 39 MR. SZYMANSKI: Proclamation recognizing and
 40 commending departing Allegheny County Council Member
 41 Michael J. Finnerty for his dedication and service to the
 42 residents of Allegheny County. Sponsored by Council
 43 Members Means, Baker, DeMarco, Macey, Kress, Kirk, Klein,
 44 Martoni, Palmiere, Futules and DeFazio.

1 WHEREAS, a graduate of Duquesne University, Mr.
 2 Finnerty is a retired educator, having taught in the
 3 Chartiers School District for 30 ---
 4 MR. FINNERTY: Chartiers Valley.
 5 MR. MACEY: --- Chartiers Valley, Chartiers ---
 6 oh, Chartiers Valley School District for 30 years. He
 7 served as president of the Chartiers Valley Federation of
 8 Teachers for two years and coached the Chartiers Valley
 9 School District for 23 years; and
 10 WHEREAS, Mr. Finnerty is an active member of his
 11 community including the Scott Township Civil Service
 12 Board, Sons of the American Legion, Chairman of Scott
 13 Township Democratic Committee, Scott Township Conservancy,
 14 Friends of Scott Township Library, AOH Division Number 32,
 15 AARP 1455, Western Pennsylvania PA State Council of Senior
 16 Citizens, the Allegheny County Labor Council, Montour Run
 17 Watershed Association and the Montour Trail Council. Wow.
 18 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOVLED, that the
 19 Allegheny County Council, on behalf of the citizens of
 20 Allegheny County, hereby recognize the Honorable Michael
 21 J. Finnerty for his contributions to Allegheny County
 22 Council and the enhancement of the wellbeing of the
 23 County's citizens. Mr. Finnerty acted always in the best
 24 interests of his constituents of Allegheny County. And
 25 his unwavering commitment to Council serves as an
 26 exemplary model of leadership. This Council thanks him
 27 for his 11 years of dedicated public service and wishes
 28 him well as he moves into the future.
 29 Congratulations, my friend.
 30 (Applause.)
 31 MR. FINNERTY: Thank you. Well, thank you, very
 32 much. There's not a whole lot I can say after that. I
 33 don't know if it's really me you're talking about. But I
 34 really thank everyone that has made it possible for us to
 35 move forward. I mean, we started here, I guess it was in
 36 '05, and I've been reelected three times. I thank my
 37 constituents that they had such faith in me to send me
 38 here three times. I also thank the County Council people
 39 that are here at the moment and County Council members for
 40 their support, their knowledge, sometimes their
 41 aggravation, that made me think of something differently.
 42 I think it's important you have a little discussion and a
 43 little aggravation in your life because it moves you in
 44 another direction sometimes. Maybe it's not the correct

1 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Mike? I mean, Bob,
 2 Representative Macey.
 3 MR. MACEY: Michael, would you join me, please?
 4 It's an honor and privilege to recognize a colleague who
 5 has the opportunity to move on to a new venture. And I
 6 say it's bittersweet because I came just a few months
 7 after Michael was sworn into office. And he's been a
 8 mentor, an educator, a true public servant and more
 9 importantly, a darn good friend. Sometimes we would be
 10 talking about issues, and I was gung-ho and I wanted to do
 11 this and do that. And Michael would say, Bob, you may not
 12 want to do that, and you know, he was right. He was
 13 right. I think I could speak for my colleagues, that
 14 we're going to miss a good man, a man who took his work
 15 seriously. And probably, I don't want to take this away
 16 from any of my colleagues, spent more time in this
 17 building than any one of us, maybe more than a half a
 18 dozen of us, because he worked. He worked feverishly,
 19 honestly and with the best intention of serving not only
 20 his district, but all of Allegheny County.
 21 NOW, WHEREAS, throughout the history of
 22 Allegheny County and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania,
 23 talented officials who possess great knowledge and
 24 determination exhibit exemplary leadership in elected
 25 positions and do contribute invariably to our communities,
 26 our county and our world --- our world, Michael --- and
 27 WHEREAS, The Honorable Michael J. Finnerty was
 28 elected on November 8th, 2005 and was duly sworn into
 29 office on January 3rd, 2006. Because of his leadership,
 30 confidence and community presence, he was reelected on
 31 November 3rd, 2009 and on November 5th, 2013 by the
 32 residents of District 4 to serve as their representative;
 33 and
 34 WHEREAS, during his tenure on County Council,
 35 Mr. Finnerty was appointed Chairman of the Budget and
 36 Finance Committee and Chairman of the Education Committee.
 37 How appropriate for being a teacher. He also served as a
 38 member of the Appointment Review, Economic Development and
 39 Housing, Executive, Government Reform, Marketing, Parks,
 40 Public Safety and Public Works Committees. Mr. Finnerty
 41 demonstrated a strong interest in the County's financial
 42 health and recently spearheaded efforts to raise the
 43 stipends and salaries for Council members and the County
 44 Executive to increase the spending accounts of Council
 45 members; and

1 direction because I think mine is, but anyhow, it does
 2 make you think of it another way, and that's important.
 3 I also thank the Chief Executive, and we have
 4 Jen here that with us from the very beginning, and Sonya,
 5 who is not here, but was with us in the very beginning.
 6 We thank you for what you've done for us --- what you've
 7 done for me, anyhow. And Rich, who was the president at
 8 the time. I've learned a lot in that time as we went on.
 9 A lot about how to get along with people, how to say
 10 things a little differently. I was kind of backward when
 11 I first started, but I think as we proceeded and people
 12 taught me different things about how to talk and how to do
 13 things that we proceeded in a great way. And I think if
 14 we look at what we've done in regard to just our budget
 15 and how it's moved forward, and how we've come about doing
 16 the Capital Budget and taking it from \$50 million to \$105
 17 million today in three years. To get rid of our onetime
 18 efforts that we went so --- such a difficult in the
 19 beginning, in '06 and '07 and so on, to today, where we
 20 look at --- we have a balance budget. We have a surplus
 21 that has got to be envied by everyone. And it's an
 22 important thing.
 23 And all our directors who do such a great job,
 24 make our life much easier because when we call you, you do
 25 something for us. You call our constituents. You at
 26 least recognize them and that's extremely important as we
 27 go along.
 28 And I just want to thank you for that. And I
 29 want to thank my wife for putting up with me because
 30 sometimes --- I'm a handful at times, but she seems to
 31 calm me down now and then. So I'd just like to say I
 32 thank everyone. And we thank our solicitor here and all
 33 our staff. Our staff is great. I mean, they make us look
 34 good no matter how bad we look, and that's important. I
 35 think we really appreciate that as we go along. And
 36 that's part of our staff right there (indicating) --- was
 37 at one time. Yeah, that's right, for sure. And I
 38 appreciate everything. I don't want to say too much
 39 because you've already said too much about me. But I
 40 thank you very much for everything and wish you the
 41 greatest. God bless you and keep on moving forward.
 42 Thank you.
 43 (Applause.)
 44 MR. MACEY: We did a tour the other day of the
 45 good old courthouse and saw its age and what have you.

1 But someone come up with a great idea about maybe
 2 presenting Michael J. Finnerty with a roof tile from this
 3 ageless building. And there you are, sir
 4 MR. FINNERTY: Is that that old roof?
 5 (Applause)
 6 MR. FINNERTY: Thank you very much.
 7 (Picture taken.)
 8 MR. SZYMANSKI: Up next 9941-16. Proclamation
 9 congratulating Mr. Joseph Catanese upon the occasion of
 10 his retirement after 35 years of dedicated service to
 11 Allegheny County. Sponsored by Council Members DeFazio,
 12 Baker, DeMarco, Ellenbogen, Finnerty, Futules, Kirk,
 13 Klein, Kress, Macey, Martoni, Means, Palmiere,
 14 Ranalli-Russell and Walton.
 15 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. Well, before I read
 16 this proclamation, I think, almost everybody in the County
 17 knows Joe Catanese. I mean, you find that out every day.
 18 Someone says I worked with Joe. I worked with Joe. And I
 19 haven't heard no one say that he's done a bad job.
 20 Everyone always says he's done a good job and they could
 21 always count on him. I know when it come to Council, we
 22 asked for something, he always did it. Never a problem
 23 with Joe. He was always there. He never missed a beat.
 24 You could always count on him. So we really appreciate
 25 that, Joe.
 26 MR. FUTULES: Bring him up.
 27 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: And I got this proclamation.
 28 I'll skip a few whereases. Come on up. I don't know if
 29 your wife and children want to come up. No? Come on.
 30 Everybody that comes up gets \$1,000. It's Monopoly money.
 31 Also, Jan and Rick, do want to come up, also? No? He
 32 considers you guys part of his family. Why don't you just
 33 come up? No? Okay. No \$1,000. No Monopoly money.
 34 I'm going to skip a few of the whereases, but
 35 I'll get some of them there.
 36 Throughout his 35 years of service, Joe's
 37 leadership and passion for delivering quality service to
 38 the citizens of Allegheny County, especially its senior
 39 citizens, have endeared him to many; and
 40 WHEREAS, Joe, a long-time resident of West Deer
 41 Township has always been deeply involved in his community
 42 including the West Deer Township Sewage Commission, Deer
 43 Lakes Board of School Directors' annual Deer Lakes Senior
 44 Citizens holiday luncheon, and other school functions, and

1 and Rick Swartz, who was president of Council at the one
 2 time and also the current Chief Executive, Rich
 3 Fitzgerald, who was president of Council. So it meant a
 4 lot to me to do that. They gave me the opportunity and
 5 they allowed me to do things, and they always put it that
 6 I knew where all the bodies were or I knew how to find the
 7 answers to where they were.
 8 But I think the other thing that I want to say
 9 --- and I did tell County Manager Willie McKain, I believe
 10 it was a couple of weeks back in a special services
 11 meeting that --- how much I just appreciate his directors
 12 that he has. They had the opportunity to work with me,
 13 and I had the opportunity to work with them. A lot of
 14 them I go back with them. When I started with the County,
 15 they're still here. Jack Exler is still here. And it's
 16 just been a pleasure working with them. And all the
 17 problems we had with county roads, how it was nice to know
 18 that I could call over there and talk to Shanley or talk
 19 to Dylan and get some things done. And knowing that
 20 Willie always supported those things and we moved forward.
 21 And obviously, Willie worked for the Chief
 22 Executive, so credit goes to the Chief Executive also. I
 23 don't want to take it away from you. And Jen, being the
 24 Chief of Staff over there and the rest of the staff over
 25 there.
 26 But I just want to say thanks to the staff here
 27 at Council. I really, really appreciate everything you've
 28 done for me. And I know at times it wasn't always fun.
 29 We had our differences on how we did things, how we didn't
 30 do things, but we always worked them out. And I think
 31 moving on, you will continue to do those things. Just
 32 remember, look out for Council. Always look out for them
 33 and give them the best that you can. And I always use the
 34 word, finish. And if you notice, Mike Tomlin uses that
 35 word, too, finish. Get it done. Just finish it.
 36 And I just want to thank all the directors. And
 37 I want to wish Councilman Finnerty the best of luck. But
 38 I think most importantly, before I conclude there, I want
 39 to thank my wife Gina, my daughter Ashley and my son Joe
 40 for being there all the time. There was a lot of times
 41 when I was at meetings or doing different things, that I
 42 didn't have the opportunity to be at their functions. And
 43 I hope they understand that and they understand now the
 44 things that I have done. And even the row officers, I'd
 45 like to thank them, too; Sheriff Mullen, John Weinstein,

1 as an enthusiastic Eucharistic minister and pastoral
 2 counsel for St. Victor parish; and
 3 WHEREAS, Joe, a registered official in football,
 4 has been honored to officiate the Pennsylvania
 5 Interscholastic Athletic Association, the PIAA Finals, and
 6 the Western Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic League,
 7 WPIAL playoffs. Joe, is the recipient of the Anthony
 8 Notorro (phonetic) Award for his distinguished
 9 achievements as a referee and was selected as one of the
 10 first honorees of the Distinguished Alumni of Deer Lakes
 11 School District; and
 12 WHEREAS, Joe looks forward to spending more time
 13 with his wife of more than 40 years, Gina, and his two
 14 children, Ashley and Joseph, the family beloved dog,
 15 Bailey --- where's the dog --- Bailey --- and expanding
 16 his services to St. Victor's Parish and the community.
 17 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Allegheny
 18 County Council hereby honors, expresses its sincere
 19 appreciation of Mr. Joe Catanese for his 15 years of
 20 dedication and service to Allegheny County, and the
 21 citizens of the Council wishes him health and happiness in
 22 all of the --- all his been (sic) in his future endeavors.
 23 I guess I'd better start bringing my reading
 24 glasses. It's getting tougher to see these words. Joe,
 25 I'm going to present you with the thing. If you want to
 26 say a few words?
 27 (Applause.)
 28 MR. CATANESE: I just want to say thank you.
 29 And I never anticipated that. I really appreciate that
 30 And I've just got to say on behalf of Council, thank you
 31 so much for giving me the opportunity. And it goes back a
 32 few years, and it goes back to Commissioner Tom Foerster,
 33 who had a little bit of thought and gave me a position
 34 with the County. And I started in Economic Development a
 35 number of years ago. And I worked for a gentleman named
 36 James Dodaro, if anybody knows him. And it was a real,
 37 real, real great experience to do that. And as we went on
 38 and we moved up and we did different things in the
 39 Council, changed the Home Rule Charter and changed the
 40 Council.
 41 Then I had the opportunity to come here and work
 42 for Council. And I want to thank the former Council
 43 members who were on Council at that time for giving me

 5 phone calls I've received from some judges and some other
 6 people that have sent their best.
 7 So I want to say thank you very much. I wish
 8 you the best and my number is in the phone book. Thank
 9 you.
 10 (Applause.)
 11 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Rick Swartz wanted to say a
 12 few words.
 13 MR. SWARTZ: I was going to get after you. You
 14 almost forgot Jan.
 15 MR. CATANESE: I saved the best for last.
 16 MR. SWARTZ: I really don't have too much to
 17 say. When Council first started, I was --- had the
 18 privilege of being on it and we had on staff. And we had
 19 to start. Joe had happened to leave the County for a
 20 while. And so for anyone that thinks that Joe did a good
 21 job at Council, I brought him back. I hired him. Anyone
 22 that thinks that he did it bad, don't know anything. But
 23 I really wanted to be here. I came in with Joe and I
 24 might as well see him out. So good luck. Good luck,
 25 Gina.
 26 (Applause.)
 27 MR. FINNERTY: Could I say something, John?
 28 MR. FUTULES: Don't forget his title.
 29 MR. FINNERTY: Can I say something? Yeah, thank
 30 you. Joe, I want to thank you for everything you've done.
 31 I mean, you made me look good when things weren't looking
 32 good. And I really appreciate that. And wish you the
 33 best as you go on. And Gina, God love you. You're going
 34 to have to put up with him now. But thank you very much
 35 for everything. We appreciate it. God bless you.
 36 MR. CATANESE: Thank you.
 37 (Applause.)
 38 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. We just --- it just
 39 so happens there was another tile that fell off and we got
 40 it. You're lucky, Joe.
 41 MR. CATANESE: Boy, I'm lucky today. Thank God
 42 we put that in the budget.
 43 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Maybe some more will fall
 44 off. Anyway, it says here, Joe Catanese, Chief of Staff,
 45 Allegheny County Council with a picture of the County and

1 everything. This is nice. Here, Joe. Cash that in,
 2 you'll get a lot of money for it.
 3 (Applause.)
 4 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Here's your proc, too.
 5 (Pictures taken.)
 6 MR. SZYMANSKI: Next up, 9942-16. Let the
 7 record also reflect that Council Member Kress is present
 8 9942-16. Certificate of Achievement awarded to
 9 the Chartiers Valley High School Boys' Soccer Team for
 10 winning the 2016 WPIAL Class AAA boys' soccer
 11 championship. Sponsored by Council Members Finnerty and
 12 Means.
 13 MR. FINNERTY: Thank you. Would the Chartiers
 14 Valley team come up and the Athletic Director, Angie
 15 Potthoff? Some of them can be over here (indicating),
 16 some over here (indicating). We'll get half and half. I
 17 mean, just like you take the field; right?
 18 I want to thank you for coming down. Sorry,
 19 none of the MacKenzies could be here. MacKenzie,
 20 MacKenzie, MacKenzie, but we're glad you're here. Who's
 21 the captain of this team? And your name is?
 22 MR. TINNEY: Sean Tinney.
 23 MR. FINNERTY: I thought that was it. Are you a
 24 Tinney from Heidelberg?
 25 MR. TINNEY: Yeah.
 26 MR. FINNERTY: Oh, gosh. That's good. Tinneys
 27 are good. Tinneys are good. This is the fifth title for
 28 CV in soccer, and I'm going to let Sue Means do some
 29 presentation here and I'll read the proc or do you want me
 30 to talk?
 31 MS. MEANS: Oh, I ---.
 32 MR. FINNERTY: Oh, I'm talking. Okay. I can do
 33 that.
 34 MS. MEANS: I'll add to it.
 35 MR. FINNERTY: You'll add to it. All right.
 36 Well, it's the fifth title and CV, when I was there, and I
 37 retired in '99, was --- I believe, some of the MacKenzies
 38 were there then at that time. And we had some powerful
 39 teams come out of there. Especially a lot of people that
 40 played for Beedlay (phonetic) coming out of Char Valley at
 41 that time. And I guess that's happening again; right? I
 42 thought so.
 43 Well, it's really great to have you here and
 44 finally we're back on track. And I think you're going to
 45 stay on track now that you have a MacKenzie, MacKenzie,

1 them play and grow as a team and just compete. So it was

 4 But thank you and go Colts.

 7 also --- I think you were also the Most Valuable Player;
 8 weren't you, in that?
 9 MR. TINNEY: In the Almanac, I believe.
 10 MR. FINNERTY: In the Almanac. All right.
 11 Sean, do you want to say a few words?
 12 MR. TINNEY: Yeah, sure.
 13 MR. FINNERTY: Here's your Captain.
 14 MR. TINNEY: I think Sue really hit the nail on
 15 the head. It was our hard work and dedication to the
 16 program that got us here. The MacKenzie brothers took
 17 over the program three years ago. Going from a losing
 18 seasons to this winning season is --- it feels really good
 19 especially to do it with a team that is so close to me and
 20 at a school that I've been at for all my life so it's
 21 definitely nice to have success. And I wish the best of
 22 luck to the program in the future, so ---. And thank you
 23 for giving me this opportunity, so ---.

 36 MR. SZYMANSKI: 9943-16. Proclamation declaring

 40 9944-16. Certificate of Achievement presented

 2 they had, it was MacKenzie that scored the goal that led to
 3 that title. So we'll let Sue talk.
 4 MS. MEANS: I just want to say congratulations
 5 to the team. It was your hard work and diligence that got
 6 you here. So today is the day to celebrate. And I want
 7 to challenge you to pursue the rest of your life with hard
 8 work and diligence and you'll have success. So
 9 congratulations, again.
 10 MR. FINNERTY: You can read it.
 11 MS. MEANS: I'll read it. Okay. Thank you.
 12 From the offices of --- this is from the Office
 13 of Allegheny County Council, a Certificate of Achievement
 14 awarded to Chartiers Valley High School, the 2016 Boys'
 15 Soccer Team. This Certificate of Achievement is awarded
 16 to the 2016 Chartiers Valley School Boys' Soccer Team in
 17 recognition of winning the 2016 WPIAL Class AAA Boys'
 18 Soccer Championship. Whoop. We commend and recognize each
 19 player and coach whose determination and resolve led to
 20 this achievement. The team has set a positive example of

 24 an accomplishment which the entire community can be very
 25 proud today, sponsored by Council Member Michael Finnerty
 26 and myself and presented on the 20th day of December,
 27 2016. Congratulations.
 28 (Applause.)
 29 MR. FINNERTY: That's why we let Ms. Means read
 30 it because she gets excited about these things. But Angie
 31 Potthoff, do you want to come up and say a few words?
 32 This is the AD of Chartiers Valley High School.
 33 MS. POTTHOFF: I have to put it up a little bit
 34 (adjusts microphone).
 35 MR. FINNERTY: There you go.
 36 MS. POTTHOFF: I'm Angie Potthoff, the Athletic
 37 Director, and our coaches apologize. When you have a
 38 MacKenzie, a MacKenzie and a MacKenzie as your coaches, a
 39 family event, you kind of lose them all to a family event
 40 so they apologize for not being here. And thank the whole
 41 Council for having us here. It's a great honor to be here
 42 and to represent our school, and particularly Council
 43 Member Means and also Finnerty for having us here today.
 44 So we really appreciate it. Our kids had a great year and
 45 they battled all the way. And it was really fun to watch

1 the rank of Eagle Scout. Sponsored by Council Member
 2 Futules.
 3 9946-16. Certificate of Achievement presented
 4 to Mr. Daniel Weight of Boy Scout Troop 854 upon earning
 5 the rank of Eagle Scout. Sponsored by Council Member
 6 Futules.
 7 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: At this time, we'd have the
 8 Chief Executive's Quarterly Address.
 9 (Applause.)
 10 COUNTY EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Thank you, Mr.
 11 President, Members of Council. I'm just here because I
 12 think you're giving away \$1,000; right? Do I get the
 13 \$1,000?
 14 No, but I have a good announcement for you
 15 toward the end of my address which I think will be pretty
 16 positive.
 17 First of all, before I get started, I do want to
 18 congratulate and thank Councilman Finnerty. I did serve a
 19 number of years, six years, with Mike. We worked together
 20 very well. And I do wish him well. I know he's going to
 21 do a good job in the district that he's going to be
 22 helping represent, the new representative out in the State
 23 Representative District, Anita.
 24 I also want to thank Joe for his work and
 25 congratulate him. Give him best wishes. It is also great
 26 to see Rick and Jan back. It's good to see folks who I
 27 served with for so many years and many of you.
 28 I also want to congratulate the members of
 29 Council who are finishing their first year. I think it
 30 was a very good productive year and I think you should be
 31 very proud of the work we all did together, working
 32 together. I want to thank you passing the budget that you
 33 did a couple of weeks ago. I think the folks, the people
 34 of Allegheny County, again, can be very pleased that for
 35 the 15th time in the last 16 years there was no millage
 36 increase on their property tax. It's kept a lot of
 37 stability and adding lot of growth and a lot of investment
 38 for both domestic, residential and commercial/industrial
 39 in this region. It was a very good budget with no onetime
 40 revenue sources. I think again, that's something you can
 41 be very proud of, that you pushed that and passed that.
 42 And an increase in the fund balance, which has occurred
 43 really over the last number of years to put us into a more
 44 financially stable condition. Bond rating has gone up, et
 45 cetera.

1 Also, when I was here last quarter, talked about
 2 the road paving project, and I think, if I remember right,
 3 I was hoping that we would hit 54 miles which would have
 4 been more miles in paving than we had done in decades,
 5 maybe ever. And I'm actually here tonight to report that
 6 we did 58 miles. And I really want to congratulate the
 7 Director Shanley ---
 8 (Applause.)
 9 COUNTY EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: --- with the Public
 10 Works Department, really was able to do with a lot of
 11 initiatives working with the County Manager to get those
 12 two new machines, the milling machine and paving machine
 13 that are in-house that we used to lease and we used to
 14 rent, in addition to the fee that we passed a little over
 15 a year ago. And with good weather and great work ethic
 16 from the folks who were out there doing this. And I can
 17 tell you, they were excited about it. They were excited
 18 about the work that they were doing throughout the summer
 19 and into the fall. And I'm sure you've heard it in your
 20 district. I've certainly heard it around this County from
 21 people that really appreciate the fact that we've improved
 22 the road. You know, obviously, the bridges we're going to
 23 be doing next year --- the capital budget that you also
 24 passed a few weeks ago. We're going to be doing not just
 25 the Andy Warhol Bridge, the Seventh Street Bridge, but the
 26 Philip Murray Bridge, the Tenth Street on the South Side,
 27 among many other projects. We just cut the ribbon in
 28 Councilman Macey's district, Chairman Macey, Chairman of
 29 the Public Works Committee, the Homeville Bridge which
 30 really is a great link in West Mifflin for the folks in
 31 that community.
 32 And I think, again, the investment we've been
 33 making over the last number of years in our infrastructure
 34 is very positive for the people in Allegheny County and in
 35 western Pennsylvania.
 36 I also want to talk a little bit about parks.
 37 We took a tour. Councilman Futules couldn't make it, but
 38 his park and Councilman Kress' park that they represent in
 39 --- at Deer Lakes Park, to get a kind of a glimpse, a
 40 sneak preview, if you will, of the ribbons we're going to
 41 be cutting next year on over a little over \$2 million,
 42 about \$2.2 million of investment from the royalties we got
 43 on the work that you approved a couple of years ago. New
 44 pavilions, a new playground that's absolutely fantastic,
 45 new bathrooms. You can actually see the water in the lake

1 now. You couldn't see it before with all the vegetation
 2 that had grown over. It looks terrific. New benches for
 3 people to be able to enjoy those lakes, who can sit there.
 4 New pedestals for the fisher --- for the fishermen to be
 5 able to work on. Electricity to some of the pavilions
 6 that weren't there before. Some of the shelters,
 7 particularly trout and minnow shelters. The Wegman
 8 Observatory improvements. So really, really some good
 9 stuff that we can all be very proud of. And again, we'll
 10 be cutting some ribbons next spring on some of those
 11 improvements. And I know for the folks who live in that
 12 area, Councilman Kress, you know, has already heard, and I
 13 know Councilman Futules, from their constituents. It's
 14 really work that hadn't been done in that park. It was
 15 almost in some ways one of the forgotten parks, and we're
 16 glad to see the work that's done there.
 17 Other parks got about a million and a half of
 18 work; exercise equipment, North Park, the tennis and
 19 pickle ball area, new deck hockey bleachers. Hartwood
 20 Acres, the formal garden and now we're going to be doing
 21 some work at the wedding pavilion that Councilman Futules
 22 had given us some good advice on with his expertise.
 23 Settler's Cabin, new deck hockey, basketball courts
 24 updated. And I know we did a --- the County Nine, you
 25 guys, Councilman Baker, DeMarco and Finnerty were there.
 26 The Parks Foundations are putting on these 5 and 10K races
 27 through all nine of our county parks. And it was a little
 28 chilly that day. But we were out doing our best. And
 29 Councilman Baker actually ran. The rest of us just shot
 30 the gun and waved and cheered everybody else on. But
 31 Councilman Baker was out there running. So that was good.
 32 The smart ones. Yeah, I don't know about that. I don't
 33 know about that, Tom.
 34 And then some work at the White Oak playground;
 35 new gabazo, wedding garden, in the planning, a new
 36 playground, et cetera, so a lot of good things that were
 37 done.
 38 You may have seen in the paper today, we finally
 39 finalized a new four-year deal with the Port Authority
 40 drivers and mechanics. You know, it's very good. You
 41 know, everybody helped out in that --- in the cooperation.
 42 Transit obviously is a big thing, and you know, with Act
 43 89 a couple of years ago, to be able to continue to
 44 improve our transportation system is one of the things

1 we're going to continually have to work on together to
 2 make sure this region grows in a sustainable way.
 3 The airport, the last time I was here, we talked
 4 about some new flights that were going to be happening.
 5 We announced just since I was here two European flights
 6 WOW Airlines is going to be flying to Iceland beginning
 7 next year, and Condor Air is going to be beginning flights
 8 to Frankfurt, Germany. So that's just a tremendous
 9 opportunity for our corporate community as well as
 10 vacationers who want to use --- be able to get to Europe.
 11 So it's very good. We also, with One Jet, announced again
 12 a couple more flights, Albany and Richmond, which again,
 13 our business community needs to be able to get back and
 14 forth, and that serves the business traveler. So we're
 15 excited about the growth that continues to happen at the
 16 Pittsburgh International Airport. We're going to keep
 17 working on that. And we appreciate your support on those
 18 issues.
 19 Now, a good announcement that literally is hot
 20 off the press. Don't tell anybody. It's going to be
 21 announced tomorrow, but I'll give you a little sneak
 22 preview tonight. Allegheny County, in a very, very
 23 competitive process with the federal government, was
 24 awarded \$17.8 million in a HUD grant for our Human Service
 25 Department for homelessness in helping folks in need. I
 26 want to congratulate Director Cherna and his agency
 27 because of the support they've received and the national
 28 recognition that that department has gotten. It was a
 29 competitive grant that could have gone to any county, any
 30 region in the country, and \$17.8 million for this county
 31 to help battle homelessness is something.
 32 Congratulations, Director Cherna. I want to thank you.
 33 (Applause.)
 34 COUNTY EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: I know Amy is
 35 going to be mad at me because she was going to release
 36 that tomorrow, but we jumped the gun. And with that, Mr.
 37 President, I want to wish everybody --- take any
 38 questions, and I want to wish everybody, obviously, a
 39 happy holidays.
 40 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Futules.
 41 MR. FUTULES: Wish you all a Merry Christmas.
 42 And I do want to thank you for keeping your word two years
 43 ago when you told the people at Deer Lakes that the money
 44 would come back to them. And you meant it. Thank you.

1 COUNTY EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Well, I want to
 2 thank you and Councilman Kress. I mean, you pointed out
 3 projects that you thought were important to the folks in
 4 that community. This playground is really --- the rock
 5 climbing and the new shelter. They even have a bathroom
 6 in this playground, in this play park area, so it's really
 7 an improvement. But we were able to put \$2.2 million into
 8 this park without one dime of tax dollars so that's a
 9 great accomplishment.
 10 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Any other? Go ahead,
 11 Representative Kress.
 12 MR. KRESS: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you
 13 Mr. Chief Executive for coming down today. We took a
 14 tour, me and the Chief Executive did. And I have to say
 15 that it's remarkable what the improvements have been at
 16 the park. I mean, I used to fish at that lake and you
 17 couldn't even fish out there. It was clogged with
 18 different debris from like, you know, whatever aquatic
 19 plants, whatever it is. But they've cleaned it out. And
 20 the fact is that the park is improving a lot. A lot of
 21 time with money you actually can't see the improvements.
 22 Money goes out and you don't know where it's going to, but
 23 here, these are concrete improvements for the people in my
 24 district. And when I was running for office, the concern
 25 had been they felt that they were neglected. I'm hoping
 26 with the investment in this park the people don't feel
 27 like they're neglected anymore out in West Deer and areas
 28 that I represent, because again, this is money that didn't
 29 come from taxpayers.
 30 And again, I know we had some controversy voting
 31 on this. But at the end of the day, I made the right
 32 decision. The people who voted for it made the right
 33 decision because we care about the people in our
 34 community. And it just goes to show that this is an
 35 investment in the people. And I want to thank you for
 36 your support on this. So thank you.
 37 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Going down the line, let's
 38 start with Representative Palmiere and then we'll go ---
 39 MR. PALMIERE: Thank you, Mr. President. Mr.
 40 Fitzgerald, I want to also mention the fact and thank you
 41 for all the good work that's been done in South Park this
 42 past year with Corrigan Drive. We've been --- we've been
 43 after that for so long, to slow that traffic down. People
 44 thought it was just an annex to the parkway, flying
 45 through there, and now we have things pretty well under

1 control. And the parking lots down there that was badly
 2 neglected is all done now. It's nice to go down there and
 3 not have to hide now. You know, when I'm running before
 4 somebody'd say, there's the Councilman over there. I'd
 5 just head the other way and take off. But now that ---
 6 you know, we really have something to be proud of. And I
 7 just wanted to thank you for, you know, continuing the job
 8 that was so necessary in all of these parks. And the rest
 9 of the Council --- I know I'm Chair of the Parks and I do
 10 care about all nine parks, not just South Park. But I
 11 just wanted to mention the fact that --- Rich, that things
 12 really, really working that well down there.

13 COUNTY EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Thank you,
 14 Councilman. And let me also --- let me just really praise
 15 our --- the employees in the parks. You can really sense
 16 enthusiasm with Director Baechle, Deputy Hopson and really
 17 the whole team working together. And I have to also say,
 18 to thank you for the work of the Parks Foundation. I know
 19 there's a relationship that we're all working together
 20 bringing some private dollars, again, that they're out
 21 raising. You've seen the chimney swifts in our parks now,
 22 a great thing with the partnership with the Audubon
 23 Society. And I could go on and on, but really, it's a
 24 relationship where, you know, it's not just the
 25 government, but it's the community itself that really is
 26 pitching in and being partners with what we're doing in
 27 the parks. And you can just tell, you know, attendance
 28 was up. I know I announced that when I was here last
 29 quarter for some of the summer events. Skiing is now
 30 open. But you could just see the passion that people have
 31 for those nine county parks, those 12,000 acres. It's
 32 something we're stewards of. We want to make sure we take
 33 good care of it. And it's really working together. We're
 34 making some good things. Thank you, Chairman. I
 35 appreciate that.

36 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Walton,
 37 MR. WALTON: Thank you, Mr. President. County
 38 Executive, I'd like to personally thank you. You've
 39 gotten accolades from members of Council about the capital
 40 improvements that you've made around the County in
 41 improving the conditions of parks and facilities
 42 throughout Allegheny County. I want to personally thank
 43 you for improving human conditions in Allegheny County.
 44 A couple of meetings ago, I had the opportunity
 45 to, as part of a liaison report, to say that you, along

1 So again, we all got to work together to do
 2 those things and I think we do. It's really the work that
 3 this Council does, you know, caring about the folks that
 4 are less fortunate is something we're going to continue to
 5 work on, so I thank you.

6 (Applause.)
 7 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative DeMarco,
 8 MR. DEMARCO: County Executive Fitzgerald, I'd
 9 like to thank you for the leadership you've shown in
 10 trying to provide good government to the people of
 11 Allegheny County. As one of the Councilmen who just
 12 finished their first year on Council, I wasn't exactly
 13 sure what I was walking into when I decided to run for
 14 this office when you saw what was going on in the
 15 newspaper or what had happened sometimes in the past. But
 16 the commitment that you've shown, along with your team, in
 17 answering any of the questions that we've had, the
 18 patience they have shown in just going over something. If
 19 they had to go over it once, twice or three times to fully
 20 explain to us the parameters of a situation, what the
 21 benefits to the citizens of this County were, has been
 22 immeasurable in helping us as we move forward in this
 23 first year and all of that starts from the top. So I
 24 want to commend you on the leadership that you've shown in
 25 helping and welcome all the new members on Council here so
 26 that together we can provide good leadership and good
 27 government for the citizens of Allegheny County. Thank
 28 you.

29 COUNTY EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Well, thanks,
 30 Councilman. I'm just kind of the guy that cuts the
 31 ribbons and does the groundbreaking with some of us. We
 32 do have a great team. And I will say this, I got to spend
 33 a couple of days last week at the Kennedy School at
 34 Harvard University with the large county executives of
 35 America. That was Cook County, Chicago, Milwaukee County,
 36 El Paso, Dallas, et cetera, et cetera. And I got --- I
 37 have to tell you that the folks nationally point to what
 38 is happening here in Allegheny County. They see the
 39 economic growth. They see the young people moving in and
 40 they see really a progressive government that all of us
 41 are working on together, good government whether it's, you
 42 know, the open data, the regional data center that we did.
 43 The partnership we do in the parks that I talked about. I
 44 mean, we're being noticed about, you know, nationally.
 45 And it was a great thing for me to be able to hear and I

1 with the Mayor, signed President Obama's Second Chance
 2 Pledge. And many people in this room don't understand the
 3 impact of that and don't understand what that document
 4 was. And what it did was actually give people --- make a
 5 commitment to give folks a second chance at restoring
 6 their ability to have family-sustaining careers. Since
 7 I've been on Council, I know of at least three individuals
 8 that you given a chance to rehabilitate their lives, to
 9 have family sustaining careers and become taxpayers and
 10 become viable members of our community again. It is
 11 absolutely critical that we begin to do that. The cost of
 12 incarceration is far too high, and we have to find ways to
 13 reduce recidivism and all those kind of issues that
 14 confront our community. Thank you for your leadership.
 15 Thank you for your commitment and keep doing what you're
 16 doing. Thank you.

17 COUNTY EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Thank you, Mr.
 18 Walton. And I appreciate that, Councilman. Let me also
 19 say ---

20 (Applause.)
 21 COUNTY EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: In the region
 22 right now and particularly where we're at in the urban
 23 core, in the City of Pittsburgh, there's a lot of good
 24 things happening. There's a lot of great opportunities.
 25 We have almost 30,000 jobs right now that are unfilled. I
 26 mean, that's almost unheard of. I mean, most of when we
 27 were coming out of school, 20 years ago, it was just the
 28 opposite that. We had too many people and not enough
 29 jobs. People were leaving because there weren't enough
 30 jobs in the community. But we need to make sure that
 31 everybody from all walks of life, from neighborhoods that
 32 aren't seeing the development that might be happening in
 33 some of the --- some of the more trendy neighborhoods that
 34 we all read about --- So job training, job skills,
 35 second chances, training in our jail and in our, you know,
 36 state correctional institutions, to really not just, you
 37 know, put people away, but to give them another chance,
 38 that when they do pay their debt to society, that they can
 39 come out and have that. But you know, not everybody has
 40 the same opportunities in this country. We know that. Or
 41 in our County. But we've got to make sure --- and that's
 42 why some of the things that Director Cherna just was
 43 awarded can help to do some of those things for some of
 44 the folks that really are, you know, having a tough time

1 obviously passed it along to the County Manager and his
 2 team and the folks that he has assembled. And I'm glad
 3 they're doing that. And we want to make sure that
 4 whatever question you have about something in your
 5 district or a policy that's coming down and whether it's
 6 in the state or federal government or our partners at the
 7 municipal government, you know, we want to continue to do
 8 that. So I appreciate your work. You're no longer a
 9 rookie, right, after tonight. You guys are veterans, all
 10 the new guys that are finishing their first year. But I
 11 think it was a good, productive year. And I think we
 12 really did move this County forward. And you know, we
 13 want to continue that on into 2017.

14 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Seeing no
 15 more --- oh, wait a minute, Representative Finnerty.

16 MR. FINNERTY: Thank you. I'd just like to also
 17 thank you, Rich, for your leadership and for the people
 18 that you put in positions here. Willie does a tremendous
 19 job as manager, and Mary does a tremendous job as the
 20 Budget Director, has really helped us out since I'm the
 21 chairman of Budget and Finance. And made our job a lot
 22 easier, and we were able to talk to each other and move
 23 things around so that everybody had satisfaction up here,
 24 almost satisfaction, anyhow. But we really thank you for
 25 that. And we --- all the directors, you do a great job
 26 and you really help our citizens out. And we really
 27 appreciate it. Thank you.

28 COUNTY EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Thanks,
 29 Councilman.

30 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Seeing no more ---
 31 COUNTY EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Thank you,
 32 Councilman.

33 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you.
 34 COUNTY EXECUTIVE FITZGERALD: Enjoy. And Happy
 35 Holidays and probably see you later on tonight.

36 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Same to you.
 37 (Applause.)

38 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: 9948-16

 12 MR. FINNERTY: We'll be out of here.
 13 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Unfinished Business,
 14 Committee on Appointment Review, 9909-16.
 15 MR. SZYMANSKI: Approving the appointment of
 16 Maureen Quinn to serve as a member of the Inaugural Board
 17 of the Tri-COG Land Bank for a term to expire on December
 18 31st, 2018. Sponsored by the Chief Executive.
 19 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Kress,
 20 MR. KRESS: Thank you, Mr. President. On
 21 December 12th --- actually on December 15th, 2016 the
 22 Committee on Appointment Review met with Maureen Quinn
 23 At that time the Committee made an affirmative
 24 recommendation to her appointment. I'd like to make a
 25 motion to approve.
 26 MR. MACEY: Second.
 27 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks? Seeing none,
 28 let's take the roll. Oh, wait a minute, let's just take a
 29 vote. All those in favor signify by saying aye.
 30 (Chorus of ayes)
 31 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Opposed? The ayes have it,
 32 9911-16.
 33 MR. SZYMANSKI: Approving the reappointment of
 34 James Overton to serve as a member of the Minority
 35 Business Enterprise Advisory Committee for a term to
 36 expire on December 31, 2019. Sponsored by the Chief
 37 Executive.
 38 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Kress,
 39 MR. KRESS: Thank you, Mr. President. On
 40 December 15th, 2016, the Committee on Appointment Review
 41 met with James Overton. At that time the Committee made
 42 an affirmative recommendation to his reappointment. I'd
 43 like to make a motion to approve.
 44 MR. MACEY: Second.

1 MR. KLEIN: Yes.

 18 MR. SZYMANSKI: Ayes, 14; noes, 0. The bill
 19 passes.
 20 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: 9923-16.
 21 MR. SZYMANSKI: A Resolution of the Council of
 22 Allegheny County, Pennsylvania, made pursuant to the Local
 23 Economic Revitalization Tax Assistance Act, LERTA, Pa.
 24 Stat. Ann. Title 72, Section 4722 et. seq. (1995), as
 25 amended, providing for a program of temporary exemption
 26 from increases in Allegheny County Real Estate Property
 27 taxes, for specified time periods, resulting from
 28 improvements made by an owner of a property located within
 29 the Seventh Ward of the City of Pittsburgh, County of
 30 Allegheny, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, generally known
 31 as the Shadyside neighborhood, previously determined to be
 32 a deteriorated area, establishing a schedule for exempting
 33 increases in Allegheny County property taxes resulting
 34 from such improvements; and prescribing the requirements
 35 and procedures by which an owner of property located

 39 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Walton,

 42 December 14th, where it was affirmatively recommended by
 43 Committee for approval by the full Council. And I so
 44 move.
 45 MR. MACEY: Second.

1 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks? Seeing none,
 2 all those in favor signify by saying aye.
 3 (Chorus of ayes)
 4 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Opposed? The ayes have it,
 5 9806-16.
 6 MR. SZYMANSKI: A Resolution of the Council of

 23 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Walton,
 24 MR. WALTON: Thank you, Mr. President. The
 25 legislation was referred to our Economic Development
 26 Committee on August 30th and ultimately was heard on
 27 December 14th and was affirmative --- affirmatively
 28 recommended to Council for approval. I move that we
 29 approve the legislation.
 30 MR. MACEY: Second.
 31 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks? Seeing none,
 32 let's take the roll.
 33 MR. SZYMANSKI: Mr. Baker?
 34 MR. BAKER: Yes.

1 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks?
 2 Representative Means.
 3 MS. MEANS: Yes. I just want to make some
 4 comments on this property. And I will not be supporting
 5 the LERTA for this property because for my three years of
 6 service on Council, always the school district would ---
 7 we would use that as a rule of thumb. If the school
 8 district was not supporting the LERTA, then we were not
 9 supporting the LERTA. And I understand that this is
 10 former Reizenstein School property. And they sold the
 11 property to the builder, and when they made that
 12 arrangement they said they would not be participating in a
 13 LERTA. And so I feel that this is Phase II of the Bakery
 14 Square housing unit. And Phase I is up and running. It's
 15 doing well. Google is nearby. And I believe that these
 16 LERTAs are to help develop an area that needs help, an
 17 area that has shown that needs some encouragement for
 18 people to build there and to bring back the community. So
 19 the community is back and running and doing well. I don't
 20 feel that this needs a LERTA in this property, so I will
 21 not be supporting it. Thank you.
 22 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Other comments?
 23 Representative Finnerty?
 24 MR. FINNERTY: Thank you. The way I understand
 25 this --- and I might be wrong about this, the school
 26 district is still going to vote on this or have voted and
 27 said they will not participate?
 28 MR. WALTON: I'll have Director Hurley respond
 29 to that.
 30 MR. HURLEY: Good evening, Council members. The
 31 reason the school district did not participate is when
 32 they sold the property they felt that that was their
 33 contribution to this project. And therefore, putting
 34 additional tax dollars towards it, they did not think that
 35 was their responsibility. So they felt that they are not
 36 going to use --- these aren't their words, but they gave a
 37 good price on it, and they were not going to participate
 38 in the future of it. It's not unfamiliar to what we did
 39 when we sold the County's Health Department building in
 40 Oakland, which we said we would not put additional subsidy
 41 into it because it was a private --- publicly owned
 42 property being but on put on the tax rolls.
 43 MR. FINNERTY: Put on the tax rolls. Correct.
 44 So I just wanted to make sure everybody understood that
 45 That property is on the tax rolls at this time. ---

1 MR. HURLEY: Yes, it is.
 2 MR. FINNERTY: --- correct?
 3 MR. HURLEY: Yes.
 4 MR. FINNERTY: And would you specify how much
 5 tax they're paying?
 6 MR. HURLEY: On this portion ---
 7 MR. FINNERTY: We're talking about the land, now.
 8 MR. HURLEY: On the land value, this portion,
 9 right now, is approximately \$6,100.
 10 MR. FINNERTY: \$6,100?
 11 MR. HURLEY: Per year. We anticipate the first
 12 two years we will continue to collect that. We will ---
 13 through the course of the abatement, which is a ten year
 14 abatement, we will collect a total of what we estimate to
 15 be \$390,000 ---
 16 MR. FINNERTY: Uh-huh (yes).
 17 MR. HURLEY: --- on the property. And we will
 18 then continue in year 11 to get the full value of that for
 19 county taxes.
 20 MR. FINNERTY: Right. Well, I will support it.
 21 I think it's a very good investment. Thank you.
 22 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative DeMarco, did
 23 you have your hand up?
 24 MR. DEMARCO: My question is just meant for
 25 Director Hurley. I was going to ask about the guidelines,
 26 you know, because I wanted to understand that those were,
 27 in fact, our guidelines, that if a school district didn't
 28 participate, that we didn't go along with it. But you
 29 answered my question here when you talked about the school
 30 district felt that their contribution was in the lower
 31 price for the property that they provided. So I'm fine
 32 with that. Thank you.
 33 MR. HURLEY: Thank you.
 34 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Remarks? Go ahead,
 35 Representative Kress.
 36 MR. KRESS: I just wanted to say I support this
 37 project. I mean, the thing is with property tax, there's
 38 always a question. Like you could leave the land vacant
 39 and pay the same amount of taxes. But what we're doing
 40 here is that they're still paying money on the actual land
 41 itself. It's just that when you're actually giving people
 42 an incentive to improve the land, we're giving them a
 43 break on the taxation itself. And that's the problem, is
 44 that some people think that we're giving them a subsidy.

 37 MR. FINNERTY: I'd just like to say also Merry

 39 putting my resignation in on the 31st of this month so I
 40 will not be here in 2017. Thank you.
 41 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Walton.
 42 MR. FUTULES: Watch what you say.
 43 MR. WALTON: I'd like to close this year out by
 44 again by wishing everyone a very Merry Christmas, Happy
 45 Holidays. And also I want to say at the conclusion of my

1 rookie year in service that I really want to thank Joe

 17 we're going to miss you. I know I'm going to miss you.
 18 You've been a real tower of strength on this Council and
 19 you're the kind of Council member I think that we all try
 20 to emulate at some point in time. And I just wanted to
 21 tell you --- publicly to thank you and I wish you well,
 22 but I wish you were staying here, too.

 36 for us, for each and every one of you that it's not about
 37 being Democrat, Republican, it's what's best for our
 38 community. And that's what so great about this Council
 39 and our staff. So thank you.
 40 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Klein.
 41 MR. KLEIN: I'd also like to thank Joe for all
 42 that he has done to make my first year here a much better
 43 year than it might have otherwise been. I think that
 44 his attention to any kind of question or concern that I
 45 had was responded to immediately. And I think that all of

1 it took to get something done. He truly has set the bar
 2 on constituent service. And it's been a pleasure for me
 3 to know him and to work with him.
 4 And I also want to congratulate my colleague and
 5 my friend, Mr. Finnerty, on moving forward in his career
 6 here. When I came aboard, I sat out there in this
 7 audience and I watched some of these Council meetings.
 8 And I'm listening to everybody talk and I'm thinking, ah,
 9 this is a guy that I'm going to be going --- butting heads
 10 with, you know, because I'm watching him go. I can't tell
 11 you how much respect I have for Mr. Finnerty. And his
 12 respect for Council, his respect for the office, his
 13 respect for process and his patience in bringing us along,
 14 all of this has contributed into what has been a great
 15 year for us on Council and allowed us to work together and
 16 working with the County Executive to get so many things
 17 done on behalf of the people of Allegheny County. We are
 18 going to miss you, Mike. Thank you very much, Mr.
 19 President.
 20 MR. FINNERTY: Thank you.
 21 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Kress.
 22 MR. KRESS: Since I missed the proclamation, I
 23 apologize for both of those.
 24 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: You're going to fool us one
 25 of these days and be on time.
 26 MR. KRESS: First off, I'd just like to say,
 27 Councilman Finnerty, it's been a pleasure serving with
 28 you. I know politics isn't easy and things happen in
 29 politics, but we're here to serve the people of this
 30 County. And I think at the end of the day you were here
 31 to try to do your best efforts for the people. So thank
 32 you for serving.
 33 MR. FINNERTY: Thank you.
 34 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Real quick. I want to wish
 35 everybody ---
 36 MR. KRESS: I didn't get to thank Joe.
 37 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: I'm sorry. Go ahead.
 38 MR. KRESS: We'll keep this brief. No, Joe, I'd
 39 just like to say when I came here in 2005, I got appointed
 40 and I was just like, oh, what am I supposed to do. And
 41 you kind of really helped me out. I remember at that
 42 time, you were like, you got to watch who you say to
 43 whoever, whatever else. I want to say you were very
 44 sincere. You're very honest. And you have integrity.
 45 And that's the one thing about government, sometimes

1 us are very lucky to have had your service. And the good
 2 news is that in retirement, I don't know if you heard
 3 this, but happy hour begins at 11:00 a.m. So all the best
 4 to you.
 5 And I would also say to my friend, Mr. Finnerty,
 6 I have to say that I admire your passion and it is on full
 7 display both in this room and in our deliberations
 8 upstairs as well. And I've learned an awful lot from you.
 9 I would say that I consider you a mentor and a guide and I
 10 will certainly miss you. And I have a great deal of
 11 respect for what I would only characterize as your iron
 12 will. But this something that a lot of people don't know.
 13 Michael also has an iron stomach. And what I mean by that
 14 is that he drinks coffee that is brewed in the Council
 15 kitchen at 8:00 a.m. He's drinking it at five o'clock in
 16 the afternoon. That's what you call a death wish. Even
 17 at 8:00 a.m. it's a death wish, but nonetheless, I thought
 18 that I should say that. So we will miss you, Mike.
 19 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative ---
 20 MR. MACEY: Thank you, Mr. President, Members of
 21 Council. I certainly want to wish everybody a Merry
 22 Christmas, Happy Holidays. But one of the things I wanted
 23 --- and it's so appropriate, liaison, can you imagine the
 24 word? What's the word liaison mean? Joe was a liaison.
 25 He was a liaison with all the directors. He could take a
 26 lot of work of the director's back because he knew --- and
 27 he's heard me say this more than once --- where all the
 28 skeletons were and where the bodies were buried. In other
 29 words, he knew how to get the job done without any
 30 fanfare, without breaking anybody's neck, without doing
 31 anything illegal, but he was able to get things done. And
 32 that, to me, is the mark of a good, public servant. And
 33 I'll miss him. I talk to him almost every day. God bless
 34 you and your family, Joe. Thank you.
 35 (Applause.)
 36 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative DeMarco.
 37 MR. DEMARCO: Thank you, Mr. President. I would
 38 just --- to echo the other Council members here in
 39 congratulating and wishing the best for Mr. Joe Catanese
 40 here as he moves on. As a newbie coming into Council, you
 41 know, Allegheny County, many folks may not realize, while
 42 some folks think of us as being small, we're also very
 43 large. We have an almost \$2 billion budget. We have over
 44 6,000 employees here. And we do have a bureaucracy, so to
 45 speak. Joe knew just where to go, who to talk to or what

1 government lacks integrity. And the fact is that you have
 2 that integrity, and it makes this County a better place.
 3 And unfortunately, you're going to be leaving, but again,
 4 I thank you from the deepest parts of my heart for what
 5 you've been able to do for the people of this County, for
 6 myself, for the people on this Council. And I thank you.
 7 You have a wonderful family. And I'd just like to say, I
 8 don't know what you're going to do in retirement, but you
 9 know, if you have any questions about that or advice, let
 10 me know. Thank you.
 11 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: I'd like to wish everyone a
 12 Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year, and wish the best
 13 for Joe and Mike. I think everybody said it all. There's
 14 no sense in continuing on. Thank you, guys, everybody did
 15 a good job. So let's see what happens in the future.
 16 Best of luck.
 17 I think that's it. So we'll move down to
 18 9947-16.
 19 MR. SZYMANSKI: An Ordinance approving the sale
 20 of approximately 8,2031 gross acres (7,9993 net acres) of
 21 County Property bordering McIntyre Road in Ross Township,
 22 Pennsylvania, 15237 identified as a portion of Lot & Block
 23 No. 612-S-64 known as the John J. Kane Regional
 24 Center-Ross Township, to Regional Development Partners,
 25 L.P., a Pennsylvania Limited Partnership for a sale price of
 26 \$1,250,000.00 sponsored by the Chief Executive.
 27 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: That'll go into Economic and
 28 Development. New Business, Motions. Seeing none,
 29 Notification of Contracts, I guess we have none. Public
 30 Comment on General Items, we have several speakers
 31 starting out with Stephen Lucas. Is Stephen Lucas here?
 32 Going one, twice. How about Lorraine Starsky?
 33 MS. STARKY: Yes. Nicotine addiction is
 34 incredibly powerful and vile. I know because I was a
 35 smoker, and I'm ashamed to say that I even smoked around
 36 my first baby. I made excuses. I limited my cigarettes
 37 to five a day, and I smoked in another room in the house.
 38 He developed asthma. There's no history of asthma in my
 39 family. Evidence mounted that secondhand exposure was
 40 very harmful. I quit for my child's sake and when I did,
 41 his asthmas ceased. I became a nurse later in life and I
 42 saw firsthand all the devastation caused by nicotine
 43 addiction and its secondhand exposure. What's at stake
 44 now here in Allegheny County is the issue of secondhand
 45 exposure to the vapors of e-cigarettes. The American

1 Academy of Pediatrics, a group representing all the
2 pediatricians, warns that any exposure to nicotine
3 including secondhand exposure from e-cigarettes may be
4 dangerous for children.

5 Besides nicotine, e-cigarettes contain a
6 flavoring of some kind and propylene glycol. That's a
7 syrupy synthetic liquid added to food and cosmetics to
8 help them stay moist. Propylene glycol is what is
9 aerosolized in stage productions to produce smoke. That
10 smoke or vapor is what is produced by e-cigarettes. We
11 eat propylene glycol in foods, and we slather it on our
12 skin and hair in personal care products. It is generally
13 recognized as safe when it's used that way. What we don't
14 know is what happens to lungs when it is inhaled. Many
15 things that can be eaten safely, such as flour, can damage
16 lungs when inhaled.

17 Various studies have indicated that vapors from
18 e-cigarettes contain several cancer causing substances as
19 well as incredibly tiny particles of tin, chromium, nickel
20 and other heavy metals. These substances are not
21 something that we as bystanders want in our lungs,
22 especially vulnerable children. James Pankow, Professor
23 of Chemistry and Engineering at Portland State University,
24 analyzed aerosolized e-liquid and detected formaldehyde
25 releasing agents at high voltages which many people use.
26 Exposure to formaldehyde has been linked to cancer.

27 I am concluding with the words of Dr. Stanton
28 Glantz, Professor of Medicine at the University of
29 California. Quote, I don't buy the harm reduction
30 argument that just because these are less polluting the
31 conventional cigarettes makes them acceptable. If you
32 have a roomful of people vaping, you will still be getting
33 pollution levels. Compared to traditional cigarettes,
34 sure, these aren't as bad. Compared to clean air, no.

35 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: For the record, would you
36 give your name and address?

37 MS. STARKSKY: It's Lorraine Starsky. I live at
38 1229 Onondago Street, and I do have --- excuse me, my
39 first time here. I live in the City of Pittsburgh, 14th
40 Ward.

41 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Richard Marino.

42 MR. MARINO: Hi, my name is Richard Marino. I'm
43 the owner of Cool Vapes. We have two retail locations
44 with 11 employees. I'm here today to urge County Council

1 In addition, a high number of adolescents that
2 use electronic cigarettes use no nicotine. They just use
3 the vapor with nicotine in them. The CDC also reports
4 that smoking is at an all-time low in all demographic
5 categories. I urge the Council to reject the ban proposed
6 by the Board of Health. Thank you.

7 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Bill Gotshaw.

8 MR. GODSHALL: I'm Bill Godshall, founder and
9 executive director of Smoke Free Pennsylvania. According
10 to Public Health England, the Royal College of Physicians
11 and many other experts, vapor products are at least 95
12 percent less harmful than cigarettes, have helped millions
13 of smokers quit smoking, have not created nicotine
14 dependence among non-smokers, are not gateways to
15 cigarette smoking and oppose no harm to nonusers.

16 Survey evidence indicates that vapor products
17 have helped about 10 million people quit smoking worldwide
18 including about 10,000 Allegheny Countians. Two weeks ago
19 the US Surgeon General issued an anti-vaping propaganda
20 work that grossly misrepresented the scientific evidence
21 and falsely insinuated that vaping is a gateway to
22 cigarette smoking for teens. And in an op-ed in Friday's
23 Post Gazette, County Health Department Director, Karen
24 Hacker and the medical society president repeated those
25 same false and misleading fear-mongering propaganda about
26 vaping towards this Council to ban vaping by adults in
27 virtually every workplace in the County. And yet last
28 week's Monitoring the Future survey of US teens found that
29 cigarette smoking declined to a new record low of 5.9
30 percent, a 16 percent drop from 2015 and a 54 percent
31 decline since 2010 when vapor products became widely
32 available.

33 That same 2016 Monitoring the Future survey
34 issued last week also found that past month use of
35 e-cigarette by teens declined for the second consecutive
36 year dropping by 29 percent since 2014. The survey also
37 found that every use of an e-cigarette dropped for 8th,
38 10th and 12th graders, and for the second year in a row,
39 the survey found that just 20 percent of teen vapers
40 reported vaping nicotine. This is a far cry from the fear
41 mongering you're hearing about vaping and teens.

42 This week a new clinical study found that
43 cigarette smokers who switched to vaping reduced their
44 number of COPD exacerbations after one year of vaping and
45 again after two years while the number of COPD

1 to reject the Board of Health's proposal, proposed ban of
2 electronic cigarettes and work in public places.

3 The proposed ban is an infringement of business
4 owners' private property rights. The County should not be
5 dictating what a business owner can and cannot do in their
6 own business. The Allegheny County Health Department
7 reports that during the public comment period they
8 received a total of 842 comments. Only 30 comments
9 supported the ban, while 812 were opposed. Irregardless,
10 they chose to proceed with the ban.

11 Currently, the decision to allow or disallow the
12 use of electronic cigarettes is enforced by the manager of
13 the facility. This process works and is not a one size
14 fits all. Let me give you an example. Say I own a
15 company located on the 30th Floor of the US Steel
16 Building. Currently, I can chose to allow my employees to
17 use electronic cigarettes at their desk providing there's
18 no objections from other employees. The process of using
19 electronic cigarettes takes less than ten seconds. In
20 this scenario, no one is offended, work flow continues
21 without interruption and there are no children at work
22 that will be affected in any way. Not only is this very
23 productive, but it also encourages other employees that
24 smoke traditional cigarettes to quit and use healthier
25 alternatives.

26 On the other hand, if Council chooses to enforce
27 the ban, my employee must stop working, catch an elevator
28 down to the lobby, walk outside with traditional
29 cigarettes smokers, take an extended break, catch the
30 elevator back to their desk. This is very unproductive,
31 disruptive and costly. You may hear from groups that will
32 misrepresent and distort facts that electronic cigarettes
33 smoking is up among teens. The industry is unregulated.
34 Nicotine causes cancer. And if you use an unreasonable
35 and inhumane amount of electricity for an extended period
36 of time that harmful chemicals and toxins are emitted.
37 These levels cannot be sustained by the human being.

38 The University of Michigan's monitoring the
39 future study surveys 40,000 to 50,000 students through the
40 United States. The most recent study shows that from 2015
41 to 2016, the percentage of adolescents who vaped in the
42 last 30 days has declined from 16 to 13 percent amongst
43 12th grade students. This is the second straight year of
44 decline in vaping in students.

1 exacerbations didn't change among the controlled group of
2 smokers. COPD stands for chronic obstructive pulmonary
3 disease and is also referred to as emphysema.

4 Many employers recognize that allowing workers
5 to vape at their workplace has helped many smokers quit
6 smoking, increased productivity, eliminated smoke breaks,
7 protected vapers from secondhand smoke exposure, reduced
8 absenteeism and healthcare costs. In sharp contrast,
9 banning vaping at workplaces and public places,
10 stigmatizes vapors, forces vapers to once again be exposed
11 to secondhand cigarette smoke, encourages vapors to switch
12 back to smoking and encourages smokers from vaping,
13 deceives the public to believe that vaping is just as
14 hazardous as cigarette smoking and exposes youth to far
15 more vapors than they would be otherwise exposed to if you
16 didn't ban vaping. Thank you.

17 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you, Brittany
18 Huffman.

19 MS. HUFFMAN: Good evening. My name is Brittany
20 Huffman and I am the program coordinator with Tobacco Free
21 Allegheny, an organization dedicated to reducing the
22 effects of smoking and secondhand smoke in Allegheny
23 County.

24 Tobacco Free Allegheny is the regional primary
25 contractor for Allegheny County with the PA Department of
26 Health's Division of Tobacco, Prevention and Control. I'm
27 also a resident and live in Russ Township. I'm here today
28 to speak in support of electronic cigarettes regulations.

29 Electronic cigarettes are a potential public
30 health risk as the aerosol threat is not harmless water
31 vapor and is not as safe as clean air. E-cigarettes also
32 contain propylene glycol or glycerin. These chemicals may
33 meet the FDA definition generally recognized as safe as
34 food additives, but that distinction does not extend to
35 the inhalation of these chemicals. Many adults don't know
36 that indoor use of electronic cigarettes exposes children
37 to nicotine and leave nicotine deposits on surfaces.
38 Various reporting sources across the United States have
39 reported an increase in serious second and third degree
40 burns from exploding e-cigarettes. Local hospitals have
41 banned e-cigarettes from their facilities because of the
42 concern safety officers have for explosion risks. These
43 exploding devices now present a huge safety hazard to
44 others.

1 An additional public health risk is exposure to
 2 e-cigarette liquid. The Centers for Disease Control and
 3 Prevention reports that e-cigarette nicotine liquid
 4 exposure has resulted in a dramatic increase in calls to
 5 poison centers, increasing one per month in September of
 6 2010 to 215 per month in February in 2014. The poisonings
 7 have been among users and non-users due to the ingestion
 8 of nicotine liquid, absorption through the skin and
 9 inhalation. More than half of the calls to poison centers
 10 due to e-cigarettes involved young children under five and
 11 about 42 percent of the poison calls involved people aged
 12 20 and older.

13 The health of youth is a major public health
 14 concern and the use of e-cigarettes in public places
 15 promotes the normalization of the behavior of smoking with
 16 youth. From 2011 to 2015, past 30 day use of e-cigarettes
 17 increased nearly tenfold from high school students from
 18 1.55 to 16 percent and nearly nine fold for middle school
 19 students from .6 percent to 5.3 percent. They are now the
 20 most commonly used form of nicotine among youth according
 21 to the just released Surgeon General's report on
 22 e-cigarettes.

23 Even the Royal College of Physicians from the
 24 United Kingdom who are examining the harm reduction
 25 potential of electronic cigarettes states that there's a
 26 need for regulation to reduce direct and indirect adverse
 27 effects of e-cigarette use. Prohibition of electronic
 28 cigarettes in areas where smoking is not allowed can
 29 support tobacco free norms, support enforcement of tobacco
 30 free laws, preserve clean indoor air standards and protect
 31 bystanders from exposure to secondhand electronic aerosol.
 32 Thank you.

33 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Cassandra Wood,
 34 MS. WOOD: Good evening. My name is Cassandra
 35 Wood and I am a program specialist with the American Lung
 36 Association in Pennsylvania based here in Pittsburgh.

37 The American Lung Association in Pennsylvania
 38 thanks you for the opportunity to comment on the proposed
 39 regulation to prohibit e-cigarettes indoors. The American
 40 Lung Association in Pennsylvania supports the inclusion of
 41 e-cigarettes and cleaner indoor air laws and a
 42 comprehensive regulation. The Association wants to assure
 43 you that e-cigarette are considered tobacco products as
 44 the FDA has ruled.

1 In addition, a ground breaking report was
 2 released by the US Surgeon General, the first ever on
 3 e-cigarettes, sounding the alarm that e-cigarette use is
 4 not safe. The FDA states that e-cigarettes allow users to
 5 inhale an aerosol containing nicotine and other
 6 substances. The Surgeon General's report found that
 7 exposure to the aerosol is harmful, specifically
 8 concluding the e-cigarette aerosol is not just harmless
 9 water vapor. Instead, this aerosol can contain harmful
 10 and potentially harmful chemicals including nicotine and
 11 carcinogens. And that's why the American Lung Association
 12 calls on you to include e-cigarettes in your
 13 comprehensive, smoke-free workplace and indoor air laws,
 14 as nine states and the District of Columbia already have.

15 Dicycyl of buttery chemicals often added to
 16 foods such as popcorn, caramel and dairy products has also
 17 been found in some e-cigarette flavors. This can cause
 18 serious and irreversible lung disease known as popcorn
 19 lung. The Surgeon General concludes that flavors like
 20 these appeal to kids and one of the primary reasons why
 21 youth try e-cigarettes for the first time. Federal, state
 22 and local policy makers such as yourselves must heed this
 23 call from the Surgeon General to protect our children from
 24 becoming the next generation hooked on tobacco.

25 While e-cigarettes do not contain smoke, they do
 26 expose others to secondhand emissions. Studies have found
 27 that formaldehyde, benzene and tobacco specific
 28 carcinogens coming from these secondhand emissions ---
 29 Other studies have shown that chemicals from vapor contain
 30 formaldehyde and other potential toxins.

31 There is no evidence that shows that
 32 e-cigarettes emissions are safe for non-users to inhale.
 33 But there is much more testing that needs to be done to
 34 determine more potential dangers that have yet to be
 35 found. E-cigarettes are tobacco products. The American
 36 Lung Association in Pennsylvania respectfully asks the
 37 Council to approve the regulation to prohibit the use of
 38 e-cigarettes indoors and in other public places. Thank
 39 you.

40 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Christina
 41 Celest?

42 MS. CELEST: Good afternoon. My name is
 43 Christina Celest, and I'm a freshman at Duquesne
 44 University. Today I represent the Tobacco Resistance
 45 Unit, a movement throughout all of Pennsylvania to help

1 the youth among the ages of 12 and 18 to stay safe and to
 2 be tobacco and nicotine free.

3 I would first like to thank you for allowing me
 4 to comment on the proposed regulations of e-cigarettes
 5 indoors. I not only would like to share my story about
 6 how devastating the impact of e-cigarettes to our youth.
 7 A few years ago when I was a part of Beaver
 8 County Teen Leaders raising awareness with alcohol and
 9 opioid addiction, I came across tobacco addiction.
 10 Striving to further my advocacy, that's when I decided to
 11 join TRUE where I participate in The Day at the Capital
 12 and Pennsylvania Young Leader Summit. I'm here to tell
 13 you that the threat of e-cigarettes is serious. The
 14 United State Attorney General that you've heard about the
 15 report concluded non-nicotine can be contained in many
 16 e-cigarettes as well as e-cigarette aerosol is damaging to
 17 the fetuses and the developing ment (phonetic) of the
 18 brain to our youth.

19 More than half of the younger combusted tobacco
 20 users who transition from cigars and cigarettes do become
 21 regular combusted tobacco product users. According to
 22 Center for Disease Control and Prevention, e-cigarette use
 23 among both high school and middle school students have
 24 tripled in one year. For instance, a 4.5 percent in 2013
 25 of high school students turned into 13.4 percent in the
 26 next year. Among middle school students, it became a 1.1
 27 percent of users to a 3.4 percent. This result shows that
 28 --- only a few years of these products being on the market
 29 that the youth use of e-cigarettes now has surpassed the
 30 use of cigarettes.

31 According to nicotine and tobacco research
 32 studies less than 30 percent of the nicotine inhaled by
 33 e-cigarette users is absorbed into the body. The
 34 remainder is exhaled into the environment, which means
 35 that after the nicotine is exhaled into the air it can be
 36 absorbed by bystanders or deposits onto surfaces such as
 37 clothing, furniture and the floor where children can be
 38 exposed to this which is why we are here for the youth.
 39 We are discussing its harmful effects not to keep those
 40 out of business, but to make sure that those youth are
 41 protected because we are the future.

42 Decreasing e-cigarette use among youth requires
 43 action which is why I am here speaking on behalf of those.
 44 I urge the Council to pass this regulation making

1 e-cigarettes illegal to smoke indoors and other places in
 2 Allegheny County. Thank you for your time.

3 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Ron Bandes,
 4 MR. BANDES: Hi, I'm Ron Bandes. I reside at
 5 1531 South Negley Avenue in the City of Pittsburgh. I'm
 6 speaking on the need for new voting machines.

7 I'm a network security analyst. I'm the
 8 President of Vote Allegheny, a nonpartisan election
 9 integrity organization. I'm a judge of elections in this
 10 County and the cyber security member of the Joint State
 11 Government Commission's Advisory Committee on Voting
 12 System Technology.

13 The primary purpose of an election is to choose
 14 the winners of electoral contests. A secondary purpose is
 15 to convince the losers that they lost fairly. Without
 16 convincing the losers and their supporters of the fairness
 17 of an election, the winner won't have the consent of the
 18 governed. This consent is the basis for the authority of
 19 the winners and the legitimacy of the government. So what
 20 does it take to convince the losers? What does it take to
 21 convince anyone of anything? Evidence. Elections are
 22 much more complex than most people realize. In the
 23 arithmetic sense everything is a pretty simple thing, but
 24 in the electoral context, counting includes the
 25 determination of what constitutes a valid vote. If the
 26 instructions are to fill in the oval next to the chosen
 27 candidate's name, does a checkmark or an x count?
 28 Guidelines are needed. Even with guidelines, some
 29 judgment will be necessary. Can computer-based voting
 30 machines exercise that judgment? Most importantly, how
 31 will the voters know that the voting machines judged
 32 correctly? Their trust and hence their consent rests on
 33 this question. For elections, we must audit the results
 34 to gain confidence in their veracity, base the audit on
 35 tangible evidence of the voters' choices and protect the
 36 integrity of the tangible evidence so that its validity is
 37 not called into question.

38 If the audit is to reveal the will of the people
 39 then it is necessary to audit the voters' expressions of
 40 their intent. In direct recording electronic voting
 41 machines like those used in Allegheny County, the machine
 42 interprets the voter's action, the press of a particular
 43 zone on the touch screen, and records the interpretation.
 44 In this case, the voter's action is ephemeral and not
 45 recorded. Only the machine's interpretation remains. It

1 won't be possible to reevaluate the voter's action to
 2 confirm that the voting system interpreted the action
 3 correctly. With such systems, an audit can answer the
 4 question, did the voting system correctly add up the
 5 interpretations? Some systems are worse still and just
 6 keep a running tally of voter's choices instead of some
 7 representation of their individual choices.

8 With these systems, we can only ask the question
 9 did the tabulation system correctly total the subtotals
 10 for the voting machines? To audit the will of the people
 11 we need to reexamine the voter's actions or marks. The
 12 closer the record is to the voter's original actions the
 13 better. The best evidence of a voter's intent is a hand
 14 marked paper ballot. Not every voter is able to hand-mark
 15 a ballot so the next best is a paper ballot produced by a
 16 ballot marking system operated by the voter and verified
 17 by the voter. Systems using paper ballots provide a
 18 durable record that can be understood directly by voters
 19 and auditors.

20 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you.
 21 MR. BANDES: Thank you.
 22 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: David Tessitor.
 23 MR. TESSITOR: David Tessitor, 240 Chesterfield
 24 Road, City of Pittsburgh.

25 If this past election hasn't shaken some people
 26 in the fact that we do not have an ability to check and
 27 determine and recount actual ballots, what are you going
 28 to say with the next presidential election? Are we to
 29 have verifiable voting machines by 2024? And if we are,
 30 how long is that going to take and what do we have to do
 31 in order to get there? Or do we have to --- going to have
 32 them by 2020. In other words, are you going to go to your
 33 people and say, we're going to have them for the next
 34 presidential. Then we'd better move fast and that's what
 35 I'm here to talk about. Because what we need to do is
 36 have a voting machine selection process that includes
 37 appointment of a citizens' advisory committee, a study of
 38 need of various criteria affecting the decision process,
 39 creation of and purchase guidelines, an RFI and an RFP, a
 40 vendor forum and presentations, preliminary election
 41 recommendations, a series of demographically diverse and
 42 geographically dispersed public presentations and
 43 hearings, followed by a final committee report including
 44 answers to comments and questions from public hearings.
 45 And the committee's final selection recommendations for

1 children with lung disease. So I'm here on their behalf,
 2 on behalf of our patients, to ask that the Council vote
 3 for a ban on e-cigarettes in public places where indoor
 4 smoking is already banned.

5 Our patient population, among other patient
 6 populations, is made of up individuals who are working for
 7 every breath. We know that irritants as simple as fumes,
 8 dust, ozone, even cold air and secondhand vapor can
 9 disrupt the ability to breathe with ease. That means that
 10 babies born prematurely, kids with asthma, kids with
 11 chronic lung disease, they're taking a gamble every time
 12 they take a breath when such irritants are around. In the
 13 best of circumstances our lungs are filtering and
 14 processing everything we breathe to make sure that only
 15 oxygen gets into our body. We live in an environment that
 16 continually stresses this function of the lungs. We
 17 already live in a place where many days of the year the
 18 air quality is so poor we ask our patients to stay
 19 indoors. I'm still getting used to the craziness of
 20 telling my patients to stay indoors. Now, if I tell them
 21 they can't be indoors anymore, I don't know what I'm going
 22 to do.

23 I don't have data on exactly how many harmful
 24 chemicals are in secondhand vapors. It's impossible to
 25 know that. If this were 1985, I wouldn't have data on how
 26 harmful secondhand smoke chemicals are. We had to learn
 27 that lesson the hard way. I can tell you, though, that
 28 our vulnerable population needs to be protected from
 29 irritants that can worsen their disease. I ask the
 30 Council to please vote on a ban to e-cigarettes in indoor
 31 places so that our patient population has a place to
 32 breathe with ease and they're not subjected to the risk of
 33 an exacerbation of their disease every time they take a
 34 breath. Thank you.

35 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you.

36 MR. DEMARCO: Mr. President?

37 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yes.

38 MR. DEMARCO: I'd like to just make a comment
 39 here to correct a statement I made at the last Council
 40 meeting. When the subject of the e-vaping in the proposed
 41 regulations came up, I commented that President Obama's
 42 administration had passed a rule saying that you would no
 43 longer be able to smoke tobacco products in any government
 44 provided housing or within 25 feet of those areas. That's
 45 all true. But what was brought to my attention by, I

1 release and presentations to you and the administration
 2 for your deliberation and approval in time to have those
 3 machines in place.

4 That committee has to do quite a bit. It has to
 5 research and define the criteria for identifying
 6 acceptable new voting machines and the selection among the
 7 prospective systems, the optimal vendors and models for
 8 the County to purchase. Such analysis needs to include
 9 consideration and security, accessibility, usability,
 10 transparency, use of paper ballots, voter verifiability,
 11 recountability, audit ability including the performance of
 12 risk, limiting audits, expected system service lines, the
 13 cost of accounting of initial and total capital investment
 14 to include bonding fees, total public payout upon
 15 retirement, possible leasing arrangements and their total
 16 cost, regular extended maintenance, total operating
 17 expenses and such other associated costs as may be
 18 considered. All of this has to fit in a very tight time
 19 line.

20 As you can see, if we're going to go for 2020,
 21 we have to have the 2019 test, a full test to make sure
 22 everything is going good. That requires a committee to be
 23 appointed. It requires a number of things to happen in
 24 here and your financing and purchases to occur by '20, the
 25 end of 2018. That means you have two years and you know
 26 how long some things can take in Council. So we have to
 27 move fast. Your first meeting coming back in January
 28 should be the consideration of appointment of a committee
 29 or at least authorization of that so that it could be put
 30 in place by April of 2017 so it can move post haste to do
 31 the job that is necessary. And I thank you.

32 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: At this point, does someone
 33 want to make a motion ---?

34 MR. SZYMANSKI: You got one more.

35 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: I'm sorry, we got one in the
 36 back. Jonathan Spar (phonetic).

37 DR. SPAHR: Thank you very much for allowing me
 38 to speak today. My name is Jonathan Spahr. I'm from
 39 Franklin Park and I work at Children's Hospital of
 40 Pittsburgh.

41 I can't do a better job than what Lorraine,
 42 Brittany, Cassandra and Christine already did as far as
 43 explaining the harms of secondhand vapor. But I'm a
 44 pediatric pulmonologist, so I'll tell you what I see in
 45 the clinic. I and my colleagues care for many infants and

1 believe, it was Ms. Huffman, was that the proposed
 2 legislation, which we haven't seen yet from the County,
 3 stresses that it's only going to address public spaces.
 4 So that it would not affect people in their own homes or
 5 things of that nature. So I just wanted to correct my
 6 statement. I appreciate you hearing that.

7 I'd like to make a motion to adjourn.

8 MR. MACEY: Second.

9 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: All those in favor, signify
 10 by saying aye.

11 (Chorus of ayes.)

12 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Opposed? The ayes have it.
 13 Meeting adjourned.
