                                          either location for current COVID-19 infection. That was the sum total of his comment.

And the third is Sadie Powers of 1707 Rhine Street in the City of the Pittsburgh. I support the ordinance to test inmates at the ACZ for COVID-19, but the
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                                      ordinance to test immates at the ACJ for COVID-19, but the easiest way to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in the ACJ is to end cash bail and release the 81 percent of inmates who are currently housed there and have not been convicted of a crime, as well as decrease the number of people exposed to the illness by reducing the number of people processed daily at the ACJ. Current number is roughly 100 people processed there each day. Most of the arrests being made are for nonviolent acts, which surely can be handled with a citation instead of an arrest, if any conviction --- if any action is even needed at all.
