



Child safety game is an engaging way to deliver important information

Parents and caregivers now have a new, fun way to refresh their knowledge around how to keep children safe.

The <u>iLookOut</u> trivia game was created by the Office of Community Relations (OCR) in partnership with Sarah Dore, learning & development director of the Penn State College of Medicine Department of Humanities' <u>iLookOut</u> for Child Abuse program. In the game, which is similar to Jeopardy, players watch quick videos on a variety of child safety topics and then earn points for each question they answer correctly. Topics include safe sleep, determining when a child is ready to stay home alone, the importance of never shaking a baby, home childproofing and choosing an appropriate caregiver.

"Keeping children safe is so important," said Bobbi Donovan of OCR, who wrote the game and coordinated its creation. "While we have developed child safety brochures and have information on our website, we know that not all parents and caregivers have access to – or are aware of – those resources. This game is just another way to let the public know that a bit of planning and preparation can make a big difference when it comes to keeping kids safe."
