 MR. MACEY: But there hasn't been a motion to
 12 receive it or --- or a motion to receive it and second.
 13 MS. HALLAM: Okay. Well, I ---
 14 MR. MACEY: So all we have this point, Ms.
 15 Hallam, is the ---
 16 MS. HALLAM: Okay. How does ---?
 17 MR. MACEY: Wait a second, please.
 18 MS. HALLAM: Okay.
 19 MR. MACEY: Well, all we have is the original
 20 Ordinance, 11507-20. That's all we have. If you would
 21 like to have that sent back to Committee I would be more
 22 than glad to order that.
 23 MS. HALLAM: Yes, sir. Please do.
 24 MR. MACEY: So ordered.
 25 MS. HALLAM: Thank you very much.
 26 MR. MACEY: You're welcome.
 27 MR. DUERR: So what about the amendment?
 28 MR. MACEY: There --- there is no amendment.
 29 MR. FUTULES: There's no amendment.
 30 MR. BAKER: We can talk about it at the
 31 Committee.
 32 MR. MACEY: All right. Here we go. New
 33 business.
 34 MR. WALTON: No. No, no, no. First, point of
 35 privilege.
 36 MR. MACEY: What's your privilege.
 37 MR. WALTON: Pursuant to the rules of Council I
 38 am making a motion that we have a piece of legislation,
 39 the Bill Robinson Independent Police Review Board, that
 40 has been sitting in Committee for more than 60 days. I am
 41 simply moving that --- I motion that we move it out of
 42 Council, out of Committee to a vote tonight on the floor.
 43 MS. HALLAM: Point of order, Councilman Macey.
 44 We have another issue at hand right now at ---

1 MR. MACEY: Point of order. One second, please.
 2 New business, Ordinances and Resolutions.
 3 Ordinance 11542-20.
 4 MR. BARKER: An Ordinance of the County of
 5 Allegheny, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, amending the
 6 Allegheny County Code of Ordinances, Division 2, entitled
 7 County Government Operations, Chapter 215, entitled
 8 Boards, Commissions and Committees, Article V, entitled
 9 Human Relations Commission, in order to establish a
 10 Countywide nondiscrimination requirement in medical
 11 treatment settings. Sponsored by Council Members Klein,
 12 Futules, Duerr, Hallam, Bennett and Prizio.
 13 MR. MACEY: I'm sorry. I forget. What
 14 Committee is that? I'm sorry.
 15 MR. BARKER: On the original Bill that --- that
 16 established the Human Relations Commission was referred to
 17 the Committee on Government Reform back when it was done
 18 in ---
 19 MR. MACEY: And the Chair of Government Reform?
 20 MR. BARKER: That'd be ---.
 21 MS. HALLAM: Excuse me. I cannot hear.
 22 MR. MACEY: Pardon me?
 23 MR. BARKER: That'd be Mr. Futules.
 24 MR. MACEY: Okay. Thank you. I'm 71-year-old.
 25 I mean, you know. Hey, go ahead. Mr. Futules, please
 26 share with us your experience.
 27 MR. FUTULES: It was sent to Committee.
 28 MR. BARKER: It's a --- that's a new referral.
 29 MR. MACEY: Okay. All right. Well, I thought
 30 he maybe wanted to say something on it.
 31 MR. FUTULES: Actually, Mr. Klein is the primary
 32 sponsor. And --- because he --- and he might want to
 33 comment.
 34 MR. KLEIN: Mr. President?
 35 MR. MACEY: Mr. Klein, go ahead.
 36 MR. KLEIN: I would be happy to introduce this
 37 and give you some background. This is Councilman Klein.
 38 MR. MACEY: Please keep it brief.
 39 MR. KLEIN: On a --- on June 12th, 2020, as this
 40 is the background that has --- that has motivated our
 41 effort to introduce this Ordinance, the Trump
 42 administration announced or finalized a rule that would
 43 remove nondiscrimination protections for LGBTQ people with
 44 respect to health care and health insurance. This rule is

1 right now slated to go into effect in mid-August. And it
 2 is a modification of a section of the Affordable Care Act.
 3 This is yet another rule/regulation put forward
 4 by this administration that defines sex discrimination as
 5 only applying when someone faces discrimination for being
 6 male or female. Mind you, this past Monday on June 15th,
 7 2020, just last week, three days after this
 8 administration's decision to deny fellow citizens their
 9 rights, the Supreme Court in the case of Bostock versus
 10 Clayton County announced that LGBTQ people are protected
 11 against workplace discrimination under Title VII of the
 12 Civil Rights Act of 1964. Justice Gorsuch, writing for
 13 the Court, said this. He said an employer who fires an
 14 individual merely for being gay or transgender defies the
 15 law.
 16 MR. MACEY: Thank you, Mr. Klein. Thank you.
 17 MR. KLEIN: Yes.
 18 MR. MACEY: New business, 11543-20.
 19 MR. BARKER: A Resolution of the County of
 20 Allegheny amending the Grants and Special Accounts Budget
 21 for 2020, Submission Number 05-20. Sponsored by the Chief
 22 Executive.
 23 MR. MACEY: Referred to Budget and Finance.
 24 MR. DUERR: Vice President Macey, can you
 25 clarify where the --- the --- Councilman Klein's bill is
 26 going? Is it Government Reform?
 27 MR. MACEY: It is going to Government Reform.
 28 MR. DUERR: Okay. Sorry.
 29 MR. MACEY: Yeah.
 30 MR. DUERR: I just wanted the clarification on
 31 that. Thank you.
 32 MR. WALTON: And --- and relative to --- I'm
 33 sorry to interrupt, Mr. Chairman, but I'd like to be ---
 34 I'd like to sign on as a co-sponsor to that legislation.
 35 MR. MACEY: Absolutely.
 36 MR. KLEIN: And Mr. President, this is
 37 Councilman Klein as well. A point of order, if anyone
 38 else would like to join as a co-sponsor, and you might
 39 make that known to ---
 40 MR. MACEY: Okay.
 41 MR. KLEIN: --- Councilman Macey, that would be
 42 appreciated.
 43 MR. MACEY: Okay. You could do that by e-mail.
 44 That'll be fine. Okay.
 45 MR. KLEIN: Thank you.

1 MR. MACEY: Well, I --- I was going to get
 2 there. You're just a little ahead of me, I'm sorry.
 3 Thank you. Go ahead.
 4 MS. HALLAM: Okay. So I hope all of you had a
 5 chance to --- to read this over. I think it's something
 6 that's very timely. Overarching transit is a human right
 7 and a basic need. It's the --- it's the lifeblood of
 8 economy.
 9 So what we've seen, especially during the
 10 pandemic, is that lots of those folks that are working in
 11 essential industries and on the front line of this
 12 pandemic rely on public transportation to reach their
 13 employment. And the devastation that's resulted from the
 14 COVID-19 is both social and economic and the hardest hit
 15 is our low income neighbors.
 16 The federal government recognized the need to
 17 maintain and increase access to transit during and
 18 throughout the crisis, and that's why the Port Authority
 19 of Allegheny County received \$141 million to provide them
 20 with significant financial support.
 21 So in this motion, I'm joined by tons of
 22 colleagues from across the state, county and local levels
 23 to call for a portion of that \$141 million to be used to
 24 ensure that all of our neighbors, especially those hardest
 25 hit by the crisis and in greatest need, are provided with
 26 the access to transit.
 27 Earlier today we published a letter calling for
 28 the immediate implementation of an Emergency Low Income
 29 Fares Program on Allegheny County transit as a way to
 30 address the public health impact of COVID-19. I am very
 31 grateful to be supported --- to have the support of
 32 Senators Costa, Fontana, Iovino and Williams in this
 33 letter, and also Representatives Gainey, Innamorato and
 34 Lee, Pittsburgh City Councilors Gross and Lavelle and many
 35 other who all signed onto that letter today.
 36 So that's why I'm asking --- I'm introducing
 37 this motion of Council tonight, affirming the need for
 38 this policy to allow riders who qualify for assistance to
 39 show their EBT cards to board for free during the
 40 pandemic. I believe this is a needed intervention to
 41 prevent COVID-19 transmission at the fare box, especially
 42 considering the fact that Port Authority recently
 43 reintroduced the fares. A low income fare program would
 44 be an important public health action to ensure that riders
 45 without other transportation alternatives, who are also

1 MR. MACEY: You're welcome.
 2 Ordinance 11545-20.
 3 MR. BARKER: An ordinance amending and
 4 supplementing the Allegheny County Code of Ordinances
 5 through the creation of a new Division 9, entitled,
 6 Conduct, Chapter 900, entitled County Law Enforcement, in
 7 order to establish penalties for improper search warrant

 10 MR. MACEY: That'll be sent to the Committee on
 11 Public Safety.

 14 MS. HALLAM: Point of personal privilege,
 15 Chairman Macey.
 16 MR. MACEY: Councilwoman Hallam?

 18 Jared has sent out a motion that I was hoping to introduce
 19 tonight regarding the Emergency Low Income Fare Program
 20 for Port Authority. Everyone should have received a copy

 34 for the statement of support from members of Council.
 35 MR. MACEY: Okay. I would just like to see if
 36 there is a --- a motion and a second to this.
 37 MS. BENNETT: I'll --- I'll motion. Liv Bennett
 38 motions.
 39 MS. HALLAM: And I'll second it.
 40 MR. MACEY: Okay. A motion made by Liv Bennett
 41 and seconded by Bethany Hallam.
 42 MS. HALLAM: May --- may I speak to this motion
 43 before the vote, sir.

1 facing economic pressures due to job loss, hours reduction
 2 and increased costs to food and accumulated rent and are
 3 able to continue accessing their critical needs. So
 4 that's why I ask you all to join me, whether as a
 5 co-sponsor or just a vote of support of this motion, to
 6 make sure that those who need it the most are --- have the
 7 help available to them. Thank you, Chairman.
 8 MR. MACEY: Thank you. I'm going to ask for
 9 comments from the other Counsel persons, and I'll begin
 10 with Mr. Baker.
 11 MR. BAKER: Okay. No comment.
 12 MR. WALTON: I have a comment, Mr. Chairman.
 13 MR. MACEY: Yeah. We'll get there. We're going
 14 alphabetical.

 17 MR. DEMARCO: Councilman Macey, I would like to
 18 recommend that this motion get sent to a Committee until
 19 we're able to look into this funding because my
 20 understanding is that the Cares Act funding can only be
 21 spent on COVID-related expenses and is not able to be
 22 spent on transportation or fare programs. I --- I may be
 23 wrong, but that's my understanding so I think if we were
 24 to vote on this tonight not understanding that information
 25 that we would be voting on something that, you know, we
 26 don't know the ramifications of.
 27 And --- and trying to check into this since the
 28 time I got that motion, you know, the Port Authority's
 29 fares as of date at 66 percent behind where they were last
 30 year, and the fares that they pay only make up 21 percent
 31 of the operating costs. So I think we all want to take
 32 --- help people that are out there. I just think we need
 33 to be responsible about doing so, ensuring that we have
 34 the capability --- or that they have the capability to pay
 35 for it.
 36 MR. MACEY: Thank you. Mr. Duerr?
 37 MR. DUERR: No comments other than I'd like to
 38 thank Councilman Hallam for making this a motion and not
 39 an ordinance. Thank you very much.
 40 MS. BENNETT: Point of order. Councilwoman
 41 Bennett hasn't commented.
 42 MR. MACEY: Councilwoman Bennett, we'll get back
 43 to you. We're allowing each Council person a chance to
 44 --- have a comment.

1 MS. HALLAM: You skipped her in alphabetical
 2 order.
 3 MR. FUTULES: You said you were going ---
 4 MS. BENNETT: Exactly.
 5 MR. MACEY: Oh, I'm looking at everybody here
 6 and I --- okay. I apologize. Go ahead.
 7 MR. DUERR: Sorry, Liv.

 9 wanted to say that I am in full support of this motion and
 10 I --- I also thank Councilwoman Hallam for bringing this

 12 I actually recently shared testimony with Port
 13 Authority at one of their Board meetings actually
 14 advocating for this exact thing so I appreciate that this
 15 is now coming before Council because I do believe that it
 16 is very timely, and it fits the needs of those in our
 17 communities.
 18 MR. MACEY: Okay. Thank you very much. Mr.
 19 Futules? Yeah, you can go.
 20 MR. FUTULES: Okay. Thanks. Well, first of
 21 all, I want to make the point that this is a motion and
 22 not an ordinance like Tom said. So this is us merely
 23 suggesting that the Port Authority themselves look into
 24 the fact that --- is there proper funding by COVID money,
 25 and then that's something that they'll have to examine
 26 themselves before they make a determination if they want
 27 to continue with the funding of non-fares.
 28 So basically we are suggesting to them to look
 29 into it and we say, well, you --- you --- you make the
 30 decision whether you want to do this or not. It's not our
 31 decision, but we support if you do make whatever decision
 32 you do make. I --- I believe that's what this motion is
 33 about. So --- and that's it for me. I'm good.
 34 MR. MACEY: Futules.
 35 MR. BARKER: Hallam. Bethany is next.
 36 MR. MACEY: Beth, you already spoke, so if you
 37 don't mind we'll skip to the next Council person.
 38 MS. HALLAM: I do not mind. Thank you.
 39 MR. MACEY: You're welcome.
 40 Mr. BARKER: That'd be Ms. Kirk.
 41 MR. MACEY: Ms. Kirk?
 42 MS. KIRK: Thank you. I have some concerns
 43 because once again we just received this without time to
 44 do much research on, and I know Port Authority is
 45 currently performing a fare program study and review

1 this motion and I am in favor of it, and I just want to

 19 administration, from anyone that they deem appropriate to
 20 give information so an adequate decision can be generated,
 21 whether to support or reject this motion.
 22 So I urge the Chairman to take this under
 23 advisement, to appoint a special committee to review and
 24 consider and bring us a --- and bring back to Council a
 25 recommendation, whether that they endorse or abstain from
 26 this motion.
 27 MR. BAKER: If that's a motion, I would
 28 second that.
 29 MS. KIRK: Thank you.
 30 MR. MACEY: Well, I believe that the motion
 31 speaks for itself, and we as Council can either vote for
 32 it or against it, and we're sending the message. As
 33 far as investigating any further, I'll take that into ---
 34 into advisement and I would --- my committee would be a

 22 know, and her enthusiasm for wanting to do this. I really
 23 appreciate that. I really do, the spirit which this is
 24 intended. Please, but can we start at some point before
 25 we do anything like this to --- to discuss this or have
 26 this at least a week or two before the next meeting so
 27 that we can have a chance to digest everything that's
 28 being said and to get the --- but again, because it's not
 29 an ordinance, but a motion, I'll support this, but I would
 30 hope in the future --- with a caveat, hope in the future
 31 that we would get informed and be informed before any
 32 motions or any --- any ordinances --- well, usually the
 33 ordinances are all right because they usually go to
 34 Committee. But in the --- in the --- in the cases of
 35 motions from now on if we could have a little bit more
 36 time to digest these things I'd appreciate it. Thank you,
 37 and I'll support this.
 38 MR. MACEY: Thank you, Councilman. Mr.
 39 Palmosina?
 40 MR. PALMOSINA: Thank you, Mr. President. I
 41 agree. I think we need some time limits on how long we
 42 have to --- to get a motion or any change of legislation.
 43 We need some time to digest it like Councilwoman Kirk

 18 MR. MACEY: Public comment on general items?
 19 MR. BARKER: So we have, I believe, 17
 20 individuals signed up.
 21 MR. WALTON: Oh, boy.
 22 MR. BARKER: First up is Angel Gober of 1128
 23 Woodland Avenue --- Wodland (sic) Avenue, Pittsburgh. To
 24 eliminate the use of tear gas, rubber bullets and
 25 flashbang grenades within Allegheny County. I would also
 26 include eliminating the usage of all animals for policing,
 27 horses and K9s, it's past due. We need to stop over-
 28 policing our communities, and divest from police budgets
 29 and invest in resources for social activities and
 30 programs.
 31 Next up is Anne, and I'm going to butcher her
 32 last name, I apologize, Reconasuto from 1211 Orovitz
 33 Avenue, also in the City of Pittsburgh. In the name of
 34 public safety and to protect the public health of the
 35 citizens of Allegheny County, I urge you to support the
 36 ordinance amendment, Bill Number 11516-20, banning the use
 37 of tear gas, rubber bullets, flashbang grenades and other
 38 less lethal weapons in the County. I also urge you to
 39 vote to waive the Second Reading of the amendment to
 40 facilitate the passing of the ordinance, Bill Number
 41 11516-20 on Tuesday, June 9th, 2020.
 42 Next up is Margaret Zemchak of 397 Dairy Farm
 43 Road in New Kensington. She signed up to speak on the
 44 ordinance to ban the use of rubber bullets and tear gas on
 45 protests, but that was the sum total of her comment.

1 action now. As we watch militarized police forces respond
 2 to peaceful protests across the county and right here in
 3 Allegheny County, there is no time like the present to
 4 pass this ordinance. Please support this bill by voting
 5 to waive the Second Reading of this ordinance and then
 6 voting this ordinance through. You are the leader that's
 7 --- leaders of this County and we are calling on you to
 8 lead in this moment by overwhelmingly approving this
 9 ordinance. Thank you for your time.
 10 Next up is Jennifer Makovics of 5211 Stanton
 11 Avenue in the City of Pittsburgh. Please support the
 12 legislation presented before County Council to ban the use
 13 of tear gas, rubber bullets and other less lethal
 14 ordinance by police. Bill 1151 --- that must be a
 15 typographical error. Please waive a Second Reading.
 16 Children and young people are out there in the streets,
 17 and we want to guarantee that their voices can be heard
 18 without risking serious debilitating bodily injury or
 19 death.
 20 I was in East Liberty when the police used tear
 21 gas on peaceful protestors. It was horrifying, and I
 22 couldn't believe it was happening in our city. We can
 23 make sure it never happens again. This is a really simple
 24 way that anyone can support this struggle and make it
 25 safer for us to be out in the streets demanding change.
 26 Next up is Margaret Duffy of 193 Longvue Drive,
 27 also Pittsburgh. If this proposal --- if this proposal
 28 that you, the Council, are trying to pass goes through,
 29 protection of this County will be a thing of the past.
 30 The thugs, looters, gangs, rioters, et cetera will have a
 31 free hand to destroy everything they wish with no
 32 repercussions. This is not what we pay taxes for. Our
 33 police serve us every day put their lives on the line,
 34 have families who need them to be protected also. No
 35 doubt you are the royals who get protection when we, the
 36 taxpayers, get the crumbs. How dare you even think of
 37 this when strength is needed, not a smack on the wrist to
 38 these evil thugs. No to this nonsense. Keep us safe.
 39 Next up is John Rossmiller of 53 Riverview
 40 Avenue in the City of Pittsburgh. De-authorizing police
 41 to use nonlethal means of riot control to include tear
 42 gas, rubber bullets and flashbangs. Why are you not
 43 protecting the downtown businesses? Why enable looters?
 44 Next up is Carolyn Speranza of 2021 Plainview
 45 Avenue in the City of Pittsburgh. I support Bill Number

1 Next up is Emily Smith, 619 Bigelow Street,
 2 Pittsburgh, PA. Use of rubber bullets, flashbang grenades
 3 and tear gas by police officers, members of Council, I am
 4 strongly in favor of legislation that will ban the use of
 5 rubber bullets, flashbang grenades and tear gas by police
 6 officers.
 7 I moved to Pittsburgh for college in 2009. My
 8 first real experience with the Pittsburgh Police was
 9 during the G20 Summit. A can of tear gas was thrown onto
 10 the balcony of my dorm building on Forbes Avenue where
 11 students were peacefully watching the protests from above.
 12 It was not ordered to be closed. During G20, I had
 13 another friend who was shot in the face with a pepper ball
 14 as he was walking home from the cafeteria, and he's left
 15 with permanent facial scarring. He was not even part of
 16 the protests, and it is on video that he had his hands up
 17 and asking to go home from dinner. These are just two of
 18 numerous instances of excessive use of force by the police
 19 on civilians who are breaking no laws.
 20 These weapons can cause permanent damage despite
 21 being termed nonlethal, and it is unethical to use them on
 22 civilians. I feel like these changes need to be enacted
 23 as soon as possible.
 24 Next up is Nicole Rivera of 1800 Fifth Avenue in
 25 the City of Pittsburgh. Ban the use of tear gas, rubber
 26 bullets and flashbangs within this county. Waive the
 27 Second Reading of this motion. Delaying the action
 28 supports institutional racism and inequality.
 29 Linda Campbell of 2011 Scheffel Road in
 30 Pittsburgh. Nonlethal use of force for police, what
 31 alternative methods are you proposing that the police use
 32 if not tear gas, rubber bullets, et cetera? It was
 33 mentioned on the news about tear gas burning the throat
 34 and bothering the people with asthma. Throat burning sure
 35 beats being shot, and there are any number of causative
 36 agents that will give an asthmatic problems. Before I
 37 would support this ban, I want to know your alternative
 38 solutions.
 39 Next up is Erika Kestenberg of 1814 Shady Avenue
 40 in the City of Pittsburgh. I am writing to the County
 41 Council to urge you to vote to waive the Second Reading to
 42 pass Councilwoman Hallam and Councilwoman Bennett's
 43 ordinance to ban the use of tear gas, rubber bullets and
 44 flashbangs in Allegheny County. This ordinance cannot
 45 wait another two weeks to be voted on. We need this

1 11516-20, an ordinance banning the use of tear gas, rubber
 2 bullets and other less lethal forms of enforcement by the
 3 police. People and especially children and young people
 4 are in the streets exercising their democratic right to
 5 peacefully march, gather and advocate. I want to make
 6 sure that their voices can be heard without risking
 7 serious debilitating bodily injury or even death. In
 8 addition, I urge the County to waive a Second Reading.
 9 Thank you.
 10 Next up we have longer comment. This is from
 11 Charles Bryant of 11A Murray Court in Pittsburgh. I feel
 12 like a step in the right direction should begin with
 13 people. The public needs to be in charge of holding the
 14 police accountable. Video phone footage is the only
 15 protection the public has to validate claims of brutality.
 16 I would like to suggest a free public domain
 17 that gives the victims of police aggression a public
 18 platform to record and track evidence. The database
 19 should be owned and operated by the general public, not
 20 government. It should be available for --- to everyone
 21 for free. All investigations conducted by the Police
 22 Review Board should not --- should be accessible to the
 23 public here. This platform should give users the ability
 24 to tag for statistics such as --- badge numbers, police
 25 zone and suspected crime, a system that protects the
 26 identity of the victim but captures protected class
 27 information. This would give the public the ability to
 28 see if there are trends associated with their local
 29 station without jumping through hoops. This would give
 30 victims the ability to access any other incidents
 31 associated with the officer and evidence required to
 32 prosecute.
 33 Furthermore, this accountability needs to be
 34 assigned to judges and district attorneys as well. There
 35 are trends of judges systemically sentencing minorities to
 36 longer and harsher sentences. All police reports should
 37 be free and accessible to the individuals if it pertains
 38 to you. Components of this plan currently exist in the
 39 MyBurgh app, Burgh Eye View and mobilejustice.com.
 40 It is said that a person is considered innocent
 41 until proven guilty in a court of law, however, it does
 42 not feel that way. It is said that the police are here to
 43 protect and serve, however, they seem more focused on
 44 catching criminals than helping citizens.

1 When I was a kid, Rodney King was beaten on
 2 camera. There was public outcry. There was an
 3 indictment, but there was no conviction. Many years have
 4 passed and many more videos have surfaced, but now the
 5 police are murdering black women, children and men.
 6 Accountability is not optional. It must be a requirement.
 7 Today if you are arrested in Pittsburgh you are
 8 not read your rights. You may not even know what you were
 9 being charged with. A judge finally informs you of your
 10 charges via TV and seis bail. Often this occurs without
 11 the suspect even having an opportunity to speak a single
 12 word.
 13 Attending the protest on June 1st was the most
 14 patriotic act of my life. I was exercising my First
 15 Amendment rights. I had a chance to meet people from all
 16 walks of life and witness strong leadership and diversity.
 17 I was inspired by the strong women and the passion of the
 18 youth. As we marched down Center Avenue, I felt
 19 optimistic for change and proud that we decided to bring
 20 our son with us. In the midst of this, we were met by a
 21 line of rioter officers who decided to use terrorist
 22 tactics on private citizens. The fact that excessive
 23 force was used during a march against police brutality
 24 shows that we have a need for reform locally as well.
 25 The most disturbing part of the events that took
 26 place on Monday, June 1st, was the lack of integrity that
 27 was displayed. No human is perfect, but all humans are
 28 required to be accountable for their actions. A breaking
 29 news press conference was called, and the public was given
 30 a false narrative. The decision was made to deceive the
 31 city. The choice to place the best interest of the
 32 department over those they took an oath to serve. The
 33 message was given by top ranking officials, those that
 34 best represent the values of the department. These are
 35 the people that write police reports and testify in court
 36 under oath. How many lives have been ruined or lost due
 37 to reckless lack of integrity displayed that evening?
 38 These events happened at a peaceful protest during broad
 39 daylight. Just imagine being Black and getting pulled
 40 over at night, and there was only two sentences left.
 41 MR. MACEY: Jared, how much --- how much longer
 42 would it be, do you think?
 43 MR. BARKER: For that particular comment?
 44 Literally two sentences.
 45 MR. MACEY: Go ahead. Please finish it.

1 daily to accounts of election meltdowns, voter
 2 suppression, malfunctioning systems and uncounted ballots.
 3 The public's experience in the June 2nd primary
 4 feeds that narrative. For this reason we need a review of
 5 election division operations performed by independent
 6 external professionals. This will identify what's working
 7 as well as what needs to change. There is no room for
 8 errors and dysfunction like those experienced during the
 9 primary. We all want fair and accurate elections, but
 10 whether the public has confidence in Allegheny County's
 11 elections will depend on the County's timely response to
 12 the problems the public experienced.
 13 Management issues and problems are outlined
 14 below. Some are associated with the County's
 15 implementation of Pennsylvania's 2019 election reforms.
 16 Others are related to conducting an election during a
 17 pandemic, yet some are ongoing and have been around for
 18 years. All must be addressed. We recognize that some
 19 operational issues are the County's responsibilities ---
 20 responsibility while others are the state's. We will
 21 gladly work with you to advocate at the state level for
 22 necessary changes. The issues to be identified are
 23 defective quality control on accuracy of ballots sent out;
 24 a thought process used in determining resource needs; a
 25 method of consolidating polling places was inevitable and
 26 lower turnout in her opinion; problematic poll worker,
 27 recruitment training and supervision is noted; and
 28 deficient safety procedures during a pandemic is the fifth
 29 item.
 30 Last up, Marie Norman of 1139 Wightman Street,
 31 also in the City of Pittsburgh. I do not currently have
 32 faith that Allegheny County will be ready for the November
 33 election. Watching how the recent primary unfolded gives
 34 me serious pause. A number of people applied for but did
 35 not receive mail-in ballots. Others got ballots for the
 36 wrong district. Many people received duplicate ballots.
 37 Also, far too many polling locations were closed
 38 leaving voters waiting in long lines or, if they gave up
 39 and left, disenfranchised.
 40 My own experience included waiting over a month
 41 for my ballot, getting inaccurate and alarming information
 42 from the state ballot tractor --- tracker, getting
 43 information from the election's staff that directly
 44 contradicted the Board of Election's decisions and being
 45 unable to reach staff people at the elections office until

1 MR. BARKER: Another major letdown from this
 2 experience came from the press of the City of Pittsburgh.
 3 The role of the press is to conform and be a voice of the
 4 people. And that is the last complete sentence.
 5 MR. MACEY: Thank you.
 6 MR. BARKER: The next comment was submitted by
 7 Dixie Tymitz of 4735 Wallingford Street in the City of
 8 Pittsburgh. She did submit the form and called in, but
 9 did not submit a content for a --- comment.
 10 Next up is Gail Pasina of 100 Seventh Street,
 11 Apartment 304, City of Pittsburgh. I support expanding
 12 paid sick leave in Allegheny County to all workers. I'm a
 13 retired citizen without the need personally for sick
 14 leave. However, I view paid sick leave as being essential
 15 to public health. This has been demonstrated vividly
 16 during the corona virus pandemic. Workers --- workers
 17 should not have to choose between coming to work sick and
 18 losing a day's pay. It is also a matter of equity. The
 19 lack of paid sick leave disproportionately harms women and
 20 people of color, which we know from a major study last
 21 year is a big issue in this region.
 22 Next up is Neepa Majumdar of 5501 Beverly Place,
 23 City of Pittsburgh. Even though my family of three mailed
 24 three ballots a week before the primary only two were
 25 received. This means one of us did not get their vote
 26 counted in the primaries. My question is who will be
 27 accountable for this situation? I know it is not the post
 28 office because the other two ballots were received. I
 29 also know that when we applied for mail-in ballots, the
 30 election office form marked our mail-in ballot status as
 31 mailed weeks before they were actually in the mail causing
 32 great confusion and stress. When we finally received our
 33 ballots, the actual postmark was the previous day. So
 34 it's not the USP's fault that our ballot wasn't counted.
 35 We are a family that has never missed voting in
 36 any election. This if the first election in which one of
 37 us felt disenfranchised. What will you do to prevent this
 38 from happening in the presidential election in November?
 39 Next up is Juliette Sovan of 1318 Malvern
 40 Avenue, also in the City of Pittsburgh. An excerpt from a
 41 memo to the Board of the Elections, introduction and list
 42 of problems. The problems experienced during the June 2nd
 43 primary in Allegheny County eroded public trust. The
 44 stakes in the November election are enormously high. The
 45 people are paying close attention. The public is exposed

1 my state representative's office contacted them on my
 2 behalf. These problems taken together are unacceptable
 3 and alarming. They erode faith in voting at a time when
 4 public confidence and election integrity is at an all-time
 5 low, and concerns about voter and disenfranchisement are
 6 sky high and they could have been prevented with better
 7 planning and management.
 8 As we face what may be the consequential
 9 election of our lifetime, one where the fate of the
 10 country may rest in the balance, I am calling on you to
 11 take these problems to take these problems very, very
 12 seriously, and request an outside audit of EO processes.
 13 The public needs to know precisely how these problems will
 14 be addressed, and we need guarantees that by the general
 15 election this process will be a well-oiled machine. The
 16 stakes are enormously high and we cannot afford more
 17 mistakes.
 18 MR. MACEY: Thank you, Mr. Barker. And as
 19 always, I think you do a great job at reading ordinances,
 20 text and letters to us.
 21 MR. BARKER: Thank you.
 22 MR. MACEY: I want to apologize to my colleagues
 23 here. I've omitted the liaison reports. Does anybody
 24 have a liaison report? Any liaison reports?
 25 MS PRIZIO: Yes. This is --- this is Anita
 26 Prizio. I just want to make sure I shared Steven
 27 Quohanson's report from the Friends of North Park. I
 28 think everybody got that, their agenda. Right?
 29 MR. MACEY: Okay. Any other comments? May I
 30 have a motion to adjourn?
 31 MR. WALTON: So moved.
 32 (Chorus of seconds.)
 33 MR. MACEY: Meeting is adjourned.
