1 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: The meeting will come to  
 2 order. Will you all rise for the Pledge of Allegiance to  
 3 the flag and remain standing for silent prayer or  
 4 reflection?  
 5 After me ---.  
 6 (Pledge of Allegiance.)  
 7 (Silent prayer or reflection.)  
 8 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: We'll have the roll call.  
 9 MR. BARKER: Mr. Baker?  
 10 MR. BAKER: Here.  
 11 MR. BARKER: Mr. Catena?  
 12 MR. CATENA: Here.  
 13 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?  
 14 MR. DEMARCO: Here.  
 15 MR. BARKER: Mr. Futules?  
 16 MR. FUTULES: Here.

 41 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: 10952-19.  
 42 MR. BARKER: A Proclamation declaring Friday,  
 43 February 1st, 2019, to be National Wear Red Day in  
 44 Allegheny County. Sponsored by Council Member Kirk and  
 45 all other Members of Council.

1 MS. KIRK: Okay. Karen Colbert, the senior  
 2 director for the American Heart Association and Amy ---  
 3 MS. MATTIAS: Mattias.  
 4 MS. KIRK: --- Mattias?  
 5 MS. MATTIAS: Yes.  
 6 MS. KIRK: Who is a survivor of heart disease,  
 7 who are here to accept the Proclamation on behalf of all -  
 8 -- all --- everyone in Allegheny County, really, the  
 9 women, the men, all of us actually. So I'd like to read  
 10 the Proclamation.  
 11 WHEREAS, cardiovascular disease --- diseases are  
 12 the number one killer of women in the United States and;  
 13 WHEREAS, cardiovascular disease kills one woman  
 14 almost every 80 seconds in the United States.  
 15 WHEREAS, about 80 percent of cardiovascular  
 16 disease may be prevented and;  
 17 WHEREAS, risk factors for heart disease such as  
 18 blood pressure, smoking and cholesterol can be controlled  
 19 and;  
 20 WHEREAS, women are encouraged to commit to  
 21 making physical activity and healthy eating a priority to  
 22 improve heart health and;  
 23 WHEREAS, the American Heart Association, Go Red  
 24 for Women --- Women's Movement, motivates women to learn  
 25 their family history and to meet with a health care  
 26 provider to determine their risk for cardiovascular  
 27 diseases and stroke and;  
 28 WHEREAS, Go Red for Women encourages women to  
 29 take charge of their heart health by knowing their total  
 30 cholesterol HDL, which is the good cholesterol, blood  
 31 pressure, blood sugar and body mass index, BMI.  
 32 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED That I, Allegheny  
 33 County Council Member Cindy Kirk and all Members of  
 34 Council to hereby declare --- declare Friday, February  
 35 1st, 2019, to be National Wear Red Day in Allegheny  
 36 County. We urge all citizens to show their support for  
 37 women and fight against heart disease be commemorating  
 38 this day and every day in February, that you can by  
 39 wearing the color red. By increasing awareness, speaking  
 40 out about heart disease and empowering women to reduce  
 41 their risk for cardiovascular diseases, we can save  
 42 thousands of lives each year. I'd like to thank you and  
 43 recognize any of you people --- any of you folks want to  
 44 say anything? Sue? No? Okay.  
 45

1 MS. KIRK: Sue, Anita, Denise? Hi, we're here  
 2 to recognize wear red for women for the American Heart  
 3 Association. You may not realize it but one in three  
 4 women will suffer or die, actually, from heart disease, be  
 5 it a stroke or a heart attack. So we encourage you to  
 6 join the movement to help end heart disease and strokes in  
 7 women in America. It's typically not a man's disease  
 8 anymore, so we'd like you to help spread the word. With  
 9 that, just so you remember, go red.  
 10 G, get your numbers. As women, we should know  
 11 our BMIs, our blood sugars, our blood sugars, your  
 12 cholesterol levels. Learn your numbers and work with  
 13 them. Own your lifestyle, lose some weight. Get --- get  
 14 healthy, get exercise, watch what you eat. Remember, it's  
 15 up to you, no one else can do it. It's your body, you  
 16 have to take care of it.  
 17 R, would be realize your risk. You --- eight  
 18 percent, I think, is genetic but there's things we can do  
 19 if you're at a higher risk based on your body or your BMI,  
 20 whatever you need to be extra careful.  
 21 E, would be educate your family. Make healthy  
 22 food choices for you and your family. Teach your kids to  
 23 stay active and eat their vegetables and whatnot.  
 24 And D, don't be silent. Stand up and tell every  
 25 woman you know that heart disease does effect women and  
 26 please be aware of the different symptoms of like a heart  
 27 attack in women which are night and day from a man, night  
 28 and day.  
 29 I just had a neighbor who was 48, thin as a  
 30 rail, no heart disease in her family, had a heart attack  
 31 walking her dog, no risk factors. And luckily, she had  
 32 just read --- Women's Health had an article on it and she  
 33 had just read about it a month before. And right before  
 34 she went to sleep she said, if I don't --- if I start  
 35 waking up in pain, call the ambulance, it's a heart  
 36 attack. Well, she had a heart attack, so be aware of the  
 37 figures.  
 38 That said, I'd like to introduce --- let's see,  
 39 you're Deb?  
 40 MS. COLBERT: Karen.  
 41 MS. KIRK: Kim?  
 42 MS. COLBERT: Karen Colbert.  
 43 MS. KIRK: You're Karen?  
 44 MS. COLBERT: Yep.

1 MS. COLBERT: I appreciate you all for wearing  
 2 red. Amy is going to speak for us. She's our  
 3 spokesperson.  
 4 MS. MATTIAS: Thank you so much, Council Member  
 5 Kirk and all the Council Members for recognizing the  
 6 importance of cardiovascular health in all of our  
 7 community. The mission of the American Heart Association  
 8 is to be a relentless force for the world of longer,  
 9 healthier lives.  
 10 Cardiovascular disease is the leading global  
 11 cause of death. And while our work remains firmly  
 12 anchored in fighting heart disease and stroke, our key  
 13 focus is equitable health and overall wellbeing for  
 14 healthier communities, because 80 percent of heart disease  
 15 is preventable with key lifestyle changes.  
 16 We go red all year, actually, but why  
 17 particularly in February, because it helps start the  
 18 conversation. It helps raise the awareness that heart  
 19 disease is the number one killer in women. In fact,  
 20 taking more lives than all --- all types of cancer  
 21 combined.  
 22 So I know this all too well because I'm a  
 23 survivor. I had what was called spontaneous coronary  
 24 artery dissection, otherwise known as SCAD. It's been  
 25 almost nine years since my heart surgery, and so there's  
 26 not a day that goes by that I don't think about that day.  
 27 I'm also a national spokeswoman for the American Heart  
 28 Association, and I'm a proud Board member here in  
 29 Pittsburgh.  
 30 So again, on behalf of the American Heart  
 31 Association and from the bottom of my heart, I want to  
 32 thank the Council Members for the Proclamation and for  
 33 your continued interest and support for the American Heart  
 34 Association and Go Red for Women. And it's great to see  
 35 all the women here in red. Thank you very much.  
 36 (Applause.)  
 37 MS. MATTIAS: Yes, and the men's ties. Thank  
 38 you.  
 39 (Applause.)  
 40 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yeah. Come on up front for  
 41 a picture.  
 42 MS. KIRK: We're going to go up front and get a  
 43 picture with all the guys behind us.  
 44 (Pictures taken.)  
 45 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: 10953-19.

1 MR. BARKER: A Proclamation recognizing the  
 2 400th Anniversary of the African-American experience in  
 3 North America. Sponsored by Council Member Walton.  
 4 MR. WALTON: Thank you, Mr. President. February  
 5 is traditionally considered to be in America black history  
 6 month. I think that prior to sharing this Proclamation  
 7 that I'd like to set the stage for some ongoing  
 8 conversations and debates that need to be had about the  
 9 current state of relationships and actions in this country  
 10 and in this County. I believe that we are at a crisis  
 11 point, that we have to make some decisions about what kind  
 12 of County and what kind of country we're going to have.  
 13 Just a couple months ago, there was a horrific  
 14 shooting in Squirrel Hill at the Tree of Life Synagogue,  
 15 and it was immediately assailed universally as a hate  
 16 crime. And many of my constituents are asking me, with  
 17 all --- and with all due respect, what happened at  
 18 Squirrel Hill was horrific and very tragic, but why aren't  
 19 we, as African-Americans and in our plight and our  
 20 circumstances given the same kind of concern and  
 21 considerations?  
 22 And I'm saying we're living in two Americas, one  
 23 that is unequal and one that is unjust. I have to say to  
 24 you that I share many of those concerns and I --- and, you  
 25 know, George Herbert Walker Bush talked --- talked about a  
 26 thousand points of light and talked about what America can  
 27 be. I think we have to candidly discuss the issues of  
 28 race in this country, and how we correct the wrongs that  
 29 have been heaped upon people of color, African Americans  
 30 specifically, for 400 plus years.  
 31 That to be brought here, to be brought to  
 32 America, in the --- in the bellies of --- of ships as  
 33 slaves, not indentured service --- servants but as chattel  
 34 slaves, never to gain freedom. Never to have an  
 35 opportunity. And that laws in this country were written  
 36 to enhance that slavery, whether it was the three-fifths  
 37 compromise, whether it was Plessy versus Ferguson, whether  
 38 it was the Dred Scott Decision.  
 39 All those things give rise to those concerns  
 40 that my constituents raise with me on a daily basis. We  
 41 can do better, we must do better. We need one America.  
 42 So with that in mind, I'll go ahead with the Proclamation.  
 43 WHEREAS, in 2018, the United States Senate and  
 44 House of Representatives enacted a bill, H.R. 1242, that  
 45 recognizes our nation's black history as having begun with

1 started this County. You might not have knew that, so ---  
 2 so we'll just give a little history.  
 3 I wanted to bring up my good partner, Dewey  
 4 Warren. He's going to say a couple words and then we're  
 5 going to have someone from the NAACP because there's so  
 6 many events going on this year that we want to highlight  
 7 all the things that's being presented. Thank you.  
 8 MR. WALTON: Brief --- brief --- briefly.  
 9 MR. MARSHALL: Briefly.  
 10 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Go ahead.  
 11 MR. WARREN: I want to thank you guys for this  
 12 Proclamation. I've been involved since --- oh, man, it's  
 13 probably been ---  
 14 MR. MARSHALL: 2013.  
 15 MR. WARREN: Since 2013 doing this, watching B.  
 16 Marshall tirelessly work and put these programs together,  
 17 doing it with a lot of his own money so I stepped in  
 18 there. I have a business that is successful here in  
 19 Allegheny County, so I also like to give back. And I  
 20 thank B. Marshall for putting me in a place where I can  
 21 give back directly to the community, so thank you again.  
 22 MR. STEWART: He said be brief. I'm going to be  
 23 brief. We're going to continue working with him. We're  
 24 going to continue partnering with him. The NAACP, I am  
 25 the president, Richard A. Stewart, Jr. and we'll do what  
 26 we can to try to stem the violence in --- in the community  
 27 and work with any organization to try to stop these guns  
 28 from coming in and try to work with students no matter  
 29 what color they are, students from inside the city and  
 30 outside the city. We're going to try to keep on working  
 31 and we need more people to get involved and get up off  
 32 their butt and do something. Thank you.  
 33 MR. WALTON: Pictures,  
 34 (Pictures taken.)  
 35 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: 10954-19 and the rest of the  
 36 Proclamations will be read into the record.  
 37 MR. BARKER: Before proceeding, please let the  
 38 record reflect that Mr. Klein is now present.  
 39 10954-19. A Proclamation congratulating the  
 40 Bon-Ami Temple Number 49 of the Daughters of Elks upon  
 41 their 107th Anniversary. Sponsored by Council Member  
 42 Walton.  
 43 10955-19. A Proclamation declaring February  
 44 2019 to be Career and Technical Education Month in  
 45 Allegheny County. Sponsored by Council Member Walton.

1 the arrival of Africans in the English colonies at Point  
 2 Comfort, Virginia in 1619;  
 3 WHEREAS, with the aforementioned act of congress  
 4 which was signed by the President of the United States in  
 5 2019, our nation will recognize four centuries of African  
 6 American survival, existence and ultimately triumph in ---  
 7 in North America and;  
 8 WHEREAS, in 2019, led by William Marshall, Stop  
 9 the Violence Pittsburgh and its partners will present  
 10 several programs and events in commemoration of this  
 11 historic quadricentenary --- quadricentennial. The program  
 12 includes a black history month high school student  
 13 program, the Jubilee of Freeman, Juneteenth parade and the  
 14 Martin R. Delaney Freedom Festival at Point Park and the  
 15 Black Music Festival at Point Park and;  
 16 WHEREAS, individuals and organizations  
 17 throughout Allegheny County, I encourage to acknowledge  
 18 the diverse contributions of African-Americans since the  
 19 founding of Allegheny County in 1788. We must never  
 20 forget the past, but should --- but should likewise never  
 21 hesitate to celebrate the survival and trump --- triumph  
 22 of our communities' African Americans.  
 23 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RECOGNIZED --- RESOLVED  
 24 that I, Council Member Dewitt Walton do hereby recognize  
 25 the 400th Anniversary of the African-American Experience  
 26 in North America and we thank William Marshall for  
 27 dedicating time and effort to making his community better.  
 28 IN WITNESS THEREOF, I hereunto cause the seal of  
 29 the County of Allegheny to be affixed to this 5th day of  
 30 February. Mr. Marshall? Thank you, brother.  
 31 MR. MARSHALL: Thank you so much. I appreciate  
 32 you. Want me to say a couple words?  
 33 MR. WALTON: Yes, sir.  
 34 MR. MARSHALL: Okay. Well, I didn't come

 41 there were 742 men who signed the petition that went to  
 42 General Council for that, four black men. Free black men  
 43 signed that petition, too. So in the beginning of  
 44 Allegheny County, there were free black men here who

 27 big things going on in Oakmont today though certainly  
 28 Just a couple quick updates since the last time  
 29 we got together. Had a great pep rally actually at OLSH  
 30 for the boys football team who won their first ever WPIAL  
 31 title. In their history, they had --- have been in

 17 Allegheny, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, authorizing the  
 18 conveyance of the County of Allegheny's interest in two  
 19 parcels of land located in the Borough of Braddock known  
 20 as Block 302-J, Lot 351 and Block 302-J, Lot 358 to the  
 21 Redevelopment Authority of Allegheny County. Sponsored by  
 22 the Chief Executive.  
 23 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Walton?  
 24 MR. WALTON: Thank you, Mr. President. On  
 25 January 29th, the Committee on Economic Development and  
 26 Housing met and discussed 10924-19, and it was  
 27 affirmatively recommended, approved by the committee to  
 28 refer it to the full Council with a recommendation for ---  
 29 for passage and I so move.  
 30 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: Second.  
 31 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Under remarks? Seeing none,  
 32 all those in favor signify by saying --- well, this is an  
 33 ordinance so we'll have to take a roll call.  
 34 MR. BARKER: On the motion to approve, Mr.  
 35 Baker?  
 36 MR. BAKER: Yes.  
 37 MR. BARKER: Mr. Catena?  
 38 MR. CATENA: Yes.  
 39 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?  
 40 MR. DEMARCO: Yes.  
 41 MR. BARKER: Mr. Futules?  
 42 MR. FUTULES: Yes.  
 43 MR. BARKER: Ms. Kirk?  
 44 MS. KIRK: Yes.  
 45 MR. BARKER: Mr. Klein?

1 politics 15 years ago so I'm certainly appreciative. My  
 2 wife, we've been involved there forever and it's just a  
 3 great organization. Episode number 12 of my TV show in  
 4 Moon Township in District 1 is coming up next week. We're  
 5 going to have some great guests. And a fun story. On my  
 6 daughter's birthday, we actually went on a different  
 7 public access show in Moon and they did a caricature  
 8 drawing of my --- my daughter, my mom and I live on TV  
 9 which was kind of fun. So just the power of public access  
 10 and the nice relationships that it brings together that

 12 This Friday is the Inspiring Success Luncheon  
 13 for junior achievement. I know junior achievement has  
 14 certainly been down here a number of times and is involved  
 15 with Council, told us all about the golden ticket. It's  
 16 going to be a nice luncheon if anybody wants to join me,  
 17 we would love to have you. Michelle is one of the few  
 18 people that actually knows the names of all the honorees  
 19 so we got all the winners here. The winners don't even  
 20 know that they're winners, but Michelle knows that they're  
 21 winners. So they will be celebrated on Friday.  
 22 Not too early to sign up for the Special  
 23 Olympics Polar Plunge, February 23rd. It's grown  
 24 immensely from our first year, so if anybody wants to  
 25 plunge into the water with me, please let me know. And if  
 26 you're too chicken to plunge, you can still donate and  
 27 support Special Olympics and still attend the event.  
 28 And then, the final one I would --- I would just  
 29 mention. Council Member Catena and I are both dear  
 30 friends with State Representative Anita Kulik. We're  
 31 doing our first get to meet your elected officials event  
 32 of the year on March 2nd in Ben Avon at Anchor and Anvil  
 33 so we're definitely looking forward to that. Okay. And  
 34 now, let's get to Council Member Futules.  
 35 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you.  
 36 MR. BAKER: With your approval.  
 37 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Futules?  
 38 MR. BAKER: Are you still fired up about your  
 39 event?  
 40 MR. FUTULES: You --- you already told everyone.  
 41 MR. BAKER: Well, they don't know what it is yet  
 42 that happened in Oakmont today.  
 43 MR. FUTULES: Well, to --- today was a very  
 44 special event in Oakmont. I left my house around 7:15 and  
 45 couldn't figure out why you couldn't move in Oakmont. The

1 traffic was lined up on Allegheny Avenue, Allegheny River  
 2 Boulevard, Hulton Road, across the Hulton Bridge, and it  
 3 was all for the grand opening of the Oakmont bakery. They  
 4 didn't even start --- open 'til 9. At 7 15, there were  
 5 people jamming the entire area. The news media was there  
 6 and I hope that's not an indication how it is every day,  
 7 but I want to congratulate Marc Serrao and his family for  
 8 putting such a very large investment into the community of  
 9 Oakmont in Allegheny County. As a matter of fact, this  
 10 bakery to date is one of the largest, if not the largest,  
 11 in the United States.

12 MS. MEANS: Wow  
 13 MR. FUTULES: Yes. I understand there is one in  
 14 California underway. It may be a little bit bigger than  
 15 him but as of now he's like 22,000 square feet. This  
 16 building is big, and a great investment and a big asset to  
 17 our --- our valley and the Allegheny Valley District. So  
 18 congratulations to the Serrao family.

19 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Well, okay. Let  
 20 me get you down here then. Go ahead, Representative  
 21 Catena?

22 MR. CATENA: Thank --- thank you, Mr. President.  
 23 I'll be brief. Saturday night, there's a ceremony and a  
 24 little show in Carnegie. It's going to be at Cefalo's  
 25 Banquet Hall and Event Center. It's in memory of Melissa  
 26 Bowers.

27 For those of you that don't know Melissa Bowers,  
 28 Melissa Bowers was a victim of domestic violence. And ---  
 29 and back when I was president of Council in Carnegie,  
 30 Melissa --- it was a tragic evening. Melissa  
 31 unfortunately lost her life as a victim of domestic  
 32 violence. And this Saturday, we're having a benefit.  
 33 It's obviously in memory of her.

34 It starts at Cefalo --- it's at Cefalo's in  
 35 Carnegie. It starts at 6:00 p.m. Tickets are \$30 in  
 36 advance, \$35 the night of the show. It's going to be  
 37 MC'ed by Michael Lamb and there is going to be a few  
 38 groups and a --- and some other speakers talking about  
 39 domestic violence and obviously everything that,  
 40 unfortunately, occurs in today's day and time. Thank you,  
 41 Mr. President. Just wanted to make that ---

42 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you.

43 MR. CATENA: Report that.

1 MS. MEANS: Thank you for recognizing me, Mr.  
 2 President. I just wanted to join Councilman Baker's  
 3 comment in that --- Councilwoman Anita Prizio, myself and  
 4 Councilwoman Kirk and Councilman Baker, we all attended  
 5 the 70th Anniversary of the Allegheny County Borough's  
 6 Associations on Saturday, and it was a great event but I  
 7 wanted to highlight just what a wonderful organization  
 8 they are.

9 They come together, they're volunteers, they  
 10 brainstorm on how to come up with solutions. They discuss  
 11 problems amongst themselves and come up with solutions and  
 12 they're also a great advocate to the state legislature to  
 13 bring about change. And I wanted to mention some of their  
 14 accomplishments over the last 70 years, which are they  
 15 have brought legislative change and --- and been  
 16 instrumental in the areas of flood plain legislation,  
 17 distressed municipalities act, municipal self-insurance  
 18 pooling laws, the local government tax reform act, the  
 19 regional asset district legislation and also revisions in  
 20 various codes in Pennsylvania.

21 So again, congratulations in our grateful,  
 22 thankful heart to the Allegheny County Borough's  
 23 Association. Thank you, Mr. President.

24 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Any other comment? See ---  
 25 seeing none, we'll move along here and go to 10958-19.

26 MR. BARKER: An Ordinance authorizing the County  
 27 of Allegheny to acquire by condemnation certain  
 28 right-of-way and easement areas from a parcel required to  
 29 stabilize the slopes supporting Elizabeth Street southeast  
 30 of Scott Drive in Dravosburg Borough, and to take such  
 31 further action as may be necessary under applicable law,  
 32 including the Eminent Domain Code. Sponsored by the Chief  
 33 Executive.

34 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: That'll be referred to the  
 35 Committee on Public Works. No business? No new business?

36 MR. BARKER: No. We have no motions, no  
 37 notification of contracts.

38 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: No? Okay. Public comment?

39 MR. BARKER: We have several actually.

40 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: You want to start off?

41 MR. BARKER: First up is Marie Norman.

42 MS. NORMAN: Hello, everyone. My name is Marie  
 43 Norman. I'm a Squirrel Hill resident and a faculty member  
 44 at the University of Pittsburgh, and I really appreciate  
 45 this opportunity to speak. This is the first time I've

1 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you, Representative  
 2 DeMarco? We're still --- we're coming this way in a  
 3 minute.

4 MR. DEMARCO: Thank you, Mr. President. I would  
 5 just like to mention here. All of us, I believe are aware  
 6 as well as the audience and the folks sitting at home,  
 7 about the debate that's going on in the city of Pittsburgh  
 8 today regarding the proposed legislation that these folks  
 9 have related to gun control.

10 There was a public hearing that City Council  
 11 heard the week before last, and I spoke at the City  
 12 Council meeting, the public hearing briefly during the  
 13 comment period. During that comment period, I offered  
 14 City Council --- I asked if they wanted to join with  
 15 County Council in trying to impanel a commission of public  
 16 safety, law enforcement and mental health experts to  
 17 really examine, you know, the issue of gun violence and  
 18 what took place at the Tree of Life Synagogue holistically  
 19 in total, and examine it and look and come back with  
 20 recommendations that leaders within the city and County  
 21 could be able to use or implement to be able to keep our  
 22 citizens safe.

23 So having done so, I wanted to make the Council  
 24 aware of the offer that I had made to City Council, you  
 25 know, on our behalf. Thank you, Mr. President.

26 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you, Representative  
 27 Klein, then we'll come down this way next.

28 MR. KLEIN: Thank you, Mr. President. This  
 29 coming Sunday, February the 10th, there is a program  
 30 that's being held at Carnegie Mellon University in the  
 31 Tepper Quad Simmons Auditorium. David Hickton, who is the  
 32 founder of the cyber law policy and security center at the  
 33 University of Pittsburgh, is --- is speaking and the  
 34 subject is cyber security risks to our election system.  
 35 And it is open to the public. The doors open at one  
 36 o'clock. I believe he speaks at 1:30.

37 And so I would just bring this to everyone's  
 38 attention. It is co-sponsored by the 14th Ward  
 39 Independent Democratic Club, as well as the 14th Ward  
 40 Democratic Committee. This is kind of their annual winter  
 41 forum. So David Hickton will --- will be speaking on ---  
 42 on Sunday. Thank you, Mr. President.

43 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Okay, down here  
 44 --- rep --- go ahead.

1 spoken in front of Council, so I'm a little nervous and I  
 2 hope you'll bear with me.

3 So during the midterm elections, we saw election  
 4 irregularities all across the United States which  
 5 effectively denied people and particularly people in poor  
 6 communities and communities of color, their vote. We saw  
 7 the drastic reduction of polling locations, again  
 8 particularly in communities of color. We saw, in certain  
 9 places long, long lines to vote which effectively  
 10 disenfranchises people who can't wait in line because of  
 11 jobs or children. We saw stolen ballots in some places.  
 12 We saw voter purges at some places, voter ID loss which  
 13 were discriminatory. We saw absentee ballots that arrived  
 14 too late to be returned before the deadline, and we saw  
 15 absentee ballots that were never counted.

16 Watching these kinds of issues on a national  
 17 level has made me really worried about Allegheny County.  
 18 And my concerns have been heightened by the conclusions of  
 19 the blue ribbon commission on Pennsylvania's election  
 20 security which found that the majority of our voting  
 21 machines in Pennsylvania are hackable and don't produce a  
 22 paper trail that would allow a recount.

23 My concerns have also been heightened by the  
 24 stories I've heard from friends who have worked the polls  
 25 on local campuses where there have been prohibitively long  
 26 lines that have kept some students from voting and friends  
 27 who have requested an absentee ballot, but received one  
 28 too late to return it in time for their vote to be  
 29 counted.

30 So whether these issues can be addressed at the  
 31 County level or whether the County can apply pressure to  
 32 the state to make sure that they happen, we have to  
 33 address these issues and we have to do so well in advance  
 34 of the 2020 elections. Am I out of time? No? Okay.

35 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: You get to go to the red  
 36 light.

37 MS. NORMAN: We have to ensure that, first of  
 38 all, that voting machines are reliable. That there is a  
 39 paper trail that allows for recounts, that we have polling  
 40 locations within easy access of every voter. That polling  
 41 locations are staffed sufficiently by trained people so  
 42 that voters can get in and out fast. That absentee voting  
 43 is easy and reliable and that every vote is counted.

44 So I hope that Allegheny County treats these  
 45 issues with the gravity that they deserve. I think this

1 is a real opportunity for us to lead the way on issues of  
 2 election integrity because in a democracy, voting is  
 3 sacred and nothing should be higher priority than to  
 4 ensure that elections are fair and secure. So thank you.  
 5 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Next?  
 6 MR. BARKER: Next up is Nancy Robinson.  
 7 MS. ROBINSON: Hi, my name is Nancy Robinson  
 8 1238 Varner Road in Whitehall. The November election, at  
 9 three o'clock in the morning I was standing there watching  
 10 my television in shock because I felt that there was  
 11 something wrong with the way the election turned out.  
 12 Because of that, I learned that there was a recount that  
 13 was being requested. So I was one of the people that went  
 14 around getting my neighbors to sign a petition to do that.  
 15 Attached to that petition was a --- now, I'm not going to  
 16 find it, was a --- wait a minute, what did I do? Did I  
 17 leave anything down there?  
 18 Anyway, there was a piece of paper by a  
 19 professor at the University of Michigan named Halderman,  
 20 who said that --- that our --- the elections are very  
 21 vulnerable to hacking by the Russians. And the kind of  
 22 election machines that we have in Allegheny County are  
 23 really vulnerable to that because they provide for no ---  
 24 no paper ballot and no way to re --- recount.  
 25 One of the things that he recommends is that  
 26 the only way --- there is a gold standard for counting and  
 27 that is to have paper ballots that are counted in public  
 28 before the ballots are even taken out of the room. That's  
 29 the gold standard for elections. I'm --- I'm sure you all  
 30 know that, but I just want you to know that I'm very, very  
 31 concerned about our next election. I'm very, very  
 32 concerned about malfeasance by different actors around.  
 33 So please try to find a way to make accurate elections or  
 34 we will not have a democracy. Thank you very much.  
 35 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Next?  
 36 MR. BARKER: Next up is Gwen DiPietro.  
 37 MS. DIPIETRO: Hello. As you may recall, I am  
 38 an experienced election judge, and I have several comments  
 39 to add to those that I gave to you two weeks ago.  
 40 First, I strongly support a transition to new  
 41 voting machines. After years of good service, the  
 42 machines that we have are ready to be replaced. In both  
 43 of the past two elections that I worked at the Carnegie  
 44 Mellon 14th Ward --- 7th District polling place we had  
 45 machines stop working. One of them, at the very last

1 a quick survey given to the election judges at the end of  
 2 the day or to be returned within a week. I have a couple  
 3 of other ideas, but the idea is to collect data, access it  
 4 and provide pragmatic specific things to do to improve the  
 5 voting experience. Thank you.  
 6 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Next?  
 7 MR. BARKER: Next up is Juliet Zavon.  
 8 MS. ZAVON: My comments are also on the theme of  
 9 voting machines and no, we didn't all coordinate. We need  
 10 more transparency about Allegheny's plans for voting  
 11 machines. Governor Wolf has said they must be replaced by  
 12 2020. We have a hard deadline.  
 13 Pennsylvania counties, including Allegheny  
 14 County have known about the problems for years. Obsolete  
 15 technologies that's unreliable, hackable and insecure.  
 16 Some officials persist in believing it's secure because  
 17 the machines aren't connected to the internet. That's not  
 18 true. It's an unfortunate myth. Equally serious, since  
 19 these old machines don't record votes on paper, there is  
 20 no way to do a recount or an audit, period. Why do you  
 21 think Saccone did not demand an audit when Conor Lamb won  
 22 that race? He would've if he could've, I'm sure, but  
 23 there's no way to do an audit or a recount with the  
 24 machines we have. If we can't verify election results, we  
 25 can't confirm their accuracy, period.  
 26 In medicine, you can repeat a test to confirm it  
 27 but we can't do that with the voting machines we have now.  
 28 So what is going on in Allegheny County, thinking,  
 29 discussions, anything about replacing the voting machines?  
 30 We hear not one word. No press release, no meetings  
 31 involving the public, no announcement, for instance, about  
 32 cyber security experts involved in this election process  
 33 for new machines. What is this election process?  
 34 A recent article in the New Yorker describes  
 35 vendors of voting machines offering lavish hospitality and  
 36 travel to County officials across the country who make  
 37 these purchase decisions. We've read about counties  
 38 deciding to purchase equipment that security experts say  
 39 is a bad choice. I've copied for you the link to this  
 40 article, which is not the only article I've ever read  
 41 recently on that subject or even over the years. What is  
 42 going on in Allegheny County?  
 43 Citizens are justifiably concerned that the  
 44 process to choose a new system is taking place behind  
 45 closed doors without public involvement or oversight,

1 moment when we were trying to collect the votes off of the  
 2 last machine, that machine shut down. So as you know,  
 3 aging infrastructure is prone to failure and the blue  
 4 ribbon report that came out recently is a strong  
 5 indictment of the actions that we need to take this year.  
 6 Second, at the same time that the County is  
 7 exploring new voting infrastructure, there is room for  
 8 complementary improvements on the human side, and I'd like  
 9 to focus on both registration and processing voters  
 10 efficiently. Regarding registration, the County election  
 11 website should do a couple of things it doesn't currently  
 12 do.  
 13 First, it should identify common mistakes that  
 14 you should avoid when you're trying to register to vote.  
 15 Second, it should clearly state that you can only vote at  
 16 your assigned polling place. A lot of people don't know  
 17 that still, especially if they've moved in from a  
 18 different district. And then third, they need to remind  
 19 voters to look for their registration cards once they've  
 20 tried to register to confirm that they successfully have  
 21 registered and to find their --- the address of their  
 22 polling place.  
 23 The second thing I wanted to say about human  
 24 processes is the need to process voters efficiently, as  
 25 Marie was saying. So does the election division use bench  
 26 marking? Does it look at what other similar counties are  
 27 doing for best practices? That would make sense. Like we  
 28 --- in many, many cases, we're asked to give feedback  
 29 about how our experience is in consumer products or other  
 30 types of activities where we're trying to do something on  
 31 the internet. For example, how did it go? Well, the  
 32 County could do that too.  
 33 So specifically, the County could ask election  
 34 judges such as myself or other poll workers or the Rovers  
 35 or the poll watchers or the election protection division,  
 36 how did it go? Collect hard data about that. Were there  
 37 enough poll workers, were there enough machines? Did the  
 38 tools work properly? Were there any issues with the  
 39 machines? Did the poll workers feel like they were  
 40 trained adequately? How long were the lines and where  
 41 were the lines long at peak times? How could we fix those  
 42 types of bottlenecks?  
 43 We can be quantitative about it and very  
 44 pragmatic and make the voting experience better for a lot  
 45 of voters. This could be as simple as collecting data by

1 without proper input and participation of the cyber  
 2 security community. The public's faith in Allegheny  
 3 County elections and Allegheny County governance is on the  
 4 line. We simply need information and dialogue. I ask for  
 5 your help in making sure the process is transparent,  
 6 involves the public and is of the highest ethical and  
 7 technical standard. Thank you.  
 8 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Next?  
 9 MR. BARKER: Next is Nathaniel Yap.  
 10 MR. YAP: Good evening, esteemed Allegheny  
 11 County Council Members. My name is Nathaniel Yap and I've  
 12 been a resident of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania for almost  
 13 five years now. Thank you for listening to my testimony  
 14 regarding voting elections, and in particular, I'm going  
 15 to focus a little bit on absentee balloting here in  
 16 Allegheny County and in Pennsylvania.  
 17 I firmly believe that the ability to have  
 18 confidence in free and fair elections where all eligible  
 19 voters have ease of access to voting is the cornerstone of  
 20 our democracy. If we lose the ability to have confidence  
 21 in being able to hold legitimate elections where all  
 22 eligible voters can cast their ballot with ease, we put at  
 23 risk our democracy. Because once we lose confidence in  
 24 our elections, fewer and fewer people will participate in  
 25 elections and without the participation of the people, we  
 26 ultimately lose the ability to have a strong and real  
 27 democracy.  
 28 In turn, we lost our ability to have true free  
 29 will or the necessary debates that we want to have on the  
 30 many relevant issues that affect our lives. Since I moved  
 31 to Pennsylvania from California in July of 2014, I've  
 32 always found the State of Elections Administration in  
 33 Pennsylvania to be willfully lacking and inadequate  
 34 compared to California.  
 35 Absentee voting in particular is a confusing and  
 36 cumbersome multi-step process in Pennsylvania and not  
 37 everyone is allowed to vote absentee. There are certain  
 38 requirements that must be met in order to qualify for an  
 39 absentee ballot in Pennsylvania, and then an absentee  
 40 ballot must be applied for each and every single election.  
 41 In contrast, in California, a voter needs to  
 42 submit their request for an absentee ballot just once and  
 43 they are automatically registered to vote absentee for all  
 44 elections going forward. It is easy, it is simple and  
 45 anyone and everyone can vote absentee. In the 2018

1 general election, over 65 percent --- 65 percent of  
 2 ballots casted in California were done so by absentee  
 3 ballot. Clearly, there is a demand for it.  
 4 Also in California, absentee ballots need to be  
 5 postmarked by Election Day, unlike in Pennsylvania, where  
 6 ballots must be received by Election Day. That's a nuance  
 7 that I think needs to be changed here in Pennsylvania.  
 8 Further, limited or adequate access to absentee balloting  
 9 disproportionately impacts those of lower income  
 10 backgrounds and communities of color.  
 11 I voted absentee by mail-in ballot because it  
 12 was convenient and suited my work schedule. I worked in a  
 13 job where I had to be in the office by five o'clock in the  
 14 morning and I typically stayed in the office until eight  
 15 o'clock p.m. I ate lunch in the office and most days, I  
 16 didn't leave the office at all. I also held a job where I  
 17 often had to travel on short notice, often with just a  
 18 day's notice. Were it not for no-excuse absentee  
 19 balloting, I probably would not have been able to vote.  
 20 I find it disturbing that a number of absentee  
 21 ballot applications and absentee ballots were not  
 22 processed appropriately or on time in Allegheny County.  
 23 This must change and it needs to be prioritized. I also  
 24 understand that many of the rules around absentee voting  
 25 are established by the state government in Harrisburg and  
 26 do not fall under the jurisdiction of the County.  
 27 However, Allegheny County, as we all well know  
 28 is the second most populous county in the Commonwealth of  
 29 Pennsylvania, comprising 10 percent of the state's  
 30 population. Our County has leverage. I would urge the  
 31 County to use that leverage to work closely with state  
 32 legislators in our region and work with the governor to  
 33 revise the rules around absentee balloting, so ease of  
 34 voting and access to voting are increased significantly in  
 35 our County and across Pennsylvania. Thank you.  
 36 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Next?  
 37 MR. BARKER: Next is David Adams.  
 38 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: David Adams? Next?  
 39 MR. BARKER: Next and last is Alison Fujito.  
 40 MS. FUJITO: Here I am again. You might wonder  
 41 why I'm so deeply concerned that our Board of Health is  
 42 pushing Gardasil HPV vaccine. They're no longer trying to  
 43 mandate it, so why does it matter if they recommend it?  
 44 There are multiple serious reasons why it matters, but I  
 45 only have three minutes to explain coherently, so I'm just

1 non-addictive. Please don't let our health department  
 2 continue to be Merck's sales force.  
 3 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Thank you. Is that ---  
 4 MR. BARKER: That's it.  
 5 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: The last one. Does someone  
 6 want to make a motion to adjourn?  
 7 MR. MACEY: So moved.  
 8 MR. DEMARCO: Second.  
 9 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Second. All those in favor  
 10 signify by saying aye.  
 11 (Chorus of ayes.)  
 12 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Opposed? Meeting adjourned.

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1 going to talk about one issue, the aluminum adjuvant which  
 2 is designed to trigger a stronger immune response to the  
 3 vaccine.  
 4 Aluminum in vaccines has actually never been  
 5 studied for safety. Aluminum was declared GRAS or  
 6 generally recognized as safe, by the FDA in 1975 without  
 7 any studies which is remarkable because in 1953, they were  
 8 injecting it to induce seizures in monkeys for study  
 9 purposes. The material safety data sheet gives a long  
 10 list of very serious symptoms of toxicity.  
 11 Now, you might've heard it said that we actually  
 12 ingest more aluminum in our food than there is in  
 13 vaccines, and that's true, but we only absorb .07 to .039  
 14 percent of what we ingest. The injected aluminum adjuvant  
 15 is designed to be completely absorbed and to stay in the  
 16 system so that it triggers a long-term antibody response.  
 17 So how much is too much? I crunched the numbers for you  
 18 on the fourth page of your packet. The FDA does recognize  
 19 a safe limit of five micrograms per kilogram for aluminum  
 20 in IV-feeding, noting that higher amounts than that could  
 21 result in central nervous system and bone toxicity,  
 22 especially in those with impaired kidney function.  
 23 Assuming the same limit for injections, the safe  
 24 limit for the average 9 to 11-year-olds who are getting  
 25 Gardasil would be up to 170 micrograms. Gardasil contains  
 26 500 micrograms of aluminum adjuvant in each dose. There  
 27 are two to three doses depending on age. It's also not  
 28 the only aluminum-containing vaccine as you can see on the  
 29 next page. If we look at Gardasil's pre-licensure safety  
 30 studies, we find that 13,000 test subjects given what was  
 31 labeled as a placebo were actually given just the aluminum  
 32 adjuvant.  
 33 Now, remember, that's designed to illicit a  
 34 stronger immune response. No way can that be considered a  
 35 placebo. In my view, the FDA should never have approved  
 36 this vaccine. Now, I'm not against offering a safe  
 37 well-studied vaccine to those who may be at increased risk  
 38 for the targeted disease. In the case of HPV, many of  
 39 those risks are known and easily avoidable like smoking,  
 40 drug use or multiple sexual partners, other STDs. But for  
 41 our health department to spend their resources on getting  
 42 full compliance for every child for this vaccine, that's  
 43 not public health. That's marketing. And it's marketing  
 44 for the same industry that told us opioids were safe and
